REMAINDER OF THIEPVAL RIDGE CAPTURED

GERMANS LOSE HEAVILY -- ALLIED AVIATORS VASTLY SUPERIOR TO GERMAN

BRITISH HAVE CAPTURED THE THIEPVAL RIDGE

Desperate German Resistance—Exceedingly Heavy Enemy Losses—French Make Further Gains.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 17.—The British have captured the remaining portion of the Thiepval ridge after desperate fighting. The resistance offered by the Germans at this point is clear proof of the importance which characterized the position. With Thiepval in the hands of the British, the northern portion of the Allied line on the Somme front will be extended, and brought into line with Courcellette, where the Canadians suffered so severely a week ago, and Fiers, where the French did much gallant work.

The German losses in the Thiepval fighting were exceedingly heavy.

On the rest of the Somme front the British artillery and trench mortars bombarded the enemy lines in conjunction with an aeroplane attack completely destroying a German battery position. The aviators also dropped bombs on a railway station and on transports moving behind the German lines.

French Success.

Paris, Oct. 17.—The French on the Somme front have consolidated the positions taken and, despite a heavy enemy bombardment, have acquired 287 kilometres of additional territory and have captured a hundred and ten prisoners. They also shot down a flaming German aeroplane.

CITY HAS PURCHASED \$9,000 OF WAR BONDS

City Treasurer Johnston intimated to the council last night that the city had been allotted \$9,000 of the war loan bonds, issued by the Dominion government. He advised that the amount be paid in full at once, thus making a saving to the city of \$25.14. The council endorsed the proposal.

METLAKATLA BOY KILLED IN ACTION

Word reached the city yesterday that John Rudland, one of the native sons of Metlakatla who offered his services to his King and country, has been killed in action. This young soldier was well known here and the deepest sympathy will go out to his sorrowing family.

GAINS MADE BY RUMANIANS IN TRANSYLVANIA

German Positions Occupied—Withdrawal in South—Fierce Struggle on the Gallician Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bucharest, October 17.—The Rumanians along the Alt River have occupied several Teutonic positions and every attack by the enemy has been repelled. South of the Burzen Valley the Rumanians have been forced to withdraw slightly owing to German pressure.

Gallician Front.

Petrograd, October 17.—Severe fighting is raging along the Gallician front and neither the Russians nor the Austro-Germans are able to announce that they have gained the advantage.

Greek Situation.

London, Oct. 17.—The Entente ministers have formally recognized the revolutionary Greek government.

This is evidently the successor to the Lambros administration recently appointed.

Vienna Claims.

Austrians in Vienna claim that they have captured sixteen hundred Russians and Italians and several machine guns and that they are repelling attacks in every theatre of war.

JACK MACDONALD IS POSTED AS MISSING

Doubt still surrounds the fate of Jack Macdonald, formerly with P. Burns & Co., who was mentioned last week in The News as having been reported killed. He was missing after severe fighting early in September, and several letters have arrived from the front within the past few days stating that Jack had made the great sacrifice.

The latest report is from Percy Godenrath, who received a letter dated September 18th, "somewhere in France," which stated that Jack had been killed. Of the original "Kilties" who left from here, there are very few left in the old regiment. Many have been so severely wounded that they are no longer fit for service; some have passed beyond, while others have been transferred to other regiments.

His brother, Fred Macdonald, has received word from Ottawa and also from his home in Elora, Ont., that though Jack was missing between September 4th and 7th, he was not officially posted until October 12th. Though several of the boys have written saying that Jack was killed, there is still a possibility that he is taken prisoner. That he will yet turn up, safe and sound, will be the hope of all.

OUTSIDE TAXPAYERS CONGRATULATE CITY

City Treasurer Johnson has received, along with cheques from outside taxpayers, quite a number of congratulatory letters from men who realize how things have been here. One is from S. S. Taylor, K. C., of Vancouver, who says, "I congratulate the city upon its lowering of taxation; that policy will favor Prince Rupert in the eyes of investors. Everyone was becoming alarmed, which if continued, would have ruined your chances of development. If you retain your investors they will, the moment business conditions warrant, be builders in your city."

SATISFACTORY RESULT OF RECENT TAX SALE

City Treasurer Johnson's report of the tax sale was presented to the city council last evening. It showed that the sale had been the means of collecting \$20,927 of arrears of taxes and that property bearing taxes of \$23,840, on which payments were due to the government, had been withdrawn from the sale, while of the balance bought in by the city only about \$1,000 belonged to private individuals, the rest carrying payments due to the G. T. P. Development Company.

