## KAISER HURRIES TO THE VOLHYNIA FRONT

### TURKS DEFEATED IN ARMENIA—GERMAN HEAVY ARTILLERY ACTIVE ON SOMME

#### KAISER RUSHES ACROSS TO THE RUSSIAN FRONT

Heavy Fighting in Volhynia—Both Sides Claim Successes—Allies Drawing Nearer Monastir.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Oct. 6.—The Russians are vigorously maintaining their attacks against the Austro-German armies in Volhynia and the Kaiser is reported to be hurrying to the scene of conflict on this front, where General Von Lansingen is busy trying to hold back the Russians. The Russians have defeated the enemy in various districts but stubborn fighting continues at many points.

##### Berlin Report.

Berlin reports that, though Petrograd states that the Russians have been successful on the eastern front, the Germans are holding the Czar's armies in check along the entire front from Lutsk to the Dniester.

##### Balkan Front.

London, Oct. 6.—The Entente forces are now within twelve miles of Monastir, the Bulgarian stronghold in Macedonia and have captured the towns of Buf and Genikeui in the Nidje Mountains. These are situated about two miles west of the Struma River and were taken after a spell of very hot fighting, the Bulgarians putting up a stubborn resistance. The Scotch and Irish regiments distinguished themselves in the encounter.

#### HUN BIG GUNS AGAIN ACTIVE ON WEST FRONT

Enemy has Received Fresh Supplies of Ammunition—French are Busy too—Cunarder Torpedoed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, October 6.—The Germans today delivered heavy counter-attacks along the greater part of the Somme front. Their fire is much heavier than it has been for some time and it is believed that they have received fresh supplies of big gun ammunition.

##### French Attack.

The French today have been shelling a German military station where there were great movements of troops reported by the aeroplane scouts. The bombardment caused a serious conflagration within the enemy lines. Since the big offensive started on July 1st, the British have captured 624 German guns.

##### Franconia Sunk.

The Cunard liner Franconia has been sunk by an enemy submarine while engaged on transport service in the Mediterranean. Twelve of her crew of three hundred are missing.

Submarines have also sunk the Russian ship Tourgai and the Norwegian vessels Brink, Knut Carl and Nesjar.

#### WORLD'S SERIES

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, October 6.—Rube Marquard, who has been selected to pitch for Brooklyn in the first game of the world's series at Boston on Saturday, says he is in tip-top form and that Brooklyn is going to win. E. E. Smathers, the owner of fast horses, has placed a wager of \$20,000 to \$14,000 that Boston will win the series. The second game will be played at Boston on Monday and the next two games will be at Brooklyn on October 12 and 13.

#### SEAMEN WANTED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—The government is arranging to recruit five thousand Canadian seamen for service under the British Admiralty during the period of the war.

#### TROOP TRAIN WRECKED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Niagara Falls, October 6.—A Michigan Central train, carrying three hundred soldiers, has been wrecked. Several of the men received minor injuries but no serious cases are reported.

#### SIR SAM BACK

Halifax, N. S., October 6.—The Minister of Militia arrived from England today. Interviewed by reporters on arrival, he styled himself Lieutenant-General Sir Sam Hughes.

#### SPLENDID SHOWING OF HAZELTON COBALT ORE

The New Hazelton Gold-Cobalt Mines Limited held its statutory meeting in Vancouver on Tuesday when the following directors were elected: Messrs. A. Erskine Smith, A. Shaw, Nicol Thompson, George E. Trorey, C. O. Wickenden, Chas. H. St. John, and C. F. Bellschweiller, with R. Dalby Morkill as secretary-treasurer.

The corporation, which is a close one, has been carrying on extensive prospecting and development work for some time. Samples of the ore have been sent to eastern Canada, New York and to England and the reports show beyond doubt that the company possesses one of the richest properties in British Columbia. The camp is within easy reach of the railway so that there are no transportation problems to get over. There is already \$100,000 worth of ore in sight and it is likely that the company will erect a plant in Vancouver for the purpose of extracting the arsenic. One English report on the ore showed, arsenic, 40.20; iron, 25.20; cobalt, 4.64, and gold over \$100 a ton. A provincial assay gave, gold, \$87.20; silver, \$2.77, and cobalt, \$110 per ton, making a total value, without the arsenic, of \$199.97 per ton. The discovery of cobalt in this district is of the highest importance as cobalt is being largely used instead of nickel in the hardening of steel tools and steel cutting and plating work.

