

U. S. SENATE CONSIDERS RECIPROCITY QUESTION

PRESIDENT DIAZ TO RETIRE FRANCHISE FOR MEXICANS

President and Cabinet of Mexico Will Capitulate to the Radical Demands—Issue a Manifesto in Which They Offer to Retire from Office

(Canadian Press Dispatch)
Mexico City, May 8.—President Diaz and his Cabinet announced today the terms upon which they are willing to vacate office. It is practically an acceptance of Madro's demands in all important particulars. The Cabinet will consider the draft later and revise it, but the text as published shows that they are willing to step out of office and grant all the leading demands of the radical and revolutionary party.

The draft manifesto announces that the Cabinet will grant to the people of Mexico a free and universal suffrage, and an election. The election is to be conducted under provisions which will prevent the re-election of President Diaz or any of the existing executive.

RIOTING IN OKLAHOMA

Gun Play Indulged in Over a Street Car Strike Dispute

ONE MAN KILLED

Four Other Men are Seriously Injured—Union Men Tried to Stop the Company from Running Its Own Cars.

Oklahoma City, May 8.—One man was shot dead, and four others seriously injured here this morning, when the striking union men attempted to stop the street railway company from operating its cars with strike breakers.

The company had engaged a number of special police who were armed with guns. These opened fire and a battle resulted in the streets.

Canvassing has been going on quietly on behalf of the candidates and today there is a briskening up in this direction.

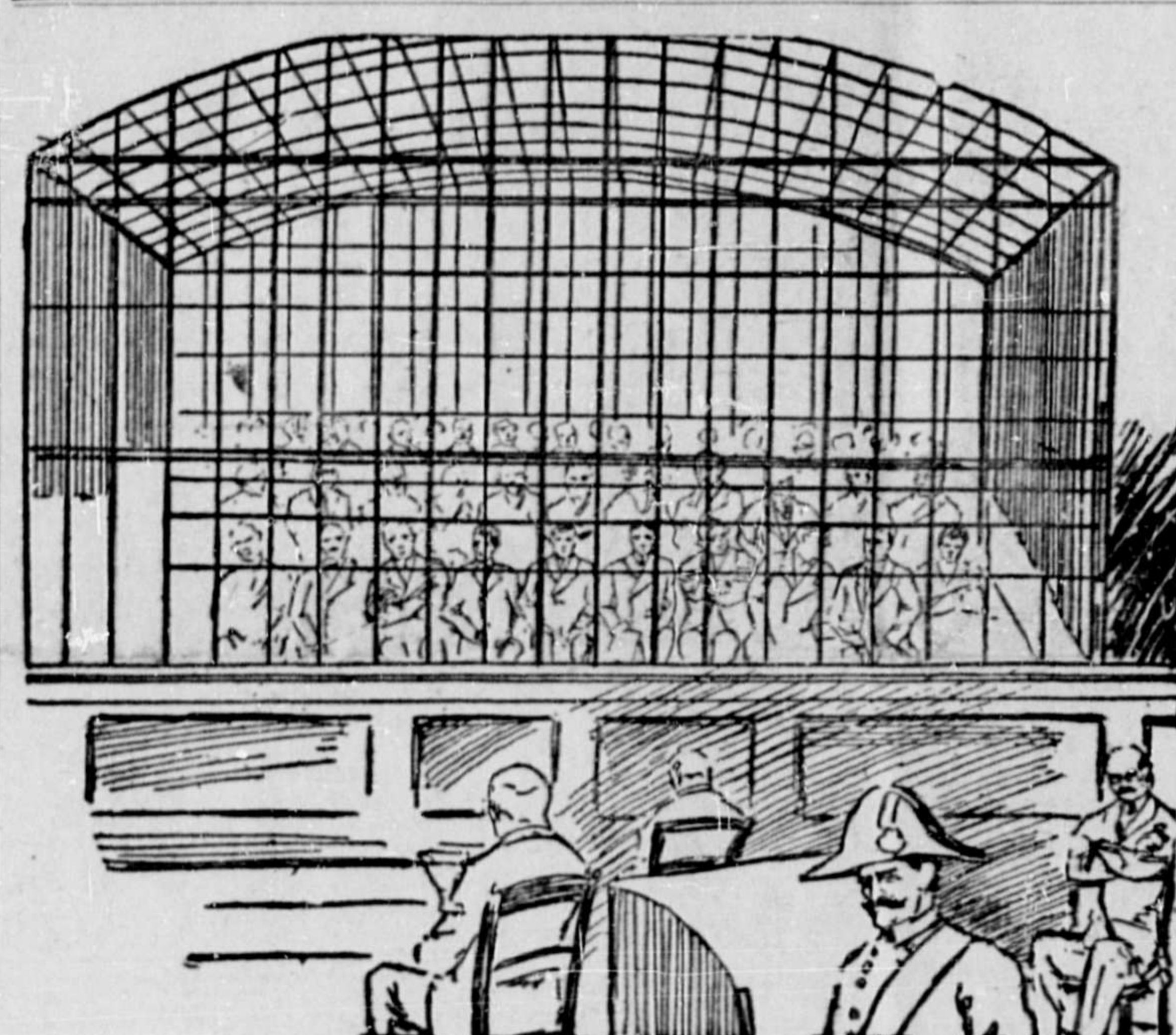
Premier McBride Sails from New York on Wednesday