The treasurer pointed out that the city had on hand a sum of \$7,000, earning 3½ per cent., which had resulted from over-estimating the cost of the 14th Avenue plank roadway. He suggested that, as this amount was not repayable until December, 1918, it be applied on the tax sale property bought in, thus earning 8 per cent. The council unanimously endorsed the treasurer's proposal.

Mayor McCaffery pointed out that the tax sale had been highly successful since it had been instrumental in bringing in about \$20,000 of arrears of taxes. He heartily endorsed the suggestion of Mr. Johnson in regard to the utilization of the \$7,000 which they had on hand.

BRILLIANT CAREER OF MAJOR "BILL" CASEY

The Toronto Globe, in a recent issue, publishes a photograph of Major William Archer Casey, who was better known in Prince Rupert in the early days as "Bill" Casey. This young officer had a magnificent record on the field, even in these days of rapid promotion for gallantry. He enlisted in Victoria as a private; was made a sergeant before leaving Canada, and was given his commission as a lieutenant on the battle field. He was twice wounded but on each occasion recovered sufficiently to be able to return to the firing line, where he rapidly gained promotion, ultimately receiving his majority.

He was a son of the late George E. Casey, who, at the time he entered the House of Commons, was the youngest member in the Dominion. "Bill" was a youth of eighteen when he came to what is now Prince Rupert with J. H. Pillsbury and the first party of engineers which located here. He worked for the Grand Trunk Pacific for several years and afterwards entered the service of the city. He lived here for about five years and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him, and he was known to everyone. His old friends here feel his loss very keenly, but are proud indeed that he earned the honors he did on the field of battle.

W. J. BOWSER MAY YET BE ELECTED TO LEGISLATURE

Victoria, Oct. 17.—W. J. Bowser may yet secure a seat in the Legislature as the preliminary checking of the soldiers' votes taken in Canada indicates that he has a majority of 145 over P. Donnelly.

PREMIER SCOTT RESIGNS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Regina, Oct. 17.—Hon. Walter Scott, premier of Saskatchewan, has resigned on account of ill-health. Hon. J. A. Calder has undertaken the duties of the premiership and it is probable that he will be his successor. Premier Scott has been in failing health for some time.

QUARTERS WANTED FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

A deputation consisting of Mrs. Besner, H. O. Crew and Ald. McClymont, representing the Returned Soldiers' Welcome Association, waited upon the council last evening in regard to the question of providing quarters for the association.

Ald. McClymont outlined the objects of the association and pointed out the necessity of their having rooms for the accommodation of soldiers arriving in the city on their way to their homes. He thought that the upstairs portion of the telephone office, shortly to be vacated, might be used for this purpose. He said that offers of furniture had been made already and that the association had not the funds to expend on premises.

H. O. Crew pointed out that Vancouver and Victoria had such accommodation and they felt that the present premises of the Returned Soldiers' Club were not fitted for the taking care of men overnight and it was felt that some central headquarters would be of great benefit.

Mrs. Besner emphasized the necessity of having something done along this line with as little delay as possible.

Mayor McCaffery said that he heartily concurred in the idea though the telephone premises would not be vacated for some time. He felt that the important matter was the providing of rooms, but not necessarily the rooms mentioned. The matter was referred to the general committee for report.

VITAL STATISTICS

The city health officer's report for August and September was presented to the council last night. It shows 11 births in August and 6 in September, while the deaths numbered 4 for the two months. There was one case of chickenpox in September and no infectious diseases in August.

ALLIED AIRMEN ARE SUPERIOR TO THE GERMAN

Three Hundred and Twenty-two Enemy Planes Downed in September—Brussels Court Martial.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, Oct. 17.—British and French aviators on the western front during the month of September have brought down three hundred and twenty-two enemy aeroplanes while the Allied losses during the same time number only forty-eight planes.

Brussels Court Martial.

A court martial is assembling in Brussels for the trial of fourteen persons accused of furnishing funds to Nurse Cavell for the purpose of assisting Belgian soldiers to escape across the frontier. Dr. Bull, a wealthy English physician is among the accused.

Sickness in Germany.

A serious blood poisoning disease is spreading throughout Germany on account of the constant consumption of preserved foods.

