## FRENCH GRADUALLY CLOSING ON PERONNE

"IMPREGNABLE" FORT FELL IN FIFTEEN MINUTES—THE RUMANIANS ARE GAINING

### FRENCH MADE SHORT WORK OF TAKING SAILLY

Fifteen Minutes Sufficient to Take "Impregnable" Position—Five Miles of Bapaume Road Commanded.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Oct. 20.—Despite the order issued to the German troops, declaring that Saily Sailly was impregnable, it required only fifteen minutes actual time for the French to effect its capture.

Berlin states that the French suffered casualties which were not commensurate with the importance of the position secured, but, from the type of defences prepared by the Germans, it was very evident that they considered this point as of the first importance. The capture of Saily Sailly gives the French command of a stretch of five miles of the road from Peronne to Bapaume.

Further south, the French are gradually drawing their line closer around Peronne and every attack during the week has resulted in ground being gained by our troops.

#### British Front.

London, Oct. 20.—Excessive rains are hindering operations on the British section of the western front, making troop movements slow but our forces have made a slight gain at Werlen-court, after repelling a German attack.

Despatches from Berlin admit that the British have captured important positions on the Sans Lorrain front.

#### NARROW ESCAPE

"Red" Lane was working on his launch a couple of days ago when the gasoline fumes became ignited from the flame of a torch. Mr. Lane was blown overboard with his clothes afire. He was rescued on coming to the surface and medical aid was summoned and his burns attended to. Mr. Joy who rescued his partner, had to fight his way through flames, and it was necessary to sink the craft to extinguish the blaze. The accident happened near the Yacht Club quarters.

#### GRANBY COMPANY HAS PUT IN WIRELESS PLANT

S. De Winter, formerly of the wireless staff at Digby, passed through the city this morning on his way south from Anyox, where he has spent the last ten days fitting up a wireless station for the Granby Company. The plant has an effective radius of 520 miles and, when tested by Mr. De Winter from the local station last night, was found to be in perfect working order. It is expected that a fifty cents local rate will be established between Prince Rupert and Anyox.

Mr. Brewster went over and the C. P. R. magnate offered hearty congratulations upon the success attained by the Liberals in the election. After the usual pleasantries had been exchanged, Shaughnessy remarked that he had a few little business matters which he wished to discuss. The premier-elect said, "You will find me at my office at nine o'clock on Monday morning, meantime, I am on my way to church," and he departed.

### INVADERS ARE DRIVEN BACK TO TRANSYLVANIA

Rumanians Capture Nine Hundred Prisoners and Guns—Ghent Civilians Deported to Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bucharest, Oct. 20.—The Rumanians have driven the invading Austro-German forces beyond the border of Rumania into Transylvania and have gained important ground, capturing nine hundred prisoners and taking twelve cannon and several machine guns.

#### Saloniki Front.

Uaris, Oct. 20.—A fresh contingent of Italian troops has been landed at Saloniki.

#### German Methods.

Amsterdam, Oct. 20.—In addition to deporting twenty thousand civilians from the city of Ghent to Germany, the Germans are adopting similar methods in other portions of Belgium and are compelling the people who are the recipients of charity to work for them under a penalty of three years imprisonment in Germany.

