BAD NEWS

Yesterday's despatches from Berlin and Vienna are rather disquieting, though German and Austrian despatches have not in the past been remarkable for their truthfulness. News from the Russian front has been scarce for some days and, in the earlier campaigns, no news from Russia generally meant bad news, while the absence of news from the western front has generally proven the forerunner of a big Allied movement.

The Russians are spread over an enormously extended front and are far away from the shipping point of their supplies and it is not unlikely that, for the time being, they are short of munitions, and the fact that their recent efforts have been spasmodic and confined to small sections of the front rather confirms this

Though the Austrians are getting very short of men, they still, like the Germans, have ample supplies of shells and big guns. 