LIEUT AND MRS. GODENRATH ARE NOW AT FREDERICTON

As was reported in The Daily News recently, Sergt. P. F. Godenrath has been appointed to a lieutenancy in the 236th O. S. Battalion, now being raised at Fredericton, N. B. Mr. Godenrath has now returned to Canada, after having been at the front for seventeen months. He left his battalion on the Somme front, and, after spending a short time in England, where he met Sergt. and Mrs. Talbot, of Stewart, and Sergt. Chappel, of Prince Rupert, he arrived in Canada, accompanied by Mrs. Godenrath, who will make her home temporarily in Fredericton. The New Brunswick Kilties—Sir Sam's Own—give promise of being a crack battalion, as all the officers have seen service in France, the majority having been promoted from the ranks. The Kilties are commanded by Lieut.-Col. Percy A. Guthrie, formerly of the 10th Battalion of the 1st Canadian Division.

"DEFEAT"

News of the "defeat" of last Sunday on the Somme front is now filtering through, and it is plain that the Canadian soldiers again covered themselves with glory. It was a defeat more glorious far than many a victory. Someone had blundered, and the western battalions were left to get themselves out of a desperately tight corner of wire entanglements under a murderous machine gun fire. When the full details of the encounter come to hand, it will form one more page of Canadian military history which will stand out in the years to come, with Balaclava, Magersfontein, St. Julien, Neuve Chapelle and Loos. Carlyle said that a nation's history consists of the lives of its great men, but it may truthfully be said that an army's most glorious history is the story of its blunders. When the French commander witnessed the Light Brigade at Balaclava charging straight in the teeth of a heavy battery, because someone had misinterpreted an order, he said, "It is magnificent, but it is not war."

From the meagre accounts to hand, it is clear that the Canadians last Sunday acquitted themselves just as magnificently. They should never have been left where they were, with their flanks exposed to a raking machine gun fusillade, but they never thought of quitting. One battalion found itself isolated five hundred yards ahead of the Allied lines and under cover of darkness began to move back. They had held their position all day with both flanks exposed to a terrific fire and, when the reduced force began to withdraw, the enemy made fresh attacks upon it.

An officer and machine gun crew, with the greatest bravery, covered the retreat and held the Germans at bay until the men had gained their old trenches when the gun crew withdrew in good order taking their guns with them. Each battalion had a similar experience and the men conducted themselves with the greatest gallantry.

It is certain that the casualty lists will be heavy and that whoever blundered will be subjected to a court martial. It is to be deeply regretted that so many brave fellows sacrificed themselves because of the incompetence or carelessness of some officer, but it is something to be intensely proud of that the Canadian citizen soldiers, who were peacefully employed not many months ago, are still possessed of the indomitable courage of their fathers, who knew not defeat no matter how heavy the odds or how difficult the task.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is too bad that Sir Thomas Tait has resigned from the directorship of national service. He was looked upon as the right man for the job. Will Bob Green be his successor?

The British and French may not have broken through the German lines on the Somme but they seem to have nibbled away a thousand or two prisoners, which is good enough to be going on with.

A French military critic says that the German submarines made a breach of the Monroe Doctrine. The Monroe Doctrine is something like a German note, a lot depends on the interpretation.

SOMEONE BLUNDERED IN COURCELETTE FIGHT

Toronto, Oct. 13.—After analyzing the Canadian eye-witness' story of operations on the Somme on Sunday, the Globe's military expert says today: "If these statements are not exaggerated, Canadians had their Magersfontein, Loos and Neuve Chapelle all in one on Sunday. They were sent up against wire defences that had not been subjected to the thorough artillery preparation necessary before an assault is launched. The explanation that 'close, direct observation' of German defences by day was impossible does not appear to be sufficient. Britain's aeroplane scouting service has become marvellously proficient and the presence of uncut wire in large quantities could have been detected at once by aerial observation.

"The defeat—for defeat it was, despite the splendid gallantry of the men who died while they sought a way through the enemy's wire entanglements—was avoidable and must have been due to the assumption by some highly-placed officer that sufficient preparation for assault had been

the artillery had not been used as it should have been.

"Hundreds of dead and wounded is a heavy price to pay for disregard of the most elementary precautions. Lack of munitions may have warranted the risking of men's lives against uncut wire in the early stages of the war, but that excuse can no longer be put forward. The Canadian people will be deeply interested in learning more about the action north of Courcellette last Sunday. The official report leaves much to be explained."
