GRIM STRUGGLE AT TCHERNAVODA--GERMANS NOW READY FOR LASTING PEACE

CHANCELLOR IS NOW READY FOR LASTING PEACE

Hollweg Wants Allies to Make First Overtures--British Air-men Busy at Ostend and Zeebrugge.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, Nov. 11.—The German Chancellor has seriously declared his readiness to collaborate in any effort made to obtain international guarantees of a lasting peace. Von Bethmann-Hollweg's latest speech in the Reichstag clearly indicates that Germany earnestly desires a cessation of hostilities, but that he wants the Entente Allies to commence the overtures.

French Success.

Paris, Nov. 11.—The French have captured several trench elements to the northeast of Les Bouefs on the Somme front.

British Air Attack.

London, Nov. 11.—A squadron of British aeroplanes have attacked the harbor and German submarine shelters at Ostend and Zeebrugge on the Belgian coast.

Constanza Bombarded.

The Russian fleet has again bombarded Constanza and Lantgalia, the Black Sea ports at the eastern extremity of the Dobrudja front.

Dutch Steamer Taken.

The Germans have captured the Dutch cross Channel mail steamer Koningin. Her ninety-three passengers, which include three American citizens, have been transported to Zeebrugge. The British steamer Bogota has been sunk.

Submarine Sighted.

Norfolk, Nov. 11.—Incoming British ships report that they sighted a submarine a hundred and fifty miles off the Virginia Capes.

WILSON'S MAJORITY IS STILL GROWING

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 11.—Based on incomplete returns, Wilson's majority over Hughes is now placed at forty electoral votes. Tumulty declares that Wilson carried two-thirds of the states with the greatest increase ever given to any second term candidate since the civil war.

The vote polled is two millions greater than has ever been previously recorded and the Democratic candidate has received the largest vote ever given to any president.

The Republicans and Democrats have each elected 215 representatives and New Mexico is the only congressional district from which the returns are still incomplete. Hughes refuses to concede his defeat on account of the fact that considerable counting is still necessary.

California in Turmoil.

Wilson's re-election in California has led to recriminations and there is turmoil over Hughes' defeat in this state. Leaders declare that Hiram Johnson, the Progressive candidate for governor, who was elected, has been "hubbing" against Hughes in California. Hughes' friends are charging Johnson with treachery to the Republican candidate and the controversy waxes bitter.

FREIGHT RATES

Mr. Justice Morrison, who will preside at the sittings of the Supreme Court on Wednesday, November 15th, arrived from the south this morning. He will go on to Skagway, returning here Wednesday morning.

MAGISTRATE DISMISSED THE RUPERT HOTEL CASE

The case against the Savoy Hotel, of supplying liquor to a prostitute, was heard this morning before Magistrate McMullin. The evidence showed that A. J. Prudhomme, the proprietor, was in Edmonton at the time and that Mrs. Fisher was outside of the hotel. The porter testified that he answered a bell from the parlor. He went up and a man and woman there ordered drinks. He brought them and later he filled an order for another drink to each.

Cross-examined by L. W. Patmore, witness said that he had no idea who the woman was. He did not know but that the couple were husband and wife.

Mrs. Fisher stated that the first intimation she received of the presence of the people in the house was a request from Chief Vickers that they be removed. She had no idea who they were. She was completely taken by surprise when she met Mr. Vickers and did not understand what he meant when he said "Get these people out". The magistrate reserved his decision in the case.

Rupert Hotel Case.

The charges against the Hotel Rupert were of selling liquor after hours. Charles E. Gavin testified that he arrived in town on the evening of October 28th. He went to the red light district and returned between 1 a. m. and 3 a. m. in a taxi. He went to the Hotel Rupert and asked for a room. He was taken by Kenny Munro to room 23. He did not remember whether there was anyone else present when he asked for a room. He did not sign the register but told Mr. Munro his name and he wrote it down.

He swore that Mr. Munro accompanied him to the room, where witness asked for a drink. He was told that he could not have a drink but that he would get a flask. He said "All right. Make it Scotch". Kenny Munro brought him a flask of Scotch for which he paid 50 cents.

Under a searching cross-examination by W. E. Williams, he ad-

mitted that he was the worse for liquor. He was not certain whether Mr. Munro came up with him, but that he came to his room later.

Kenny Munro was next called. He gave his evidence very clearly. He stated that about two o'clock in the morning of October 29th, Gavin came in to the office. He was intoxicated. He could not write his name, being too drunk. He was given room 23. The elevator boy took him up. Immediately after that Mr. Munro went to bed and never saw witness again that morning. He denied most emphatically that Gavin had been given any liquor whatever.

