## BRITISH SUBMARINE GOT GERMAN CRUISER

### GERMAN OFFENSIVE ENDS IN FAILURE -- ALLIES DO NOT TRUST CONSTANTINE

#### GERMAN LIGHT CRUISER SUNK BY SUBMARINE

British Submarine Scores in the North Sea—British and French Aviators have Successes.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 23.—A British submarine has torpedoed a German light cruiser of the Kolberg class in the North Sea.

##### British Air Successes.

British aeroplanes bombed the German lines of communication, including an important railway junction and an ammunition depot. One train was hit and four coaches derailed.

A hostile aeroplane dropped four bombs last night in the vicinity of Sheerness. There were no casualties and the naval aircraft pursued the invader and later shot it into the sea.

##### French Successes.

Paris, Oct. 23.—French aviators brought down three German aeroplanes yesterday and forced five others to land in a damaged condition on the Somme front. A German captive scout balloon was also brought to the ground in flames while another German aeroplane was destroyed near Verdun.

##### Italian Front.

Rome, Oct. 23.—Severe rainstorms and heavy snow, which is continually falling, are impeding military operations in the mountain passes of the Austro-Italian theatre of war.

#### LAKE STEAMER WRECKED —CAPTAIN SOLE SURVIVOR

(Special to The Daily News.)

Cleveland, Oct. 23.—The whale-back lake steamer James B. Colgate, carrying a cargo of coal, has been pounded to pieces during a terrific gale on Lake Erie. The entire crew of twenty-one was drowned, the captain being the only survivor.

#### THE AUSTRIAN PRIME MINISTER ASSASSINATED

Action Induced by Refusal to Convene Parliament—Norway Causes Germany to Protest.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vienna, Oct. 23.—The Austrian Premier, Count Karl Stuerghk, has been assassinated. His assailant declares that purely political reasons were responsible for his action, which was induced by the refusal of the premier to convene parliament.

The assassination of Stuerghk is significant in that parliament was prorogued when the peace element became urgent in their demands and it was decided that the only method of preserving internal peace was to close the house.

##### Germany Protests.

Christiania, October 23.—The German minister has presented a note to the Norwegian government protesting against the Norwegian embargo upon all submarines of the belligerent countries. The action of Norway was the result of the passage of German submarines within the three mile limit of the Norwegian coast.

##### London Report.

London, Oct. 23.—The embargo put upon submarines of belligerent countries by Norway is considered here to be the prelude to important steps designed to check Germany's unbridled and vindictive sinking of Norwegian steamers, regardless of all law and humanity. It is not unlikely that Norway will stop all exports to Germany of material likely to be used in war. Popular feeling in Norway is running high and the people are demanding that the government take action against Germany.

#### PRIVATE W. G. OAKLEY AMONG THE WOUNDED

W. G. Oakley received a telegram from Ottawa this morning stating that his son, Private W. G. Oakley, was wounded on Sept. 26th. This young soldier, who was formerly with Harry Atkins in this city, is about nineteen years of age and had been in the trenches for six months. He comes of fighting stock, his grandfather having been through the Crimea and Indian mutiny, while his father carries both South African medals, one with six clasps. Mr. Oakley senior was formerly in the famous Scots Greys and was in South Africa for two years, going through the hardest of the campaign. The many friends of the family will hope that the boy will soon be fit and well again.

#### GADSBY DEALS WITH RECRUITING SITUATION

Ottawa, October 20.—Recruiting is practically at a standstill in Canada and the government professes to be at a loss to know the reason. Many reasons have been suggested by candid critics. Some of them follow.

Reason No. 1—An impression has got abroad that the government never intended to recruit five hundred thousand men anyway. Not long after Premier Borden made the announcement, some of the government's most influential and wealthy friends declared that it couldn't be done without seriously weakening the manufacturing industries of the country, since which time the government has had cold feet on the subject. It is freely stated that the five hundred thousand was only a bluff, and that the government sprung it to stop further bidding.

Reason No. 2—The registration scheme is said to be another bluff. Up to date the government has introduced no compulsory element into it. Men may register or not as they see fit. The government has no idea of doing anything more than the September Morn Act—that is to say, shiver on the brink. The chief object of the registration scheme is apparently to mark time. Like the old maid who was once kissed, the government "likes to talk about it," but that's about as far as it gets. The registration scheme is in the hands of a Toronto lawyer, who is now a member of the Headquarters Staff at Ottawa, having occupied this non-combatant position since the beginning of the war. #### NORWEGIANS PURCHASE MANY AMERICAN SHIPS

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, October 23.—Four prominent Norwegian bankers have arrived here to arrange credits and complete arrangements for the purchase of vessels valued at \$200,000,000. Several steamers which have just been built in San Francisco will be taken over by Norway. Norway is determined to seize the present great opportunity to increase her hold on the world's carrying trade and it is reported that she will even turn her attention to an effort to compete with the Japanese in the trans-Pacific trade.

