ALLIED AIRMEN ARE SUPERIOR TO THE GERMAN

Three Hundred and Twenty-two Enemy Planes Downed in September-Brussels Court Martial.

London, Oct. 17 .- British and French aviators on the western front during the month of September have brought down three hundred and twenty-two enemy aeroplanes while the Allied losses during the same time number only forty-eight planes.



"DEFEAT"

News of the "defeat" of last Sunday on the Somme front is now filtering through, and it is plain that the Canadian soldiers again covered themselves with glory. It was a defeat more glorious far than many a victory. Someone had blundered, and the western battalions were left to get themselves out of a desperately tight corner of wire entanglements under a murderous machine gun fire. When the full details of the encounter come to hand, it will form one more page of Canadian military history which will stand out in the years to come, with Balaclava, Magersfontein, St.Julien, Neuve Chapelle and Loos. 