#### BREWSTER REALIZES HIS RESPONSIBILITIES

The election of the full Liberal ticket in Victoria was made the occasion for a party banquet to the workers in that city, at which Mr. Brewster and the other candidates delivered speeches of congratulation to those who had been instrumental in their return.

The remarks of Mr. Brewster were of especial interest because it was his first deliverance since the election. The Liberal leader was careful to reiterate his stand upon certain matters which he emphasized during the fight.

"We realize the responsibility," said Mr. Brewster, "but we are not afraid to face it and carry on. The people have placed behind me a body of men than whom there can be no higher type, men of high character, clean record and tried business ability. We are pledged to give to this province clean and honest government, and abolish the patronage system, and our pledge shall be carried out to the utmost. The people have declared that they must have men of higher ideals in charge of their affairs. The days of the professional politician are past, never, I hope, to return. To the past, also, belongs the spoils system.

"The fight is only beginning, for there is much to be done in order to straighten out the affairs of the province. The new government will need your earnest co-operation, and sympathy and some patience in the almost hereulean task which has to be undertaken, but there is no doubt as to the result. #### NICHOLAS' MEN MAKE SURPRISE DRIVE ON TURKS

Russian Success in Turkish Armenia—Large Quantity of Material Taken—Italians Win.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, October 6.—With the suddenness which has so often disconcerted the Turks, the Grand Duke's army in Turkish Armenia has resumed the offensive, the troops receiving splendid assistance from the Russian fleet in the Black Sea. The Russians inflicted a severe defeat on the enemy near Trebizond, capturing a strongly fortified position and, advancing through a strongly guarded line, took many prisoners and immense quantities of military equipment. The enemy's rear earth works and trenches were destroyed by the Russian guns. The Russians also registered gains on the south-eastern portion of this front.

##### Italian Success.

Rome, Oct. 6.—In Albania, the Italian cavalry has occupied Georgueatis Ekiskopi and has established communication with the Italian forces advancing from another direction on the Austro-Italian front. Every enemy attack has been repulsed.

##### Franz Josef.

Franz Josef, the aged Austrian emperor, is again reported to be very seriously ill.

#### NEW TRIAL ORDERED IN LUCAS LIBEL CASE

Victoria, October 3.—The Appeal Court of British Columbia has ordered a new trial in the case of Lucas vs. the Ministerial Union. It will be remembered that the case arose out of the publication of the pamphlet "The Crisis in B. C." Alex. Lucas, M. L. A. for Yale, sued Moses Cotsworth, Rev. A. E. Cooke and others for libel, basing his suit on a paragraph dealing with a timber deal supposed to have been put through by Mr. Lucas.

The appeal was argued by S. E. Taylor, K. C., who argued that Mr. Justice Morrison had erred in ruling out certain evidence which Mr. Woodworth, for the defence, sought to call, and that Mr. Justice Morrison's charge to the jury was prejudicial to the defendants. A sentence particularly objected to in the charge was one in which the judge said, "Sir Richard McBride we know and Mr. Sampson and Mr. Mara, but who is this man Cotsworth? It will be for you to say whether or not he is just an ordinary untruthful man."

#### GERMANS FLEE RUMANIANS IN TRANSYLVANIA

Desperate Fighting in Dobrudja Region—Berlin Claims Rumanian Army Cut to Pieces.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bucharest, Oct. 6.—In Transylvania, the Rumanians have captured several enemy fortresses after three days strenuous fighting. The Austro-German armies are reeling before the Rumanians on this front.

##### Dobrudja Struggle.

In the Dobrudja region the Teutonic forces have frustrated every effort to advance on the part of the Russo-Rumanian armies.

##### Berlin Report.

Berlin reports that the Rumanian army, which crossed the Danube a few days ago in an attempt to corner Von Mackenzen's army, has been terribly cut up. The Rumanians were driven back to the river, where German monitors had destroyed their pontoons, and suffered very heavy losses, the casualties being estimated at 14,000 to 15,000 men.

##### Greece Hard Up.

Rome, Oct. 6.—It is reported that the Greek government has suspended all payments on account of money shortage.

