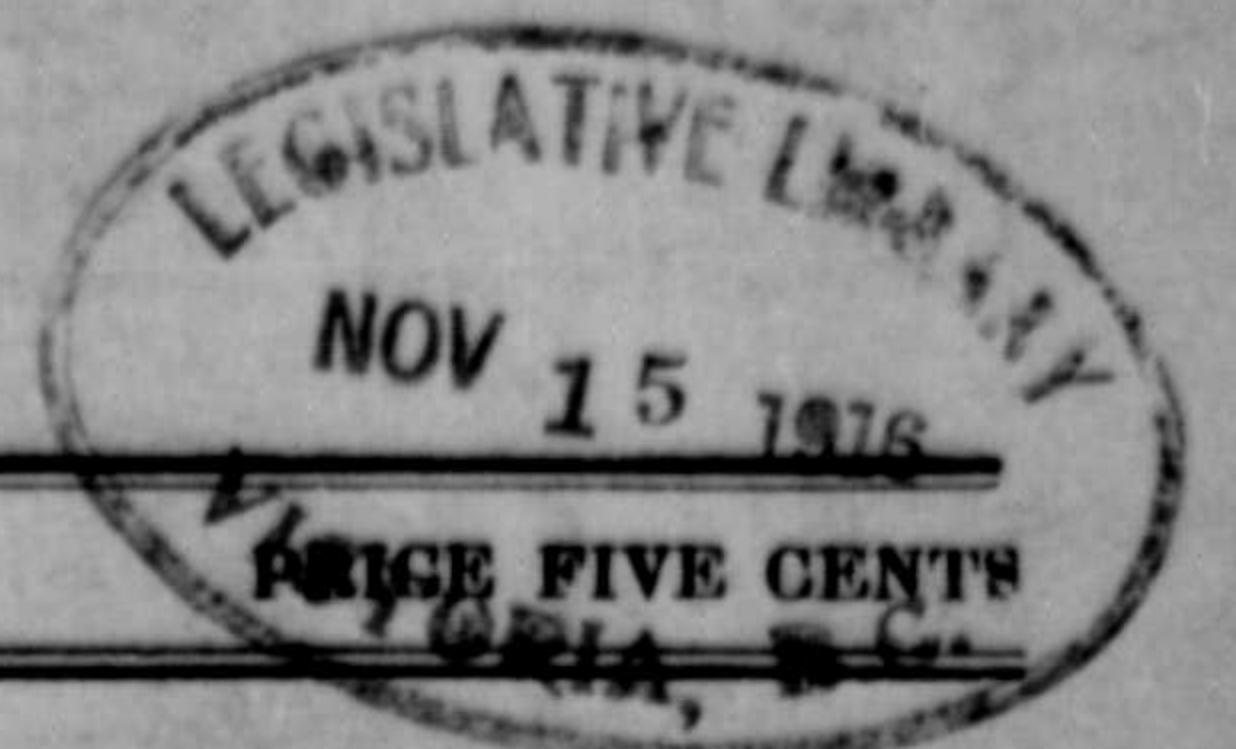

## GERMANS DRIVEN BACK TWENTY-FIVE MILES

### TABLES TURNED ON MACKENZEN ON DOBRUDJA--RUMANIANS RETAKE HIRSOVA

#### MACKENZEN IS BEING DRIVEN SOUTH AGAIN

Germans Driven Back for Twenty-five Miles—Hirsova Captured by Rumanians and Russians Advancing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 10.—The Rumanians are driving south at increased speed and have re-captured Hirsova, at the juncture of the two branches of the Danube. Von Mackenzen's forces have been driven back for a distance of twenty-five miles and the Russians and Rumanians are continuing to advance. The enemy have been forced to evacuate the village of Topal, burning the village before they left.

The Bulgarians are retreating along the entire front before the onslaughts of the Allied armies and are burning the villages as they evacuate them.

Reports from Berlin declare that Von Mackenzen's forces have retreated and are avoiding fighting the Rumanians according to instructions received from Germany.

#### Russian Report.

Petrograd, Nov. 10.—The Russians and Rumanians have repulsed every attack on the Transylvanian front, the fighting in the Trotus Valley being particularly severe, the Russians being engaged in a violent struggle at this point.

The Allied offensive in the Dorna Watra region is progressing favorably while further advances have been made in the Buzeu Valley and prisoners captured. All the German efforts to return to the offensive in the Jiu Valley have been repelled.

#### FRENCH DRIVE GERMANS BACK ON THE SOMME

Fierce Hand to Hand Fighting Around Sailly Saillisel—Germans Shell Forts on the Verdun Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 10.—On the northern section of the Somme front, the Germans furiously attacked the French positions at Sailly Saillisel but were driven back to their trenches after a desperate hand to hand encounter, in which the Germans gave way before the bayonets of the French.

Great artillery activity prevailed throughout the night on the Verdun front and the enemy directed a particularly heavy shell fire on Fort Douaumont and Fort Vaux, which the Crown Prince has declared he will yet recapture. The French, in a series of sorties against the enemy trenches, captured a number of prisoners and inflicted severe losses on the Germans.

