## VENIZELOS LEADS GREEK REVOLUTIONISTS

### ALLIED AIRMEN PLAY HAVOC WITH GERMAN DEFENCES -- ANOTHER ZEP. RAID

#### REBELLION AT LAST BREAKS OUT IN GREECE

Venizelos will Lead Revolutionists—Crete has Thirty Thousand Armed Men—Allies Win in Dobrudja.

(Special to The Daily News)

Athens, Sept. 26.—M. Venizelos, former premier of Greece, is to head a revolution against King Constantine and his ministers. The Allies' strong man in Greece has arrived at Athens to lead a rebellion of the people of Macedonia and Crete. Crete is now in open rebellion and thirty thousand armed revolutionists have seized control of the island.

Ex-Premier Venizelos did his utmost to persuade King Constantine to start hostilities against the Central Powers but all his efforts failing and a large majority of the Greek people being strongly in favor of the Allies, Venizelos has now thrown down the gauntlet to the government and will lead the people openly.

#### Victory in Dobrudja.

A report from a British correspondent in Petrograd says that the Russians and Rumanians in the Dobrudja region have scored great victories, taking over two thousand prisoners.

#### ROADWAY WANTED

A petition was presented to the city council last night by ten residents and property holders for a six-foot plank roadway from Sixth Avenue to Fourth Street thence along Fifth to Seal Cove Circle. The city clerk informed the council that such a request had been turned down on two previous occasions. The cost would be about \$9,500.

Mayor McCaffery said that they had promised Spitzer, Rorick & Company that there would be no further issue of bonds.

Ald. Dybhavn said that councils in the past had undertaken such work at the request of a few people and trouble had resulted. He thought it unwise for the council to act on this petition and moved accordingly. His motion was seconded by Ald. McRae and carried unanimously.

#### G. T. P. AGREEMENT

At the close of the city council meeting last evening, Ald. Casey moved that the city solicitor be instructed to bring down a report at the next meeting as to whether the agreement between the city and the Grand Trunk Pacific is still binding. Ald. McClymont seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

#### GERMAN FORTS AND TRENCHES ARE FLATTENED

Allied Aviators Wipe out Everything in Terrific Raid on Enemy Lines—French Have New Plane.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Sept. 27.—Hundreds of tons of explosives, dropped by the Allied air squadrons, have turned many miles of German trenches into shapeless masses and towns which last week were more or less intact now no longer exist. A recent visitor to the western front reports that many miles of zig-zag German communication trenches have been flattened.

The town of Combes, recently a German stronghold, is now only a name while the Germans holding the various railroad depots in western Belgium are in momentary fear of being destroyed.

More than twenty German munition depots have been destroyed, along with hundreds of German batteries. The Allied aviators, who have carried out all this destruction, are simply swarming thick in the air over the western front.

