## PARSON AND FEW MEN TAKE FOUR HUNDRED

### GERMANS LOSE HEAVILY IN MAKING SMALL GAIN -- SERBIANS STILL GAINING

#### CHAPLAIN AND FEW MEN TAKE FOUR HUNDRED

Substantial Gains in Ancre Drive — Germans Make Progress At an Enormous Sacrifice.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 16.—The British drive along the Ancre in the direction of Transloy continues. The number of prisoners taken in this district since Monday now amounts to 5,678. The British troops fought splendidly, overcoming a fierce resistance. The British losses were comparatively light considering the extent of the gains made.

##### Gallant Chaplain.

Four hundred Germans surrendered to a British chaplain who was at the head of a few British soldiers in the Ancre district.

##### German Gain.

Paris, Nov. 16.—Strong German forces attacked the French positions north and south of the Somme last night and gained limited advantages at an exceedingly heavy cost. The enemy losses far outweighed the importance of the point gained. The Germans have also secured a footing in St. Pierre-Vaast wood and at Pressoire, where the French made gains the other day.

#### THIRTY THOUSAND MEN IDLE IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 16. Thirty thousand men are idle and a hundred steamers are tied up in Sydney and Melbourne, and the Sydney wool sales have been suspended on account of the coal strike.

#### BRITISH TRIBUTE TO CAPTAIN BOELKE

Berlin, Nov. 15.—British aviators, with the true sportsmanship which prevails amongst the rival flying men, have sent floral wreaths for the grave of Captain Boelke, the famous German aviator who was killed recently. They have also written letters of sympathy to the parents of the deceased officer.

#### ALLIED LINES DRAW CLOSER TO MONASTIR

Bulgarians Pursued by Serbians — Rumanians and Russians Regain Ground—British Air Success.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 16.—On the Macedonian front the Allies are successfully continuing their offensive and their lines have been advanced closer to the Bulgarian stronghold of Monastir from the southeast. The Serbians, who have played an active part in the recent important victories, are pursuing the Bulgarians.

##### Transylvania.

The Rumanians have again made a successful stand against the Teutons, having captured Boasic, while the Russians have recaptured the trenches which they recently lost at Narayouka.

##### British Air Success.

A squadron of British aeroplanes carried out successful bombing attacks against a German aerodrome on the western front. Bombs were also dropped on the railway lines; the stations, and the rolling stock.

#### CONTINENTAL TRUST CASE HEARD THIS MORNING

In the Supreme Court this forenoon, Mr. Justice Morrison heard the case of D. M. McGregor v. G. R. Naden et al. W. Steers, of Vancouver, appeared for Mr. McGregor and W. E. Williams for G. R. Naden and M. P. McCaffery. L. W. Patmore represented T. D. Pattullo. Mr. McGregor, who is a stock broker in Vancouver, occupied the stand this forenoon. He testified to having been a party to the taking of an option on 110 shares in the Continental Trust Company, of Prince Rupert, at a price of \$2,000, the option being for fourteen days. The original option was really in the name of his associate, N. F. Wilson, who had Mr. McGregor go to Prince Rupert to look over the affairs of the company. M. J. Hobin and C. B. Peterson provided him with a statement of the affairs of the company, which he went into item by item, asking questions in regard to items which he did not understand. Ultimately he signed an agreement to purchase 110 shares for \$2,000. The case is still proceeding.

#### TWENTY-DOLLAR SHOES LOOKED FOR IN CHICAGO

Toronto, Nov. 16.—One hundred thousand dollars damage has been done by fire to the warehouses of Adams Brothers, leather merchants in this city.



WRECK IN WHICH C. P. R. ENGINEER NARROWLY ESCAPED DEATH

This unique picture shows the wreck at the west end of the C. P. R. bridge in Galt, Ontario, in which six cars were reduced to matchwood, and Engineer Joe Brand, of Toronto, and Fireman Kusel, of London, saved themselves by jumping. The smash-up occurred on the main line and delayed traffic greatly. Slippery rails are given as the cause. The same spot was the scene of a bad wreck several years ago when five men lost their lives. The white articles in the foreground are not mushrooms, but fresh hams.

