MACKENZEN OUT-GENERALLED ON DANUBE

GERMANS HAVE TO EVACUATE TWO FORTRESSES -- FIERCE FIGHTING AT LUTSK

GREAT COUP BY RUMANIANS ON RIVER DANUBE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Von Mackenzen Compelled to Evacuate Fortress to Save His Army—Serbians Still Gaining.

London, Oct. 4.—The feature of the day's despatches is a great coup by the general commanding the Rumanian troops on the Danube who, by throwing his troops across the river and threatening to carry out an enveloping movement which would have completely upset the whole German northern campaign, brought disaster upon the army of General Von Mackenzen. The German commander was so completely out-manoeuvred that he was compelled to evacuate the fortresses of Silistria and Turtukai which he took from the Rumanians a short time ago.

Berlin declares that Austro-German monitors entered the Danube and blew up the pontoon bridges after the Russians and Rumanians had crossed over into Bulgarian territory.

Serbian Success.

Athens, Oct. 4.—The Bulgarians made a desperate but unsuccessful attempt to recapture the Kaimakalan plateau by transferring their ninth and tenth divisions from the Dobrudja front. The Serbians captured an important Belgian fortified position at Kocobey.

Teutons Resisting.

Bucharest, October 4.—Violent fighting continues at Constanza on the Danube, the Teutons stubbornly resisting the Russo-Rumanian pressure.

VANCOUVER BOY IS DARING AVIATOR

Lieut. A. D. Bell-Irving, son of Mr. Henry Bell-Irving, of Vancouver, has been given the Military Cross for his prowess in bringing to earth two German aeroplanes and an observation balloon. The latter feat was particularly daring as these captive balloons are right over the German lines and are amply protected by anti-aircraft guns. The lieutenant is the third member of this well known family to be decorated with the coveted cross.

BERLIN CLAIMS SUCCESS OVER THE RUSSIANS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Heavy Fighting on Lutsk Front—Neither Side Gained any Advantage—Colored Mun Report.

Petrograd, October 4.—Severe engagements are progressing west of Lutsk and neither side is able to record any marked advantage although Berlin reports that the Germans inflicted exceptionally heavy casualties on our troops, after repulsing twenty-nine infantry attacks, preceded by terrific artillery bombardments.

Berlin states that the Russian attacks were of the fiercest description but that the Germans drove them back all along the line. Like most German reports, it appears to be highly colored and Berlin claims that the Russian batteries were turned upon the Russian trenches in order to force the infantry to face the counter-attacks. It is also stated that the Russians left many dead on the field to be buried by the Germans.

In Transylvania.

Berlin, (Official) October 4.—The Austro-German troops in Transylvania have been compelled to withdraw before superior Rumanian forces.

MAJOR C. T. PARTINGTON WAS KILLED IN ACTION

(Special to The Daily News.)
Nelson, Oct. 4.—Private advices received here report that Major C. T. Partington, of Prince Rupert, has been killed in action.

The above news will be received in this city with feelings of the deepest regret. Major Partington, who came to Prince Rupert from Nelson about eight years ago, was a highly esteemed citizen and a most efficient officer who was keenly interested in military matters for many years.

Just a few days ago Fred. Stork received a letter from him, dated September 10th, written at the Canadian base on the western front. He said he had just returned in two Germans, one of whom wore an Iron Cross, and that he had secured the button as a souvenir.

After remarking that the Allies were doing splendidly, he said that he was just about to return to the front trenches and before going he wished to send his regards to his friends in Prince Rupert. The deepest sympathy of all citizens will go out to Mrs. Partington in her bereavement.

THE CANADIANS PARTICIPATED IN BIG BATTLES

British Aviators are Busy Near Brussels—Von Bissing Yielded to Neutral Ministers.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, October 4.—Inclement weather is interfering with the military operations on the Somme front, where the Canadians participated in important battles over the weekend.

Air Activity.
British naval aeroplanes attacked the German airship sheds near Brussels, while the aviators of the Royal Flying Corps bombed German troop trains near Prosenik.

Von Bissing Yields.
Amsterdam, October 4.—Under protest from the Spanish and American ministers at Brussels, General Von Bissing, the German military governor of the Belgian capital, has pardoned twenty-two Belgian civilians who were under sentence of death.

Protection Demanded.
Havana, Oct. 4.—The British government requests a guarantee of safety to all British vessels entering Havana or other Cuban ports. The demand is the result of a bomb explosion which took place on an unnamed vessel last month.

THE WAR

That the Germans are in rather desperate straits for men is evident from the fact that they are using sailors to reinforce their regiments on the Somme front. It is, of course, possible that they are simply doing as Britain is doing at Saloniki, using batteries of naval guns and that the sailors taken yesterday were gun crews. However, the fact that only machine guns were taken lends color to the belief that the naval men were actually being used as reinforcements for the ordinary infantry regiments. It is impossible that the Central Powers can keep on steadily replacing their enormous wastage on all fronts without having to look outside of their ordinary sphere for recruits. The Russians and Rumanians, though they may be losing many men, are taking a heavy and regular toll from the Austrians and Germans, while the strenuous fighting on the Somme front since July 1st is most certainly beginning to tell.