#### Cunarder Sunk.

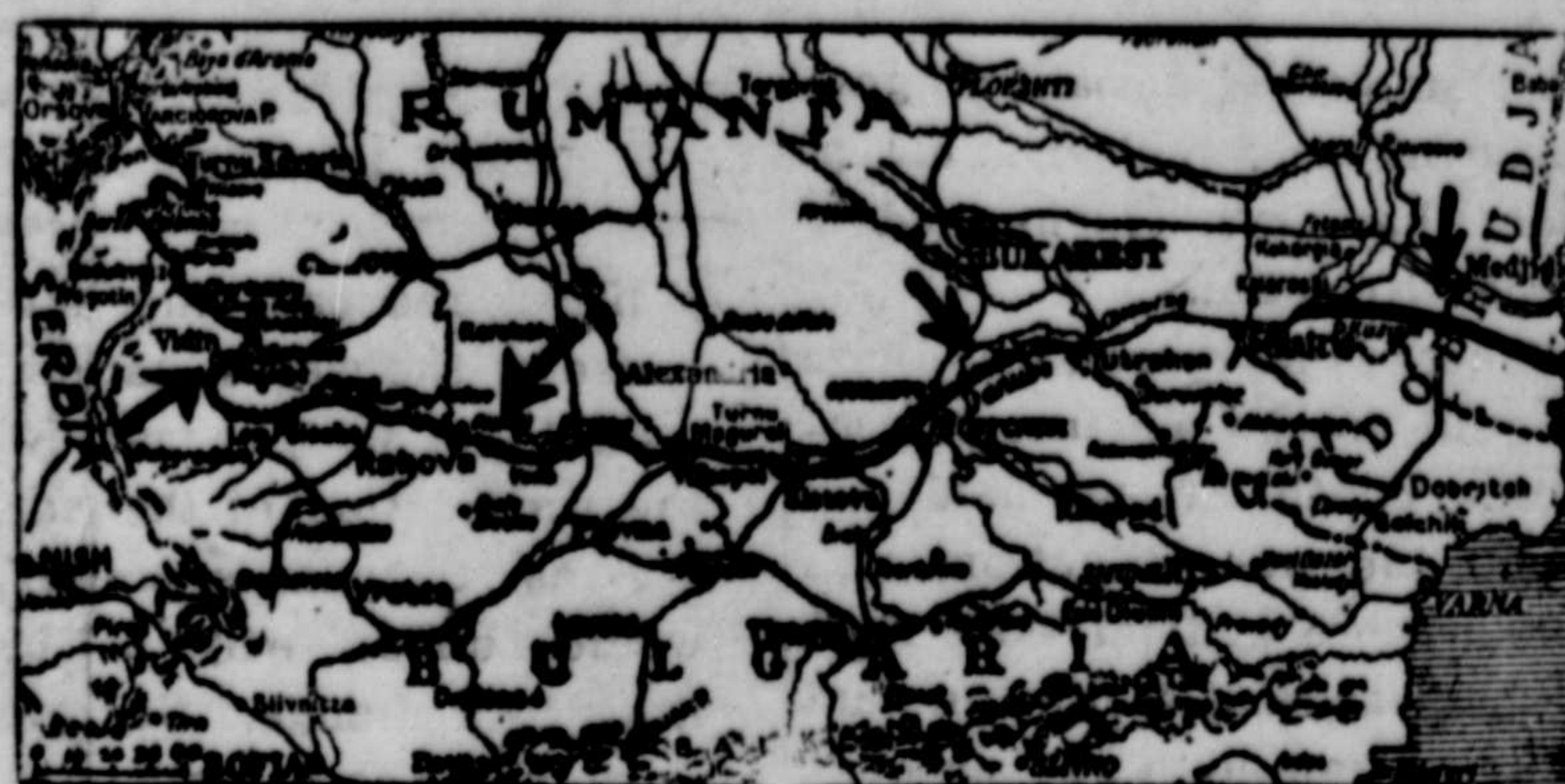
New York, Oct. 20.—The Cunard liner Alaunia struck a mine in the English Channel while proceeding from Falmouth to London. The liner sank but all of her passengers and the majority of the crew were saved. The cargo of the Alaunia included twelve thousand tons of war material.

#### GERMANY KNOWS NOT WHAT SHE FIGHTS FOR

It is strange, says a Paris writer, that Germany, after two years of war, does not yet know what she is fighting for. This, at any rate, is the idea that one derives from the acrimonious controversy that is being thrashed out in German political circles and in the German press. One section, the ruling clique, demands the annexation to Germany of a considerable portion of Europe. Another group pretends to be shocked by the word "annexation," and insists only upon the necessity of "guarantees." A third group, the most numerous, but less influential, merely the common herd, is indifferent as regards either annexation or guarantees. It wants peace, an early peace.

The Germans, in fact, are hopelessly divided over the purpose of the war, and in this respect form a striking contrast to the Allies, who are welded into a solid block by a single passion, love of liberty, and a single determination, the determination to destroy Prussian militarism.—Dispatch.

Regina, Oct. 20.—W. M. Martin, who represents Regina in the Federal Parliament, has accepted the premiership of Saskatchewan. For the past two years there has been considerable talk of Mr. Martin's succeeding the Hon. Walter Scott, who has been in precarious health for several years. Mr. Martin is extremely popular throughout the province and will make a strong leader.

### WARSHIPS WERE REMOVED FROM THE U. S. COAST

Britain Acceded to Request From Washington and Disaster Followed—Hindenburg Opposes Subs.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 19.—Dealing with the recent submarine campaign by the Germans off the Atlantic seaboard of the United States, Viscount Grey, formerly Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has announced that the British Admiralty ordered its warships withdrawn from their positions near the American coast in order that no offense might be given to the United States government, although international law clearly permitted the British vessels to remain in the vicinity of that coast.

#### Hindenburg Opposes Subs.

Amsterdam, Oct. 20.—General Von Hindenburg is emphatically opposed to a more ruthless prosecution of Germany's campaign against the merchant marine of the Allied nations.

Politicians in Germany are formed into two distinct camps on this question and a large number of prominent men, who are opposed to Bethmann-Hollwegg, have signed a petition demanding that he send in his resignation.

