## ROYALIST PLOT IS UNEARTHED IN GREECE

### CANADIAN FISH FOR BRITISH ARMY — GERMAN LINE ON SOMME IS STILL INTACT

#### CONSTANTINE HAD SCHEME TO JOIN GERMANS

Greek Royalist Plot Exposed by the Allies—Drastic Demands Shattered the King's Dream.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 14.—Vice-Admiral Du Fournel, on behalf of the Allies, has demanded control of the Greek police; the prohibition of the carrying of arms by Greek citizens, and the stoppage of the transportation of munitions through the province of Thesaly to the neighborhood of Larissa. The conditions laid down by the Allies have been accepted and the Entente ministers will now recognize the new Lambros cabinet.

#### German Plot.

According to despatches from Athens, the Entente Allies unearthed a Royalist plot, which explains the reason for the ultimatum of a few days ago, which included most drastic demands. King Constantine was scheduled to retire northward with troops with the intention of concentrating in Thesaly, where he would remain entrenched until the arrival from Germany of an army, when the Greeks and the Germans would join forces against the Allies. King Constantine declared that Rumania would be wiped out in fifteen days.

#### ITALIANS NOW NEARING SECOND AUSTRIAN LINE

Four Hundred More Prisoners Taken on Gorizia Front—Further Italian Gains on the Carso.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Rome, Oct. 14.—Violent infantry fighting continues on the Carso Plateau, following the terrific Italian artillery bombardment on that front. The attacks have resulted in further successes for the Italians.

In the Gorizia region the Austrians have made heavy counter-attacks which were all repulsed with severe casualties inflicted on the enemy. The Italians have approached to the second line of Austrian trenches and have captured four hundred more prisoners.

#### In Transylvania.

London, Oct. 14.—The steady pressure of the Austro-German forces is compelling the Rumanians in Transylvania to retire to their own frontier.

#### British Sailors Missing.

The British steamer Gardepie has been sunk. Twelve of her crew were saved but thirteen are missing.

#### PATRIOTIC CONCERT IN THE EMPRESS THEATRE

Private Peat, of the First Canadian Contingent, will tell of his experiences in the charge at St. Julien and in the fighting around Ypres, at the concert in the Empress Theatre tonight. Mrs. Peat, who had charge of munitions making in England, will also tell of what the women of Britain are doing to help defeat the Germans. Humorous numbers will be given by Private Jerrett and the program should prove to be highly interesting both from a musical and historical standpoint.

