## EIGHT NEUTRAL VESSELS ARE SUBMARINED

### FURTHER BRITISH AND FRENCH GAINS ON SOMME FRONT--RUMANIANS RETREAT

#### EIGHT NEUTRAL VESSELS SUNK BY SUBMARINES

Five Norwegian Ships Sent Under Yesterday—Kaiser Confers With Chancellor at Berlin.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Oct. 24.—Five more Norwegian vessels have been sunk in European waters. They were the Sisboy, Rabbi, Raftsund, Aria and Drann. The Swedish ship Lenka was also sent under and the Greek steamer Embiricos and the Danish steamer Fritzemil suffered a like fate.

#### Berlin Conference.

Berlin, Oct. 24.—The Kaiser and the Imperial Chancellor, Count Von Bethmann-Hollwegg, are conferring here on the war situation.

Reports to hand from the Balkans claim that the Serbian advance in the Cerna sector has halted.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, Oct. 24.—The Italians have resumed the bombardment of the Austrian positions on the Carso Plateau, with the city of Trieste as their objective.

#### TROPICAL HURRICANE

(Special to The Daily News.)

New Orleans, Oct. 24.—Sixteen of the crew, including the captain, were drowned when the steamer flines foundered in the Caribbean Sea during a tropical hurricane. Three members of the crew were saved.

#### RUMANIANS AND RUSSIANS ARE HARD PRESSED

Retreat Continues on Dobrudja Front—Germans are Gaining in Transylvania—Rumania Entered.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bucharest, Oct. 24.—Although stubbornly resisting, the Russians and Rumanians have been compelled to continue their retreat before superior German, Bulgarian and Turkish forces between the Black Sea and the Danube.

#### In Transylvania.

A terrific battle is raging between the Rumanians and the Austro-German forces for possession of the mountain passes in the Transylvanian Alps. The enemy has captured territory inside the Rumanian border.

#### Galician Front.

Petrograd, October 24.—The Austro-Germans, in a violent attack, cleared the Russians from the Narayuvka River section. The enemy also made several attacks north of Brody but were repelled on each occasion.

#### DISASTROUS BLAST FIRED FROM CITY HALL

Prince Rupert people are well used to the report and shock of big blasts and, when the buildings along Third Avenue and in the vicinity of the city hall rattled yesterday afternoon shortly after five o'clock, those who were indoors did not pay much attention. Passengers on Third Avenue, however, paid very prompt attention, for several of them had to dodge chunks of rock weighing from two to ten pounds each, and, unfortunately, one lady and her little baby sustained slight injuries and rather a severe shock. Mrs. George Case and her baby were just outside the C. P. R. office when the shot was fired and a large rock which smashed the C. P. R. office door, struck Mrs. Case a glancing blow, tearing her coat, and leaving a bruise. She was also bruised in the back and sustained a few slight cuts. The baby buggy was upset, but fortunately none of the rocks struck the infant. The little one was slightly bruised by the fall but otherwise was uninjured.

Dr. Cade was quickly summoned and, with Constable Adams, took Mrs. Case and baby to the hospital. The baby passed a restless night but is well this morning. Mrs. Case is naturally suffering from the bruises received and from shock, but fortunately both are likely to be all right in a few days. Mr. Case is at present working at Tramville for the Rocher De Boule Company.

#### Narrow Escapes.

There were several very narrow escapes of serious injury and probably the narrowest was that of little Billy Martin, who had just delivered his Daily News at the C. P. R. office and was in the act of closing the door when Mr. Davies saw a huge chunk of rock hurtling through the air towards the office. He shouted to Billy to jump, which he promptly did, landing behind the safe door, and

a rock which must have weighed about three hundred pounds crashed into the door and smashed the step and the plate glass.

Another piece went through the window of Mr. Goldbloom's store, while another entered the office of the Rocher De Boule Copper Company through the window. Fortunately, Mr. Thompson was about a block away at the time. Several small pains over the door of Morte Craig's studio were broken; the front of the Raik Press office suffered rather severely, as also did the sidewalk in front of the city hall, while the steps showed several gaps. The windows on the upper side of the library were shattered by flying rocks and Atholl Fraser, who was inside, had a narrow escape, a chunk striking him on the leg.

The police office window was smashed and lying just outside was a rock which must have weighed a ton. Had it carried a yard further it would have played havoc with Chief Vicker's office arrangements. Chunks the size of a man's head crashed into the treasurer's office and it is remarkable that no one was hurt. A rock which must have weighed little short of a ton landed in the centre of Third Avenue, while smaller pieces showered all around like shrapnel.

