ALLIES DEMAND CAPITULATION OF GREECE

ULTIMATUM GIVES ATHENS FORTY-EIGHT HOURS — ITALIANS RESUME ATTACK

ALLIES REFUSE TO WAIT LONGER THAN TWO DAYS

Greece Given Forty-eight Hours to Hand Over Fleet and Give up Railway—Minister Will Comply.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 12.—A Reuter's despatch from Athens states that Vice-Admiral Du Fournet, the French officer who is commanding the Anglo-French battle fleet in the Mediterranean, has presented an ultimatum to Greece demanding that she hand over her entire fleet to the Allies, excepting the cruiser Averoff and the battleships Lemnos and Kilkis, which are ordered to be disarmed. The ultimatum also calls for the surrender of the Piraeus-Larissa railway, which forms the backbone of all communication lines through the centre of Greece from the Aegean Sea to the Bulgarian frontier, and the dismantling of all sea coast forts within forty-eight hours.

The Minister of Marine in the Lambros cabinet has announced his intention of complying with the demand within the prescribed period.

British Gains.

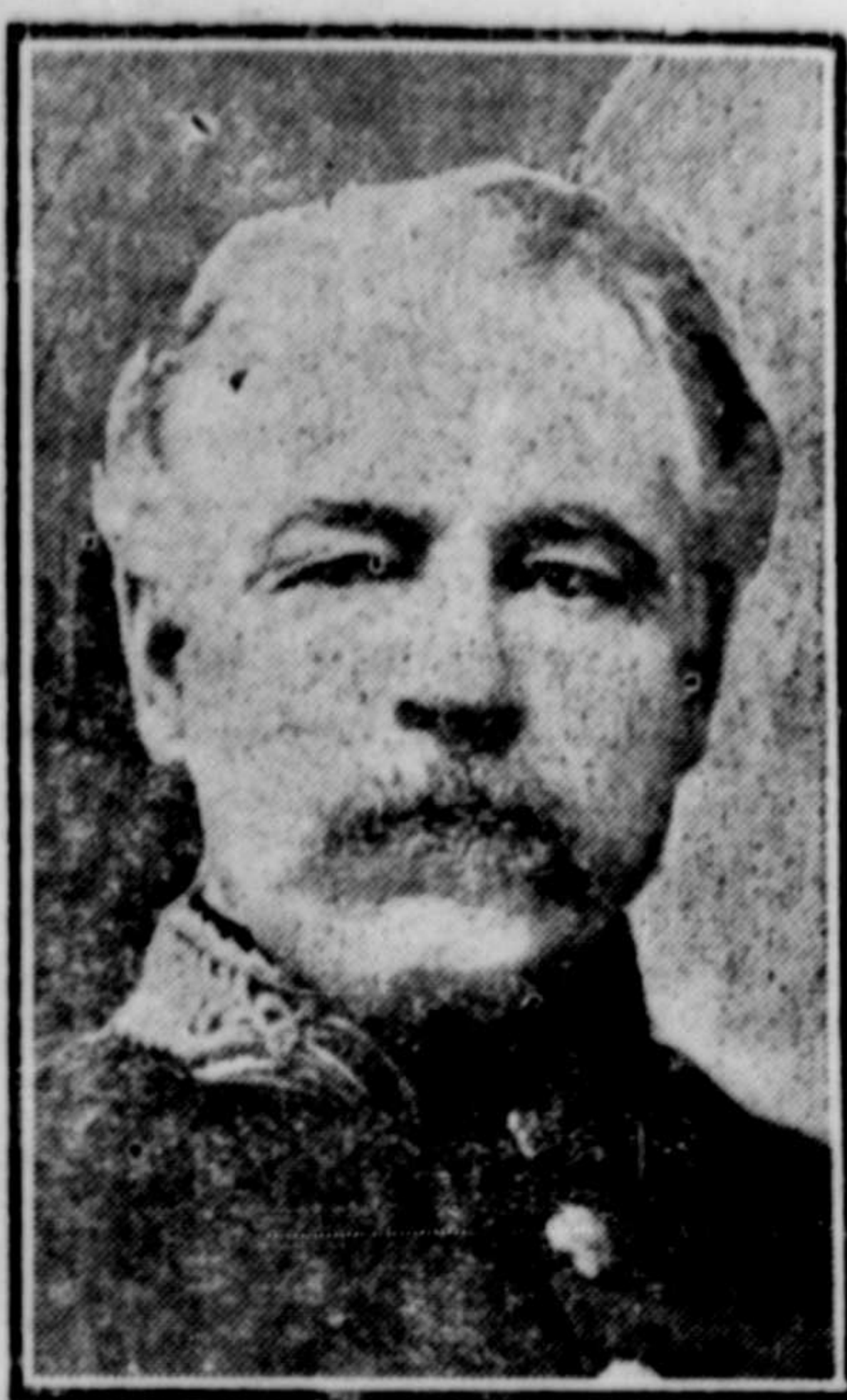
The British forces on the Balkan front have advanced, taking the towns of Papalova and Prosenik from the Bulgarians and Germans.

