GREEK COLONEL AND REGIMENT JOIN ALLIES

DARING EXPLOIT BY ITALIAN DESTROYERS -- FRENCH TAKE SIX HUNDRED MORE

GREEK OFFICER HAS JOINED THE NATIONALISTS

Will Offer Himself and Men to the Allied Commander at Saloniki—Rumanians Attack Mackenzen.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Nov. 7.—Colonel Calomenopoulos, commanding the forty-third Greek regiment at Volo, with numerous officers and virtually all his soldiers, has joined the Venizeloi Nationalist movement and it is his intention to report to General Sarrail, the French officer who is in command of the Allied forces at Saloniki, and to offer to make an attempt to regain the Greek forts which have been turned over to the Bulgarians.

Rumanian Fronts.

Bucharest, Nov. 7.—On the Dobrudja front, the Rumanians and Russians have assumed the offensive and are compelling the Teutons to retreat at many points.

On the Transylvanian front the Rumanian advance in the Jiu Valley has halted before heavy enemy reinforcements which have been brought up. The Rumanians have suffered another reverse after terrific fighting in the Predeal Pass and have been compelled to retreat.

P. F. GODENRATH WILL BE HERE RECRUITING

Captain P. F. Godenrath, of the 236th (Kilty) Battalion is on his way to Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert on a recruiting expedition for the Kilties who wear the tartan of the McLains of Dhuart. The idea of the campaign is to recruit McLains throughout the Dominion.

HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The American halibut schooner Altan brought in 55,000 pounds this morning and the Alameda, 4,000, while a wire was received this morning from the captain of the American schooner Polaris that he was coming from Ketchikan with 45,000 pounds for today's market. There had been no bidding this forenoon but it was expected that a new record would probably be made.

NOW READY FOR BUSINESS

DARING RAID BY ITALIAN BOATS IN POLA HARBOR

Torpedo Destroyers Penetrate Austrian Anchorage—Big Enemy Vessel Sunk At Durrazzo.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Nov. 7.—A flotilla of Italian torpedo boats daringly penetrated the anchorage of the Austrian fleet at Pola, the Austrian naval base in the Adriatic, and ineffectively fired two torpedoes. The warships returned to the fleet unscathed after carrying out a reconnaissance right under the guns of the fortress.

Italian destroyers torpedoed and sank a large enemy steamer which was moored in the shelter of the defenses of the Albanian port of Durrazzo, which has been in Austrian hands for some time.

Trieste Defence.

The Austrians, who are rushing heavy reinforcements to the battle front protecting Trieste, have apparently assumed the offensive but were unsuccessful in recovering the positions recently lost to the Italians.

POLISH INDEPENDENCE DECLARED YESTERDAY

Warsaw, Poland, Nov. 7.—The ceremony attending the declaration of Polish independence was very simple and the new nation was quickly formed. Many cheered the proclamation of the Kaiser and the Austrian Emperor when it was read at noon yesterday.

ALICE ARM NOTES

The Alice Arm Mining and Development Company have bonded the copper property of Dan Kennedy and "Red" McFarlane for \$60,000 and the first cash payment has already been made. The claims are near the head waters of the Kitsault river and make a good showing of copper.

The molybdenum property owned by the Stillwell Brothers is shut down meantime pending some improvements being made in the plant.

The Dolly Varden Company is making steady progress, a compressor having been brought in recently. The company has also got a sawmill working.

It is reported that there is a hitch in the deal between the Alice Arm Mining and Development Company and the owners of the Spanish Group. This property is one of the richest in the district and the price made was \$100,000.

There is considerable dissatisfaction in the camp because of the fact that mail is received only once a week. The boats leave mail at Granby three times a week but it is allowed to remain at Granby until Saturday, when the whole week's mail is brought over.



OFFICERS OF VICTORIOUS CANADIAN BATTALION

This picture of the officers of a Canadian Highland Battalion of the first contingent was taken in a shell shattered building the morning after an advance of a mile had been made on September 26th. The picture was received by William Proudfoot, the Ontario M. P. P., from his son Lieut. W. Proudfoot, who has since been wounded. The lieutenant writes that, when the full story of the battalion's advance is told, it will be one of the brightest spots in Canadian history. NEW APPOINTMENT FOR MAJOR M'MORDIE

Among the recent military appointments gazetted in London, is that of Major S. P. McMordie, D. S. O., to be second in command of the pioneer training depot. It would appear from this appointment that Major McMordie is to be retained in England for some considerable time, if not permanently. Having lost an eye, besides sustaining some ten other wounds, it is not unlikely that the major is considered unfit for service in the trenches. With his ripe experience as an officer in Canada, Major McMordie should make an ideal training officer.

