RUSSIANS AND RUMANIANS NOW ATTACKING

BOTH CLAIM GAINS ON SOMME -- CANADIANS RESTING -- RUSSIANS DEFEATED

TABLES TURNED BY ALLIES ON THE DOBRUDJA

Russians and Rumanians Have Now Assumed the Offensive—Rumanians Advancing in the Jiu Valley.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Oct. 31.—According to a correspondent at Odessa, the important Russian Black Sea port, the Russians, Rumanians and Serbians on the Dobrudja front have assumed the offensive against Von Mackenzen's forces.

Bucharest Report.

Bucharest, October 31.—The Rumanian advance in the Jiu Valley is continued successfully and three hundred and twelve prisoners have been captured along with four machine guns.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, Oct. 31.—The Russians, in massed formation, endeavored to break through the Teutonic lines on the Volhyan front but were defeated, with heavy casualties.

Submarine Enquiry.

Washington, Oct. 31.—President Wilson has requested the State Department to procure a statement regarding the sinking of the steamers Marina and Rowanmore, without warning. Both vessels were carrying American citizens at the time they were torpedoed by the Germans.

HALIBUT TOUCHES TOP PRICE AGAIN TODAY

The only halibut schooner in this morning was the Constance with 50,000 pounds. Tomorrow being a train day, the bidding was brisk and quickly mounted to 11 cents and gradually reached 12, the highest paid previously in the city. It looked as if a new record would be established but the fare finally went to the Booth Fisheries at 12 cents.

NATIONAL FISH DAY CELEBRATED IN CITY

Today is "Fish Day" throughout the Dominion of Canada, and, in keeping with the day, a fish luncheon, under the auspices of the Board of Trade, was provided at the Central Hotel. George W. Nickerson, president of the board, presided over a large gathering of citizens. After a luncheon comprised of a variety of fish dishes had been disposed of, Mr. T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, delivered an address on "Service," as applied to the fishing industry in general and Prince Rupert in particular. The address, which was listened to with the greatest interest, will be dealt with at greater length in our tomorrow's issue.

WATERWAY COMPLETED AT SURF INLET MINE

F. W. Holler, superintendent of the Surf Inlet Mine, is in town. He expects that the reduction works will be ready for the treatment of ore by Christmas. The dam has now been completed, furnishing a water-way to the mine at the head of the upper lake. Mr. Holler will endeavor to keep the water route open all winter by using an ice-breaker. Mr. Holler favors the constructing of a smelter in the vicinity of Prince Rupert for the treatment of ores from the various mines in the district.

LIBERAL RECEPTION IN VANCOUVER TONIGHT

At the luncheon of the Rotary Club in Vancouver today, Mr. H. C. Brewster will deliver an address on "The Future Development of British Columbia." This will be the first speech, with a political bearing, delivered by the premier-elect since the result of the elections was announced.

