## IMPORTANT ALLIED GAINS ON SOMME FRONT

### CONSTANTINE SAYS NO GROUND FOR SUSPICION — WILL WITHDRAW HIS FORCES

#### ANGLO-FRENCH LINE ON SOMME SPREADING OUT

French Capture Important Point and British Make Further Progress in Thiepval Region.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, October 19.—North and south of the Somme the French have made fresh gains and have captured the remainder of Sully Sailliesel, a most important point on the road between Peronne and Bapaume. The French drove the Germans from their hill positions, compelling them to release their first line defences over a front of a mile.

#### British Front.

London, October 19.—In the Thiepval region, the British have made further gains, securing important commanding ground which was in German hands. The Anglo-French line on the Somme front is now in the form of an ever deepening crescent, sweeping from Ablaincourt, which was recently taken by the French, in a northeasterly direction to within a short distance of Peronne, straight north through Bouchavesnes to Sully Sailliesel and then in a northwesterly direction through Gueudecourt to Courcellette and the Thiepval region.

#### MONSTER BLACK COD TAKEN OFF THE ISLANDS

The schooner Borealis, of the New England Fish Company, which put in to Vancouver on Monday with 25,000 pounds of fish, landed a giant of the black cod species weighing 175 pounds and measuring five feet in length. The fish has all the markings of a black cod, but, as this fish usually weighs from ten to fifteen pounds, there is considerable doubt as to what the monster really is. It was caught in 210 fathoms off the Queen Charlotte Islands and A. L. Hagar, of the New England Company, is arranging for the government fishery officers to view the freak and will then present it to either the British Columbia or Dominion museum.

#### RED CROSS WORK

#### RUMANIANS ARE HOLDING HUNS IN TRANSYLVANIA

Russians Lend Aid—All German Attacks Repelled and Many Prisoners Taken—Small Bavarian Gain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 19.—The Rumanians, with the assistance of the Russians, have succeeded in stopping the Teutonic efforts to advance through the Transylvanian Alps in the direction of Bucharest.

The Russo-Rumanian armies have repelled all the Austro-German attacks and have inflicted severe losses on the enemy. The Allied armies have also captured a large number of prisoners.

#### Galician Front.

Petrograd, October 19.—The Bavarians have stormed one Russian position on the Galician front and have captured three hundred and fifty men and twelve machine guns.

The Russians have repelled all Austro-German attacks in the passes of the Carpathians, where it is now snowing heavily.

#### SEVERAL DISCOVERIES OF MOLYBDENUM ORE

The Molybdenum property at Alice Arm, which was discovered in the building of the trail to the Dolly Varden Mines, will very shortly be shipping ore. Molybdenum is one of the most sought for minerals at the present time, owing to the fact that it is used extensively in the hardening of steel and, to a certain extent, reduces the amount of nickel required. The Alice Arm property is one of the biggest discoveries yet made and will produce some hundreds of tons, which, at the price of \$2,500 per ton offered by the government, should show a good return.

There are showings of this ore at various points in this vicinity and another discovery was made in the Alice Arm district a few weeks ago. This new discovery is not so rich as that which will shortly be shipping but the ore covers a wide area and, if it can be economically handled, should also prove valuable.

Reports are coming in from the interior of further discoveries of molybdenum though it is impossible to tell yet if the mineral is there in paying quantities. Prospectors are turning their attention to this line and there may be interesting developments at an early date. A new discovery was made recently at no great distance from the G. T. P. railway and it is stated that there is every prospect of good quantities showing up. Though the demand for molybdenum has greatly increased on account of the war, there is a big market for it in normal times as well, as it is widely used in the manufacture of fine steel blades, etc.

#### BOWSER MAY CRAWL INTO SIXTH PLACE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Oct. 19.—W. J. Bowser has secured sixth place in Vancouver as a result of the soldiers' vote cast in Canada. He has now a majority of 45 over Pat, Donnelly.

Lieut.-Col. F. J. McKenzie has been returned for Delta, thanks to the soldiers' vote. A. D. Patterson led in this constituency by a small majority on the civilian vote.

The entire soldiers' vote in Canada has now been counted with the exception of South Vancouver and Richmond, which are held back on account of the legal action which is being taken by J. W. Weart, the Liberal candidate for South Vancouver.

Mr. Weart has produced proof that many soldiers who should have voted in Richmond cast their votes in South Vancouver, because the latter happened to be their post office address. The returning officer refused to uphold Mr. Weart's objection but the Liberal candidate has made an appeal to the courts.

#### FEDERAL PARLIAMENT MEETS IN JANUARY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Toronto, Oct. 19.—Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of Public Works, who spent part of the day in this city, states that the next session of the Federal Parliament has been fixed for some time in January and that meantime neither a general election nor a coalition government will be considered by the authorities in Ottawa.

#### INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT RUMANIA

Now that Rumania has entered the war on the side of the Allies, it is interesting to recall a few facts about the most northern of the Balkan peoples. The last census showed that it had a population of about eight millions. Bucharest, the capital, having about 400,000. The Rumanians are a Latin race and their capital is a deliberate imitation of Paris. Bucharest has often been described as the gayest city in the world.

King Ferdinand, though a son of Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern, and a Prince of a non-reigning branch of the Kaiser's family, has French blood in his veins, his grandfather having married a great-niece of the Empress Josephine, consort of Napoleon.

Queen Marie, Europe's most beautiful queen, is of British and Russian descent, being the eldest daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh and of the Grand Duchesse Marie of Russia. She is thus a first cousin of both King George and the Czar.

The Rumanian army consists of 800,000 fully-trained troops and altogether can be increased to a strength of 1,100,000. The late King Carol, who died in 1914, served his apprenticeship as an officer in the Prussian Guard, and began building up the Rumanian army on the Prussian model in 1866.

Rumanian infantrymen are unrivalled in the Balkans, and the Rumanian cavalry are as good as any in Europe. The Rumanian is naturally a fine horseman as the cavalry spirit is born in him. The infantry rifle is the Mannlicher, and the field gun is a Krupp quick-firer of 75 m. m., with a maximum range of 6,500 yards. The army is famous for its large number of sharpshooters. It also has a fairly large flying corps.

The navy consists of one protected cruiser, seven gun-boats, six coast-guard vessels, eight torpedo boats and four river monitors. The merchant navy consists of 757 vessels.

The sorest blow to Germany through the Rumanians entering the war on the side of the Allies is that she will no longer get the Rumanian crop surplus, as hitherto. Rumania is one of the richest parts of Europe and, after Russia and the United States, is the largest wheat grower in the world. Last year, besides wheat, Germany received large quantities of petroleum, coal, timber, horses and cattle from this rich little country. The Rumanian oilfields are amongst the richest in the world. Germany lost a very useful ally when Ferdinand threw in his lot with the Entente Powers.

#### CONSTANTINE IS PROTESTING HIS SINCERITY

King Personally Assures British Minister that Greece Did Not Intend to Join Germans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 19.—King Constantine, who returned hurriedly to Athens yesterday, has personally assured the British Ambassador at the Greek capital that there was no foundation for the suspicion that Greece contemplated attacking the Allied forces commanded by General Sarrail at Saloniki. He declared his readiness to immediately withdraw the Greek forces stationed in the vicinity of Larissa as proof of his sincerity.

#### Italian Gains.

Rome, Oct. 19.—The Italians have made further advances. After smashing the Austrian line by means of concentrated artillery fire they captured a commanding position on Mount Pasubio.

#### Some Speed.

Italy is completing warships which will have a speed three times faster than that of the greatest trans-Atlantic liner. (A fast Atlantic liner travels at about thirty miles an hour.)

#### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The American halibut schooners Superior and Rolfe brought in 3,000 and 9,000 pounds respectively this morning, while the Canadian schooners Nornen, Caygeon and Margalice had 4,000; 3,000, and 3,000. The Cold Storage steamer George E. Foster brought in 65,000 and the Chief Skugaid, of the same company, 20,000. Prices yesterday were around 10½ cents owing to a very small supply and it is expected that they will still range around ten cents today.

THE HALIBUT HUB

The Pacific Fisherman for October devotes considerable space to a resume of the speeches made in Congress for and against the amendment to the revenue bill which was framed to divert the halibut industry from Prince Rupert.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the discussion is that in which it is admitted that, in any case, Seattle cannot longer remain the hub of the halibut industry and, in boosting for Ketchikan as the new centre, the Seattle packers are admitting that the natural centre of the halibut business is now in the north.

but the worthy Senator should not have mixed up the \$35,000,000 Alaskan railway appropriation with the halibut industry. There is no connection between the two.

When the natural soreness at seeing the halibut industry moving north is taken away from the Seattle arguments, and politics is left out of the debate, the matter narrows down to the question of whether Ketchikan, with no railroad connection, except by ferry to Prince Rupert, should have the halibut industry handed to it by means of special legislation.

The most significant part of the discussion is that played by the New England interests. It is very evident that they fully realized what was bound to happen on the Atlantic seaboard, where they have enjoyed for years certain privileges at the hands of the Canadian government, if Seattle were allowed to have its way in preventing the handling of American fish at Prince Rupert, except in bond.