## ELECTION TALK

Hon. Bob Rogers is again talking elections, or rather no election. As Bob is considered the election wizard, though the Manitoba debacle rather tarnished his reputation in that line, he seems to feel that he should at certain, or uncertain, intervals announce just how he feels about his own particular line of business. Sometimes he comes out openly, as at present, and on other occasions his ideas are issued through a sympathetic section of the press. On several occasions since the war began, the Rogers press has started a Federal election flutter but each time something has happened to spill the beans.

There is no secret about the fact that the Premier and his colleagues have been calculating the political weather prospects since the house prorogued and the chief question to decide was whether the election should be held in November or in April. Many favored dissolution this fall as they feared further serious complications in the next session of the House and they had more than enough trouble at the last.

It would appear that the weather forecast throughout the east is unfavorable and is likely to remain so indefinitely and that the Hon. Bob's statement to the press is an intimation that not only is there to be no election this fall but he would prefer not to hear the word mentioned, and he hopes there won't be an election for years.

Bob also spurns all idea of a coalition government, which is only natural, as he could not expect Liberals to coalesce in many of his own little schemes, when they would not stand for

handing over the contract for the new Parliament Buildings to a contractor on a basis of 8 per cent. on cost, plus 20 per cent. depreciation on plant. Coalition to Bob is unthinkable, and who can blame him, knowing Bob. However, nobody has ever suggested a coalition government and nobody, except Bob, has ever mentioned a Federal election.

There is no reason why there should not be a general election. South Africa held one when the war situation was much more critical than it is at present, and feeling in that country ran high, on account of the Boer rebellion. Elections have been held in Australia and in several of the provinces in Canada. Only in Britain has there been a continued extension of the life of parliament, and there they have a coalition government.

So long as Canada continues the present form of government, there is no reason why elections should not be held in their due course, except in very exceptional instances, and it is very questionable whether the former extension was warranted, though it was readily agreed to by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who acceded to the request of the government on purely patriotic grounds. On the same grounds, it might be argued that a Federal election should be held within the next year. If patriotism is a genuine caring for the welfare of the country, then patriotism demands an election in the Dominion of Canada. It is evidently the intention of the government, when it meets in January, to ask for a further extension of their term. Such an extension should not be considered for a moment, as it would be made for purely

political reasons, and not because of the war situation. As a matter of fact, in many ways, the prosecution of the war, so far as Canada is concerned, would undoubtedly be benefited by a change. No government which contains Hon. Robert Rogers and Hon. Sir Sam Hughes can ever be considered a strong enough government to handle the present situation.

There are evidently not enough Conservatives in Alberta to go round and the Tories have nominated a Liberal in Sturgeon. Tories are also getting very scarce in British Columbia these days.

How have the mighty fallen. Bowser is still fighting for last place in Vancouver. Sir Richard's successor is indeed experiencing a lingering death.

Hon. William Manson was an interested spectator of the counting of the soldiers' votes. William did not see anything there that looked like an inducement to return to Prince Rupert.

(5) Voters will greatly facilitate matters if those voting on Road Tax bring their receipts with them, and those claiming to vote on Agreements bring their Agreements with them.