NEW HALIBUT RECORD

A new record for halibut was established shortly after noon today, when the Altin Fisheries paid 13 cents for the fare of 55,000 pounds brought in by the Altan. The Booth Fisheries paid 12 1/2 cents for the 45,000 pounds due to arrive on the Polaris from Ketchikan.

LUMBERMEN WANTED

The British army requires lumber just as much as it requires munitions and there are many men in Canada who can do their share for the Empire by enlisting in the Forestry Battalions. Sergt. Stokes is at the Red Cross rooms recruiting for a new Forestry Battalion and blacksmiths, teamsters, chaffeurs, sawyers, filers, edgemen, fellers, laborers and anyone having a knowledge of lumbering will be welcomed to the ranks.

RICH GALENA STRUCK ON KITSULT MOUNTAIN

That Alice Arm district is to become in the near future an important shipper of lead, as well as copper, molybdenum and silver, is evident from the returns recently received from the Trail smelter on a small shipment of galena ore from the Matilda Mine, owned by A. F. Smith, of Granby. The returns show silver, 7.4 ozs., copper, 4 per cent., zinc, 10 per cent. and lead, 48.4 per cent.

The Matilda property is situated above the timber line on Kitsault Mountain, where the Kitsault river comes out of the Kitsault Glacier. It was first discovered by Alec Davidson, a well known old time prospector of Alice Arm district, and was staked by Mr. Smith later. There is a big ore shoot about forty feet wide and the ore is in pay streaks of from one to five feet. Only six days work has been done on the property, but the owner of the claim has seen enough to feel satisfied that he has got something good.

There are twelve other claims in the immediate vicinity, right behind the Matilda, being the Monarch, owned by M. P. Olson; near at hand is a claim owned by Harry Mann, of Granby, which shows 30 per cent. of antimony, and about a mile on this side Morris Peterson has just finished a fifty-foot tunnel on his property which shows high grade copper.

The boys who are mining on Kitsault Mountain are anxious to procure government assistance in the building of a pack trail next summer from the Wolf Group, where the Dolly Varden Company are likely to erect their mill, out to the mountain, as at present they have to pack even blacksmith coal in themselves.

Work has been started on the Wild Cat Group, recently bonded to the Alice Arm Mining and Development Company by Alec Davidson, and which show an average of 9 per cent. copper. With regard to the rich strike on Kitsault Mountain, so far as can be learned, no bonding arrangement has been made, as the strike was made late this fall.

FRENCH TAKE SIX HUNDRED MORE GERMANS

Further Gains Made at St. Pierre and Vaast Wood—British Consolidate Ground Captured.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 7.—In addition to the prisoners taken yesterday, the French have captured an additional six hundred Germans in further fighting at St. Pierre and Vaast Wood and have inflicted severe losses upon the enemy.

British Front.

London, Nov. 7.—In the vicinity of Les Boeufs and Lesars the British have consolidated the ground captured yesterday and our artillery has successfully bombarded the German trenches, while very effective work has also been done by our trench mortars.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—In Sunday's fighting on a twelve-mile front the French and British suffered heavy casualties and accomplished nothing except a small local gain at St. Pierre and Vaast Wood.

WASHINGTON WORKERS FACING MURDER TRIAL

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 7.—As a result of the recent industrial war at Everett, Washington, many members of the I. W. W. organization are now facing trial for murder. Two hundred and ninety seven men are in jail in connection with the fracas.

It is also stated that Scott will return to Vancouver, not as a defendant, but as a crown witness prepared to give King's evidence against his former principal.

LOW STANDARDS

An opportunity was given by the Vancouver School Board to F. W. Welsh, of soap contract and soldiers' vote fame, to hand in his resignation as a trustee, but Mr. Welsh defied the board. The matter will, of course, be set right by the electors of Vancouver when the time comes for electing trustees, but the situation is interesting as an example of the standard of public service which has been recognized by men who have admittedly been the rulers of this province in the past few years. It would appear that Welsh is quite satisfied that he did nothing wrong in inviting \$25 for the Tory funds from a soap contractor, who afterwards added that amount to his invoice for soap to the School Board. Mr. Welsh's standard of morality allowed him to do this, without for a moment imagining that he was doing anything out of the ordinary. The same gentleman was sent over to England to take care of the soldiers' vote for the Bowser machine and one wonders what his standard of morality permitted him to do over there, by way of helping out the Bowser party.

