

Athens, Oct. 3.—Negotiations cruiting for the Alberta district. between Greece and the representatives of the Entente Allies are believed to be nearing completion. ACDEEMENT IC DINDING The delay is attributed to the fact that the Allied ministers were dealing direct with King Constantine, refusing to recognize the new cabinet which was recently appointed. It is reported that the new premier and his cabinet resigned yesterday.

#### The Revolution.

Piraeus, Oct. 3.—The Revolutionaries having already seized a Greek battleship, King Constantine is paying particular attention to the character of his naval commanders.

New commanders have been appointed to the battleships Kilkis and Averoff on account of a suspicion that the old commanders had leanings towards Venize-

The revolutionists declare that one of the causes of the recent trouble is that the King is extremely bitter at Venizelos and is intensely jealous of the ex-premier's powers of leadership.

#### SOLDIERS' VOTES

The total number of soldiers' votes polled in the recent provincial election was about 12,000. Over four thousand of these were polled in camps in Canada and about seven thousand in Europe. In camps in Canada there were 19 votes polled in the Atlin contest; 48 in Prince Rupert; 5 in Omineca and 42 in Prince George. In Canadian camps there were 1,901 votes polled in the Vancouver fight, so that the count of this vote may have a considerable bearing on the final result. All the soldiers' votes will be counted on Thursday, October 12, and the result should be known a