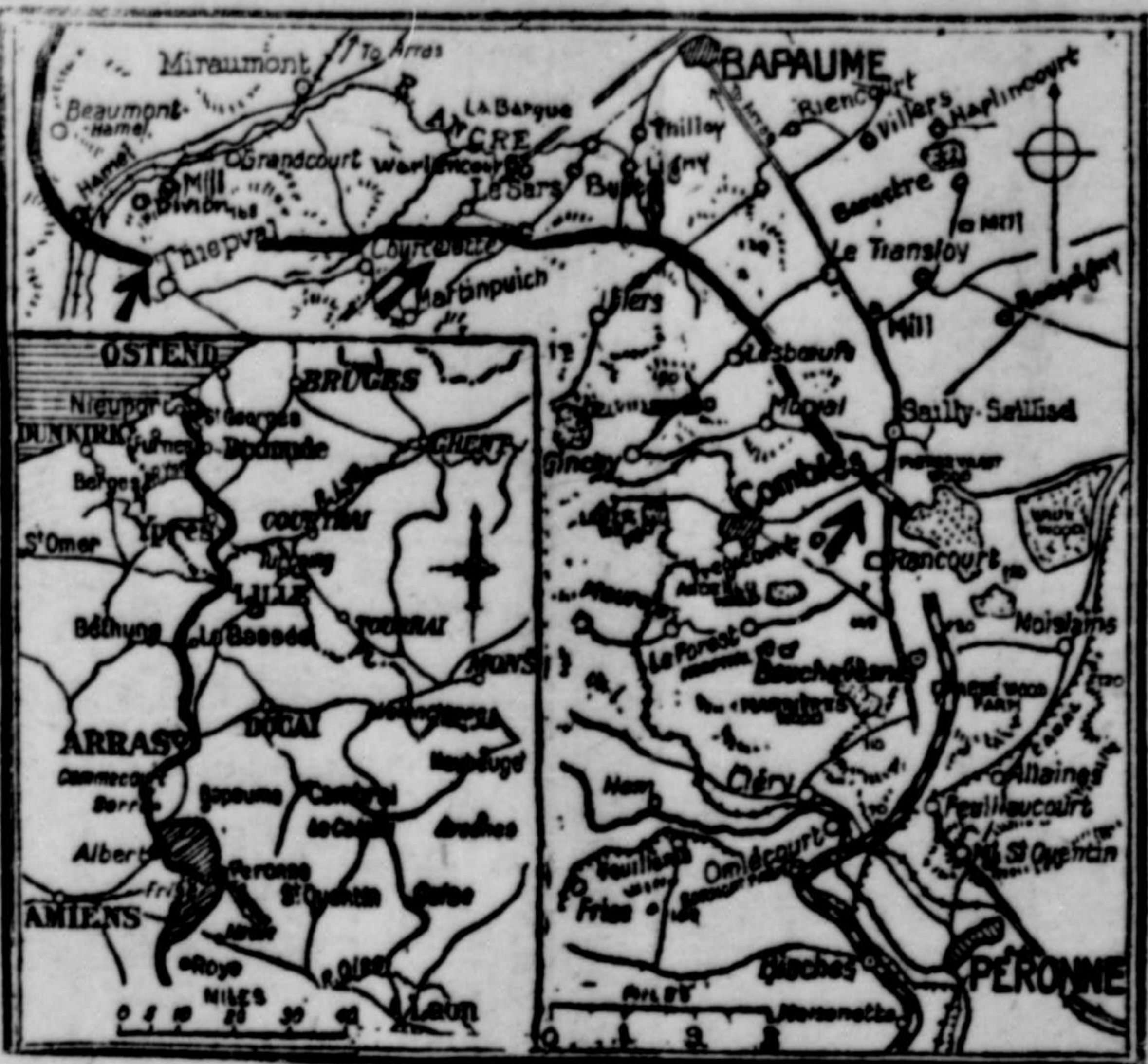
#### HALIBUT STEAMER INDEPENDENT HIT REEF

The halibut steamer Independent, of the National Independent Company, which was reported sunk off the Alaskan coast the other day, struck a reef off Middleton Island, fifty miles south of Cordova. A heavy sea was running at the time but the crew of thirty-eight were able to get away in their dories. The vessel was valued at \$50,000 and was built at Tacoma in 1911.

#### JACK MACDONALD REPORTED KILLED

A letter from the front this morning, telling of the death of James Stewart, mentions the fact that Jack Macdonald was killed at the same time. The writer thought this was Mr. Macdonald formerly of P. Burns & Company, but his brother, who is also with that company, has received no word, and, as the death mentioned must have taken place three weeks ago at least, there is every reason to believe that it is some other Jack Macdonald. There were at least two of the name in the battalion.

Jack, who was so well known here, was for a time on the quartermaster's staff, but about two months ago was transferred to the hand grenade company of the 3rd Pioneers. That he is still well will be the hope of everyone in the city.

#### MAJOR W.S. MARSHALL DIED OF WOUNDS

Word reached town last night that Major Walter S. Marshall has died of wounds received on the western front. Mr. Marshall was one of the most popular young officers who left this city for active service. He went to Vernon as lieutenant in the 62nd Battalion and later got his captaincy. He got his majority on active service and was transferred to the Pioneers, who seem to have been in the thick of it in the west. Mr. Marshall was formerly manager of the Prince Rupert Importing Company and was a native of Hamilton, Ont. His brother, Col. Marshall, was killed shortly after Walter reached the front.

#### LIEUT. PETERS, D. S. O., IS AGAIN PROMOTED

City Solicitor Peters received the good news this morning that his son Lieut. Fritz Peters, D. S. O., has received further promotion in the Royal Navy, having been given command of H. M. S. Christopher, one of the newest and largest types of torpedo destroyers. It is intensely gratifying to know that the Canadian boys are earning honors on the sea as well as on land.

#### SOLDIERS' VOTES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Vancouver, October 14.—The counting of the British Columbia soldiers' votes is practically completed. The figures for Prohibition are 31,528 and 24,967 against, while there are 37,910 votes in favor of Woman Suffrage and 17,796 against, making the Prohibition majority 5,561 and the Suffrage majority 20,114. The votes cast in the various constituencies have not yet been announced. The returns from Europe will not be here until next week.