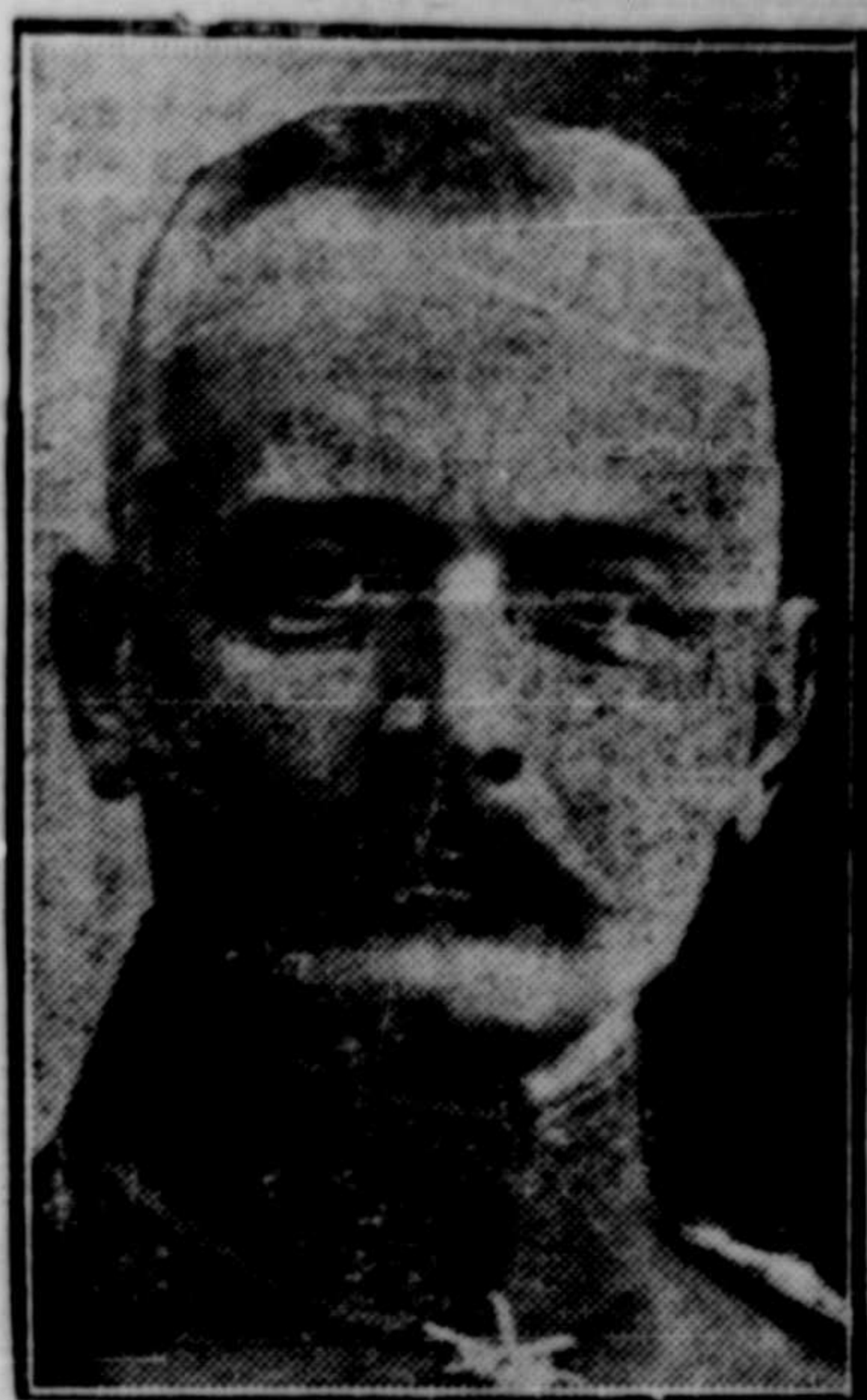

New York, October 31.—The Nicaragua government is unable to meet its financial obligations and American bankers are assuming the management of the internal revenues of this Central American republic.

