ALLIE CAPTURE THIEPVAL AND COMBLES

TWELVE HUNDRED PRISONERS TAKEN -- GERMANS FLED FROM THEIR TRENCHES

GERMANS FLED FROM TRENCHES ON SOMME FRONT

Twelve Hundred Prisoners Taken When Thiepval and Combles Fall — Prisoners Say Morale Going.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 27.—The British and French have now completed the capture of Thiepval and Combles, two of the strongest of the German fortified towns on the Somme front.

The excellence of the Allied artillery was responsible for the collapse of the enemy, the new big guns simply wiping out the defences. When the infantry attacked the Germans fled from their trenches, discarding rifles and other war material.

Twelve hundred prisoners were taken at Combles. The town is a shapeless mass of ruins and is filled with German dead. The losses of the Allies were light, thanks to the terrific preliminary bombardment and the splendid use made of the new "tanks" in the attack.

Captured German prisoners assert that the morale of their troops is weakening owing to the ferocity of the Allied attacks and that they are incapable of offering a prolonged resistance following long spells of constant trench duty without any relief.

Further German losses.

Paris, Sept. 27.—The Germans have again experienced severe losses in unsuccessfully attempting an advance against the French at Thiaumont and Fleury.

SIR H. DRAYTON FAVORS LEASING THE DRYDOCK

Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the railway commission, and A. H. Smith, president of the New York Central lines, arrived from the south this morning on a tour of inspection in connection with their work as commissioners. They were accompanied by H. L. Ingersoll, assistant to A. H. Smith, and F. H. Phippen, counsel for the C. N. R. They were met here by W. P. Hinton, W. C. C. Mehan and George A. McNicholl. Early this morning they were taken over the drydock by J. H. Pillsbury.

On returning to the depot, Sir Henry Drayton was interviewed by Mayor McCaffery in regard to the possibilities of starting work at the drydock. Sir Henry expressed the opinion that the dock should have been busy months ago. He asked for the figures in regard to the Cotton lease, which the mayor said Mr. Hinton would be able to supply on the train. Sir Henry said that, if the terms of the proposed lease were reasonable and satisfactory to the company, an agreement should be reached immediately and work started. He stated that he thought it most desirable that the company should lease the plant. Mr. Hinton assured him that the company considered the Cotton offer reasonable and that they were ready to carry out the agreement with Mr. Cotton and his associates just as soon as the government at Ottawa was agreeable. The party left for the east on a special, accompanied by General Superintendent Mehan, just ahead of the passenger this forenoon.

WESTHOLME ACTION DISMISSED BY COURT

L. W. Patmore received a wire from E. P. Davis, K. C., this morning stating that Judge Murphy has dismissed the action of the Westholme Lumber Company against the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company. The lumber company claimed heavy damages for loss of business and extra cost of handling lumber, owing to the filling up by the railway company of the entrance to Cameron Cove.



Mr. McLauchlan went out to look at some mining claims on the Keman River in the Gardner Canal country along with David Stewart, a well known prospector. The body was taken to Hayner Bros. parlors. No particulars as to the cause of death were available at the time of going to press.

Mr. McLauchlan was a highly respected resident of this city from the very earliest days and was interested in mining in various parts of the country and also in oil prospecting on the Islands, and the news of his sudden death will come as a great shock to his many friends.

SITUATION IN GREECE LOOKS MORE HOPEFUL

Constantine Makes Statement—Ministers Regaining Confidence in Him—Bucharest is Raided by Huns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Sept. 27.—The impression prevails that King Constantine has been misjudged in regard to his attitude towards the Allies. It is now reported that Greece is willing to join the Allies in the war if satisfactory conditions can be arranged. An early decision is expected.

The adherents of ex-Premier Venizelos are leaving Athens. The King's declaration has cleared the political atmosphere somewhat and is encouraging Entente ministers, who have heretofore been very doubtful regarding several matters in connection with the Greek situation, to view matters with more confidence.

Raid on Bucharest.

A great fleet of German aeroplanes and Zeppelins raided Bucharest, the capital of Rumania last night. Sixty people were killed.

English Raid.

London, Sept. 27.—The official report of the weekend raids in the south of England give the total number of fatalities as 74.

Norwegian Steamer Sunk.

The Norwegian steamer Bufjord has been sunk. The crew was saved.

BERTRAM REID PASSED AWAY IN THE HOSPITAL

Bertram Reid, a well known old timer of this district, died at the general hospital last night of tuberculosis of the throat. Mr. Reid, who was 34 years of age, was a native of St. John, N. B. He worked on the construction of the G. T. P. and lately was foreman for that company at Smithers. His sister, Mrs. Marr, of Los Angeles, came here about a month ago and was with him until the end. The body will be taken to St. John for interment.

THE FUTURE

Optimism is a splendid thing, either nationally or individually, but it must be an optimism founded upon fact and not a fool optimism based upon the imaginings of people who figure according to their hopes, and hopes alone. Canada has had good cause for optimism, and today has just as much reason to be optimistic, in spite of the fact that many parts of the Dominion have been saddled with a huge weight of debt as the result of a wonderful display of energy on the part of the speculator who played upon the natural optimism of a healthy young people for all they were worth.

We are told that the total trade of Canada in the last few months has doubled, and, at first glance, this would appear to give rise to tremendous hopes for the immediate future but it is absolutely necessary that the figures should be carefully examined as to the proportion of the vast total which makes for future growth. The critic who looks underneath the surface of figures which, at first glance, look perfectly satisfactory in themselves, is liable to be termed a pessimist by unthinking people, but, after all, the truest form of optimism is that which gets down to bed-rock and bases its calculations for the future upon what is logically bound to happen, simply because something of the kind has occurred before.

Taking the vast trade figures of the Dominion, one must deduct therefrom the amount which accrues as a result of the war, and probably all the increase noted, and some more, can be laid to this account. Canada is doing an enormous business in munitions and other war materials, but, with the close of the war, this line of business will naturally cease. Thousands of men and women will be thrown out of employment and, at the same time

millions of capital, which is at present engaged in making munitions, will be released to find its way into other lines of production. What to do with those men and women and along what lines is this capital to be used are the big questions which Canada will have to face in the near future. The fact that Canada's trade for the first five months of the year was double the amount of the same period last year will avail nothing. The one outstanding fact will be that there are so many thousands of people to be employed and so many thousands of families to be fed and clothed. Next to the carrying of the war to a successful conclusion, this is the most important question which must be studied carefully by all Canadians, no matter whether they are for the moment capitalists or wage-earners.

Added to the people who will be out of employment after the war are the tens of thousands of our fighting men. What are they to do for a living? Many of them will return to the spheres they occupied before the war, but many more will find their former occupations ungenial. Facing a ledger will be tame work after facing the German hordes. Now is the time to prepare for the placing of those men and not the day after they arrive from Europe. Properly directed, the energies of those tens of thousands of our sons will make for greater development and much greater production but they must not be allowed to congregate in our cities where they will simply swell the lists of the unemployed and soon become unemployable.

Canada, like the rest of the world, has been turned upside down and is at the beginning of a new era. It must be an era of solid, steady growth, the growth being as largely as possible from within. In the past, Canada has been a big borrower and borrowing has been made easy for her. A

country whose resources are so largely latent must of necessity borrow freely, but there is a great possibility that the day of free and easy borrowing is over for many years. Besides providing for new development work there are huge debts to be met and it is puzzling the wisest financiers in the Dominion as to how they are to be met. The solution of the big problem cannot be found in a few hours and meantime the most important point is that the people of Canada should realize fully the difficulties ahead.