No one is rash enough to venture even a guess as to when the war will end, and the military critics seem to be satisfied that it will last all winter, while Britain is preparing to carry on for two whole years yet, in order that nothing may be left to chance. Some little time ago, Lloyd George, the British Minister for War, called for figures from the leading authorities on munitions as to the Allies' requirements for the next few months. On looking over the list, he immediately multiplied the totals by ten and told them to go ahead and produce and to keep on producing. This is typical of the spirit in which

the war is being prosecuted. The Allied leaders have no definite date in view but simply the end. It may come soon; it may not come for two years, but there can be but one ending.

The taking of Bapaume will mark another big step forward for the British army on the Somme as it will give them command of a wide stretch of comparatively open country over which progress will be much more rapid than it has been in the past few weeks. It seems certain that there will be no let up to the fighting on the western front this winter but that the advantage gained during the summer will be pressed home and the enemy given no rest. The new auto "tanks" will travel just as easily in winter as in summer and infantry attacks will be kept up incessantly. The troops will enjoy much better health than they did waiting in wet trenches for the enemy attacks and there should be big changes all along the western front before Christmas.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

There is further talk of a Federal election. There is no reason why there should not be an election next fall, but, meantime, the government had better keep right on at its important job of revising its recruiting methods. The probability is that the war will be over before the extended parliamentary term is over.

Constantine is taking no chances on losing a few more battleships. He had better get busy and close the deal with the Allies or he may lose much more than Venizelos will be able to take from him.

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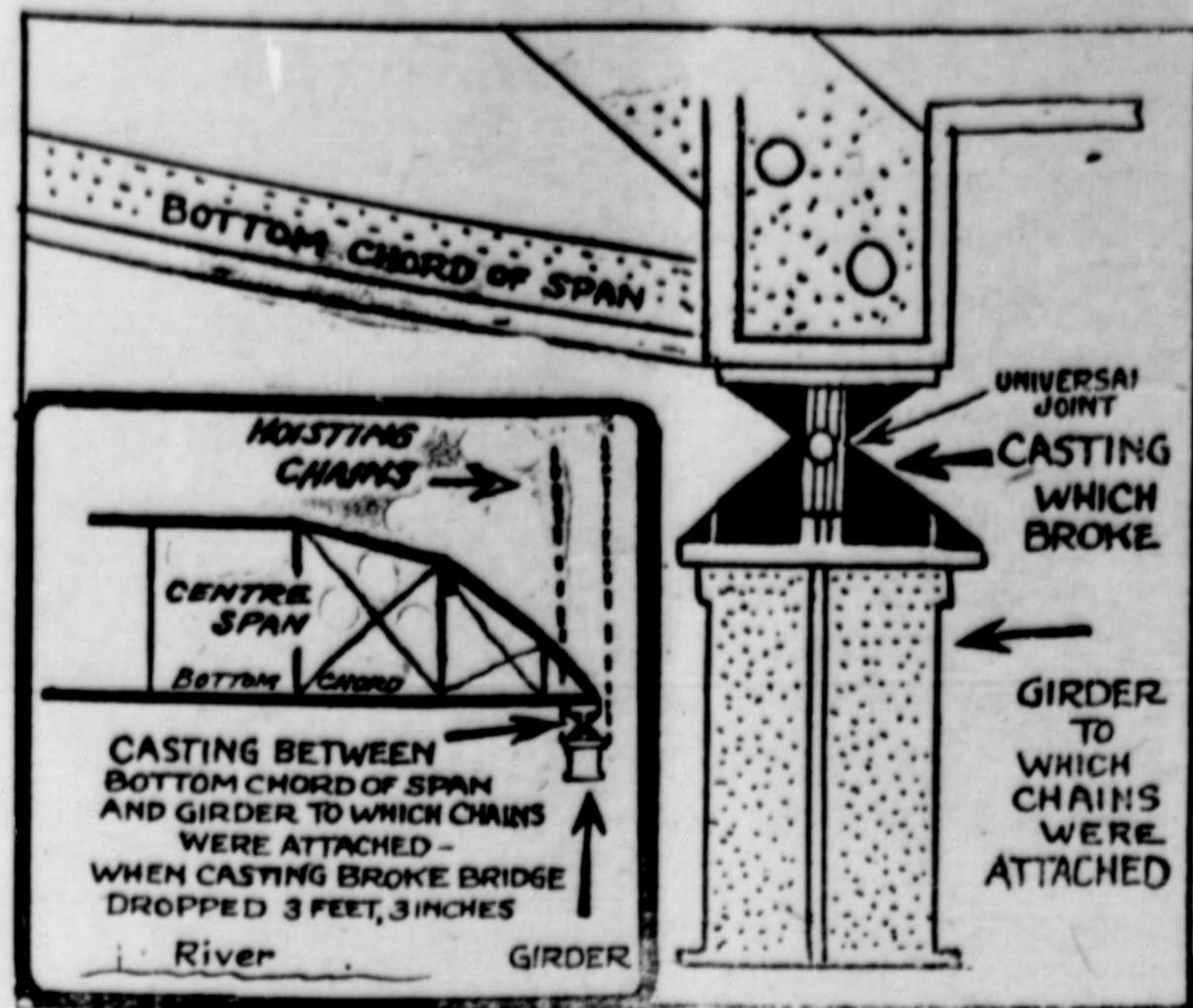