#### TEN FOR CONVICTION -- TWO FOR ACQUITTAL

Victoria, Nov. 13.—There will be no re-trial of the Gosden case. The accused will be formally allowed his freedom following the entry by the crown today of a nolle prosequi. The "\$50" charge will be dropped, as well as the second count laid against Gosden in respect to a conversation which Gosden said he heard between J. T. Scott, Mr. Anderson and Mr. McTaggart.

The attitude of the crown is that the perjury charge has resulted in two disagreements and there is now no hope of a conviction.

The jury is alleged on Saturday to have stood ten for conviction and two for acquittal. On this point there is no official information.

It is understood that at the conclusion of the case Saturday Mr. W. C. Moresby, Crown counsel, expressed his decision to at once recommend that the charge be dropped. He is said to have regarded the defence put up in the second trial with an important new witness as much stronger than the defence offered by Gosden at the first hearing.

#### CHURCH UNION DEBATED AT FORTNIGHTLY CLUB

The opening debate of the Fortnightly Club was held in the Presbyterian Hall last evening, D. McCorkindale presiding over a fairly large attendance. The subject was: "Resolved, that Church Union be held in abeyance until such time as there is more unanimity in the Presbyterian Church." D. C. McRae, Douglas Stork and E. H. Patterson conducted the affirmative and C. R. Murray, E. J. Smith and William Turnbull the negative. On an audience vote, the negative carried.

At the close of the debate songs were sung by Mr. Raper and Mr. Warner, both of whom were heartily encored. The accompaniments were played by Miss Marguerite Kilpatrick. The ladies provided refreshments.

#### REPUBLICANS BLAME GOVERNOR JOHNSON

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 16.—Hughes' organization will unite against Governor Hiram Johnson, of California, in an effort to prevent him getting the nomination in 1920. The Republican leaders point to Johnson's huge majority in California in the recent election and compare it with Hughes' minority, as evidence that the governor was in league with a Democratic ring.

Wilcox denies that the G. O. P. nominee declined to meet California's governor and wants to know if Johnson turned down the meeting. He refuses to offer any criticism until he is certain of the facts.

Wall Street is stunned by rumors that 6,300 errors have been found in the counting of the California ballots. Both in Los Angeles and in San Francisco many errors have been found in the recounts and several local judges have been summoned to explain how they arrived at their totals.

#### DR. BLAND DECLARES THE CHURCH IS DEAD

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, Nov. 16.—At The Presbyterian Synod, Rev. Dr. Bland, addressing hundreds of elders and ministers, declared that the church at the present stage in its history is dead. He asserted that the entire system must be reconstructed and that the church must deal with graft, combines and patronage.

It will be remembered that Dr. Bland caused quite a sensation some months ago in Port Arthur by his tirade against certain politicians.

#### DAMAGES FOR INJURY AWARDED L. J. MACKAY

In the case of L. J. Mackay v. The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, Ltd., before Mr. Justice Morrison in the Supreme Court yesterday, the jury, after about forty-five minutes deliberation, brought in a verdict for the plaintiff, assessing the damages at \$1,500.

The evidence for the plaintiff showed that, while he was trucking in the glazing room of the cold storage plant, last October, a box weighing between three and four hundred pounds fell from the truck of a man Holton, who was behind him, breaking Mackay's leg. It was shown that one wheel of Holton's truck had gone into a depression in the floor, where the top coating had worn off. The hole was described as being nine inches across and three-quarters of an inch deep.

Dr. Kergin testified as to the nature of Mackay's injuries, showing that the plaintiff would never again have the full use of the limb.