HALF A MILLION HELLO'S OVER RUPERT'S PHONES

New Directories Next Week—Manager Love Reports Fire Alarms Again Working and Improved—McBride Street to be Lighted Tonight

Five hundred and eighty-four thousand "Hello's" were waited in tones ranging from the softest feminine dulcet to the roughest masculine roar over Prince Rupert's phones during the months between August 15th, 1910, and April 30th, 1911. There were also five hundred and eighty-four thousand polite little feminine inquiries of "Number Please" from "Central." Not a single complaint of any serious nature was received in that time. Minor interruptions of the service were few, and promptly put right, and subscribers all over are well pleased.

Fire Alarms in Order

Today Mr. Love, manager of the Light and Phone Department, mentions that the old fire alarm system throughout the city is again in working order. Properly insulated wiring has been installed, and the system so arranged as to be under control of the Telephone Department Central. This will

ensure its being kept in repair. There are eighteen alarms altogether. Section Six is not quite ready yet.

Light up McBride

Tonight for the first time McBride street will be lighted. Everything is in readiness there to turn on the current. Two new switch boards have been installed at the power plant to control four different circuits. Section Six is now a distinct circuit by itself. So far the street lighting is still in the same circuit with the domestic supply, but later this will be altered.

LOSES SEAT BY ONE VOTE

Exciting Political Action in Great Britain

UNFAIRNESS CHARGED

Liberal Candidate at Exeter After a Week's Recount before Two Judges Loses His Seat by One Vote.

(Special to the Daily News)
London, May 8.—One of the most exciting political trials has just been concluded at Exeter, with the result that Mr. St. Maur, the Liberal member was unseated, and his opponent at the last election, Mr. Duke, K. C., was declared elected by one vote. Mr. St. Maur previously held the seat by four votes.

For an entire week the seat had hung in the balance. At any moment the loss of two votes was enough to unseat Mr. St. Maur, who was declared elected last December by a majority of four only. The invidious task of deciding whether this vote or that vote were good or bad, when so much depended on a single ballot paper, fell to the lot of Judges Ridley and Channell, and the course of the trial was of such a see-saw nature that by the last day excitement had risen to fever pitch.

When the decision became known the enthusiasm of Mr. Duke's supporters and the bitterness of Mr. St. Maur's sympathisers were unbounded, and an unprecedented encounter between Judge Ridley and the unseated member took place in the London train as it stood in the station.

Smarting under a sense of defeat, Mr. St. Maur, addressing the crowd on the platform, alluded to "unjust judges." Judge Ridley was seated in the same coach, and he rose and placed a restraining hand on Mr. St. Maur's shoulder and closed the window. Before the train left Mr. St. Maur, however, made it clear that he had no intention of retracting his words.

Paul's Solution of the Great Problem

REV. W. H. McLEOD'S SERMON

"Socialistic Ideal Can Only be Attained by the Work of Men Inspired by the Christ Spirit" Says This Pastor.

Only by the gradually increasing number of strong and good men on the earth will this world ever attain to the ideal social state towards which mankind is striving. This is the substance of Rev. W. H. McLeod's sermon last night on "Paul's Solution of the World Problem."

"The world," said Rev. Mr. McLeod, "is waiting and hoping for men like Christ, and the world will never be satisfied until it finds such men." The Socialistic Ideal will never be won by finely spun theories. Only men strong for good, for brotherhood, and the cause of Christ on earth will ever bring about the ideals of those theories.

"You cannot build up the commonwealth of Canada by mere genius alone. It must be genius plus the Christ-like spirit. Cherish the great Ideal and you will live and you will live and work for it for the whole of humanity."

"This is the greatest century that ever has been for helpfulness and brotherliness. It is because of the spread of the Christ Spirit. This may be denied," said the pastor, "but I believe it."

