IMPORTANT FRENCH GAINS ON SOMME FRONT

SUCCESSES ON VERDUN FRONT -- POLAND IS DECLARED AN INDEPENDENT STATE

FRENCH MAKE SUBSTANTIAL GAINS IN WEST

Important Advances Made on the Somme and Verdun Fronts—Damloup Taken—British Gains.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Nov. 6.—The French, on the northern section of the Somme front, have pushed their lines several hundred metres forward in the direction of Le Transloy while they have also taken a trench a little to the south of this point. The greater part of Saillies is now in French hands, this powerfully organized German position having been attacked simultaneously from three sides. Our troops have also advanced at St. Pierre and Vaast Wood, securing successively three trenches and endangering the entire enemy line in this sector. We have also taken a position on the southwestern outskirts of the wood.

Verdun Front.
East of Fort Vaux, on the Verdun front, we have also advanced for several hundred metres, capturing a village and also the town of Damloup, to the southeast of Fort Vaux and directly on the road to Abaucourt.

British Front.
London, Nov. 6.—The British, on the Somme front, have attacked at several points, advancing a thousand yards and capturing prisoners.

WASHINGTON HAS INDUSTRIAL WAR

(Special to The Daily News.)

Everett, Wash., Nov. 6.—Two hundred and fifty industrial workers, on board the steamer Verona from Seattle, engaged a hundred and fifty citizens here. A thousand shots were exchanged and the steamer returned to Seattle with four dead and twenty injured on board. The police met the party with fixed bayonets and rifles loaded with ball cartridges and marched all the passengers to jail.

WILLIAM G. OAKLEY DIED OF WOUNDS

W. G. Oakley received a telegram from Ottawa on Saturday stating that his son, William George Oakley, had been killed in action. About ten days ago Mr. Oakley received word that his son had been wounded, so that he has apparently died of wounds. This young soldier was only nineteen years of age when he landed in France. He was a remarkably bright young fellow and the news of his death will come as a shock to his many boy friends in Prince Rupert. The deepest sympathy of all citizens will go out to Mr. and Mrs. Oakley in their bereavement.

J. W. MORRISON LISTED AMONG THE WOUNDED

C. F. Morrison, of Metlakatla, one of the "grand old men" of northern British Columbia, has received a telegram from Ottawa stating that his son, J. W. Morrison, has been wounded on the battlefield. Mr. Morrison's daughter, Mrs. A. C. Aldous, has arrived from Winnipeg, with her two children, and is now with her parents at Metlakatla. It is to be hoped that the "major's" son will soon be fit and well again.

ENGINEER MINE

Captain Alexander, who controls the Engineer Mine, in Atlin, on his way south on Saturday, reported that work will go on all winter, a gang of seven men continuing to block out the ore. Captain Alexander estimates that there is practically \$2,500,000 worth of ore in sight and this could be taken out in a year's time, if the capital were available to put in the necessary plant. Shipments of ore have been made to Tacoma, which averaged about \$135 per ton.

CONSTANTINE VERY CAREFUL OF NEUTRALITY

Refuses Allied Demand for Light Flotilla—British Rounding Up German Forces in East Africa.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 6.—The Greek cabinet, under the presidency of King Constantine, has refused the demand of the Entente Allies for the use of a light flotilla, carrying the French flag and manned by French seamen, as a protection against enemy submarine raids. The cabinet declares that the approval of such a scheme would be equivalent to a departure from neutrality.

Macedonian Front.

The Germans and Bulgarians have made three violent attacks in the Cerna region but all were successfully repelled.

In Africa.

By a converging movement, the British forces in German East Africa are herding the Germans into one section. The German forces are already partially surrounded and several have been captured.

Belgians to Register.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—All Belgians resident in Canada have been summoned to register with the Belgian consuls throughout the Dominion before December.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA SIGHTED THE DONALD D.

The coasting steamer British Columbia arrived in Vancouver on Saturday after one of the roughest passages ever experienced by Captain Hewison. She encountered exceptionally heavy seas in Queen Charlotte Sound and was delayed for forty-eight hours in Milbank Sound. She sighted the derelict Donald D. in Queen Charlotte Sound and made an effort to get to her, but failed on account of the heavy seas. The B. C. had a full cargo of salmon from the north.