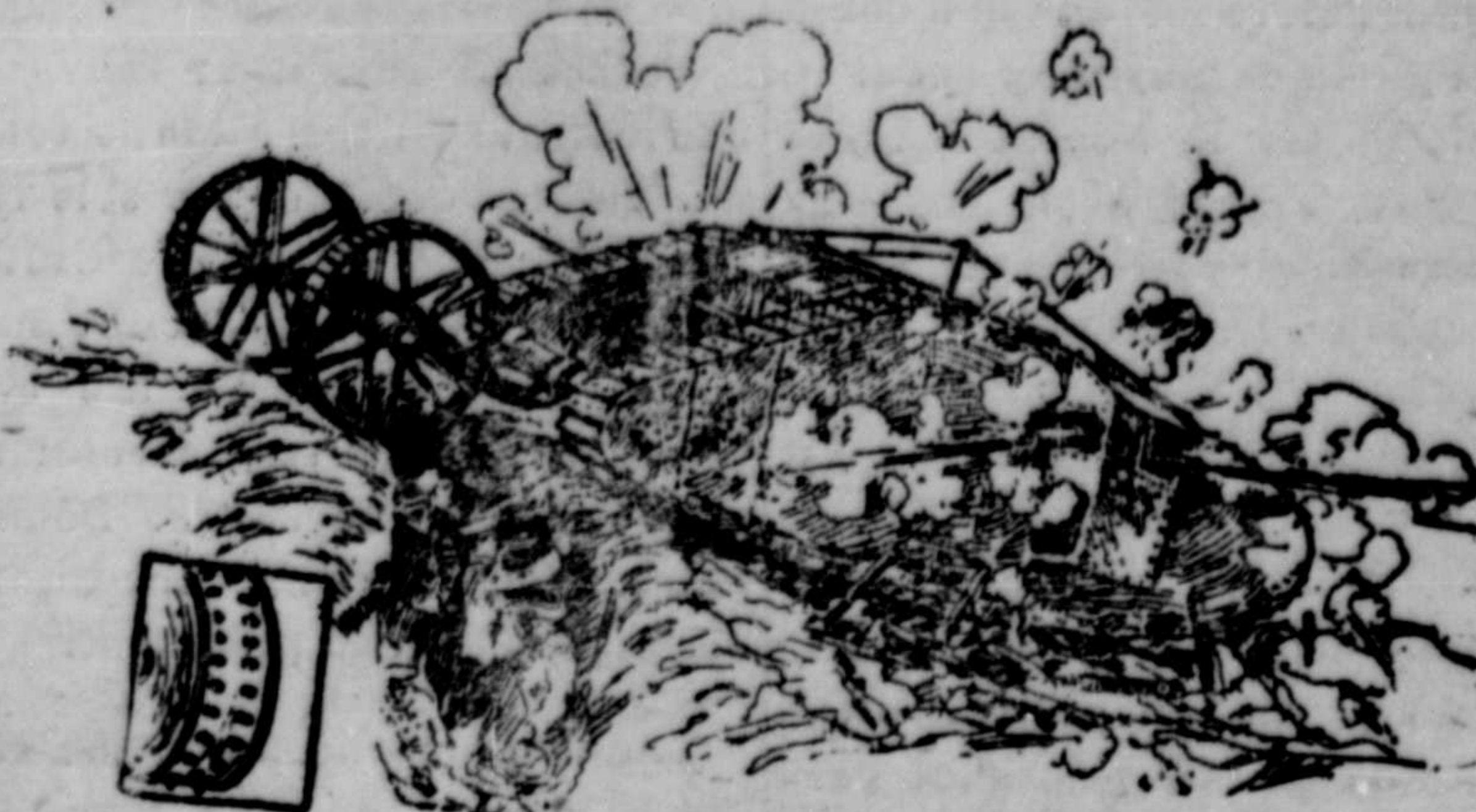
PRINCE RUPERT WILL SHARE IN NEW ACTIVITY

ONE OF THE BRITISH "TANKS" IN ACTION

The travelling land forts, or land dreadnoughts, which gave the Germans such a shock recently on the Somme front, have caterpillar wheels and movable guide wheels which permit the "tank" to travel across shell craters and trenches with the greatest of ease, while their weight will carry away any obstructions. Brick walls, trees and such obstacles present no difficulties to this new war weapon with its toad-like movements. The diagram shows the way in which trenches are surmounted.

COMMITTEE REPORTS ON DISASTROUS BLAST

A lengthy and fully detailed report on the recent blast near the city hall was brought down at the council meeting last night. In substance it stated that the hole had been drilled too far forward, with the result that the hole drilled was of a greater depth than the surface width on top. The amount of dynamite used in the last spring was excessive, being fully half the amount used in the final blast. The mass of rock had been greatly weakened by the last spring, two vertical seams being shown at an angle of 120 degrees with the apex just behind the hole. A careful examination should have revealed this weakness and a reduced charge should have been used. The charge used in the final blast was excessive, even had the rock shown no weaknesses such as the seams mentioned and the quantity of rotten rock showing on the surface. The absence of broken rock showed that the charge used had been in excess of the quantity required to move the rock to be displaced. Insufficient warning was given to the public of the firing of the shot. The report was signed by W. Tobey, Mayor McCaffery and Ald. Casey and Dybhavn. On the motion of Ald. Nelson, seconded by Ald. Casey, the report was received and filed.