Evidence for the defence was given by Gus Anderson, L. L. Le Roux, D. Crist and John Mathieson. Each testified to the fact that Mackay knew of the condition of the floor, which was worn in places on the surface, the worn places being covered by sheet metal. Mr. Mathieson, the superintendent of the plant, said that he was not aware of this particular hole. All the workmen knew the conditions and they had no fear regarding their safety.

Mr. Fulton, for the defendants, in addressing the jury, contended that there was no evidence of negligence on the part of the company, and that the plaintiff, knowing the condition of the floor, voluntarily undertook the risk. He also pleaded contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff.

Mr. W. E. Williams, for the plaintiff, described minutely the condition of the floor, and the difficulty "a man trucking a box weighing over three hundred

Exposed Positions are Untenable in Face of Shells — Bomb Dropped on Padua — Many Killed.

Rome, Nov. 16.—The Italian forces, under a heavy Austrian shell-fire, have been obliged to evacuate exposed positions at San Marco.

##### Austrian Report.

Vienna, Nov. 16.—The Austrians have captured Italian trenches and four hundred and seventy-five men with seven machine guns.

##### Padua Bombed.

Paris, Nov. 16.—Austrian aviators dropped a bomb on the ancient city of Padua, in Italy, killing thirty-two and injuring fifty-eight.

##### Belgian Success.

Paris, Nov. 16.—Belgian foraging parties raided the German trenches at Dixmude and secured several prisoners.

#### EIGHT-HOUR DAY FOR STANDARD OIL WORKERS

San Francisco, Nov. 15.—The Standard Oil Company have granted an eight-hour day to their workmen here and made no decrease in pay on account of the curtailed hours. The shorter working day affects between seven and eight thousand men in California.

**YOUNG CANADA**

Every old timer of Prince Rupert who was privileged to sit in the auditorium of the Westholme Theatre on Tuesday evening must, as he looked on the hundreds of bright school children, have found his mind reverting to the days when the school children of this young city could be counted on the fingers. Eight years ago, Prince Rupert was a railroad camp, and a man's town rather than a place for children. The pioneer has done his work; homes have been hewn out of the solid rock, as it were, and hundreds of pairs of tiny feet patter along to and from school over ground which was a few years ago primeval forest and swamp. The jungle has given place to the neighborhood and the foundations of another outpost of the last Great West have been firmly and surely laid. The majority of the men who helped to lay the foundations are gone; many of them overseas to fight for the Empire they have helped to build, and others to the mountains and the creeks in search of the world's secrets, chiefly because towns and cities have no attraction for them.

Family life has succeeded pioneer life and the places of the frontiersmen of civilization have been taken by Prince Rupert's first generation of citizens. The future of Prince Rupert is wrapped up in the minds and characters of the budding manhood and womanhood which are being trained in our schools. The hope of Prince Rupert, of Canada and the Empire lies in its children. The British population is small and the British Empire is wide. People have come in from other nations to help develop it and they are welcomed.

The children are doubly welcome. The children in our schools have sprung from many different nations but they are all Canadians and will help to build up Canada as a nation within the Empire.

On the teachers of Canada rests a tremendous responsibility, which is shared with the parents of the Dominion. The children, looking out with eyes wide with wonder on the epoch-making happenings of the present, are the citizens and legislators of the future. Future cabinet ministers met on the school platforms of Canada on Tuesday night to help alleviate the sufferings of the little children of Belgium. Who can attempt to estimate the far-reaching effects of that occasion?

Our pioneers laid the foundations of a city; our teachers are laying the foundations of a nation. On their upbuilding of the minds and characters of the children of Canada depends the future history of the Dominion. It is well that the children should be banded together to do what they can in the interests of liberty, equality and justice. The whole world is in the melting pot; the children are looking on, and their receptive little minds are learning the lessons of the times in which they live. On their learning that truth and righteousness alone exalteth a nation depends the future of the Dominion of Canada and the British Empire.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

It is clear that Washington's attitude to Berlin is to be a little stiffer than it was before the election. President Wilson is following the right line in investigating the wholesale ship-



ping of Belgians as slaves to Germany. The German scheme is nothing more nor less than a reversion to the old slave trade.