MANY ATLIN FOLKS SOUTHBOUND SATURDAY

The Princess Alice, on her last trip from the north for the season, had a full passenger list on Saturday afternoon. Amongst the passengers from Atlin, bound for the south, were Captain Alexander and Mrs. Alexander and Jack Dunham, from the Engineer Mine; Paul Gryer, Manager of the Columbia Mine, along with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Breeze and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Quick, from the same property; Charles Miller, who is in charge of a hydraulic proposition at Boulder Creek; Herb. Brethour, also in charge of hydraulic work in the same region; James Lipscombe, agent for the White Pass Company, and Hugh Molyneux, road superintendent in Atlin. Captain McDonald and crew of the steamer Scotia were also aboard.

BLUNDERING METHODS IN QUEBEC RECRUITING

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Sir Thomas

Tait's tete-a-tete with the Directorship of Recruiting seems to have lasted about twenty minutes. He found that he hadn't enough authority to appoint a secretary and make it stick, so he quit right there. What chance had a Director of Recruiting to direct recruiting when he couldn't direct the personal arrangements of his own office without government intervention? Sir Thomas seems to have been a good logician. At all events he acted promptly on his conclusions. R. B. Bennett, M. P., the Calgary Demosthenes, is his successor. R. B. is more of a politician. He will probably get along.

The government's objection to Mr. Murray as Sir Thomas' secretary caused considerable amusement. Not long ago, as secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, and speaking as one honest man to a large number of others, he issued a circular letter telling something of the derogatory truth about the government. Mr. Murray's letter was couched in moderate language. He said it because his duty to his employees compelled him to say it, but not coarsely—more in sorrow, we may take it, than in anger. His employers took no umbrage—they realized that his comment was accurate, though searching. When Mr. Murray accepted a job under Sir Thomas Tait, becoming as it were a government official, he doubtless considered, that his guilty stains were de facto washed away. Not so the government. They had it in for Murray. They cherished revenge. They got back at him and plenty. They told him to run away and roll his hoop. He did. So far so good.

But just here a large question is raised. Where is this thing going to stop? Is the government going to fire everybody who has made remarks about it for the last two years? Both sides of politics have been doing that very thing ever since the war started, and for some time before that. If Mr. Murray is a typical case, if everybody who has blasphemed, no matter how mildly, is to get the axe, what becomes of the Civil Service? How will it be recruited? Is the patronage system to fall down because the government is touchy about criticism? In short, is it the intention of the government to exclude the entire population of Canada from official favor simply because they have been using heretical language?

The government disclaims any compulsory intentions for its registration scheme. It is an appeal to the man power and the woman power of the Dominion, plus a badge distribution for the unfit. Labor critics say that the appeal to the women power of Canada is a sort of tip to the shell profiteers to make more money by employing women instead of men, and at smaller wages. Perhaps this is going too far. We do not set it down here as a fact, simply as an impression that somehow or other has got abroad.

CREW OF DONALD D. HAD VERY ROUGH TIME

Captain Svendsen, Mrs. Svendsen, Mate Martin Hansen and the two members of the crew of the barge Donald D. were safely landed in Prince Rupert early Sunday morning by the Prince John, after going through an experience none of them would care to repeat.

They left Prince Rupert in tow of the tug Dola, Captain Verge, and everything went well until they reached Wright Sound, where they ran into heavy seas. With the wind steadily increasing from the southeast, and the glass falling, they sought shelter in Swanson Bay, where the City of Seattle was also compelled to shelter. After getting away from this anchorage, the weather was not so bad until, after crossing Milbank Sound, the wind again began to increase and they encountered snow squalls. On the night of November 1st they sought shelter in Safety Cove, where they lay with both anchors out. They left Safety Cove about 8 a. m. and about 10 a. m. passed Cape Calvert, after which the wind again increased and at 11:30 p. m. while five miles off Egg Island, the tow rope parted.

The tug made for Alert Bay for coal and spoke the Prince John on the way. Meantime, those on board of the barge had lit an oil flare as a guide to the tug. The barge drifted in heavy seas all night and daylight found her between the Devil's Rocks and the Pearl and Charles Rocks, steadily drifting towards the reefs between Cape Calvert and Herbert Point.