Bavarians Advance.

Bucharest, October 12.—The Bavarians, who captured the Rothenthurm Pass in the Carpathians in Transylvania, have crossed into Rumanian territory.

WHITEHORSE BOY KILLED IN ACTION

"Jack" Taylor, son of Judge Taylor, of Whitehorse, has been killed in action on the western front. This makes the third man from Whitehorse to give his life for the Empire. The others were Fred Young and George Chapman.

SOLDIERS SMASHED THINGS IN CALGARY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Calgary, October 12.—Soldiers from Sarcee Camp near here, incensed at the arrest of some of their comrades for a violation of the liquor regulations, wrecked a Chinese restaurant; visited the mounted police barracks and smashed windows and furniture and burned clothing and equipment.

ANOTHER EXPOSITION AWARD FOR GRAND TRUNK

Montreal, Oct. 11.—The Grand Trunk System has received an additional honor from the Jury of Awards of the Panama Pacific International Exposition.

Notification was received here today that the Jury has awarded the Railway a silver medal for the excellence of its exposition pavilion from an architectural point of view. This is a tribute not only to the Grand Trunk, but to Canadian architects who designed the building. The design was Spanish Renaissance in character, making a handsome and ornate structure which was situated in a prominent position at the northeast corner of the grounds at San Francisco.

The Grand Trunk was awarded a gold medal for its general exhibit which featured the natural riches of the Dominion.

ASQUITH SAYS NO PATCHED UP PEACE WANTED

Britain Passes Huge New War Loan—German Losses Over Three Millions—Old Men Are Called Up.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, October 12.—Premier Asquith, in moving the thirteenth British war vote of three hundred million pounds in the House of Commons yesterday, said that he has estimated Great Britain's daily war expenditure at five million pounds.

Speaking to the motion, he concluded an able and lucid speech on the financial side of the war as follows: "Great Britain and her allies cannot allow this war to end in a patched-up, precarious, dishonoring compromise, masquerading under the name of peace."

German Losses.

An official British compilation of German casualties up to the end of September gives a total of killed and wounded of 3,556,018.

Old Men Called Up.

A Reuter's despatch from Berlin announces that Germany has ordered all men between the ages of 58 and 63, who have been previously declared unfit, to report for examination and to be ready to serve.

The shaded portions of the map show the advances made on fourteen miles of this front in the recent fighting.

MRS. DE MUSSY WAS DOUBLY BEREAVED

Mrs. De Mussy, who is residing in Paris, has written to Rev. Father Bunoz telling of the death of her husband, Captain De Mussy was killed while leading a charge against Fort Douaumont, on the Verdun front about the end of May. Mrs. De Mussy has suffered a double bereavement as her little baby, born after she returned to live in France, died just a month before the gallant captain gave his life for France. The women of France are bearing much of the sorrow of this terrible conflict and Mrs. De Mussy has suffered more than most. The deepest sympathy of her many friends in Prince Rupert will go out to her in her double bereavement.

MITCHELL ALBERT LOOKS FOR BIG RUSSIAN TRADE

Mitchell Albert, who has just returned from the south, confirms the report that he will leave for Russia in the spring with the intention of embarking upon railway construction. Mr. Albert looks for a largely increased business between this continent and Russia as he expects extensive development in that country after the war. He looks for an enormously increased demand for machinery of all kinds, particularly harvesting machinery. He thinks Canada ought to get busy now to secure a large share of this trade which will otherwise go to the United States. Prince Rupert is the logical shipping point to Vladivostok, being two days nearer that port than any of the ports in the south, and he is of the opinion that now is the time to get busy in this direction.

THREE YEARS HARD FOR SASKATCHEWAN MEMBER

Regina, Sask., Oct. 12.—Mr. Devline, the member of the Legislature who was charged with accepting a bribe in connection with the Banish the Bar Bill, has been sentenced to three years hard labor.

SWEDEN LAUNCHES FIRST STONE SHIP

London, Oct. 5.—A new type of ship, said to be the first stone vessel ever floated, has arrived at Christiania. The ship, which resembles a large barge, is constructed entirely of concrete, with the exception of the ribs, which are of steel.