Sir Sam does not seem to be taking his cold bath in very good humor. He evidently does not realize the true inwardness of his dismissal.

The reference made by Mr. Justice Morrison to the loss sustained by the bar in the death of Captain Adair Carss, at the opening of the Supreme Court yesterday, made a deep impression on all who heard it.

There must be a "hoodoo" attached to the name Hughes. The little Welshman of that name, who is premier of Australia, is now in a peck of trouble with his party. Like Sam, he is "some" talker. Both gentlemen seem to have a penchant for going to London and telling them how to do things.

The latest development in Greece seems to be that the Allies are proposing to step in to save King Constantine from any inconvenience which may arise out of the fact that the Greek people are divided against him.

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## GERMAN PEACE PLANS WERE NIPPED IN BUD

Some time ago there was a report from Charles H. Sabin, president of the Guarantee Trust Co., of New York, that Berlin was to make peace overtures through Washington. As nothing came of the movement, it was by some regarded as nothing but a stock exchange rumor started for financial purposes. It now transpires that Mr. Sabin obtained his information from an unimpeachable source, and the Chicago press states that neutral diplomats had actually prepared to start for America as the bearers of the German government's proposals. Ambassador Gerard, who left for home about the time the talk started, was not concerned in the matter.

Thanks to its intelligence department, the British government had learned of the movement and lost no time in nipping it in the bud. It will be remembered that Lloyd George, at this time, came out with a most emphatic statement to the American press, saying that Britain would resent any attempt on the part of any neutral government to institute a peace movement at that time.

A few days later, in the House of Commons, he made an impassioned speech from which the following is an extract: "Any step at this time by the United States, the Vatican or any other neutral in the direction of peace would be construed by Britain as an unneutral, pro-German move. Britain has only begun to fight, and we can brook no interference. The British soldier is a sportsman. He has fought as a sportsman and will die as a sportsman. He plays the game; has never squealed, and has never asked

anyone to squeal for him. We are fighting for fair play against a bully and we shall fight until we get it. Any talk of France or Russia making a separate peace is nonsense. I have just visited the battlefields of France. I stood, as it were, at the door of hell and saw myriads marching into the furnace. I saw some come out of it scorched and mutilated. This ghastliness must never again be re-enacted on this earth, and one method at least of ensuring that end is the infliction of such punishment upon the perpetrators of this outrage against humanity that the temptation to emulate their exploits will never again enter the hearts of the evil-minded amongst the rulers of men. That is the meaning of Britain's resolve."

It will also be remembered that just at this time, Premier Asquith made his famous speech in which he said, "this war cannot be allowed to end in some patched-up and dishonoring compromise masquerading under the name of peace."

These emphatic statements from the leaders of the British people caused the German government to abandon its efforts at arriving at a peace through the good offices of the United States.



pounds had to contend with in dodging such a hole. He held that it was impossible for Holton to see the depression in the floor. He contended that the evidence for the plaintiff showed that Holton was handling his truck in the ordinary way. He claimed damages on the ground that Mackay would never again be able to follow his former occupations of tie-cutter and prospector.

His Lordship, in summing up, dealt very clearly with the legal aspects of the case under common law, and also as it came within the scope of the Employers' Liability Act.

### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

Five halibut schooners made port this morning with 190,000 pounds between them. The Vansee had 60,000; the Republic, 60,000; the Orient, 45,000, and the Arctic, 20,000. These are all American vessels. The Canadian schooner Rose Spit brought in 5,000 pounds. There had been no bidding this forenoon, but, as there has been a good deal of fish shipped south in the last few days, it is not likely that prices will go over 12 cents.
