PRINCE RUPERT'S NEW ASSESSMENT IS OUT TODAY

McBRIDE GIVES OTTAWANS A PRETTY BROAD HINT

Tells Conservative Members at Brilliant Banquet That the Needs of the Country May Require That Men Now Administering Provincial Affairs Respond to the Nation's Call---Significant Statement Aroused Great Enthusiasm---They Understood It.

 Ottawa, May 6.—"The principle of the Conservative party is to put the country first, and following this principle, it may eventually come about that some men now administering provincial affairs, may be impelled to respond to the nation's call."

The words are Premier McBride's in a great speech delivered last night at a banquet held in the Parliamentary restaurant.

Significance Acclaimed
 The significance of the sentence could not be misunderstood, and

it was greeted with immense enthusiasm. Premier McBride spoke with fine effect, and his reception by the crowded assembly was magnificent. The banquet was arranged by Mr. Borden in honor of Premier McBride and Attorney General Bowser of British Columbia.

Brilliant Affair

All followers of Mr. Borden were invited to attend, also all the members of the Press Gallery, and the function was a most brilliant one, probably the most brilliant held in Ottawa for over

thirty years. The gathering was in enthusiastic mood, and the speakers, particularly R. L. Borden himself, were probably never in better vein, or heard to better advantage.

ASSESSMENT FOR 1911

Total Taxable Values Show \$200 000 Increase

G. T. P. REDUCTION

Private Owners Pay More—Assessment of Their Property Increased. Cash Value is Basis of This Year's Assessment.

Prince Rupert's Assessment for 1911 has just been issued by Mr. J. C. McLennan, City Assessor. Assessment is made on cash values. An increase on total taxable values, of about \$200,000 is shown. The amount under this head for 1911 is \$12,920,960. Last year's total taxable values were \$12,721,006. The feature of this year's assessment is the reduction of the Grand Trunk Assessment. Grand Trunk holdings last year were assessed at \$7,291,500. This year they are assessed at \$4,843,830. Private owners bear an increased assessment this year, their property being assessed at \$6,802,540, and improvements \$1,018,290. Government land and improvements are exempt to the extent of \$1,665,530. Hospital property and improvements to the extent of \$37,900, in each case the total holdings.

The Grand Trunk Development Co's property is assessed this year at \$2,243,330, and improvements at \$37,300. This company's property includes all of Sections 2, 3, 4, and 9 and all portions of the townsite as yet undivided.

Total assessment on Section 1 for 1911 is \$6,854,400. Section 5 \$1,779,150, Section 6 \$1,339,785 and Section 7 \$1,309,905.

BROOKLYN PASTOR NAMED IN COAL LANDS DISPUTE

Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis of Brooklyn Tabernacle Charged With Fraud in Connection With Coal Lands on Queen Charlottes Worth \$20,000,000---Jas. A. Moore of Seattle and Western Coal and Iron Co. Mixed Up in Sensational Case.

 Victoria, May 6.—Coal lands worth \$20,000,000 situated on the Queen Charlotte Islands are concerned in a sensational fraud suit which is being brought against Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, a noted Brooklyn divine. The suit is being brought against him at the instance of Z. M. Hamilton and associates of his in this city.

James A. Moore, Seattle, and the Western Coal and Iron Company are concerned also as parties in the suit. Today Mr. Justice Clement gave permission to the

suing parties to have a writ served upon Rev. Mr. Hillis at his house in Brooklyn.

"Inspired" Preacher

Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis is a successor to the great Rev. Dr. Talmage in the pastorate of the Brooklyn Tabernacle and the news of the charge created a sensation. Rev. Dr. Hillis is one of Brooklyn's most popular preachers, believed by many of his hearers to possess peculiar inspiration. His exhortations to his flock to lay up for themselves treasure in heaven have filled the Tabernacle to overflowing

with congregations listening with breathless attention. His pastorate has been most successful.