What the average citizen of eligible age asks is, why should I go overseas to bleed for my country and let these brigands stay at home and bleed it?

Reason No. 4—There are too many shining examples of safety first in the higher ranks of the militia to encourage others to risk their lives. Too many church parade heroes being made brigades

#### ALLIES REFUSE TO TRUST KING CONSTANTINE

Greek Troops Ordered South and All War Supplies to be Surrendered—Von Mackenzen Gains in Dobrudja.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 23.—A French military attache has presented to King Constantine further demands involving the removal of all Greek troops from around Larissa to the southern part of Greece, and the surrendering to the Allies of all war supplies in the country.

##### Macedonian Gains.

Despite inclement weather, slight additional gains have been made by the Entente Allies on the Macedonian front, especially in the region of the Cerna River.

Berlin admits that the Allies continue to gain on this front.

##### The Dobrudja.

Bucharest, Oct. 23.—In the course of violent attacks from the Black Sea to the Danube, the Teutons have forced the Rumanians and Russians to retire.

##### Berlin Report.

Berlin, Oct. 23.—Von Mackenzen's drive on the Dobrudja front has shattered the Rumanian and Russian armies and the action has resulted in a German victory. The Russians and Rumanians have been driven from their positions along the entire front.

#### ITALY THREATENED WITH COAL FAMINE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Geneva, October 23.—Italy is threatened with a coal famine and the police have issued stringent regulations regarding the use of this fuel. Prices of coal have reached an exorbitant figure and the poor people are using wads of paper for fuel.

#### SUCCESSOR APPOINTED TO SIR GEORGE PAISH

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—Sir George Paish, the British financial expert who was a member of the railway board of enquiry named some months ago to report on railroad conditions in Canada, having resigned owing to ill-health, W. M. Ackworth, of London, England, a British railway expert of wide experience, has been asked to fill the vacancy and is expected to arrive in Canada within the next two weeks. Mr. Ackworth has been a member of several Royal Commissions on railways in Britain and is the author of several books upon railroad economics.

#### GERMAN SOMME ATTACK ENDED IN DISASTER

All Attacks Repelled and Heavy Losses Inflicted—Units Were Surrounded—Berlin Admits Failure.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Oct. 23.—The powerful counter-offensive launched by the Germans south of the Somme on Saturday has resulted in disaster to the enemy. All the German attacks were repulsed and very heavy losses were inflicted.

Several German units which gained an entrance to the French trenches were surrounded and only one hundred and fifty were left alive. These were taken prisoner.

##### Berlin Admits Defeat.

Berlin, Oct. 23.—Heavy Teuton attacks repelled along the Somme front.

##### British Gains.

London, Oct. 23.—British attacks on the Somme front have resulted in the attainment of all objectives and the capture of over a thousand prisoners, including the Staff redoubt and the Regina trenches (dubbed so by the western Canadians). The British advanced to a depth of five hundred yards on a front of five thousand yards.

#### LOS ANGELES HAD AN EARTHQUAKE SUNDAY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 23.—Two earthquake shocks were experienced here last night but no damage was done to property.

##### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The following American halibut schooners arrived this morning: Dick, 12,000 pounds; Director, 11,000, and Viking 6,000. The Canadian schooner Gilford came in with 4,000 pounds. Bidding opened at 8½ cents but no sales were made up to noon. Prices will likely range around 9 cents.

COST OF LIVING

Ever since the outbreak of the war there has been a steady increase in the cost of many commodities in Canada and in most other countries.

The British government very promptly took action in regard to flour and sugar, and assumed control of the supplies and prices, fixing the quantity to be carried by the wholesaler and the prices at which these lines were to be sold.

Action in regard to freight rates was slower in coming, but, when it did come, it was drastic, the government taking seventy per cent of all surplus profits so that though the consumer still paid high prices, he was relieved of a large slice of the cost of the war by this big tax.

Coming nearer home, we find that, in Canada, the govern-

ment has looked on complacently while the cost of living has mounted steadily higher, but, within the last few days, Ottawa has at last been stirred up sufficiently to make enquiries, and the various public bodies are to bring in reports as to costs of the different commodities before the war and now, with a view to estimating the general rise in cost of living.

As manufacturers and jobbers are not in business for their health but simply to make money, the government will find that the Canadian public has been made to pay through the nose for many things. Take shoes for instance. A shoe which cost \$5 before the war now costs \$6. It is admitted that there is an increase in the demand for shoes as a result of the war, not because more people are wearing shoes but because shoes wear out quickly at the front, especially if they are poor shoes to start with, and the factories in the Dominion are loaded down with more orders than they are able to fill.