#### British Front.

London, Nov. 10.—East of Armentieres, the British discharged clouds of gas against the enemy and carried out a heavy bombardment of the German trenches.

The theme of the story is the childish folly of a Japanese maiden who, though betrothed to one of her own race, longs for recognition in white society. She is infatuated and is about to fall into the snare set by an adventurer, when her poverty is revealed and the white man loses all interest in her. She feels disgraced and seeks to destroy herself but is saved at the last moment by her native lover, splendidly played by Hayakawa. A Gaumont Graphic completes a great show.

#### D. A. THOMAS INTENDS TO START OPERATIONS SOON

The following is from an old country newspaper:

Great anthracite coal deposits have been discovered in the territory through which the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway runs in British Columbia. Mr. D. A. Thomas, the Welsh coal magnate, is credited with the intention of making an early start on the mining operations in the Groundhog district, which is estimated to contain 1,441,444,000 tons of coal. Plans have been made for a short line of railway from the coal fields to Nasoga Bay, fifty miles north of Prince Rupert. The product in the Groundhog district is said to be the only hard, smokeless, steam anthracite in the world outside of Wales, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. The opening of the Panama Canal will enable naval and other vessels using hard coal to come through the Canal with a small amount of fuel in their bunkers and replenish their supplies at Prince Rupert or Nasoga Bay with coal from the British Columbia mines.

#### BILLIARD MATCH

Percy V. Edwards gave a splendid exhibition of billiards last evening in Ben Self's pool room in a friendly match with "Paddy" Burke, to whom he conceded 200 points in a game of 500. The expert failed to make the handicap, Mr. Burke getting 300 while Mr. Edwards was compiling 417. Mr. Edwards made a break of 41. There was a large gathering of spectators who thoroughly enjoyed the fine display of billiards. Mr. Edwards is a remarkably clever cueist.

At the meeting of the School Board last night the following tenders for the fixtures for fire protection at Borden St. School were opened: Kaen Hardware, \$67.05; Howe & McNulty, \$67.35; Thompson Hardware, \$72.50, and Stork's Hardware, \$84.30. The lowest tender was accepted.

#### HOTEL MEN CHARGED WITH IRREGULARITIES

A. J. Prudhomme, proprietor of the Savoy Hotel, appeared before Magistrate McMullin this morning on a charge of selling liquor to a prostitute. The information was laid by W. H. Wright. W. E. Williams, who appeared for the accused, asked for an adjournment until nine o'clock tomorrow morning. This was granted. L. W. Patmore appeared for the prosecution.

George W. Morrow, H. B. Rochester and K. Munro, of the Hotel Rupert, were also charged with selling liquor after hours, the information being laid by W. H. Wright and Charles E. Gavin. W. E. Williams asked for an adjournment until Monday morning. L. W. Patmore, for the prosecution, objected to the adjournment, as Gavin was a working man and had to get to work as soon as possible. It was finally agreed that the case be heard immediately following the other case tomorrow morning.

#### POPE WILL CREATE TEN NEW CARDINALS

Rome, Nov. 10.—It is officially announced that the Pope will hold a consistory on December 4th and will create ten new cardinals, including Monsignor Sbarretti, former apostolic delegate to Canada.

#### HIGH COST OF LIVING ORDER IS REDRAFTED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—The government has redrafted its order regarding the high cost of living and it is expected to pass the cabinet council immediately.

#### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

There were seven halibut boats in this morning with 73,000 pounds between them. The Lincoln had 7,000; Constitution, 16,000; Vesta, 15,000; North Cape, 7,000; Eagle, 10,000; Olympic, 8,000, and the J. P. Todd, 10,000. Up to noon, the Cold Storage Company had bid up to 12½ cents for 50,000 and the Booth Company had bid 12½ for the remaining 23,000 pounds. The probability is that sales were made at these prices, though bids were left open until this afternoon.

#### LORNE CREEK GOLD DISPLAYED IN CITY

Max Heilbronner's window is attracting great attention these days. It is nothing new for Max to have a fine display of nuggets but there is special interest attaching to the trays of nuggets and dust which occupy the centre of his main window this week, because of the fact that the precious metal came in from the property of Corley & Burgess, on Lorne Creek. The gold assays at \$17.25 per ounce and there is at least \$1,000 worth of it, this being a portion of the season's clean-up on this property which Mr. Heilbronner purchased recently.

The Dryhill Mining Company, which is the official name of the company, has had fifteen men working on the creek this summer and H. E. Ranft, who returned to town the other day, states that they have had a most successful season and expect even better things next year. Every man who casts an eye on that splendid display of gold will feel perked up considerably and will become a greater booster than ever for Prince Rupert as a coming big mining centre.

#### G. T. P. BOOSTING THE HALIBUT INDUSTRY

Pictures of western Canada will be shown throughout the United States this winter. The films, which were taken under the auspices of the Grand Trunk Pacific, include a variety of scenes in the harvest fields of the prairies, views of the Rockies, and scenes around Prince Rupert. One of the most interesting pictures is that of the arrival of a halibut schooner at Prince Rupert with 80,000 pounds of fish. The camera man was able, thanks to the kindness of one of the large fishing concerns in the city, to obtain a fine series of pictures of the unloading, beheading, icing and packing of the halibut, concluding with the loading on to the refrigerator cars. Prince Rupert will receive much publicity from the display of those films, which will be viewed by tens of thousands of people.