At one p. m., they were overjoyed on sighting the Prince John steaming to their rescue. A hawser was got aboard, but, owing to the pitching in the heavy sea, this parted and they were again at the mercy of the seas and wind. Captain Davis, at great risk to himself brought the John close to windward, and, as the seas and wind were getting worse, they told the captain that they would abandon the barge. He at once had a lifeboat manned and all were safely taken aboard the Prince John, the operation taking an hour. Mrs. Svendsen was lowered over the side by a rope. The rescued party are deeply grateful to Captain Davis and his crew for the kindness shown them on board the John and are loud in their praise of the seamanlike manner in which the G. T. P. skipper handled his ship in a sea which was so heavy that the vessels were at times hidden from each other. Captain Davis and his men worthily upheld the traditions of the British mercantile marine.

POLAND HAILED BY GERMANS AS INDEPENDENT

Manifesto Issued at Warsaw and Lublin—Rumanians and Russians are Still Advancing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Nov. 6.—Germany and Austria-Hungary have issued a manifesto at Warsaw and Lublin declaring Poland an independent state, with a hereditary monarchy and a constitutional government. Guarantees for the needed development of Poland have also been promised.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, Nov. 6.—The Russians have advanced south of Dorna Watra and have occupied the positions formerly occupied by the Austro-Germans on the series of heights south of Putna.

Rumanian Front.

Bucharest, Nov. 6.—The Rumanians continue to pursue the Teutons through the Jiu Valley and are capturing huge quantities of war supplies. Russian warships in the Black Sea are again shelling Constanza and are also bombarding Langalia.

Italian Front.

Rome, Nov. 6.—The Italians have made further gains on the Carso plateau and are now bombarding Jamiano.

PARTY FIRST

The Provincial Conservative Association held a meeting in Vancouver recently and the chief theme of discussion seems to have been the re-habilitating of the party. Some advocated the holding of a convention in order to inspire enthusiasm and to help restore the shattered fortunes of the party, while others believed in a policy of watchful waiting, meantime giving the Liberals plenty of rope. In the reports of the meeting in the Tory press, there is not one word in regard to the welfare of the province. Evidently the Tories have not yet read the lesson of the recent election, and they are evidently still blind to the signs of the times. The party, its hopes and plans is the one topic which concerns them.

The idea of giving the Liberals plenty of rope is that they may, with their big majority in the house, carry out exactly the same hanging operation recently performed by the Bowser government. What W. J. Bowser thinks of such a policy is not recorded but it is to be hoped that he, as leader of the Opposition, will feel that it is his duty to work just as hard for the welfare of the province as the leader of the government will certainly do. What sort of an Opposition would we have if its sole aim was to see the government go to pieces on the rocks which wrecked the Tory ship? What sort of a province would we have under such conditions?

The people of the province, and of the Dominion, are heartily sick of the party political game, played along the above lines and both parties must realize that this is so. That Mr. Brewster does so is evidenced by his insistence

that patronage, which is the prize to be won in the game, must be abolished. Men of the stamp of H. C. Brewster are needed throughout the Dominion today. The day of the professional politician is over and the sooner the Tories of British Columbia realize this fact the better. In politics, there must always be at least two parties, so long as the party system is followed, and no country has yet been able to devise a better system, but these parties must in the future be composed of men whose ideals rise above party. "Pat" Donnelly, in his speech at the Liberal reception, said that he took his defeat philosophically as he realized that the welfare of the community must be put before that of the individual. In the same way, the welfare of the party must take second place to the welfare of the country, in fact should have no place at all when the welfare of the country is in the balance. If British Columbia is to prosper, and if the Dominion is to reach the place it ought in the scheme of things, men of high ideals must be placed in the forefront of politics in both parties.

In selecting a man of the stamp of H. C. Brewster as their leader, the Liberals of British Columbia have made a splendid start, and the leader has been surrounded by men of a high standard. The opposition is perhaps scarcely strong enough, yet, if the ten Conservatives serve their province as they ought, they may do much to redeem the past. The premier-elect is no longer a politician, but the man at the helm of the province, guiding its destinies, not for the benefit of any party, but for the benefit of every man, woman and child in British Columbia. Mr. H. C.

