

### SIR SAM RESIGNS

In requesting the resignation of Lieutenant-General Sir Sam Hughes, Premier Borden has performed his greatest feat since taking office in 1911. Premier Borden has been constantly charged with weakness as a leader, and the formation of his first cabinet betrayed unmistakable signs of weakness. Not only did he pander, for political purposes, to an element amongst the French-Canadians which was, and is, flagrantly anti-British, but he allowed two men to enter the cabinet whose room would have been preferable to their company, so far as the welfare of the country and the comfort of the Premier was concerned. One was Sir Sam Hughes and the other the Hon. Robert Rogers.

If Sir Robert Borden was at the cabinet, he was still more at fault in allowing him to remain there. It must be admitted that the Minister of Militia performed a herculean task in getting together the first Canadian overseas contingent. Sam's most bitter opponents must admit that he did splendid service on that occasion when the situation demanded quick action. That done, Sir Sam became even more Hughes-like than ever. Sections of the Tory Press flattered him and he seemed to get the idea that he and the Hughes family were the great driving force behind Canada in the war. It again must be admitted that Sam is some driving force, but even his friends will admit that he expended a good deal of time and energy