A Rich Pastor

Dr. Hillis has long been looked upon as a rich man, his earnings as an author and as a lecturer and Chatauqua attraction have been very considerable. It was not known that he was interested in the investment field, and the news of the charge against him caused great surprise. His friends are confident that he will have an ample answer to make when the matter reaches the courts.

START NO BRANCH LINES TILL MAIN LINE IS READY

General Manager Chamberlain of the Grand Trunk Pacific Says that the Location of the Fort George to Vancouver Branch is Not Decided Yet—Warns Investors Against Speculation.

Winnipeg, May 6.—In reference to the location of the Grand Trunk Pacific line from Fort George to Vancouver, Manager E. J. Chamberlain said last night that the announcement has been consistently made all along that the company will not commence work on the branch line between Fort George and Vancouver until the work on the main line between the East and Prince Rupert is completed.

Which Side Fraser?

Mr. Chamberlain was most emphatic in his assertion that no further information was available in reference to the location of

branch lines. He could not state which side of the Fraser River the line will be most likely to follow, and declared that this point is not likely to be settled definitely for some time yet.

Discourages Speculation

With some warmth Mr. Chamberlain went on to say that large sums of money are continually being received by various speculators from poor people all over the country for investment in lots in the supposed vicinity of this branch line. He warned these small investors that the prospect of return on any outlays made at this time is in the last degree problematical.

PREMIER OF P. E. I.

H. G. Palmer, K. C., Member for Fort Augusta Appointed

BOUGHT THOUSANDS OF ACRES NEAR HERE

One mile and a half north of Mile 160 on the Skeena River is a large tract of arable fruit and agricultural land that extends along for six miles and covers 7,520 acres. On the very threshold of the townsite of Hazelton is another stretch of similar land measuring 6,800 acres, both of which are owned by the Grand Trunk Pacific Fruit Land Syndicate, of Seattle, a concern that will put this land on the market this summer to accommodate hundreds of intending settlers from the United States, who have already begun preparations for trekking into the wealthy interior.

Big Seattle Syndicate To Bring Intending Settlers from U. S.—Land is on Skeena and Will be for Fruit Farms—Party from Iowa Coming This Way

"I was down in Iowa a few weeks ago," he said, "and returned with Dr. E. M. Hanson, who has acquired 3,600 acres near Mile 160 on behalf of a number of prominent Iowans. When people learned that we were going to Prince Rupert and the sur-

CORDOVA THREATENED WITH MORE TROUBLE

Crowds of Men Who Dumped Coal Into Harbor Yesterday Are Waiting for Arrival of Steamer Edith with 2000 Tons More—Authorities Swear in Deputies in Readiness to Protect the Cargo.

(Canadian Press Dispatch)

Cordova, Alaska, May 6.—There has been no disorder here today, and none is expected until the arrival of the steamer Edith which has sailed from Nanaimo with 2,000 tons of Canadian coal for the Alaska Steamship Company. The Edith is to discharge her cargo here.

Ominous Threats

Threats are being made today that the Edith will not be allowed to discharge her cargo, or if the cargo is landed, that it will speedily follow the rest of the Canadian coal landed at this port, into the

sea. The harbor authorities are preparing for trouble. So far the position of the steamer is not known.

Customs Demand

As all the foreign coal is under the control of the United States customs authorities until it is landed and the duty paid, the Deputy Collector of Customs here, made a demand upon U. S. Commissioner Tucker for protection when the Edith arrives. He was assured that an ample force of deputies would be in attendance to protect property on the arrival of the vessel.

