ALLIED GAINS RECORDED ON EVERY FRONT

TEUTONS RETIRING IN CARPATHIANS -- RUSSIANS MOVING TOWARD LEMBERG

GERMANS BRING FRESH TROOPS TO WEST FRONT

French Capture Trenches and Prisoners on Verdun Front—German Division Brought from Russian Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Sept. 22.—The French have captured several trench sections on the Somme front, taking prisoners at the same time.

On the Verdun front the French have advanced to the east of Fort Vaux and at Chapire wood. The Germans attempted several attacks, preceded by mine explosions, but all were repulsed.

The Germans have recalled a whole division from the Russian front in order to reinforce their positions on the Somme where the Allies continue to inflict enormous losses on the enemy.

Canadian Casualties.

Ottawa, Sept. 22.—Canadian casualties since the beginning of the war amount to 37,861. In the fighting of Monday and Tuesday the Canadians lost four hundred killed; twelve hundred wounded and three hundred missing.

RUSSIANS ARE MOVING TOWARD LEMBERG AGAIN

Berlin and Vienna Admit That the Teutons Have Been Compelled to Retire—Allied Success in the Balkans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 22.—The Russians are moving towards Lemberg and have repulsed every Austro-Hungarian attack.

Berlin and Vienna admit that the Russians have compelled the Teutonic armies to retire in the Carpathians.

Turks Assisting.

Turkish soldiers, under Austrian and German officers and equipped with German material, are aiding the Teutons on the Riga, Galician and Dobrudja fronts.

Balkan Success.

Bucharest, Sept. 22.—It is officially reported that the Rumanians, Russians and Serbians have defeated the Germans, Bulgarians and Turks under General Von Mackensen in the Dobrudja region, notwithstanding the fact that the enemy had received heavy reinforcements.

The fighting, which was of the fiercest description, continued for six days without cessation and the enemy were compelled to retire to the south, burning villages as they went.

SIX MONTHS FOR SUPPLYING LIQUOR

R. D Morrison was sentenced to six months imprisonment at the police court this morning for supplying liquor to Indians. Several Indians were fined for being drunk and disorderly.

In spite of the backward season, the district exhibits at the fair this year are better than those of any previous year. CAPTAIN ENGLISH DEAD

CAPTAIN A. W. AGNEW HAS DIED OF WOUNDS

It was with the deepest regret that citizens learned this morning of the death from wounds of Captain A. W. Agnew, who was formerly a resident of Prince Rupert. Captain Agnew was severely wounded some months ago and lost an eye. It was thought that he would not be accepted for further service, but on August 23rd he returned to the trenches and was wounded last Sunday. He was taken to hospital at Amiens, where an operation was performed. The operation was apparently successful but the gallant officer died shortly afterwards. He was 35 years of age and leaves a widow and two children. The sympathy of the whole community will go out to Mrs. Agnew and her children and to Mr. William Agnew of Victoria, father of the deceased officer.

GOVERNMENT TO BLAME FOR THE DRYDOCK INACTIVITY

MILES COTTON EXPLAINS TO MAYOR WHAT TRANSPIRED BETWEEN HIS FIRM; THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC AND THE BORDEN GOVERNMENT AT OTTAWA

The following letter from Miles P. Cotton, including an extract from Premier Borden's letter to President Chamberlin, in which he advises that the drydock be not leased, throws further light on the situation. Mayor McCaffery is certainly getting to the root of the matter and it is up to the citizens to lend him every assistance in seeing that the plans of the government are re-arranged so that Mr. Cotton's firm may go ahead with their shipbuilding.

Vancouver, Sept. 19, 1916.

M. P. McCaffery, mayor,

Prince Rupert, B. C.

Dear Sir:—I wired you on the train that I would send you a letter on my arrival in Vancouver stating the condition of affairs as regards the leasing of Prince Rupert plant by myself and associates.

I have spent three months in the East on this matter, negotiating with Mr. Chamberlin, president of the Grand Trunk Railway, and the government officials. We have our financial arrangements and organization complete and had arranged for a half million dollars to put into this business, which is more than ample for operating expenses. I went East on this matter with the practical assurance that the Grand Trunk would give us this lease provided we could show we were substantially able to carry the matter through, and after all this time spent negotiating with them Mr. Chamberlin has decided that they will not lease the plant without the sanction of the government, and he showed me a letter from the Premier, Sir Robert Borden, ruling on this matter. I am quoting this letter below:

"To E. J. Chamberlin, president of the Grand Trunk Railway System.

