FIERCE BATTLE RAGING ON BALKAN FRONT

BRITISH STILL GAINING ON SOMME -- A THOUSAND MORE PRISONERS ARE TAKEN

GREAT BATTLE NOW RAGING ON BALKAN FRONT

Forces Equal but Allied Guns are Superior—Greece Haggles Over Terms—Revolutionists Busy.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Sept. 30.—The general assault of the Serbians, French and Russians north of Florina, for intensity and numbers of troops engaged, is by far the greatest battle yet fought on the Balkan front. The Bulgarians are equally strong in infantry but the Allies show a great superiority in big guns. The battle is still raging and is indecisive as yet.

Greece Haggles.
Greece is reported to be haggling with the Entente Allies over territorial terms before taking the final action which will bring her into war with the Central Powers.

The Revolution.
Pireaus, Sept. 30.—Revolutionists in civilian garb boarded a Greek battleship; expelled the loyal officers, and had tugs tow the vessel to Salamis Bay where Allied warships are anchored.

Russian Front.
Petrograd, Sept. 30.—On the western sections of the Russian front the Russians have bombed enemy stores, railway stations and motor car transports. Four German aeroplanes were destroyed while the Russians lost two.

(Special to The Daily News.) Ottawa, Sept. 30.—Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance in the Borden Cabinet, has been invited by the Imperial government to visit London.

ALLIED FORCE DRAWS CLOSER IN ON BAPAUME

British Make Further Gains and Take Thousand Prisoners—Great Feat of Daring Frenchman.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Sept. 30.—Despite very bad weather, which hampers the artillery movements and converts the battlefield into a mire, the British were successful in occupying five hundred yards of German trenches and capturing over a thousand prisoners. The British are striking from two directions, while the French are advancing from the south. The Allies have closed still further in on Bapaume, which is the next German stronghold to be tackled.

Daring Airman.

Paris, Sept. 30.—Lieut. Guynemer, who has earned fame as one of the most daring of the French aviators, after destroying three enemy aeroplanes in two minutes and a half, dropped ten thousand feet and alighted uninjured.

French General Killed.
General Pierre Girodon has been killed on the Somme front.

DIED WITH RESCUER CLOSE BESIDE HIM

Seward, Alaska, Sept. 26.—While crossing Portage Glacier from Turnagain Arm to Portage Bay, a resident of Hope, Bert Foreman, fell into a crevasse and alighted in water, and mud out of sight of Eaton, who had become separated a short distance from his companion on account of a snowstorm. Eaton began a search on hearing Foreman's cries for help. He told Foreman that he would enter the crevasse lower down and rescue him. While Eaton was gone Foreman became panic stricken and opened the arteries in his left wrist. Eaton reached him just before he died. Foreman said he feared he would freeze to death and chose an easier way to die. The body was carried out to Mile Sixty-three of the United States Railroad and will be brought here.

Foreman's wife committed suicide by shooting in Anchorage a week ago because of despondency.

(Special to The Daily News.) New York, Sept. 30.—President Wilson has received an avalanche of insulting communications from Jeremiah O'Leary, president of the American Truth Society, accusing him of being pro-British and saying that he had failed to obtain compliance with American rights.

President Wilson telegraphed the following reply: "Your telegram received. I would feel deeply mortified to have you, or anybody like you, vote for me. I do not want the vote of any disloyal American, and, since you have access to many such, and I have not, I convey this message through you."

BANDITS ESCAPE WITH EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS

(Special to The Daily News.) Moose Jaw, Sept. 30.—Six heavily armed masked bandits cut the telegraph and telephone communications and entered the Caron Branch of the Bank of Hamilton last night; bound and gagged the night watchman; blew open the safes, and escaped in an automobile with \$8,000 in currency.

WRINCH GROUP AT OWEN LAKE BONDED

An important deal was made by Harris Bros. this week when they bonded for \$35,000 the Wrinch group of claims at Owen Lake to a syndicate headed by F. H. Daken and Moore of San Francisco and New York. The property was staked some years ago by Gore and Risdale and then Dr. Wrinch took an interest.

The property is in the Owen Lake district and is reached by a sixteen-mile trail from Houston and that trail is now being put in shape.

Five men went up to the property this week to work on the trail and to erect cabins and the intention of the new owners is to develop the property as quickly as possible.

The group is very promising with four known veins that average four feet in width. The ore, which is copper and lead-zinc, is high grade.—Omineca Herald.

BRITAIN IS PAID COMPLIMENTS IN THE REICHSTAG

Chancellor Vents His Spleen and Bolsters up German Hopes—Swiss Provide for Prisoners.

(Special to The Daily News.) Berlin, Sept. 30.—Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg, in his address to the Reichstag yesterday, said that the Germans will persevere until victory is theirs. "Great Britain has broken one international law after another, and is the most egotistical, the fiercest and most obstinate of all Germany's enemies," said the Chancellor. He also said that the Allies could not break through the German lines on the Somme front and made a similar statement regarding the campaign on the eastern front.

Practical Swiss.

Berne, Switzerland, Sept. 30.—Foreign Minister Hoffmann, head of the Swiss political department, announced in parliament yesterday that preparations have been completed so that students, who are interned or are prisoners of war in Switzerland, may attend the Swiss universities.

CO-OPERATION

In his recent speech here, Sir George E. Foster called upon capital and labor to come more closely together and to realize that the one is inter-dependent upon the other. In this connection, it is interesting to recall the experiment of a prominent German manufacturer a few years before the war. This manufacturer employed some fifteen hundred men and on many occasions had had thorny problems to settle regarding labor matters. Finally, he decided upon a plan of conducting the labor end of his business along parliamentary lines. He called a meeting of his men and suggested that all questions in regard to wages and conditions of work should be submitted to a committee of which he would select six and the men would select six, while he took the position of chairman. The men agreed and, at the suggestion of the head of the firm, they adopted a scheme by which each man shared in the profits of the concern in addition to his regular wages.

The plan worked so well that, at the end of the first year, the manufacturer asked the men to elect all twelve of the "parliamentary committee" while he acted again as chairman. He had no more labor troubles; the men took an entirely new interest in their work, partly on account of the fact that they shared in the profits and partly because they felt an added interest since they to a large extent control of their own destinies in the industrial world. At the end of three years, there were three thousand men employed; the works had been enlarged; the men were earning seven and a half per cent. higher wages than the men employed in similar lines in Germany, while their working hours had been reduced by three quarters of an hour per day, and the employer enjoyed a larger in-

come and increased his capital holdings.

The principle may not be in strict accordance with recognized union rules, but, in this one instance, it was a great success and was heartily approved of by the capitalist and also by the few thousand men whom he employed. The German Socialist party was bitterly opposed to the scheme and fought it hard, but they failed to make any impression on the workmen, many of whom had been Socialists, and probably remained so, if that were compatible with their becoming capitalists in a small way. In any case, it was an interesting experiment, the chief value of which was that it was a serious attempt to deal with a serious problem.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Catch the Kaiser" will be the popular sport in the British navy when the new German super-submarine sets sail for the United States.

In spite of an occasional adverse report from Berlin or Vienna, the Russians seem to be bagging a regular supply of prisoners along the Galician front, with a few villages thrown into the bargain.

The Imperial Chancellor seems to have treated the Reichstag to his opinion of the actions of Italy and Rumania. What he thinks of the latest move of Queen Sophia's husband, King Constantine of Greece, would probably not look well in type.

The New York police seem to be looking for a sympathetic strike which has gone amiss. The unions say there are a hundred and forty thousand men on strike. They must be expressing their sympathy very gently.