#### BRITISH ARMY REQUIRES MORE CANADIAN FISH

Atlantic, Pacific and Great Lakes to Supply for Our Fighting Men—German Somme Line Intact.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 14.—For some time past the soldiers at the front have been receiving Canadian fish as part of their rations and the change of diet has proven so beneficial that the war office is extending it. Canadian fisheries on the Atlantic, Pacific and the Great Lakes will now supply the British army with one million, five hundred thousand pounds of fish.

#### Western Front.

Paris, Oct. 14.—The attempt by the British and French forces to break through the German lines on the Somme front has proved unsuccessful.

#### Verdun Safe.

General Nivelle, who succeeded General Petain in command of the French forces in front of Verdun, declares that Verdun is now safe and that there is no possibility of the Germans ever being able to break through on that front.

#### SIR WILFRID APPROVES OF WOMAN SUFFRAGE

LLOYD GEORGE The discovery of the war, so far as Great Britain is concerned, is undoubtedly David Lloyd George. The "little Welsh attorney" had, of course, made a name for himself as a statesman years before the war was ever dreamt of, but not even his closest friends imagined that the plucky little Welshman had the ability to rise to such an occasion as he has done.

Mr. Lloyd George is a native of Criccieth and served his apprenticeship in law with an uncle, who also directed his schooling. Aspiring to political fame, he had no difficulty in getting his countrymen to elect him to the House of Commons. His radical views appealed to them and he had a gift of fiery oratory which carried conviction. He had a long spell of hard work and splendid training on the front Opposition benches during the reign of the Balfour government and he was a sore thorn in the side of the late Joseph Chamberlain, who was Foreign Secretary during the dark days of the South African war.

When Balfour was defeated in 1906, Mr. Lloyd George was given a seat in the Campbell-Bannerman cabinet, but it was not until he became Chancellor of the Exchequer in the Asquith government that he began to stir things up. His raids on the earnings of the large corporations, by way of increased income tax on unearned increment; his increased death duties, and his effort to solve the land problem in Britain established his fame among the Radicals and brought him many bitter enemies amongst the wealthy classes. His old age pension

scheme and plan of state insurance, which were both bitterly opposed, even by men in his own political party, added lustre to his career and he was paving the way for greater reforms when the war broke.

A man of dynamic energy and wonderful ability to grasp the salient features of a situation, the sworn enemy of militarism and a man termed "pro-Boer" in the days of the South African war, many wondered just how he would make out in the great struggle. He has done wonders, and perhaps the greatest spur to his efforts was that he was fighting the detested militarism. Naturally a fighter, the gallant little lawyer seems to have been in his element from the beginning, and the more work he was given to do, the greater capacity for work did he seem to develop. As Minister of Munitions, he placed the production of war material on a sound business-like basis and brought unity and co-operation where everything had been done in haphazard fashion.

While he was filling this difficult position, the trouble broke out in Dublin. A man was needed, and immediately found, in Lloyd George. When Kitchener's death shrouded the Empire in gloom, the question in the minds of all was "Who can succeed him?" Lloyd George was the answer, and the correct answer. He is not a soldier, but he seems to possess a remarkable faculty of being able to rise to any and every occasion. Probably it is the Celtic temperament, but certainly it is largely an infinite capacity for hard work. His latest speech on the war has sent a thrill throughout the Empire, just as his radical



speeches from the platform thrilled his audiences. Perhaps the most remarkable result of his magnificent work in the great crisis is that many thousands of men who hated even to hear his name mentioned some years ago, are today numbered amongst his greatest admirers and staunchest supporters. He is undoubtedly the man of the moment.

for sizing in the business, sold ordinarily for three dollars and seventy-five cents a barrel and now brings six dollars and fifty cents; bleached sulphite, another important item, has doubled in price, and the same may be said of satin white. Common bleach, which was a cent and a quarter a pound, went up to seven cents, and is now practically unobtainable. But aniline colors lead all the rest for mounting price. Those that formerly sold for forty cents a pound are now about twenty dollars for the same weight. Aniline colors are extensively used to give the proper hue to paper, cochineal and ultramarine or magenta and aniline blue being combined to obtain a desirable white.

So, dear reader, if your newspaper presents a jaundiced appearance, or your magazine just bought has the cast of age, remember that the publishers are having their troubles in getting paper, at all!—Exchange.