McNAMARA ARRAIGNED

Charged with Murder and Dynamiting

"THE CORDOVA COAL PARTY"

Whether or no the incidents of yesterday in the harbor of Cordova, Alaska, will become famous in history no man can tell. There is no assurance in the simple feat of heaving good Canadian coal into the harbor to justify the expectation in the hearts of the Cordova people that some day posterity will accord them a place alongside the heroes of 1773. Whether the coal-heaving incident holds in store pedestals in the Hall of Fame or cells in the penitentiary for certain gentlemen of Cordova, depends not so much on the nature of the act itself as on whether the game of heaving Canadian coal into the harbor succeeds or not. If the policy wins, they will be heroes and men of public spirit; if it loses they will be riff-raff and a menace to the community—at least in the general esteem.

The man who would aspire to be a hero, had better realise that there is no assurance that he will not be adjudged a knave. The modern Hampden who with dauntless breast the little tyrant of his fields withstands usually ends up in the police court as a contributor to the taxes, and a target for the police court humorist. Lucky indeed is he if he manage to divide public opinion into equal praise and censure like that famous Earl of Claverhouse, who to one group of historians is "bonnie Dundee," and to the other "bloody Clavers." Heroism like the menial act, depends upon the spirit in which it is performed. No man is truly abased, save in his own eyes; no candidate for heroism may safely count on more than the endorsement of his own conscience. Napoleon's comment on the crowds that cheered his triumphal entry into Paris, crystallises the common experience of the hero. Even T. Roosevelt, Esq., who has come as near to being national idol as any man living, knows what it is to receive the cold mitten from the crowds that but a few months before acclaimed him.

Northern British Columbia is interested in the possible developments of the Cordova coal party. Like Alaska, Northern British Columbia is a vast coal-field. Like Alaska most of it is in the hands of the coal grabbers and monopolists. Like the people of Cordova, the people of Northern British Columbia are importing coal from a distance and paying exorbitant prices, while our coal fields are untouched.

No one suggests that the situation in British Columbia has reached the aggravated state that reigns in Alaska, but it is bad enough to make us take a deep interest in the Cordovan affair. Lloyd-George has taught the people of England to sing with meaning, "God made the land for the people." This may seem an absurd doctrine to those folk who believe God made it for the land grabber and the coal speculator, but the doctrine has taken root in England, and seems to be a not unpopular belief among the settlers in Alaska.

Throwing good coal into the harbor is about as sensible a way of showing how mad one feels, as stamping one's feet on the pavement or smashing one's own crockery. But, as an outburst of rebellion at a very real grievance, it is not to be laughed at. Besides, the whirligig of chance and Time may yet transform those hot-headed coal-heavers into Fathers of their Country.

Double Weekly Service WILL SHIP ORE SOON

Stewart M and D Property Makes Progress NEW TUNNEL SCHEME
By Driving a Thousand Foot Boring Great Saving Will be Effected. Ore Can be Dropped Right on Railway.

Before long there will be shipments of ore from the property of the Stewart Mining and Development Company at Stewart.

The time is drawing near when this property will have to undergo the change from a prospect under development to a shipping mine, the bodies of ore found in the No 4 ledge, being now considered sufficient to warrant this. The most feasible plan for working the property, as a mine, will be by a tunnel from the Bear River side. This will obviate the necessity of constructing an areal tramway, and will give approximately 700 feet depth vertically below the present workings, and drain the mine for practically all time. The mouth of the tunnel will only be a short distance from the line of the Canadian North-Eastern railway, which will be in operation before the end of June.

At a rough estimate the tunnel will be about 1,000 feet in length, and with a spur from the main line to the mouth of the tunnel, it will facilitate the handling of ore at the very lowest possible cost.

This plan was reported at the general meeting of the company held the other day. In working the mine the proposed tunnel will offer a cheap way of handling the ore as the tunnel will be driven with a slight raise for drainage and an up chute at a point beneath the present workings will be driven for ventilation. Thus the ore can be stopped, and the expense of hoisting machinery saved. It is expected this tunnel will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000. The directors are to have a thorough report on the mine made by an eminent mining engineer, and a survey of the tunnel made shortly, and as soon as this is done work on the proposed tunnel will commence.