The council passed a vote of thanks to Messrs. W. Tobey and G. R. Naden for their services on the committee.

RECREATION ROOMS

At the city council last evening, a letter from Miss Davis, secretary of the Queen Mary Chapter of the I. O. D. E., was read pointing out the necessity of providing something in the way of recreation rooms for the sailors who may be in port. Miss Davis intimated that the men would be deeply grateful if accommodation could be provided for about forty. Magazines and table games had been promised and it was hoped that the citizens would share in the work. The matter was referred to the general committee with power to act.

MINING DEVELOPMENT IN ALICE ARM DISTRICT

The Alice Arm Mining and Development Company, which was recently incorporated, will develop the Esperanza Mines, better known as the Spanish Group. The members of the company are well known in mining circles in the north and there is every prospect that the Esperanza will become a big producer. Pedro Salinas and his associates, the original owners of the property, have made several shipments of ore, all of which showed splendid results. The ore will be treated at Granby.

HAND TO HAND FIGHTING LITERALLY CARRIED OUT

A wounded officer now in this country says that when his men attacked a number had their rifles shot or blown out of their hands. Yet they went through, and "to see those chaps of mine tackling the Boche with their bare hands was worth living for—or dying for. It was meat and drink to me. They just tore their men down; and wrenched their rifles from them. One big section commander of mine was just like a terrier with rats; except that he didn't wait for killing. He was too busy. He went for his men like a blooming lamplighter; smashed 'em down; grabbed 'em by the slack of the breeches and the neck, and chucked 'em back over the parapet, to roll down into the remains of their own wire. 'Fall in there! Fall in!' he kept yelling, and goodness alone knows what he meant by it. But he put them out of business all right."—Scotsman.

ENEMY REGAINS LOST TRENCHES ON SOMME FRONT

French and British Successful in the North—Canadians are Resting After Stronour Fighting.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, October 21.—On the Somme front, where they have received fresh supplies of big guns and strong reinforcements, the Germans have launched a vigorous attack and have succeeded in regaining portions of their former trenches from the French. Four hundred and twelve French soldiers were taken prisoners in the attack.

Allied Success.

Paris, October 31.—On the northern section of the Somme front, the French and British have advanced in the regions around Morval and Sailly Saillies, where they have captured sixty German prisoners.

Canadians Resting.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—The Canadian divisions, after several weeks of very hard fighting, have been granted a rest and have now retired to the reserve trenches in the rear, while a proportion of the men have been granted a few days leave to visit in England.

TERRIFIC STORM RAGING IN THE OLD COUNTRY

W. J. Rooney, superintendent of the G. T. P. Telegraphs in Edmonton, states that the reason for the meagre war despatches today is that terrific storms have brought down the wires all over the old country.

PASSING IT ALONG

The government proposes to deal with the high cost of living question by unloading it upon the municipalities. These authorities, we are told, are to be empowered to conduct investigations under oath into all "alleged" combines operating in Canada and to investigate the "alleged undue advance" in the prices of food-stuffs. It is also proposed, "when an undue advance in prices has been established," to give municipalities the power to prosecute. Meanwhile the government will appoint another committee of the Minister of Justice and the Minister of Labor, to conduct an investigation of its own.

All this, of course, means nothing in the solution of the problem. It is merely an evasive substitute for decisive action by the only power in Canada competent to deal with the question. Municipalities cannot dissolve combines, which flourish under statutory and other privileges given to them by the government of this nation. That, indeed, is why the subject is being shifted to their shoulders. If it were possible for them to deal effectively with these tariffs and other restrictions on competition the government would take mighty good care to keep the remedy out of their hands.