Stories are coming from England and from France of soldiers, who were known to be against the government, being deprived of their votes. Men were sent away from camp until the voting was over and, in some cases, whole companies were disenfranchised. The same sort of thing happened in Canada. In one camp, containing quite a number of men from Prince Rupert, no opportunity was given many of the men to record their votes. This may have been an oversight, but it was an oversight which should not have hap-

pened. When one finds that the man who had charge of the soldiers' votes in England was possessed of such a low standard of public morality, as to see nothing wrong in the soap deal, one wonders if the omissions recorded were really accidental.

Fortunately, the rule of such men as Welsh in this province is over and a better day has dawned. In the past few years this province has probably suffered from the fact that big business men have been too busy handling an expansion of business to devote their time to public affairs and men of the professional politician stamp have been allowed to take a hand in public matters. There is a strong, sterling business man at the head of the affairs of the province now, and it is to be hoped that in every branch of public affairs throughout the province broad-gauged business men will take the time to devote their energies to the taking care of our schools, city development and all other lines of public work.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is rumored that Bowser is seriously considering the handing in of his resignation to the Lieutenant-Governor. He is taking a long time to think it over.

King Constantine seems to be worried over the keeping of a strict neutrality. Perhaps his intercepted letters to the Kaiser breathed the same spirit of strict neutrality that he is displaying to the Allies, then again, perhaps they did not.

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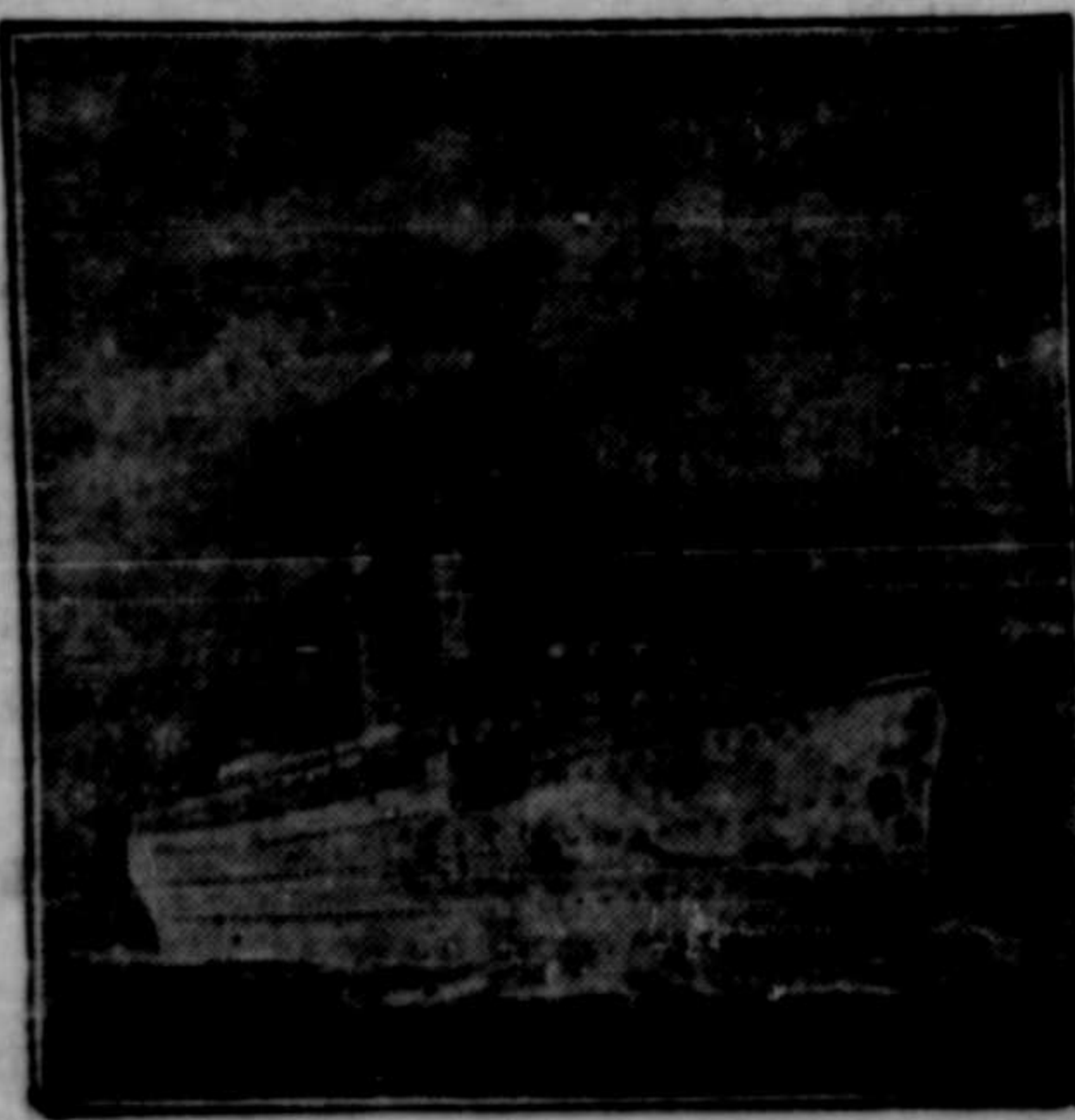