MODERN SCIENTIFIC WAY OF CLEARING STUMPS

The Char-Pit Method Clears Big Stumps for Less Than Fifty Cents a Stump and Enriches the Land in the Process—Useful Information for Intending Settlers

The char-pit method of clearing land is still meeting with favor in the states to the south and especially in Washington and Oregon. The plan is being very generally adopted and for the guidance of those who have not yet used it a circular has been issued by the Portland Commercial Club giving particulars of tests made near Chehalis, Washington, under the supervision of the Citizens' Club. The method will be of interest to settlers in our own district who have to face the problem of stump-clearing:

This method applies economically to stumps above one foot in diameter—the smaller stumps can be removed quicker by pulling with horse and capstan, or donkey engine, where such power is available.

Preparing the Stumps

In tests of char-pitting, all bark was removed from the stumps for a height of about two feet above the ground. Enough dry kindling wood was gathered from the ground and down logs to form a ring six to eight inches in thickness entirely around stumps where bark had been removed. After kindling was placed, it was closely covered with clods and thick flakes of clay dug near the stump with a farm shovel, only leaving a small sapce, about a foot wide, for igniting the kindling.

While the kindling wood on first stump was getting thoroughly ignited, other stumps were similarly prepared and the kindling red.

Making the Char-Pit

After the kindling got thoroughly burning, the one foot opening was also covered with earth to drive the fire around the entire ring of kindling like a charcoal pit. When the rising smoke indicated that the kindling around the stump was well lighted, additional dirt was placed closely around the stump to keep all the heat inside the casing of earth.

None of the heat escaping, the fire grows hotter from the burning stump and slowly destroys the stump.

Tall stumps will burn entirely off just above the earth casing, and such crowns can be readily burned up in log heaps.

Burn to the Roots

The beds of coal left where the crown burned off should be covered closely with additional earth and all roots that are exposed above ground should also be similarly covered with from four to six inches of earth, and the fire will follow roots to their ends clear below ploughing depth.

The first day of the tests two men prepared and fired thirty-two large stumps. The second day they examined the thirty-two burning stumps and added dirt to the banking where necessary, and prepared and fired twenty-six more stumps; the third day, twenty-four stumps; and the fourth day, eighteen stumps—a total of one hundred stumps. Every day they visited burning stumps and prepared and fired more stumps.

Fifty Cents a Stump

Data was computed on the preparing—firing and tending—of one hundred stumps kept burning continuously at an average cost of less than fifty cents per stump, only labor and five cents' worth of matches being used. These one hundred stumps averaged 46 inches in diameter at the base, by actual measurement.

These tests on Mr. Dupertuis' land were made on a shot clay soil, on the hill land of the south side of the Chehalis river, about one mile from the Adna station on the Northern Pacific Railway.

Did Even Better

Reliable information of still lower cost per stump by the char-pit method of burning has been received from Mr. J. W. McCutcheon, also of Adna who reports clearing off two hundred stumps at a net cost of seventy dollars, an average of only thirty-five cents per stump.

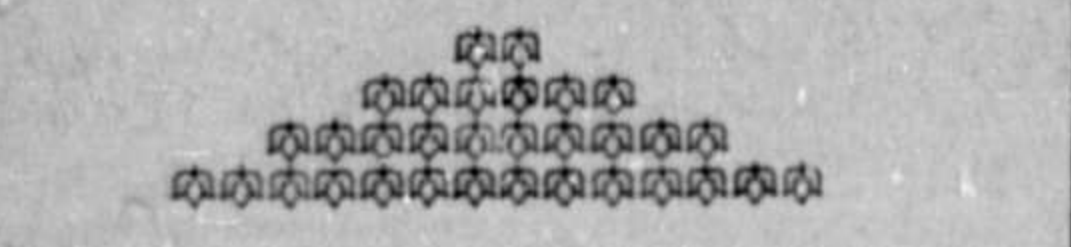
