RUMANIANS FORGED AHEAD IN SNOWSTORM

ENEMY CLEARED FROM VULCAN PASS -- BRITISH LOST THE DESTROYER FLIRT

BRITISH LOST DESTROYER IN CHANNEL RAID

Six Drifters Gone Also—Two More Norwegian Vessels Sunk by Germans—U 53 Returns Safe to Port.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 1.—Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the British lost six drift net boats and the torpedo destroyer Flirt, in addition to the returning transport Queen, in the recent raid by German torpedo boat destroyers in the English Channel. The Germans lost two destroyers.

More Norwegians Gone.
The Norwegian vessels Falketjell and Tordal have been sunk by a German submarine and the Greek steamer Massalia has also gone under.

White Arrives.
Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance in the Borden cabinet, has arrived in London.

U 53 Returns.
Berlin, Nov. 1.—It is officially announced that the German submarine U 53, which played such havoc with shipping off the Atlantic coast recently, has returned safely to a German port.

NATIONAL FISH DAY CELEBRATION YESTERDAY

At the "Fish Day" luncheon in the Central Hotel yesterday at one o'clock, under the auspices of the Board of Trade, Mr. George W. Nickerson presided over a gathering of about eighty. After a splendidly varied lunch of fish dishes had been disposed of, Mr. Nickerson called upon Mr. T. H. Johnston, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, to address the company.

At the outset, Mr. Johnston pointed out that the National Fish Day had been declared by the Canadian Fish Association, of which there are several members in the city, with the object of making Tuesday of each week a fish day, in addition to Friday.

The speaker then quoted from several southern papers to show that Prince Rupert has come to be considered the natural centre of the Pacific coast fishing industry. He emphasized the fact that now that the title had been won, it is up to us to see that it is upheld.

"There is only one word necessary to tell how this can be done," said Mr. Johnston, "and that is the word 'Service.'" By service he meant the providing of every facility for the handling of fish by the railroads; the construction of suitable docks, cold storage plants and the careful supplying of bait and outfit generally. "It is only by giving the best possible service that we can hold the fishing industry," said the speaker.

Mr. Johnston went on to remark that it had been stated that Prince Rupert had stolen the fishing business. He contended that the industry had centred here because Prince Rupert had provided the best facilities for it, and also by reason of the geographical position of the city. He characterized the present volume of fishing business as a compliment to the foresight of the capitalists who had placed their money in the construction of the great transcontinental railway in the north. Their dreams of future development had come true. He held that the mere fact that the American fishermen had come here in such numbers proved that they found better facilities here for the handling of their fish than elsewhere.

"How can we hold the trade?" asked the speaker, to which he replied, "only by giving the service." Though at the moment he was dealing solely with the fishing industry, this applied to all industries. In the first place the fisherman must see that he brings in a good quality of fish, as quality always demands price. "Today, we have an opportunity to build up a trade, while fish is scarce in other places, which will hold after the war is over and other markets have been opened up," said the speaker, "and Prince Rupert must make a name for fish of quality superior to that of other quarters. Let Prince Rupert stand for 'fish,' as Winnipeg now stands for wheat."

The fish must be properly taken care of in the boats; carefully

THE RUMANIANS DRIVE HUNS OUT OF VULCAN PASS

Rumanians Smashed Ahead in Snowstorm—Deutschland again Crosses the Atlantic—Six Americans Killed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, Nov. 1.—A Tribune correspondent has cabled that the Rumanians smashed ahead during the violent snowstorms of the past two days in the Transylvanian Alps and cleared the enemy out of the Vulcan Pass, which frees the western wing of the Rumanian army from the Austro-German pressure.

Deutschland Again.
New London, Conn., Nov. 1.—The German submarine Deutschland, Captain Koenig, which left Bremen on October 10th on her second voyage across the Atlantic, has arrived here with a cargo of chemicals on board. There was an unconfirmed report from Baltimore last Saturday that the Deutschland had passed Virginia Capes.

Six Americans Killed.
The report of the State Department shows that Six Americans were killed and forty-one rescued in the sinking of the steamer Marina. Washington has requested Berlin for information on the subject.

PASTOR RUSSELL DEAD

Canadian, Texas, Nov. 1.—Pastor Russell died of heart failure while on a railroad journey from Los Angeles to New York. Pastor Russell was the leader of the Bible Students movement and some time ago was denied admittance to Canada as he had been declared guilty of preaching against recruiting for the British army.