Von Mackenzen seems to be awaiting the outcome of the Transylvanian struggle. Unless Von Falkenhayn's army can link up with the Teutonic forces on the Dobrudja front, the gains made between the Black Sea and the Danube will have no permanent effect.

BLUNDERING METHODS IN QUEBEC RECRUITING

(Continued From Page One.)

possibility that it might be used as the ground work for some new scheme of taxation which would get at the munition workers' wages. One sure thing is that it hands out twelve additional jobs to twelve district directors of recruiting who are chosen.

Complaint is made by good Conservatives in Quebec that the government uses the most blundering methods in that province. French? Similarly, how is the recruiting officer to catch the habitant if he can't hand it to him in his mother tongue? The place and time to catch Jean Baptiste is the church steps on Sunday morning after eleven o'clock mass. He is there in a receptive mood and the good cure has told him his duty. But you can't catch him if you address him in a language he doesn't understand.

Good Quebecers also say that it would help a lot if Henri Bourassa's seditious newspapers were muzzled, or suppressed by a government which has been quite active in censoring the press in every quarter except where it was needed. Lurking Germanism, alleged or otherwise, has been run to earth by the censorship as far west as the Pacific, and as far east as the Atlantic, and sharply dealt with. Reputable dailies in Montreal and Ottawa have been from time to time annoyed for printing legitimate news of an innocuous character, but Le Devoir, which goes on making a stench right under the official nose, goes untouched. The inference is that Mr. Bourassa has strong friends at Ottawa. He has — some of them in the cabinet.

The loyal Conservatives of Quebec have no desire to take Henri's life, or do anything that would crown him with the partial, but not fatal, martyrdom which he desires, but they do think that it would help recruiting a whole lot in Quebec if LeDevoir was bound over, not to keep the peace perhaps, but at least not to interfere with the wise and patriotic conduct of the war.

Another thing that would help recruiting in Quebec is an assurance from the government that

Oliver Asselin's regiment will be sent to the front. Oliver Asselin is one of those Quebec Nationalists whose peace theories yield the mistakes almost appear as if they were made on purpose. The idea seems to be to make recruiting in Quebec as awkward as possible. What government, these critics ask, that was really in earnest about recruiting in Quebec, would send there recruiting officers who cannot speak the French language? How much chance would the recruiting missionaries have in Toronto if they talked to the people only in to his loyal fervor in a just cause when the war test comes. Asselin, in short, is not too proud to fight. When he stands between love of factional politics and duty to his country it's duty that has the call. Asselin stands for the doctrine of defending Canada's shores even when the circumstances make her frontier as far away as Belgium. He doesn't go back on his old doctrines—he simply has a more competent idea than Bourassa of how far Canada's shores extend. With German submarines nosing their way into American harbors, Canada does not seem to be as far away from the European struggle as some people thought. On the whole, Mr. Asselin thought it was a good plan to raise a regiment for the defence of Canada and to send it where that defence could best be made.

For this thought Col. Asselin and his regiment are now doing penance. It did not suit the Ottawa government with its Nationalist wing to have a Nationalist leader like Oliver Asselin act that way. It put a crimp in the argument they were using in Ontario and elsewhere that no recruiting could be done in Quebec. What kind of story was that when the very Nationalists were tumbling over each other to enlist in Asselin's regiment?

What to do about it? Why, sidetrack Asselin's regiment. Send it to Bermuda. And sent it was to Bermuda, where it is now doing garrison duty, although eager to go to the front. But even in Bermuda there are dangers to encounter. One danger was the purple-faced old governor of the island who saw in these stout French-Canadians a supply of labor committed to him, as it were, by Providence. His bright thought was to employ Col. Asselin's regiment clearing up

brush. He almost got away with it until Col. Asselin heard about it.

"What!" said Col. Asselin, his black eyes snapping, "work my soldiers who stand us in two dollars and a half a day when you can get nigger labor for ten cents! Forget it!"

Which the governor of Bermuda did accordingly. Colonel Asselin was at Ottawa the other day begging again that his regiment be sent to the front.

"Yes," said Secretary McCurdy, "we'll send your regiment, but you must stay behind to raise another."

"I'm not that kind of a colonel," replied Oliver Asselin. "I go with my men."

And there the matter stands. The new Director of Recruiting ought to look into it.—H. F. G.