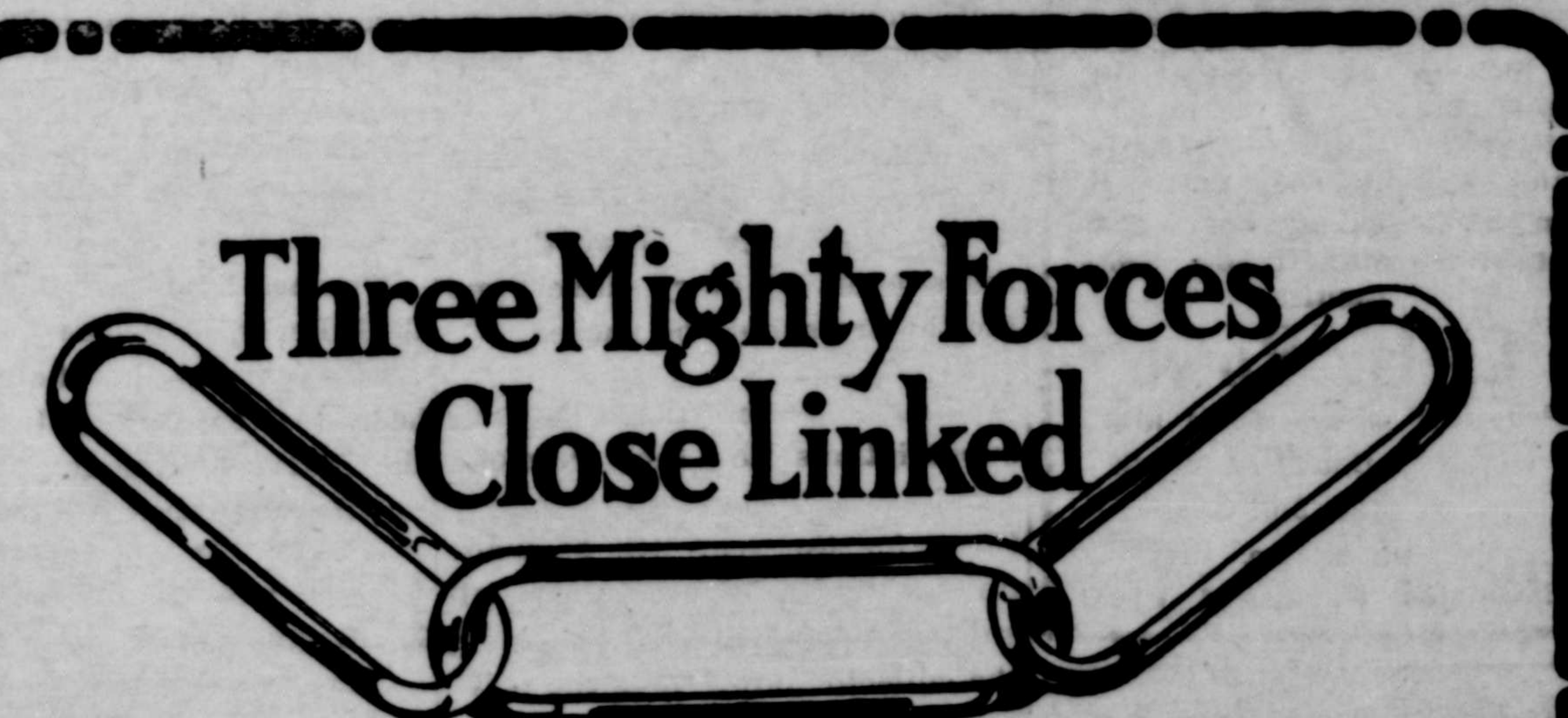