It is claimed that this hull will resist damage better than steel, iron or wood, and is consequently safer. The practical application of the idea dates back only a few months ago, but it at once attracted much attention, and M. Bostrom, the minister of marine, and one of Sweden's largest shipowners, immediately ordered a lighter of some thousand tons displacement.

It is proposed to construct concrete ships of from 15,000 to 20,000 tons displacement, to be used as railway ferries between Goteborg and England. The inventor, M. Nicolai Fougner, an engineer, claims to be able to construct any size demanded.

These concrete ships can be sailed or engine like other vessels, and experts consider that a new epoch in shipbuilding has arrived.

Captain Whitten, of the Cold Storage fleet, has gone to England to bring his family over here.

ITALIANS HAVE RESUMED THEIR TRIESTE DRIVE

Six Thousand Prisoners Taken After Eight Days Heavy Bombardment—German Troops Cornered

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, October 12.—Following eight days of very heavy artillery bombardments and mining preparations, the Italians have resumed their offensive on the Carso Plateau in the direction of Trieste. They made excellent progress in their infantry attacks, capturing six thousand prisoners.

Germans Cut Off.

Berlin, October 12.—German troops who held the salient projecting towards Vermandovillers, on the western front, have been cut off by a French enveloping movement.

French Air Raid.

Paris, Oct. 12.—French aviators bombarded a magneto factory at Stuttgart, in Germany, causing a conflagration.

Holland Protests.

The Hague, October 12.—The Dutch government is demanding an explanation from Germany regarding the sinking of the Dutch steamer Bloemerdijk by German submarines off Nantucket.

"PADDY" SULLIVAN GOT FOOT CRUSHED

"Paddy" Sullivan, who returned yesterday from England, where he went on active service, had the misfortune to seriously injure his left foot while in training and no one is more disappointed that he has missed his opportunity to get a shot at the Huns than is this Rupert pioneer. Mr. Sullivan has seen active service in Egypt and in South Africa and, though he carries the active service button for this war, his one regret is that he took no really active part in it.

WILSON'S POSITION

Perhaps one fails to realize the difficulties of being a neutral in this world wide war, and particularly the embarrassments attached to the neutrality of a country which has a population of a hundred millions, drawn from every country under the sun, but chiefly from the belligerent nations. President Wilson has come in for a good deal of criticism, both at home and abroad, and perhaps the fact which convinces him that he is sailing a truly neutral course in a troublous sea of war is that both Germany and Britain are thoroughly dissatisfied with his actions.

This is not the time to go into the question as to whether Washington should have protested against the invasion of Belgium, but the submarine question is a live issue of the moment and it is not out of place to dwell on President Wilson's attitude in this connection. In the first place, there can be no doubt that the President of the United States has viewed matters largely from the standpoint of the welfare of his own country, and it may safely be said, the leaders of any of the other nations, similarly placed, would have done likewise. The matter of the notes regarding the sinking of the Lusitania and other vessels carrying United States citizens has been threshed out by the press and has got no further forward, except that Berlin has made certain promises, which were worded in such a way as to mean little.

Within the past few days, however, an entirely new development has taken place, and the Kaiser's submarines have come right up to the United

States doorstep, as it were, and have run riot amid shipping on the Atlantic seaboard. Nine steamers are alleged to have been sunk off the Nantucket Shoals and one of the submarines took a breather to put into Newport with despatches for the German Ambassador at Washington, and then proceeded to sea again. So far as the United States is concerned, this campaign might just as well have been carried out within a few miles of the British coast, as the ships being outside of United States waters, they were clearly outwith the jurisdiction of Washington. It appears then that, if President Wilson approves of, or at least only gently objects to, the submarine warfare of the past, he must let this go as being exactly in the same class. However, an entirely new and interesting point is raised by the fact that Washington protested to Great Britain against British cruisers patrolling the waters off the Atlantic coast, in wait for the submarine Deutschland. If British cruisers had no right to lie in wait for the Deutschland, then most assuredly German submarines had even less right to send to the bottom nine vessels, several of them carrying passengers, in the same waters. The Deutschland was legitimate prey, in that she carried only war material as cargo and was essentially designed for such work, and not in any sense as a merchant ship in the ordinary meaning of that term.

President Wilson again faces a thorny problem and he has not made it any easier by appearing to make fish of one and flesh of the other. Had he controlled the situation with a stronger hand in the first in-

stance his troubles today would have been considerably less. At it is, he has opened up the whole question from a new angle and it will be highly interesting to watch developments.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

If the submarine controversy again becomes heated probably Woodrow Wilson will not be very much disappointed if the people of the United States invite Charles Hughes to try his hand at dodging the difficulties of a neutral whose population is drawn from both sides in the war.