AS OTHERS SEE US

It is always interesting to "see ourselves as others see us," but it is not often so amusing as the view of Prince Rupert presented to the residents of Hoquiam, Washington, by Senator Johnson, who visited these parts during the summer.

Congressman Albert Johnson writes his newspaper, the Hoquiam Washingtonian, a chatty letter about his Alaska trip, from which the following excerpt is taken:

"Ketchikan, population 3,000, is headquarters for the Alaska halibut fishing industry, which industry is in great danger of being transferred, body, boots and breeches, to the new city of Prince Rupert, the Pacific ocean terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. The road can make any freight rate it desires, and there seems to be no doubt that its directors have set out to secure the transportation business of Alaska.

Prince Rupert has not progressed as rapidly as its promoters had planned, owing to the European war and because British Columbia has been pretty well drained of its young men, and also because capital for investment purposes is very hard to obtain. Nevertheless, a \$3,000,000 drydock is being built there, a great townsite is being carved out of solid rock, all of the British steamships of the Australian, Yokohama, Vladivostok and Hawaiian lines stop there, and the water front is already a busy place. Alaska's halibut is shipped from there in great quantity. Tea and silk for the United States are in the holds of ships which stop there en route to Vancouver, and the ships going out are loaded with machinery and war material for Vladivostok.

"In the country back of Prince Rupert are many fine valleys, and the British government is advancing to those injured soldiers returning from the trenches in France \$1,350 each, giving them a year's education in agriculture, etc., and then deeding to them 160 acres of land. Thus they hope to populate the country which shall be tributary to Prince Rupert."

The worthy senator was really here, though for a very short time, and it is not impossible that some humorist has been "stringing" him, but it would rather appear that he has been drawing upon his imagination. However, if his letter is taken as a prophecy instead of a statement of fact, it may not be so far out at that.

The senator's knowledge of Canada must be rather limited, however, when he speaks of the British government deeding returned soldiers 160 acres of land in Prince Rupert's hinterland with a loan of \$1,350 and a year's agricultural education thrown in.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Recruiting returns for the Dominion show a decided falling off and it is well that the matter is being taken up seriously at Ottawa. 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considerably but it is apparent that the Germans have not been nearly so successful as the German war office would have the world believe.

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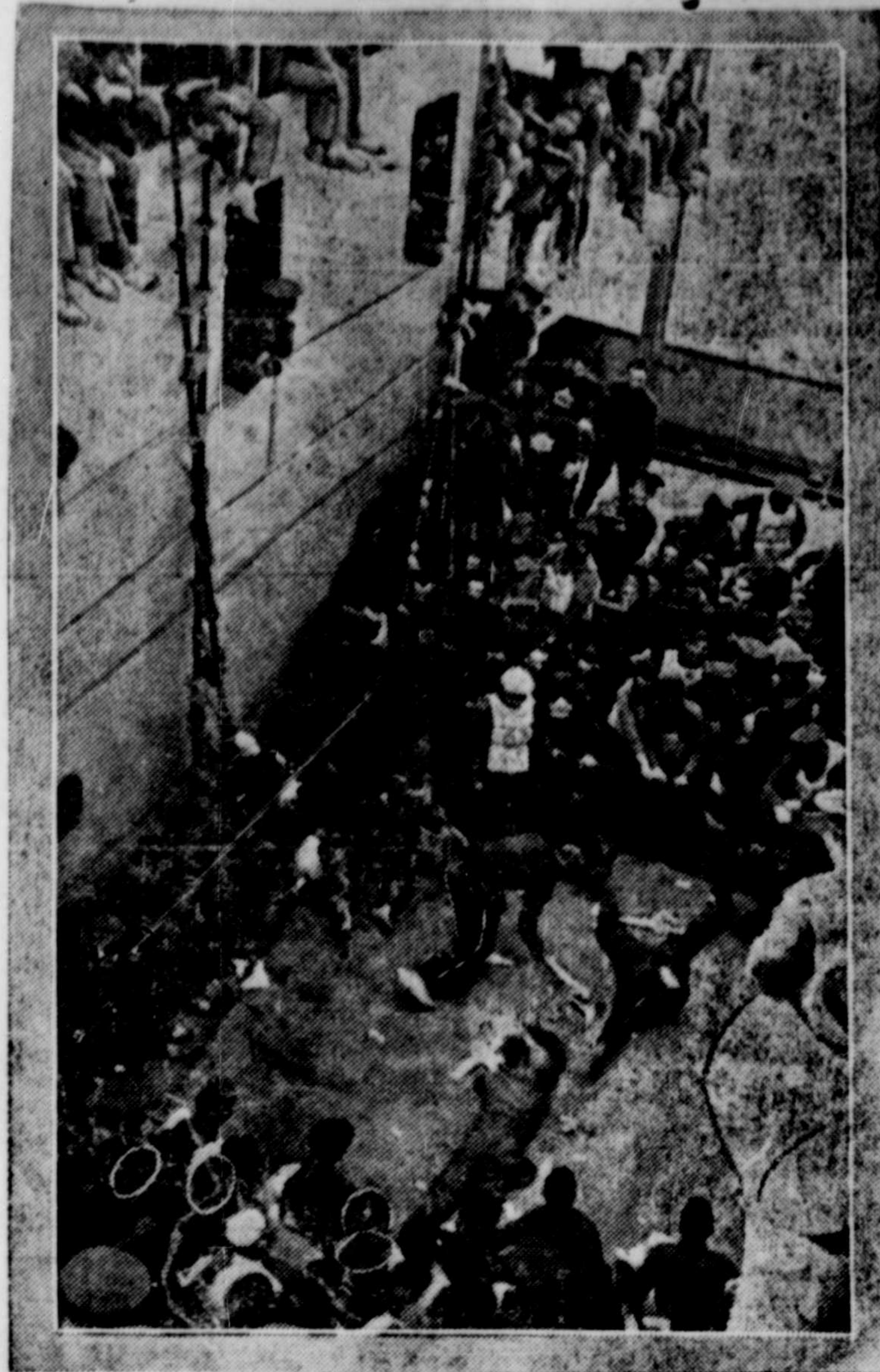