Robert Capet, the elevator boy, was called. He corroborated Mr. Munro's evidence as to the arrival of Gavin. Gavin was drunk and when asked to sign the register by Mr. Munro, said "You write it". Mr. Munro asked his name. He said "Gavin". "First name?" asked Mr. Munro. "C.," replied Gavin. The boy said that he alone took Gavin up to room 23. He never saw him again that morning. There was no liquor supplied, nor asked for.

W. H. Wright, who laid information regarding a second charge, was then called. He said that on October 18th, he and George Sweet and George Tite went into the bar of the Rupert Hotel just before closing time. They had either one or two drinks and when he asked for another, the bartender told him it was closing time. They went out to the office and had a talk with Kenny Munro, and about ten or fifteen minutes after, he asked if they could not have a drink. Mr. Munro went to the bar and brought them three drinks, which witness paid for. He figured that it would be about ten minutes after ten.

Cross-examined by W. E. Williams, he said that he did not look at his watch but he was certain that it was after ten as they had been chatting for about ten minutes after coming out of the bar.

George Sweet was then called. He testified to coming out of an Eagles' meeting along with W. H. Wright and George Tite. It was

SPLENDID CALIBRE OF MEN SELECTED

T. D. Pattullo, member-elect for this district, returned from the south this morning. He reports that business conditions in the south have somewhat improved, though, naturally, there are many matters of importance "hanging fire" pending the installation of the new government. Just when that government will take office has been a matter of conjecture.

"It is unfortunate that Mr. Bowser has not seen fit to tender his resignation before this," said Mr. Pattullo, "as the fiscal year ends on March 31st, and it will leave very little time for the new government to prepare a legislative programme."

Mr. Pattullo remarked that it was very necessary that the new government should get down to business immediately, by reason of the financial condition of the province. He states that it will be found to be in a more serious condition than people realize, and one of the chief works of the new government will be to rehabilitate the whole situation.

"Mr. Brewster asked me to convey to the people of Northern British Columbia his appreciation of the splendid support which they gave him in the recent elections. He is thoroughly seized of the amplitude of the resources of our north country and expressed to me his determination to bring these resources under development at the earliest possible date," said the member.

At a meeting of the Liberal members-elect, in Vancouver, at which Mr. Brewster was unanimously and enthusiastically confirmed in the leadership of the Liberal party, Mr. Pattullo had the pleasure of meeting a majority of the Liberal members-elect, and he thinks the province is to be congratulated upon the calibre of the men selected to carry on the public business, and that it augurs well for the future conduct of the affairs of the province.

RUMANIANS ARE FIGHTING FOR DANUBE BRIDGE

Russians and Rumanians Make The Greatest Advance of the War--Russians Worsted in Volhynia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 11.—Von Mackenz's army is still retreating and the Russians and Rumanians have now reached the Danube, after the most remarkable advance in the history of the war. The Allied armies have travelled with tremendous rapidity and have carried everything before them.

There is very heavy fighting raging in the neighborhood of Tchernavoda. The Germans and Bulgarians are desperately resisting the efforts of the Russians and Rumanians to gain the bridge across the Danube at this point. On the Transylvanian front the Germans have made one small gain.

Russians Worsted.

Petrograd, Nov. 11.—The Russian line in Volhynia has been badly dented by seven furious onslaughts by the Austro-Germans and the Russians have been compelled to fall back upon their second line of trenches. The assaults were made with startling suddenness and the enemy have gained three miles of first line Russian trenches. Our troops have been obliged to release the captured heights at Dorna Watra, which they took the other day.

The End.

London, Nov. 11.—Lord French said today that the war is approaching its climax and that the end is bound to come in the spring, if not sooner.

General Brusiloff, the Russian commander in Galicia, says that the war is won and that it is only a matter of how long it will take the Germans to realize that they are hopelessly beaten.

DEUTSCHLAND NOW READY TO LEAVE PORT

New York, Nov. 11.—The German submarine Deutschland, provisioned for a sixty days voyage and loaded with a cargo of crude rubber, nickel, zinc and silver valued at a million and a half dollars, is now ready to sail.

THE TARTAN

The Fredericton Daily Gleaner, in a two-column article on the New Brunswick Killies (Sir Sam's Own), states that "the Minister of Militia having authorized the recruiting of 'all the MacLeans and their connections throughout Canada' for this unit, plans have been completed for a Dominion-wide campaign." Five officers are now touring the Dominion in an effort to round up the MacLeans.