PATRONAGE

The Conservative press in the south seems to be worrying considerably as to how H. C. Brewster, the new premier of British Columbia, is going to make out in trying to live up to his promise to do away with the patronage system. Patronage has reigned so long in Canada, and, in the last few years has become such a powerful thing, that many seem to feel that it will be impossible to root it out. Of one thing we may be very certain, Mr. Brewster was thoroughly sincere in his promise, and we may rest assured that he will do everything he possibly can to destroy the evil which has made politics in Canada the most corrupt of any of the Dominions.

One of the first things done will probably be to place the outside civil service entirely under a commission, with each position to be filled by competitive examination. Examinations exist at present, but the system is a farce, in so far as throwing open the service is concerned, as the appointments are first made by political agents, and the appointees pass the examinations afterwards, there being no competitive element. In Britain, not only are the competitions purely competitive but the examiners have not the slightest idea as to the identity of the students whose papers they are checking up, a number being used on each, and the papers sent to London for checking purposes.

The worst feature of the patronage system is not, however, in the appointment of civil servants, but in the distribution of government orders for supplies. These have been handled in each district by a

patronage committee, within the party, the members of which took what they could for themselves and handed out the crumbs where they thought they would be most effective. The system lent itself to the most flagrant abuses, costing the province and the country many thousands of dollars more than it should under an honest contract system. In Britain, there is no such thing as a patronage list and tenders for supplies submit samples and prices, without the names of the firms being made known to the parties passing upon the tenders. It is asserted that the patronage system cannot be abolished root and branch, no matter how honest may be the intentions of Mr. Brewster. That remains to be seen, but, in the meantime, the new premier will leave no stone unturned to bring about the desired change, and he can be greatly assisted by the public in general. He is no longer the leader of a political party, but the premier of the province and, therefore, the guardian of the welfare of British Columbia and every person in it for the next five years.

should be the watchword of Prince Rupert for the year 1917. This city is dependent on the fact that it is here that rail and ocean meet, and it is at this point we must have the facilities for handling our industry. He went on to say that progress in the fishing industry is dependent to a large extent upon the railroad companies, as fish must be carried rapidly that it may reach the eastern markets in prime condition. He believed that the railway company had as its motto "Safety First." He thought it should be service first, as the one included the other. In dealing with the transportation problem, he pointed out that it costs \$2 per 100 pounds to land fish in Montreal, while it cost only 65 cents to carry a 100 pounds of copper the same distance. There was not this difference in the gross rates, but fish included boxes and ice and this was the figure on the net weight of the fish. He thought that the food of the people should be carried at a lower rate than such a commodity as copper which could not be termed a necessity of life. When the time comes when the fishermen would be handling the cheaper grades of fish, it would not pay them to ship east, as the freight would amount to more than the value of the fish. He thought that the railway company had its work to do in the building up of the fishing industry.

NATIONAL FISH DAY CELEBRATION YESTERDAY

(Continued from Page two.)

by the introduction to these waters of fish not found here at present. This applied particularly to the haddock, which is plentiful in the Atlantic but not found here. He described the haddock as one of the finest of fish from every standpoint, and one which lent itself to a much greater variety of treatment in the way of packing and preparing than any other fish. He thought that spawn brought into the Pacific would develop splendidly, just as the shad had done in the south, when introduced by the United States government. Today, carloads of shad are being shipped across the continent from the Pacific. In conclusion, he urged the tradesmen and the members of the Trades and Labor Council to adopt "Service" as their watchword for next year. He felt certain that the result would be beneficial to the whole community and to the Dominion of Canada.

Mayor McCaffery, seconded by Mr. G. A. Woodland, moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Johnston for his able address; to the hotel management for the sumptuous luncheon; to the Board of Trade for planning the function and to the many gentlemen who had attended.

In putting the vote, Mr. G. W. Nickerson pointed out how much unity of purpose had accomplished in bringing the fishing industry to Prince Rupert. Every man, woman and child had benefitted from the fact that this city is handling fifty per cent. of the coast fishing business. He called for the same unity in dealing with the northern salmon industry, which is centred in Vancouver and Victoria and none of the benefits of it experienced by Prince Rupert, which is the centre of a large part of it. He urged the people of this city to show their confidence and interest in the fishing industry by investing their capital in it. He had had four years experience of it and it was the only thing which had given a return. A most enjoyable and educative function closed with the singing of the National Anthem.