Greece has got another new premier. This makes the fourth in about as many weeks. Probably the first three were not slow to relinquish the job when opportunity offered. Being premier of Greece is no sinecure these days.

Germany wants to float another war loan of twelve billion marks. When Germany floats a new war loan it is just a case of taking the money out of one pocket and putting it into another.

Mr. Justice Haggart rules that Mr. Justice Galt, in presiding at a recent enquiry in Winnipeg, exceeded his authority in sentencing newspaper editors for contempt of court. It would appear that an editor can say anything he pleases about a judicial enquiry and all that can happen to him is to be told that he must be a good boy in future, while he has the option of starting in next day and doing the same thing again.

The French have badly bent the German line on the Somme front. Berlin will be consoling the German people with the fact that the line is not broken.

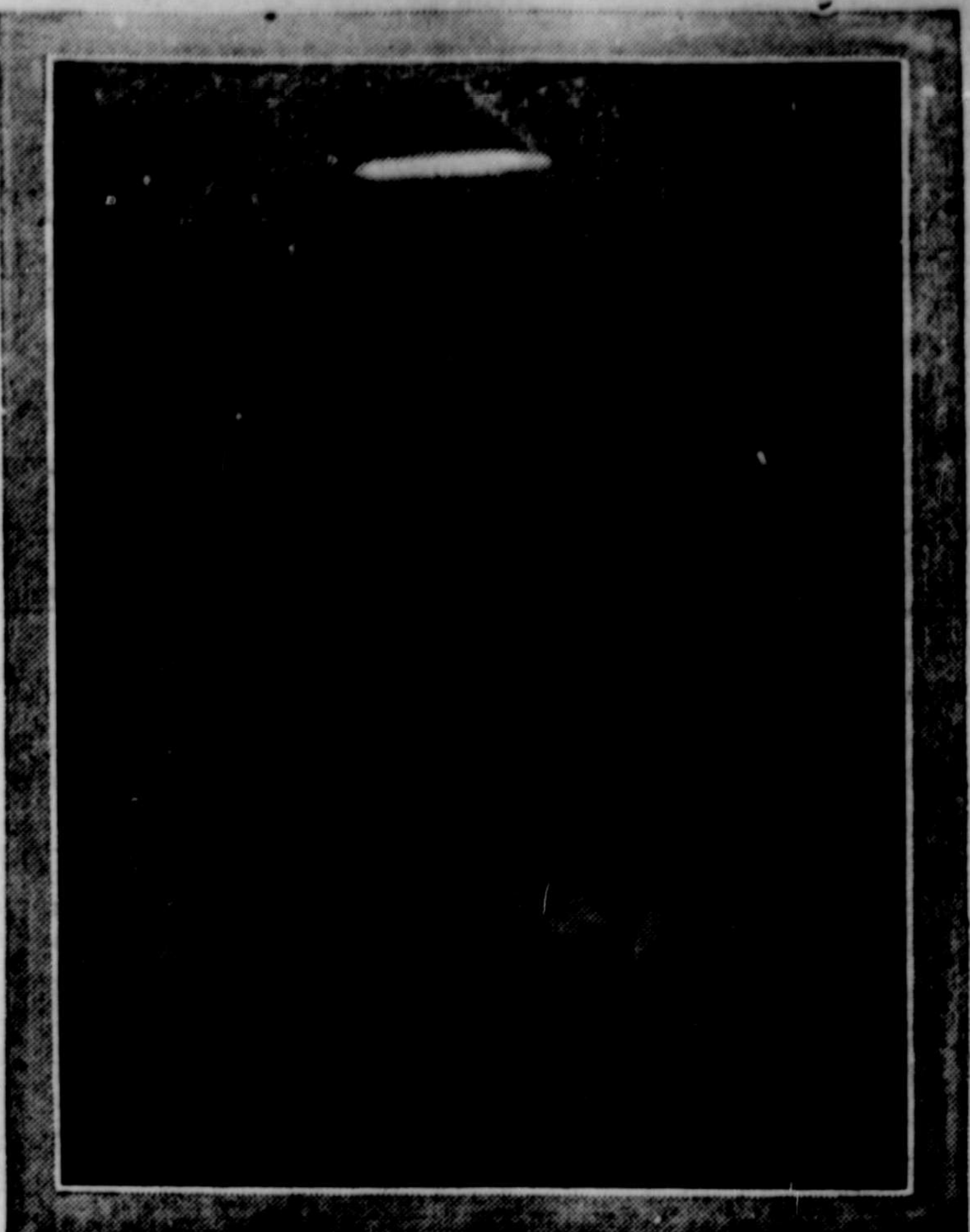