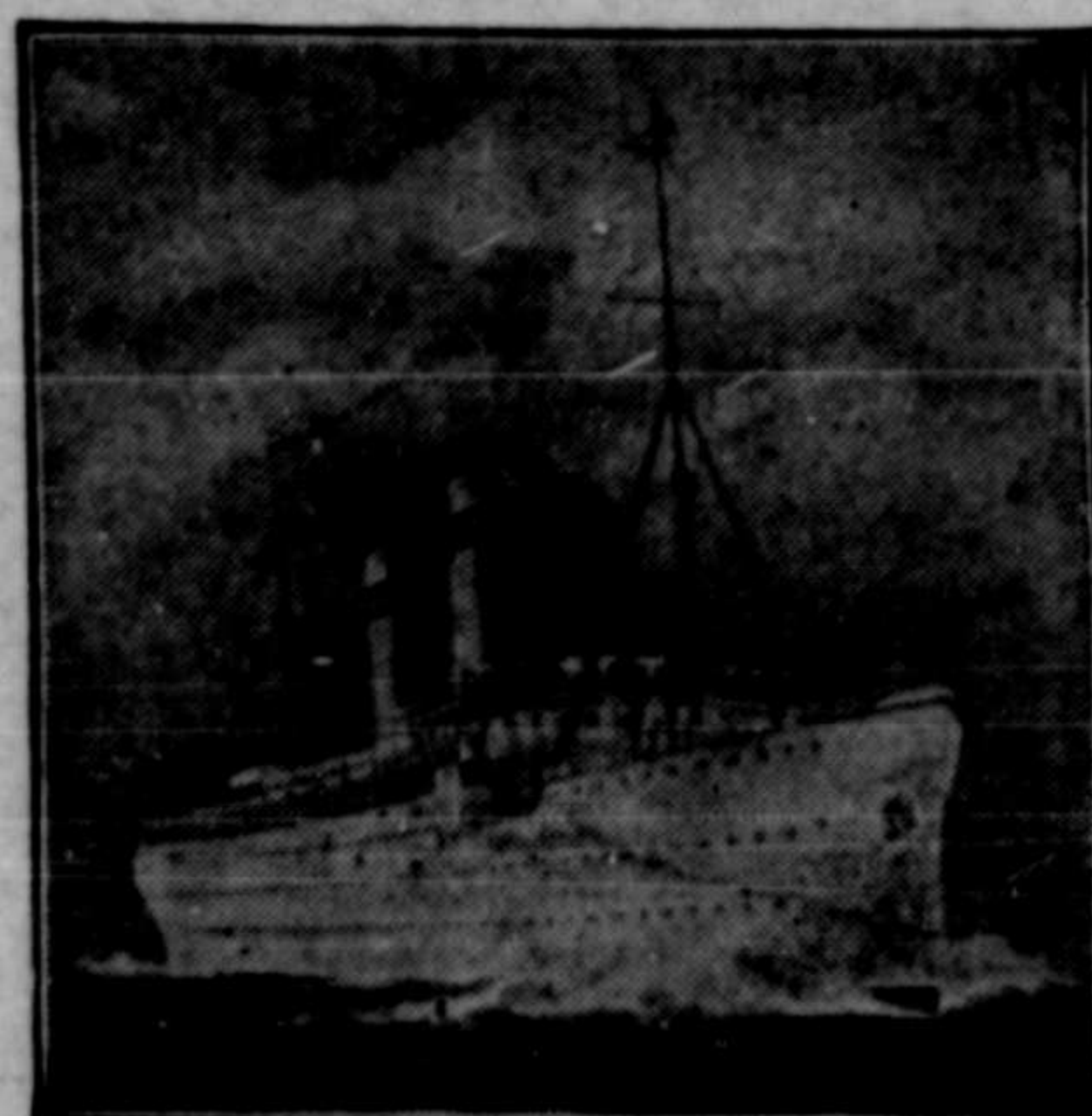

## THE WORLD'S GREATEST DIGGING OPERATIONS

Today a man who could obtain permission from the military authorities, and who was possessed of ample leisure and abundant patience, and who did not mind dodging shells and bullets, might walk underground across Europe from the North Sea to the Alps.

He would follow a zig-zag course of approximately 750 miles, this being the length of the original first-line trenches constructed by the Allies, and which are still practically intact. Opposite to this gigantic ditch, and running more or less parallel to it at varying distances, is another similar semi-subterranean passage, representing the German first-line trenches; and behind each of these opposition ditches again are others, and still others extending back in some instances for many miles.

Moreover, each of these 750-mile-long ditches—the first, second, and third-line trenches on either side, together with the "alternatives" as they are called—are connected one with another by a perfect labyrinth of communication trenches, representing many thousands of miles of digging and tunnelling.

Entire nations have toiled for long months in order to scar the face of Europe with these immense ditches. Taken collectively nothing like them or even remotely approaching them has

ever before been accomplished by human agency.


The digging of the Panama Canal has been generally regarded as the biggest thing of the kind yet undertaken, necessitating, as it did, the excavation of just over 250 million cubic yards of earth and rock. But it is estimated that not less than 1,000 million cubic yards have been excavated for our and the German trenches.

A similar excavation would be sufficient to make four twin parallel tunnels through the centre of the earth, each 14 ft. in diameter and 8,000 miles long, capable of accommodating four Tube trains; while the concrete used—approximately twenty million cubic yards—would construct a wall 8 ft. thick, 12 ft. high, and more than 1,000 miles long.—Ex.

### SOMME BATTLE LINE CAPTURED BY CAMERA

Enormous crowds in the city of London are flocking to see films of "The Battle of the Somme." The question asked by all is "Who took it?"

The films were taken by two famous European operators, J. B. McDowell, of the British and Colonial Kinematograph Company, and G. H. Malins, of the Gaumont Company. Mr. Malins, who took about a third of the picture, has been at the front for over a year and has taken pictures all over the western front. One of his most audacious acts was to film the Belgian and British front lines from an aeroplane at an altitude of 13,000 feet. Parts of this picture have been shown publicly but the Headquarters Staff has reserved most of it for its own use.

Though Mr. Malins has catered to the public by filming war pictures, most of his time has been taken up in making pictures of the German lines for the Allied Headquarters Staff, which has a private "movie" show for the special purpose of viewing those films. On one occasion, he was unfixing his camera after taking a picture in a trench when two German bullets passed through his service cap. He made his way back to his car under shell fire and found it in a ditch and his chauffeur completely unnerved. He had to set out on foot along a shell-swept road and covered miles, packing his camera, before he got out of the line of fire.