#### WILSON AGAIN PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES

Republicans Will Demand Recount Where Vote is Close—Both Houses Will Have Democratic Majorities.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 10.—Woodrow Wilson, the twenty-eighth President of the United States, has been re-elected. The latest figures give him 272 of the 531 electoral votes and Hughes 235. The doubtful states represent 24 votes, but, even if Hughes carries them all, he will have only 259 votes. The Republicans declare that it is their intention to demand a recount where the results are almost equal.

The Senate returns 54 Democrats and 42 Republicans, while the revised figures for the House of Representatives give the Democrats 215 seats and the Republicans 211, with one Independent; one Socialist; one Progressive and one Progressive-Protectionist. In his last term there was a Republican majority in the Senate, which has now been reversed.

#### BELGIAN TREATY COPIES FOR SCHOOL ROOMS

At the meeting of the School Board last night there were placed before the trustees copies of the now famous "scrap of paper." These are fac-simile copies of the part of the treaty which guaranteed Belgium immunity from attack. The signatures of the various representatives are shown. On the motion of George Tite, seconded by Mrs. Kirkpatrick, it was decided to have them framed and one placed in each room of the schools.

#### LUMBERMEN WANTED

The British army requires lumber just as much as it requires munitions and there are many men in Canada who can do their share for the Empire by enlisting in the Forestry Battalions. Sergt. Stokes is at the Red Cross rooms recruiting for a new Forestry Battalion and blacksmiths, teamsters, chaffeurs, sawyers, filers, edgemen, fellers, laborers and anyone having a knowledge of lumbering will be welcomed to the ranks. tr.

## RETURNED SOLDIERS

A recent issue of "Punch" contains a cartoon of a man rowing a boat loaded with the members of his family. It was entitled, "A Convalescent". To row the heavily laden boat was evidently all he could do. Like many of the amusing drawings in "Punch", it was a picture to make one think as well as smile. Here is a man, who has risked his life for his country, recovering from wounds which probably have brought him very near to death. Under the careful treatment of the doctors and nurses, he has regained his strength and is apparently just as well as ever. The fact that he has not been allowed to return to the trenches, however, means that he has been to a certain extent disabled, and the probability is that, in spite of his appearance of sound health, he is not so able to face life with so much vitality as he once did.

Life has been aptly described as a river, and a river flows steadily on. Men must either row hard against the stream, or drift with it. The man who has to row against the stream, carrying the load of a family with him, has, in most cases, a hard struggle, even if he is in perfect condition. What of the man who is weakened seriously as a result of wounds sustained in this desperate war? It may be that he will struggle gamely with the dogged pluck which he displayed in the trenches, and, when he realizes that he is not the man he once was, he may begin to drift. Every war of the past has produced its quota of drifters, some because they had not the strength to resume the struggle; others because they had not the inclination.

The Returned Soldiers' As-

sociations which are being formed throughout Canada will do much to encourage, and imbue with new hope, the men who have gone through the valley of death and come out bearing traces of the struggle. The chief aim of these associations is to take care of and guide those who require assistance, and they are worthy of the support of every citizen, as they are to a large extent going to relieve the authorities of a very heavy burden. The huge national debt resulting from the war and the care of the returned soldiers are the two great problems facing Canada and the Empire. That the soldiers themselves are wide awake to the situation, and that they are already building up their fences against the future, is one of the healthiest signs of the times.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Many mining experts from the south have looked over this district during the fall and summer and several deals are likely to result. Next spring should see a big awakening in mining, which is still in its infancy here. Alice Arm, the Islands and the various mining districts in the hinterland of Prince Rupert are almost certain to be quite busy next summer.

Following the development of the ore bodies must come smelters, refineries, etc. These follow in the natural course of things. Grow wheat, and elevators and railroads will spring up inevitably; develop mines, and smelters and refineries follow just as certainly.

## SEPTIC POISONING CURED BY SALT WATER

A revolution in surgical treatment has been introduced by a British doctor. The new method is called "saline irrigation," and a newspaper writer describes its manner of application as he witnessed it at a military hospital.

Lying comfortably in bed was a soldier with a severe shrapnel wound on the knee. The bed-clothes that covered the upper part of his body were arranged in the ordinary way, but below the clothes were raised by a "cradle," so that the wound was quite removed from any possibility of contact with the coverings.

All the time as he lay there,

salt water trickled gently from a glass tube on the wound, running day and night without ceasing, and all the time carrying off the poison from the wound and helping to heal it.

The saline solution—it is nothing more than warm water with five to ten per cent. of common salt in it—comes from an ordinary Thermos flask suspended above the bed, with a rubber tube conveying the fluid to the small glass tube.

After three or four days of irrigation, most septic wounds become clean and healthy. The salt penetrates to the seat of the poisoning and carries it off. War Cry.