"Dear Sir—Regarding the leasing of the Prince Rupert drydock and shipbuilding plant, I have submitted this matter to my colleagues and it has been decided that pending the investigation of the Railway Committee it would be unwise to lease this plant at the present time. I am returning you herewith letter outlining the proposition submitted by Mr. Cotton to you."

(Signed) R. L. BORDEN, premier. Mr. Chamberlin, in showing me this letter stated that as far as he was concerned this was final and he would not negotiate or discuss the leasing of this plant

any longer at present. I subsequently interviewed the government again at Ottawa, requesting that they use influence with the Grand Trunk to reopen this matter, but to date have had no success.

We are still prepared to go ahead if the Grand Trunk will negotiate with us in the matter, and I regret very much that we have had no better success in our efforts than this.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION

The annual meeting of the Northern B. C. Agricultural Association was held in the city hall last evening when President A. J. Prudhomme presided over a small attendance, the majority of the members evidently being too busy at the Exhibition Building.

Mr Prudhomme said that though the season had been backward, in some places the farmers losing their crops through frost, the agricultural exhibits were better than ever. They had added twenty per cent. to the table space which gave the appearance of bareness at some points but there were actually more exhibits than at any other fair. He was particularly pleased to see the high standard of the district exhibits which he considered better than last year.

He regretted that in a fish country, there was not a larger display of fish and complimented the mining men on the magnificent showing they had made this year, the exhibits being much finer and of greater number than before. The Indian exhibit and that of locally grown flowers were both better than ever.

He thanked the G. T. P. for the rebating of the freight on all exhibits brought in which are to be auctioned for patriotic purposes and intimated that the produce would be sold tonight.

The financial condition of the association was better than ever, thanks to the assistance given by the city and a larger bonus from the government. He then called upon the members to elect officers for the ensuing year.

Mayor McCaffery suggested that, as there was a small attendance, it might be well to postpone the election of office-bearers until some future date. This was decided upon.

CLEMENCY

The jury in the case of Mr. Pierce, the member for Wadena, Sask., which found this gentleman guilty of accepting a bribe of \$500, asked for clemency. Why should they? Why should any jury ask for clemency for any man who has so faithfully broken his bond to the people whom he represents? A higher standard of politics is demanded throughout the Dominion, but that high standard will never be attained by extending clemency to the men who are found guilty of a flagrant breach of faith. Any man who accepts a bribe for political or any other purposes is a traitor to his country, and to his fellows, and, as such, should be dealt with to the limit of the law. It is time that an example was made of some of the men who have brought politics in this country to such a low level, and the fact that the guilty party is prominent enough to have become a representative of the people in the Legislature should not stand in the way.

The fact that the guilty party has reached such a degree of prominence that the people have trusted him by making him their representative is an aggravation instead of an extenuation of the offence. The ideals of any man aspiring to such a position should be away above any question of personal gain and the only way by which men of the stamp of Mr. Pierce can be kept from dragging the name of Canada in the mud is to make an example of every offender until our provincial parliaments are swept clean.

Had the same jury been sitting on the case of a man who had been raised in criminal surroundings, and who had been found guilty of stealing even \$5, instead of accepting a bribe of \$500, would they have made any appeal for clemency? Would they not rather have decided that such a character must be handled

with the utmost severity? Yet, the latter man, who has known little but crime all his life, would really be less worthy of blame than the man who has posed as the champion of the people in their parliament. The public life of Canada must be kept clean, and it can only be kept clean by using the broom of the law with the utmost rigor and without fear or favor.

What about the party or parties who offered the bribe? Are they to go free? The man who offers a bribe is equally guilty with the man who accepts it and should suffer accordingly.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The general consensus of opinion seems to be that the war will last into next year. Lord Kitchener's forecast of a three years war will probably come out just about right.

New York is liable to be embroiled in a bitter labor battle, owing to the non-recognition of the men's union by the traction companies. Apart from the merits of the question of the demands made in the first instance, it seems ridiculous that, at this time of day, any corporation should seek to deny to working men the right to organize; a right which capital has always taken to itself.

What is the use of asking Sir Wilfrid Laurier to appoint new members to the Parliament Buildings reconstruction committee if Bob Rogers has already decided that the buildings have to be built entirely anew with the contractors making 8 per cent. on the cost and 20 per cent. depreciation on their plant?

So it was Winston Churchill who had a hand in the invention of the new motor warfare. Winston got in bad over the Antwerp fiasco but we must never forget that he had the fleet ready at the critical moment.