#### New French Plane.

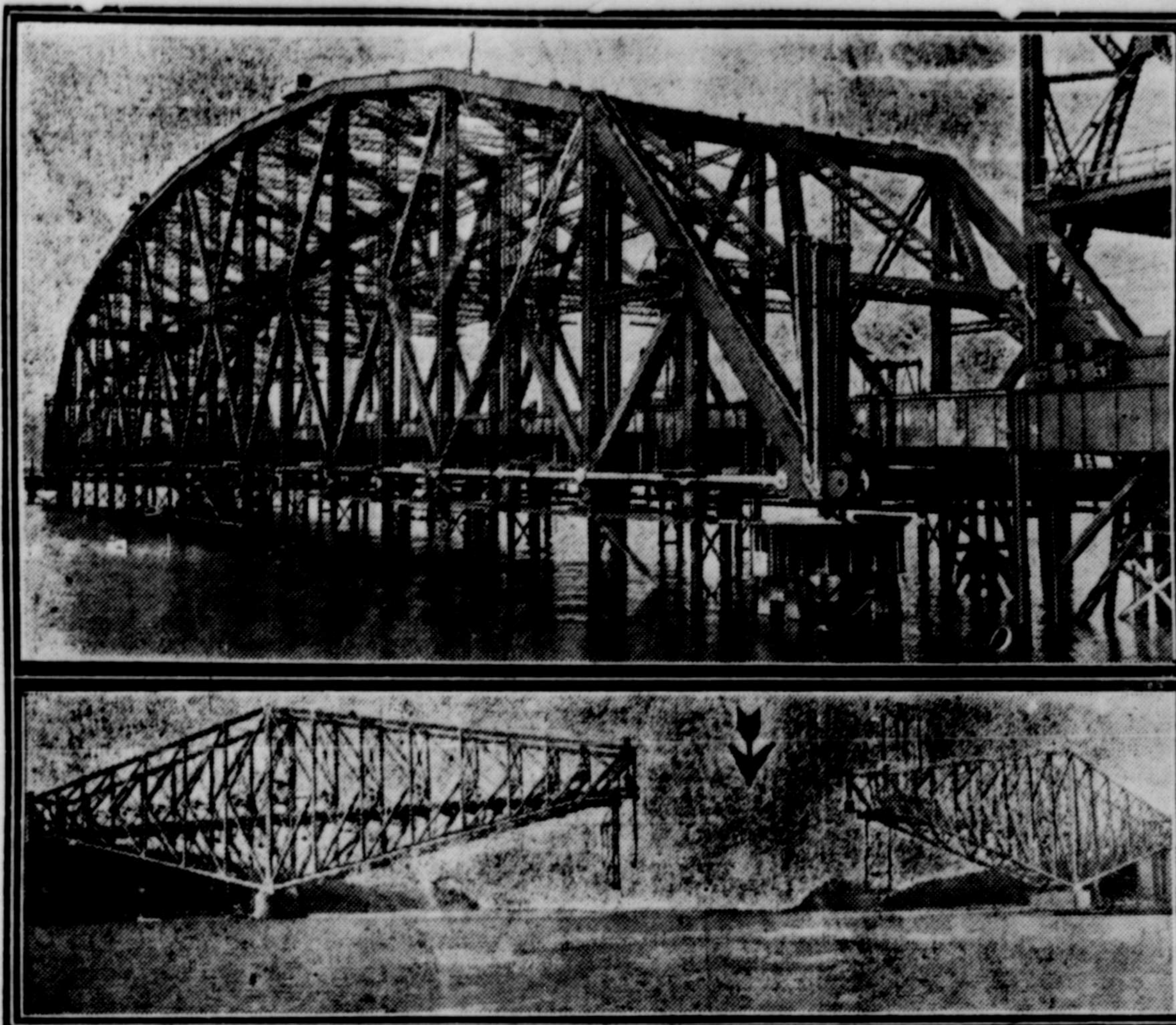
The French used today for the first time an entirely new type of aeroplane which is capable of flying a thousand miles without having to descend to earth. It is declared in Paris that those machines, which are being turned out in great numbers, are to be used in a contemplated air raid on Berlin.

#### AUSTRALIAN PLAN FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

The government of Australia is putting the question of aid to returned soldiers up to the men at the front. About a third of the census papers have been returned and of these 25 per cent. favor settlement on the land, while 35 per cent. claim reinstatement in their former civilian positions. The Commonwealth Government has calculated that \$100,000,000 will be needed for an adequate repatriation scheme, and of this sum it is anticipated that \$75,000,000 will be raised by public subscription. Successful applicants will receive \$2,500 worth of land and \$2,500 worth of improvements. The total will be repayable by the settler over a term of years, the government bearing any losses. Ex-soldiers wishing to acquire business in the towns will be treated with the same generosity, and the scheme is to be controlled by trustees who are entirely free from any political influence.—United Empire Magazine.