Three of the men of the light department had just quit work on the pole at the Bank of B. N. A. corner while a fourth was still at work in the ditch nearby. To him it must have seemed like life in the trenches.

Duncan Mackenzie, the foreman in charge of the work, was standing up on the top of the bluff overlooking the scene of destruction. Mr. Mackenzie has had long experience of rock work but was unable to account for the mishap, except that it was one of those accidents which are due to the vagaries of powder. Nearly everyone around had a theory as to how it happened, the most feasible being that of Atholl

#### NINE MONTHS REPORT ON LIGHT AND PHONE

The city treasurer presented a report to the council last night of the returns for the Light and Telephone plant for the past nine months. The light department showed a gross revenue of \$33,261.81 and an expenditure of \$31,870.39, giving a net surplus of \$1,391.42. The telephone department showed gross earnings of \$17,610.50 and an expenditure of \$15,438.74, with a net surplus of \$2,171.76. When it is taken into consideration that the report covers the six worst months of the year and only three good months and that there are three winter months yet to come, the report is good. It must also be remembered that there is a reduction of \$5,000 in the charge for street lighting as against last year and an additional charge of \$3,000 for interest, etc., under the serial bond system as against the old sinking fund plan.

#### BORDEN APPEALS TO C. P. R. RAILROAD MEN

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Premier Borden's personal appeal to the patriotism of the railway employees was unfruitful and the union men decline to cancel the order to strike at five o'clock tomorrow evening unless the Canadian Pacific Railway Company grants their demands.

Liverpool, Oct. 24.—Sir William Bowridge, the noted shipowner, is dead.

#### BRITISH TROOPS TAKE THOUSAND YARDS ON SOMME

Another Important Gain Made by Haig's Men—French Advance at Morval—British Air Raid.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, October 24.—On the northern section of the Somme front the British have captured over a thousand yards of German trenches in the region between Gueudecourt and Lesbœufs, which advances bring Sir Douglas Haig's forces still nearer the Bapaume-Peronne road.

A squadron of British aeroplanes bombed two railway stations behind the enemy lines. The aviators dropped bombs on a moving train and did considerable damage to the station buildings. They also brought down seven German machines. Eight British planes failed to return to headquarters.

#### French Advance.

Paris, Oct. 24.—The French war office announces an appreciable gain in the Morval region, just south of the scene of the British action at Lesbœufs. The new British and French advances in this region have brought the Allied front at this point in line with Sully Saillisel, recently captured by the French, completing the crescent formation from Bouchavesnes to Gueudecourt.

#### FIFTY KILLED

Ramos Arispe, Texas, Oct. 24. A rear-end collision between a freight train and a passenger train here yesterday resulted in fifty people being killed and scores injured.

## RICH ORE STRIKE ON DOUGLAS CHANNEL

Vancouver, Oct. 21.—Mr. W. Porteous Sloan, general manager of the Drum Lummon mines, Douglas Channel, arrived in the city yesterday from the north with the news of a rich strike of ore on the properties of the company, and incidentally he brought some wonderful samples of ore with him.  
 Mr. Sloan is rather conservative in his statements regarding the value of the strike, declaring that he does not wish to create any false impression regarding it, but that although some of the samples assayed as high as \$373 a ton, he would not attempt to place that figure as an average of the mine, but he is confident from the ledges which have been uncovered in the 400-foot tunnel that the general run of the ore will go in the neighborhood of \$50 to the ton. Two weeks ago

a ledge was uncovered which shows 20 feet in the tunnel. While he is in the south, Mr. Sloan will take up the question of getting a road into the property which is three-quarters of a mile back from the waterfront of Douglas Channel, midway between Hartley Bay and Kitimaat, under the provisions of the legislation enacted by the government at the last session of the Legislature.

The ore which has been encountered in the tunnel is very much like the high-grade rock taken from the Butte, Montana, workings. It carries, however, a higher percentage of silver, and a distinct trace of gold. The tunnel has been driven in on the slope of Copper Creek for a distance of 400 feet, and the 20-foot ledge, which was encountered, came as somewhat of a surprise, as it was not expected that the ore body would be encountered until further in. The tunnel was driven to take care of the ledge which shows 80 feet up the hillside. There are seven men at work on the property at the present time.

Mr. Sloan says the whole coast is being prospected thoroughly, and that many good claims are being staked out along the northern coast line, some excellent samples of ore being obtained by the prospectors. He is convinced that British Columbia is on the eve of a great era of mining development, but says that this can only be made a permanent and lasting good for the province if the authorities will more thoroughly protect the prospectors and the public from the "wild-catters."