The government does not need to waste time going into figures in connection with the cost of living. The figures are there and very easily found. What should be gone into is the total available leather supply in Canada and the number of shoes required from the Dominion, in addition to the demand of normal times. Wheat supplies should be estimated in the same way and the method

should be extended to every line, with a view to arriving at a fair idea of the whole economic situation within the Dominion. Many shoe manufacturers are paying largely increased prices for raw material but there are others who are getting rich quick at the expense of the wage-earner. All speculation in wheat and other food supplies should be stopped and prices brought down to a business level. It is a crime that at any time men should be allowed to gamble with the food of the people, but, at a time like the present, it is an aggravated offence and the man who does it is an enemy of his country just as the German is. There is ample room for enquiry, and it is to be hoped that the enquiry is prosecuted down to the very root of the matter, and prompt action taken when the enquiry is ended.

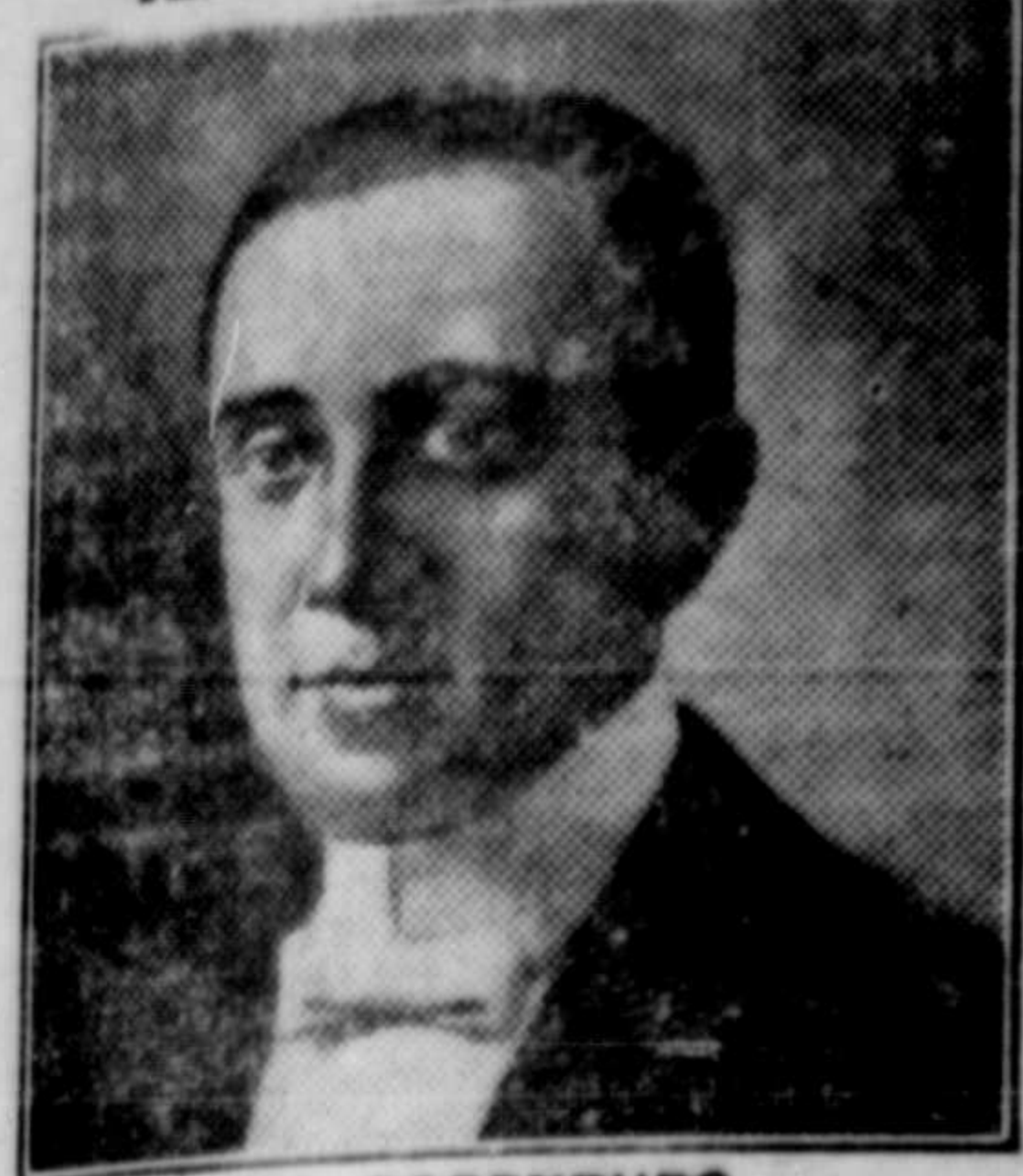

## GADSBY DEALS WITH RECRUITING SITUATION

(Continued From Page One.)

dier-generals, too many political colonels raising regiments for others to lead into the danger zone, too many recruiting colonels getting sick leave and chucking the job when their regiments are ordered abroad, too many chicken-hearted four-flushers in cocked hats putting up the excuse that their duty lies at home, too many honorary colonels who get no closer to the war than Piccadilly and the Strand—in short, too many slackers in high places drawing down big pay for taking care of their own hides.