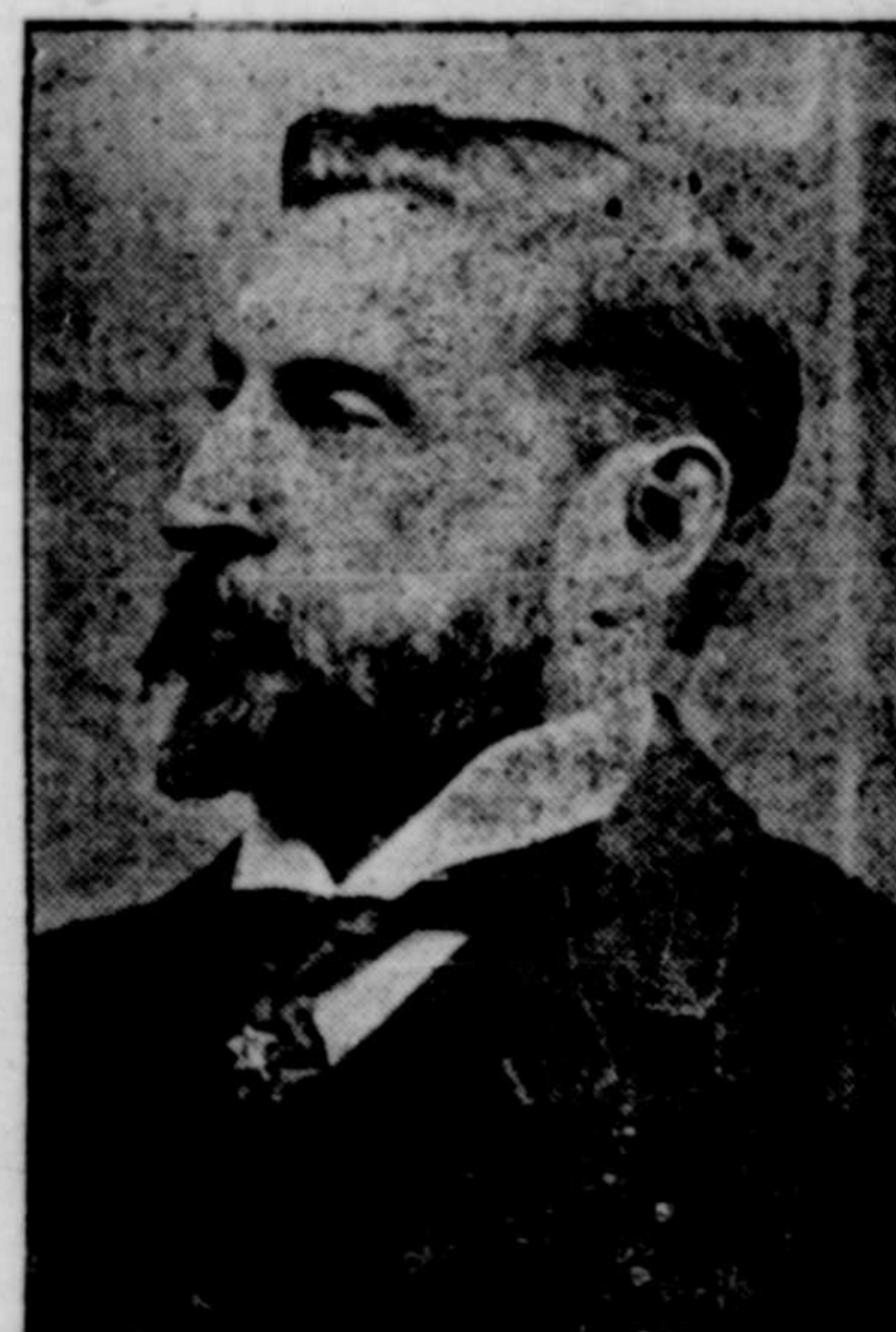

#### CITY WEIGH MASTER

Weston Coyney having resigned his position as city weigh master, Kenneth J. Smith made application last evening to the city council for the position on the same terms as previously. The city clerk said that there had been several requests for the use of the scales and that the matter was of some urgency. Ald. McClymont, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, moved that Mr. Smith be given the appointment. This carried unanimously.

#### SEATTLE LAUNCHES FIRST BIG VESSEL

Seattle last Thursday witnessed the launching of the first steel vessel ever built at the port. The Niels Nielsen took the water just four months after her keel had been laid by the Skinner & Eddy Company. The vessel is the largest ever built in the northwest. She is 423 feet, nine inches over all, with a beam of 54 feet and a hold depth of 29 feet, 9 inches. She is of 8,800 tons dead weight and has a cargo capacity of 12,500 tons. The launch marks an epoch in the history of the Puget Sound city.

Practically every bit of the material which went into the construction of the vessel had to be brought across the continent, and one of the most remarkable features is that Mr. Skinner and Mr. Eddy, the heads of the construction company, had no previous experience in shipbuilding though they had proven themselves successful men in other lines of business. Much of the credit for the speedy and successful work is given to David Rogers, the superintendent of the shipbuilding yard. Mr. Rogers was born of Scotch parents, at Carrickfergus, County Antrim, Ireland, fifty-two years ago. Seattle is looking forward, with good grounds, to a great future in the world of mercantile shipbuilding.

#### FIRE BRIGADE

Fire Chief McDonald's report for the month of August shows three alarms turned in, the brigade being successful in preventing any property loss on each occasion. The cost of up-keep of the fire fighting force for the month was \$979, which amount includes the cost of new uniforms.

#### ZEPPELIN RAID LAST NIGHT ON ENGLISH COAST

No Damage Reported—Fishermen Saw Zeppelins at Sea—British Aviators Bombed St. Denis.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 26.—Another Zeppelin raid on the east coast of England occurred last night. Several hostile airships were observed crossing the east and northeast coast line between ten thirty and midnight. Bombs were dropped in the northeast counties but there are no details of the loss of life or damage to property yet to hand.

British fishermen in the North Sea report that they saw four Zeppelins yesterday going in a northeasterly direction. One of them was apparently damaged.

#### British Raid.

Amsterdam, Sept. 26.—It is reported that forty Germans were killed or injured in a British air raid on St. Denis, in western Belgium on Friday. Two German airship sheds and three Zeppelins were destroyed.