## BRITAIN'S CAMPAIGN AGAINST SUBMARINES

Discussing our position at sea in his "History of the War" (Nelson & Sons, Edinburgh), John Buchan says:—

It is too soon to write the detailed story of our campaign against the German submarines. The Admiralty rightly refused to publish even the estimated numbers destroyed—a refusal which showed an acute knowledge of the enemy's psychology. A sinister silence without a word of news was far more trying to the nerves of the German undersea service than any advertisement of success. Famous submarine commanders went out and never returned. No man setting forth from the Elbe bases knew what he had to face. Some device which meant certain death might be waiting for him in the British coastal waters.

A few of our methods of defence were known to the world. The new type of monitors—vast torpedo-proof rafts carrying 14-inch guns—were able to operate in shallow seas with almost complete immunity from the underwater menace. Elaborate nets were constructed in the main sea passages, in which more than one submarine was fatally entangled. We know from the narrative of Lieut. Wenninger, commanding the German boat U 17, what might happen to a submarine which

fouled these steel meshes. Even when he managed to get clear, he had to lie for hours at the bottom while our torpedo boats watched the surface.—Scotsman.

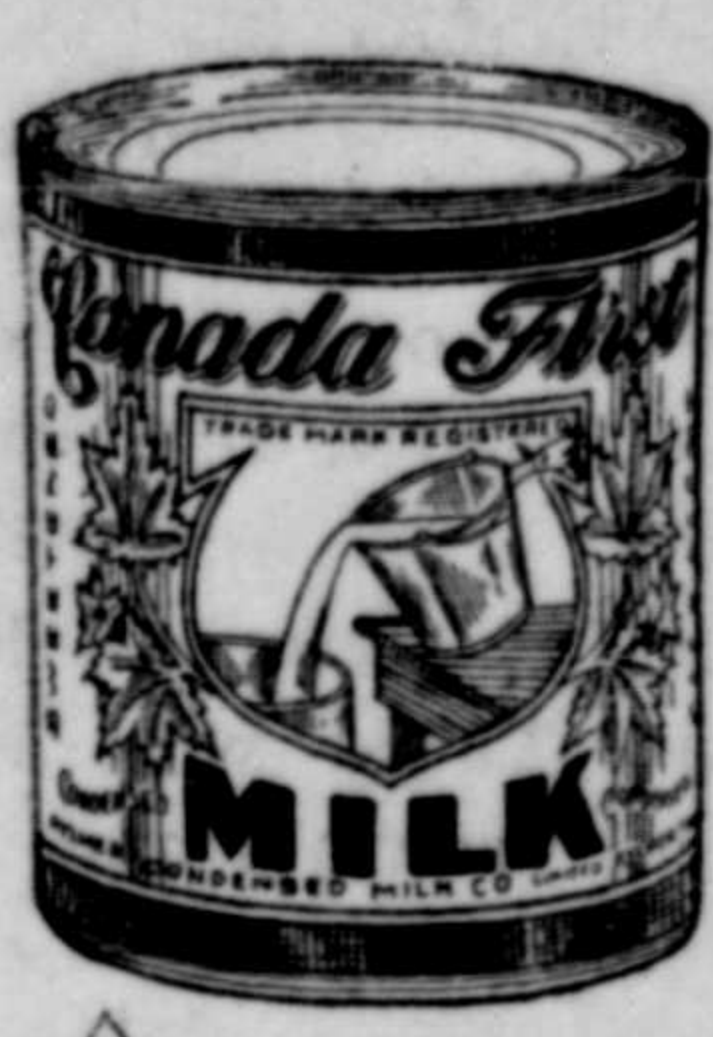

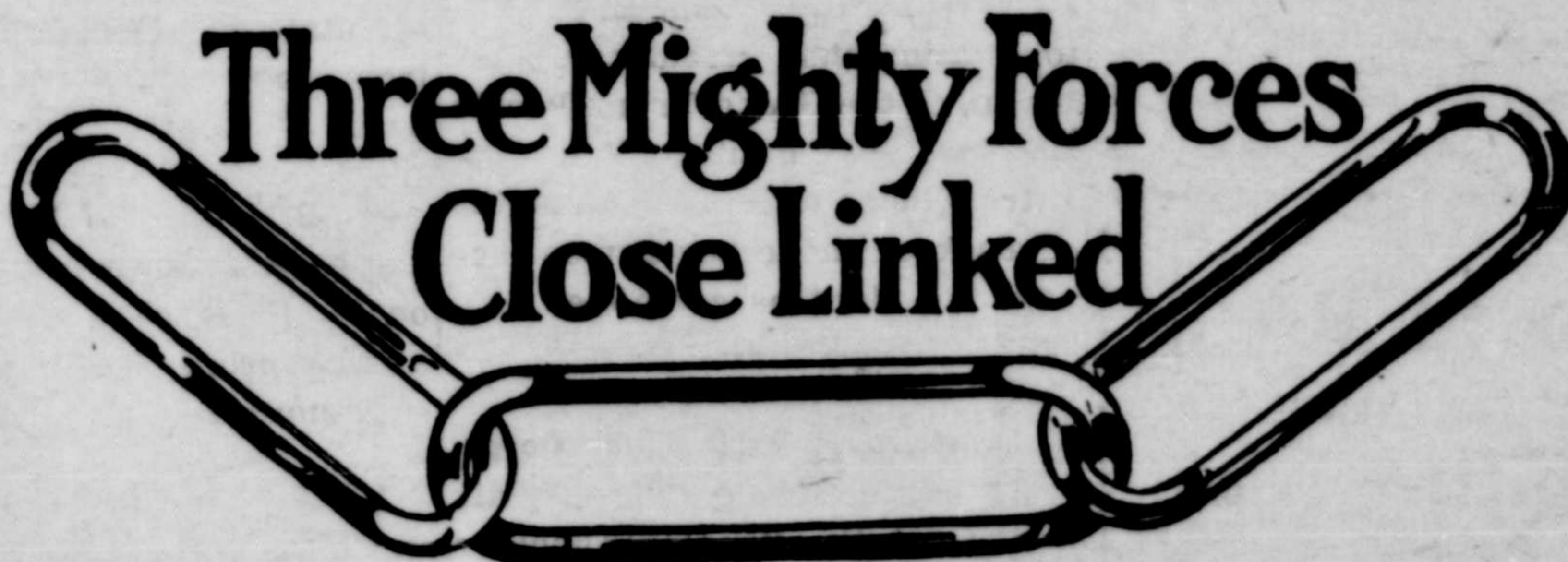