NOTES AND COMMENTS

Constantine made for Athens on the jump on receipt of a note of extremely grave character. Perhaps it was an intimation from the people of Greece, through Venizelos, that his kingship had been freed.

The attack of the Allies on the Somme front seems to be a sort of military rugby game in which the defenders don't know the signs of the attacking team. One German commander is reported to have said that the Allies in the west were not following the recognized rules of warfare.

The Germans do not care for the bayonet, but Russians charging at them out of the fog and darkness with cold steel must have been particularly unpleasant.

Compulsory registration of all men of military age has been decided upon. It is the only solution of the recruiting question, and will be welcomed by many men who are in doubt as to their position.

It is rumored in Vancouver that Premier Bowser will lay down the reins of office at the end of October. Why all the rush? Why not hang on until the beginning of the year, or longer if the people will stand for it?

## WAR PREDICTED TO END THIS YEAR

The Paris correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende has had an interview with Mme. A. de Thebes, a well known French clairvoyant and astrologer, in which she emphatically states that the war will end before the New Year.

She it was who said in 1913 that the year 1914 would be the year of great heroism, and despite much shedding of blood and tears would be a great year for France,

and place her in the front rank of the nations. The correspondent found Mme. de Thebes in her home in the Avenue de Wagram. She at first declined to be interviewed, referring the correspondent to her almanac for 1916, but she finally consented to give him the following message:—"I have predicted that the war will end this year, and I desire to say now, despite all circumstances and arguments to the contrary, that peace will be declared before the New Year. And peace will come suddenly and unexpectedly. The roar of the guns will cease overnight, and the soldiers on both fronts will be called home to peaceful pursuits. Fate has so decreed it."—Dispatch.

## THE FOOT OF WAR

Boot and shoe exports increased 8,458,046 pairs for ten months as compared with 1914. There was an increase of over 100 per cent in quantity and 159 per cent in value. The total value of leather, boot and shoe exports, was in excess of \$120,000,000, against \$47,856,148 in 1914, an increase of 150 per cent.—Exchange.

Halibut fishermen report that they have seen large numbers of herring off this coast for the last few weeks.

The Zorra, one of the Atlin Fisheries schooners, came in from the Islands today with 25,000 pounds of cohoes.

At the present time there are nine new-born babies at the hospital, a record since the institution was opened. It is also remarkable that of the nine there is only one a boy.

The Irish Fusiliers leave for the south on the Prince George on Friday morning. Remembering the sudden countermanding of the last order for departure, the boys will feel uncertain about it until they actually step on board the boat.

George W. Nickerson is expected to arrive from the south on Monday. Mr. Nickerson has made his headquarters in Winnipeg for the past few months, as western general agent for the Dominion Canners and the Aylmer Condensed Milk Company, the packers of Canada First Milk.

**FIRST APPLICATION UNDER NEW LAND ACT**

Victoria, Oct. 16.—The first application under the new act which permits land purchasers who are in arrears to the government to take an equivalent to the equity in land and release the balance of the land to the crown for use as soldiers' homesteads, is being filed with the government today.

The land purchaser is a Vancouver man, represented by Mr. T. B. Shoebottom, solicitor. He applied a few years ago to purchase a choice section of 640 acres on Graham Island, but fell into arrears for principal, taxes and interest.

After deducting the amount due for interest and taxes it is calculated that the land purchaser is entitled to a little over a quarter of the land. He is accordingly to be given a piece of the land from one side of the section, measuring one mile from north to south and a quarter-mile from east to west, containing a quarter section of 160 acres. He has to take the land as it comes and not pick and choose the best patches. After he has taken his block of 160 acres there is still a surplus of 870, which will be forfeited to the crown. The balance of 480 acres will be thrown open for settlement as soldiers' homesteads.

**VARIED PROGRAM AT WESTHOLME THEATRE**

The Westholme had a capacity house again last night when a long and varied program was presented, the chief feature of which was the seventh installment of "The Girl and the Game." The management had expected to produce "The Painted Soul" along with the Helen Holmes number but the Lasky feature was censored in Vancouver and the exchange had to rush along a scratch program to take its place. The bill includes "A Peaceful Victory," in which Florence La Badie, of "Million Dollar" fame, leads; an amusing Billy Van Deusen comedy; a prettily staged little drama entitled "Drifting," a remarkably good little comedy-drama in "His Little Story," and a fine Mutual Weekly. With such a variety of films and such splendid music everyone enjoyed the show.

**COMPANY FISHERMEN GET INCREASED WAGES**

The halibut fishing companies operating from Seattle, Prince Rupert and Vancouver have voluntarily raised the price paid the fishermen operating on their steamers to 1 1/2 cents per pound, an increase of one-fourth of a cent per pound over the union scale.—Pacific Fisherman.