#### LIEUT. J. W. NICHOLLS AMONG THE WOUNDED

The latest casualty list contains the name of Lieut. J. W. Nicholls, Canadian Mounted Rifles, amongst the wounded. There is no doubt that this is J. W. Nicholls, late of the staff of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company who left for the front some time ago. His many friends in Prince Rupert will wish him a speedy recovery and an early return to the trenches.

#### EDITORIAL STAFF INTERNED

The German military authorities have established a punitive camp for troublesome Germans, and have consigned thereto the whole of the editorial staff of the Socialist daily paper, the Leipzig "Volkszeitung." These journalists are to be confined in the camp until the end of the war.—Tit Bits.

**GERMANY COMPLAINS**

Germany, the nation which raided defenceless little Belgium, bringing unspeakable horrors upon its women and children; the nation which carried on a grim submarine warfare against defenceless passenger vessels, even to the sinking of the Lusitania, with its hundreds of women and children; the nation which has carried on a series of Zeppelin raids on the towns of England and Scotland, with no further military aim than to scare the wits out of women and children; the nation which first brought asphyxiating gases into use as a weapon of war; the nation which played liquid fire upon its enemies; in short, the nation which has defied every law of civilized warfare, if warfare can ever be described as civilized, is to register a complaint with the International Red Cross Society against the use by the British of "travelling land forts," as being "contrary to the methods of civilized warfare."

The despatch from Geneva to this effect may be by way of a joke, though it is rather a grim subject for joking. It would be just as logical for the Germans to object to the use of machine guns because they can be moved about from place to place and carry some sort of a defence for the gunners. Though the press is debarred from publishing a minute description of the new machine, it may be said that it is of the nature of a battery fixed inside an armored tank, on the same principle as a compass is placed in its box. The tank, which is impervious to all fire except the explosion of a "Jack Johnson" or other big shell, is fitted with "caterpillar" feet all the way round and it rolls forward on those feet, while the men and the guns inside remain perfectly balanced. There is absolutely nothing about it that can be taken exception to by the enemy excepting its effectiveness. It is

much more humane, for instance, than the universally approved methods of mining the enemy's trenches, by which hundreds of men are blown to atoms without any hope of offering resistance and without a moment's warning. Were the Germans able to shoot holes in its hide, there would be no complaint. It is said that, if the Allies can manufacture a sufficient number of the new machines, the war would be over in a matter of weeks. May they get all they need and then some.

**BOB PEEVED**

Bob Rogers seems to have become quite peeved because the court in the Agricultural College enquiry insisted on getting at the straight facts. Bob evidently thought that a judge, with whose appointment he had a good deal to do, should have had sense enough to deal leniently and blindly with the evidence of the Minister of Public Works. When Mr. Rogers was completely cornered and his "memory" was shown to be a little "faulty," he turned on the judge and accused him of "graft" because he was accepting a fee for presiding at the enquiry, besides his judicial salary.

Supposing the judge is at fault, though that is a debatable point, what had that to do with the increase in the tender for the building? Had Bob been able to show that Judge Galt had caused the contractor's tender to be increased to serve his own ends, then Mr. Rogers had good grounds for being "peeved," but, as it was, Bob's ill-tempered remarks were entirely irrelevant and had no bearing on the case whatever. Bob seems to be suffering a little from his contact with Sir Sam Hughes and his manners are taking on quite a Hughes' touch. Between Sam and Bob, the Borden government is in very grave danger of finding itself torpedoed

by its friends very shortly. Affairs have been going wrong for Mr. Rogers for some time back, and he has a big burden to carry in the shape of the reconstruction of the new Parliament Buildings, as the opposition seem to be determined that "Manitoba methods" will be barred in this instance. It would be a splendid thing for the Borden government if it could arrange to have Hon. Robert Rogers join Sir Sam Hughes in Europe with the camera brigade and that he should stay there indefinitely.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Bob Rogers has apologized to the people of Manitoba for the part he played in the appointment of Judge Galt. Bob has many more serious offences against the same people for which he has not yet offered an apology.

The Germans think it perfectly humane to kill twenty-eight defenceless civilians and to injure ninety-nine more by means of bombs dropped from the air, yet they object to the British raiding the German trenches enclosed in "armored tanks." The latter is war against warriors; the former is war against women and children.

Canada's second domestic war loan has been over-subscribed by about seventy per cent., while the first was doubled, yet the Minister of Finance placed the first big war loan in New York without ever dreaming of asking the Canadian people if they would care to invest money at better than five per cent. The rush to take

up the new war bonds is both good patriotism and good business.

The halibut fishermen are facing a serious situation in the shortage of bait. Now is the time for the department at Ottawa to take up the question of government prospecting for herring. The outlay on such a scheme would be returned many times over and is just as worthy of outlay as are experimental farms.