Reason No. 5—Camp Borden. Another million dollars thrown to the birds. A sand-blown sun-scorched Hades where discipline can only be preserved by giving half the men weekend leave turn about. As many as twenty thousand men have been absent from Camp Borden on four days leave at one time. There are two thousand deserters. The camp is to be vacated by the middle of October, leaving it to the ravages of winter weather. The chances are that next spring will find it a desolate scene of rack and ruin. The only real purpose it seems to have served was the holding of a ceremonial parade, at which Major-General Sir Sam Hughes took the salute from thirty thousand dust-choked soldiers for the benefit of the moving picture ma-

chine. These films are now being exhibited in England with a view to boosting Sir Sam, but the government evidently considers it bad policy to show them here.

Reason No. 6—Scurvy treatment of the Duke of Connaught, who had promised to stay with us until the end of the war, but who felt constrained to leave because his valuable military knowledge and advice would have a better opportunity at home. His Royal Highness was so beleaguered and beset by Sir Sam's jealousy, so headed off in his good intentions that he came to be known as the Duke of Cannot. This bon mot is of Sir Sam's own making.

Reason No. 7—Great dissatisfaction is expressed at the Pension Board. This institution is not only bone-headed, but is afflicted almost beyond belief with the red tape worm. It seems to operate on the general principle that widowed mothers, bereaved wives and permanently disabled heroes should be kept out of their pensions as long as possible. Moreover, the pensions are scaled on the English plan—the officers get the big end—which does not apply well in a democratic country where Jack is as good as his master. As a matter of fact, there are many Canadian soldiers in the ranks who have as good a social position in civil life, if not a better one, than the officers who are put over them. There is a wide-spread feeling that the pensions should be equalized—that is to say, the same disability should get the same pension, whether a colonel or a private suffers it.

Reason No. 8—The irresistible character of certain of the recruiting officers. Instead of arguing this point out, let me cite an instance which will be recognized readily by people who live in Cobourg or thereabouts. I mention no names, but I look straight at him.

To that part of the country came somewhere about the year 1899 an aristocratic drifter from England with a Bertie-of-the-Guards lisp. He played the organ and had a light, clear, bath-room (continued on Page Four.)

tenor voice. Between the two he made a living. In 1902 he moved west and tried his hand as a farmer, but found it harder work than playing the organ and moved back again. He gave it a three years trial, after which he decided that the only manual labor he wanted was the kind he found on the keyboard. The war found him still tickling the ivories. He was one of the first to spring to the colors. He made a good spring at that—landed as a captain, although he had never had a day's drill or taken the short course or done anything to qualify. However, as I said before, he knew the manual—of the pipe organ—and his Ottawa friends let it go at that.

Of course, the gallant captain had no intention of stiffening his joints and spoiling his touch in the trenches. His job was that of recruiting officer. He continued to play the organ on Sunday and played the typewriter in the armories on week days. He made fairly good money, holding down both jobs.

In the spring of 1916 his regiment shifted overseas, but not the Captain. He couldn't be away from town and play the organ, so he stayed behind. He is still engaged in the good work of recruiting and playing the organ and intends so to remain. None of that nasty, stinking gunpowder for the Captain!

The captain is a good spender, and when he hasn't got it to spend he charges it up. Like Mr. Micawber, he sometimes forgets to pay. Naturally this does not endear him to the community in which he does his recruiting. Judged by results, it costs this country about one thousand dollars for every recruit the captain gets. It's cheap at that, the Captain's Vere de Vere manner alone being worth the money. Intending recruits, who are not repelled by his blue-blooded hauteur, have only to listen to him playing the organ and that settles it. They can't get far enough away.

A story is told of the Captain that while on a recruiting errand in a certain village he took dinner at a private house—he is a great diner out—where he was much incensed at the conduct of the son of the house, who had also donned khaki, in sitting down before the captain got his legs under the mahogany. The rage of the captain at the nerve of a mere private in his own father's house beating him to the soup is said to have been terrific. Tschaiukowsky's "1812" on the pipe organ could not have been worse.—H. F. GADSBY.