Having made the "alleged" combines as safe as the Bank of England, the government will contribute directly towards the solution of the problem by appointing a sub-committee of the cabinet to conduct an investigation of its own. We are not informed if this committee will be so irreverent as to disturb the report of the last body appointed by the government

to investigate this question, which now reposes peacefully in the archives of the labor department. That commission it will be remembered operated on the secret service model. It was in Victoria and out again before more than a dozen people knew anything about it. The object of this secrecy, of course, was to avoid any embarrassing disclosures about trusts and combines.

The only authority capable of dealing with the high cost of living in Canada is the national government, and while undoubtedly even that body cannot wholly maintain the equilibrium of prices it certainly not only can refrain from multiplying the conditions which make for the upward tendency but can deal with the trusts and mergers which today have the people of Canada by the throat. We repeat what we said the other day, that no country in the world is, or ever has been, as trust-ridden as Canada, and this condition will continue as long as the nation's government is controlled by interests protected from competition by a constantly growing tariff wall.—Victoria Times.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

There seems to be considerable excitement in the south as to the appointment of the Brewster cabinet. The premier-elect is wisely keeping his own counsel. The whole matter may safely be left to the man who is to lead the province.

The Minister of Finance has issued a call for economy all round. It will be a blessing if the economy begins in Ottawa, particularly in the militia depart-

Bernstorff says that the submarine raid on the Atlantic coast was carried out with the sole object of finding out if the United States navy would rescue the survivors. The Germans are evidently becoming very careful as to the lives of survivors. Doubtless the idea was to get the United States to form a precedent.

The aviator who killed the engineer of the Kaiser's train let the bomb go a few seconds too soon. Better luck next time.

It is surprising to find that the Australians are voting against compulsory military service since only three voted against the taking of the referendum and the others seemed to strongly favor compulsion.

The Germans are to declare captains of Allied mercantile ships prisoners of war in future. They are careful to quote the code article under which they do this. Under what code were they acting when they sank the Lusitania and murdered the captain of the Brussels?

King Constantine has come to a complete understanding with the Entente ministers. We may be certain that there is nothing about a "benevolent neutrality" in the agreement.

The United States presidential election takes place on November 7th and, as usual in elections, both sides claim to be certain of victory. The campaign is not being fought along the orthodox party lines and he is a rash man who would attempt to name the new president. Teddy Roosevelt has evidently made up his mind that the German vote is for Wilson, as he is working overtime calling down the "hyphenates."

TUNGSTEN ORES FOUND UP NORTH

Bearing out the statement made by Dr. D. D. Cairnes, head of the geological survey in the Yukon, to The World recently to the effect that large deposits of tungsten concentrates had been discovered in the north, Mr. J. Lindeberg, president of the Pioneer Mining Company, who has just returned to Seattle from Nome, reports that no less than 15 tons of this mineral, valued at \$7 per pound, were mined by this company in the Nome region. In the opinion of Mr. Lindeberg, this new development will become a large and important one.

The tungsten ore is of the variety known as Scheelite, and is used in the manufacture of rifle barrels, big guns and other implements in which an exceedingly tough grade of steel is required. Scheelite was discovered by Dr. August Scheel, a German scientist, associated with the Krupp steel plant at Essen, Germany. It has a value of \$5 a pound if it produces 60 per cent. of tungsten acid.

The Scheelite was discovered by Lindeberg this summer in the schist formation on Rock Creek, and is being mined by hydraulic methods.

To install Plant.

"We did not get started till late in the summer," he said. "It took considerable time to install the hydraulic plant. Next year

we will work on a much larger scale. This is the only formation of the kind found in the Nome region."

There was a splendid rainfall at Nome this summer, and the result was a much better yield of gold than last year. This season's output will be in excess of \$3,000,000.

"Considerable gold has been brought in from Vine Creek, a newly discovered district, at the head of Norton Bay," said Lindeberg. "It looks as if this is going to develop into a fairly good yield. Associated with the gold is a small amount of platinum.

"The Pioneer Mining Company this summer extended the Grand Central water system. Otherwise the country is progressing about as usual."—World.