It must not be imagined that the MacLeans, the descendants of a famous and warlike Scottish clan, are backward in coming forward in the cause of King and country, for all the "Mac's" are doing their share as was to be expected of them, and the sole reason for the tremendous effort to get hold of the MacLeans is because this battalion is to wear the tartan of the MacLeans of Dhuart. With all due respect to the MacLean family and the aforesaid tartan, it seems hardly worth the expense of sending officers from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from the far north to the United States boundary simply to induce men to wear a particular brand of tartan. It is rather by way of an insinuation that the MacLeans require some special pandering to their family pride before they can be induced to shoulder a gun, and this is anything but true. Then so far as wearing the tartan is concerned, what does it matter, since the gay streaks of the Dhuart's will be hidden by a khaki apron when they get to the front, and the Germans won't be a bit the wiser as to whether it was a MacLean or a Macdonald that carried out some desperate piece of work. It seems to us that a MacLean in any other

tartan would use a bayonet just as effectively, yes, even if he had merely pants, it would make no difference.

Of course, there may be another reason for all this excitement and scrambling for recruits with a penchant for a particular tartan. The battalion is known as Sir Sam's Own, and there is an effort being made to bring it up to a brigade. Now a brigade of Sir Sam's Own is something which the Minister of Militia may well think worth striving for. What will the Germans say when they learn that Sir Sam has grown into a whole brigade? Still, it would have been much cheaper, and just as effective, to have had the MacLeans join the New Brunswick Killies through the ordinary recruiting stations.

The Minister of Finance is calling for economy all round; the government is seriously considering how much they dare do in the way of dealing with the high cost of living, and everywhere prices are soaring, yet the militia department is evidently not worrying about the high cost of recruiting. At first, it appeared that the officers would bear the cost of this fantastic scheme, but, since the sanction of Sir Sam has been obtained, it is evident that the cost is to come out of the pockets of the people. The people of Canada have done nobly. They are contributing magnificently to the Red Cross and Patriotic funds, while every line of patriotic endeavor is being supported with great good spirit. The ordinary cost of recruiting they will not grumble at, but why should they be asked to bear the expense of spreading officers throughout the Dominion to find out how many men can



be found to match a certain tartan. Even if the officers were to bear the expense, it is a disgraceful extravagance, and the money would be much better spent in taking care of the widows and children of those who have sacrificed their lives in the war. It does not require any special tartan scheme to induce the MacLeans to serve their country, as their fathers did before them, and the whole scheme is typical of many things which have been done in the past two years.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Berlin silence of the past few days in regard to the Dobrudja front is explained. Von Mackenzen has been driven back twenty-five miles. There is a ding-dong battle raging in Transylvania, but it now seems certain that Von Falkenhayn and Von Mackenzen will never link up.

Berlin says that Mackenzen avoided fighting the Rumanians according to instructions. He evidently took a very serious view of his instructions and followed them out to the limit when he got so many miles away without stopping.

Woodrow Wilson is re-elected and the number of men who knew all the time that he would be is still growing. The general opinion here seems to be that Teddy Roosevelt would have made the grade if the Republicans had let bygones be bygones and nominated him. The Democratic majority in the House is very small and a few colds on the government side of the House might defeat the government.

Ottawa is redrafting the order-in-council in regard to the high cost of living. The first idea was to throw all the onus on municipalities, who are helpless in the matter so long as the manufacturers are allowed to do as they please. It will be interesting to watch whether the government will after all assume its real responsibilities in the matter.

With eggs approaching a dollar a dozen, the man who can afford ham and eggs for breakfast will soon begin to feel that he is advancing in the social scale and that he ought to rank at least with the man who owns a Ford, if he cannot aspire to the distinction of the ranks of the Cadillacs or the Daimlers. Families who can afford to use butter will soon be thinking of establishing a social circle of their own.

NOTICE TO BELGIANS RESIDENT IN CANADA

The Consulate General of Belgium at Ottawa has just addressed the following communication to the editor:

A ministerial order dated the 15th of October, 1916, extends to the Belgians living in Canada the provisions of the Decree of the 21st of July last.

As a consequence all Belgians born after the 30th of June, 1876, and before the 1st of July, 1898, shall before the 1st of December, 1916, duly fill registration forms and address same either to said Consulate General or to the nearest Belgian Consul.

Registration forms will be supplied by the nearest Belgian Consul on either verbal or written application.

Married men born after 1894 and single men born after the 30th of June, 1886, will be summoned to the nearest Belgian Consulate, where their obligations will be explained to them. If fit for service, they will be transported to the Belgian Recruiting Commission of Folkstone, England.

Married men born before 1895 and single men born before the 1st of July, 1886, may apply for a delay provided since any date prior to the 21st of June they have been in the employ either of concerns engaged in the production of war material or of any service of general utility. Such application shall be made in the registration form. Those who have not applied for a delay or who have been refused same will be summoned to the nearest Belgian Consulate, on a date to be determined by future provisions, to be medically examined and, if found fit, transported to the Belgian Recruiting Commission of Folkstone, England.