Rev. Mr. McLeod spoke enthusiastically for the influence of the mothers in moulding for the world the type of men who will bring about the great ideal. "Thank God," he said, "for Christian mothers. That is where boys get the foundation of character."

"Let us become Godlike," he concluded, "and we shall never be discouraged in our work. Let us help up the man who is drifting down. So we shall solve the great world-problems of sin and society." The Baptist church was thronged last night, and the brightness of the service was marked throughout.

THE NEW CITY ASSESSMENT

It is not true that figures are dry reading, and can be made to support anything. Figures do not lie, though their users may. They condense into tabloid space a great fund of statement.

The assessment figures published on Saturday are of particular interest, and are worth studying, even by those who are rarely given to bothering about figures. The assessment shows where and how and to what extent the city council proposes to raise its revenues for the year.

Little difference is shown in the total between this year and last—a mere trifle of \$200,000 on a total assessment of over fourteen millions. At first sight this might lead the unthinking to suppose that the taxes will be about the same as last year. This is not so.

In last year's total the Grand Trunk Pacific was assessed for its properties a sum of approximately \$7,300,000. This year they are assessed at \$4,834,830. The Grand Trunk Pacific is either to be congratulated on a light assessment or condoned for the remarkable shrinkage in the value of its lots.

The new assessment maintains the old total by putting the deficiency onto the general public to make up. The general public is to be either condoned with on a high assessment, or congratulated on the remarkable increase in the value of its properties.

The difficult thing to realise is how the company's properties could shrink so in value during the year, and the general public's properties rise so in value, both of them being jumbled up in the same town.

In the meantime, the assessment is a warning to the general public to look for an increase in their tax bills, especially to those who own Section 1 property. The rate has not yet been announced, but it cannot under the Municipal Clauses Act exceed 15 mills.

It is obvious that the assessor has had to increase the assessment to the general public in order to retain the revenue and maintain the borrowing power of the city in the face of the proposed rebate to the Grand Trunk Pacific. USEFUL TO HOUSEWIVES

Half a Dozen Handy Household Hints

Badly stained knives may be made to look as good as new by rubbing on charcoal.

If a soft piece of homemade bread is rubbed on a scorch on woollen goods it will remove it entirely.

Vegetables will take longer to cook, but will be much nicer and of better color if boiled uncovered.

A tasty way of using left over boiled rice is to put a piece of butter in the frying pan and adding the rice when the butter sizzles. Fry until brown.

To make celery firm and crisp and with a salty flavor liked by most people, clean as usual and soak in cold, salty water for an hour before serving.

Eggs will keep well packed in dry salt with the small end down. Grease the shell with lard before packing, and pour melted lard over the top layer of salt.

When boiling cabbage, cut the cabbage in quarters and slip each quarter into a separate cheesecloth bag. Then when it is cooked it comes out intact.

To remove the fat from soup or broth intended for an invalid, it is not necessary to allow it to become cold, as is usually done. Instead, place a fine wire sieve on ice, until it is thoroughly chilled, and pour the liquid through this. If the liquid is partially cooled the fat will solidify on the cold wire and the broth will be ready for use immediately.

To wash chamois gloves and keep them soft, first put the gloves on the hands, using lukewarm water and pure soap. Wash in this later until the gloves are thoroughly cleansed, then rinse in clear water of the same temperature, but before taking off the gloves, cover them again with a lather of the soap. Allow them to dry in the shape.

Dominion Government is Helping Queen Charlottes

BUDGET OF NEWS

Prof. Halkett is studying conditions for developing Salmon Industry—Experimental Farm to be Started to Help Agriculturalists.

(Special Correspondence)

Massett, May 7.—Professor Halkett of the Marine and Fisheries Department, is on Massett Inlet investigating the habits of salmon, particularly the "sockeye." With Fisheries Inspector C. Harrison and Indian Agent Thomas Deasy the Professor visited Naden, Ain, Mamon, Awne and other streams on Massett Inlet.

A road party cleared a trail between the new townsite of Massett and the Indian town at the entrance to Massett Sound.

The whaling station at Naden Harbor is receiving a number of whales and treating same for export.

An experimental garden under the control of the Dominion Government, has been started on the Indian reserve at Massett. Ground has been cleared and seeds of various kinds planted at the Indian Agency. The Indian school children and older persons are receiving lessons in gardening and a larger area of ground than formerly will be under cultivation on the reserve.

The residence for Dr. A. Ross Fraser has been completed; streets are being cleared in Massett townsite; James Martin's large residence is in course of erection and several new buildings are under way on Delkatla Bay.

Captain Daniel Stanley is recovering from a severe attack of illness and will take charge of the gasoline launch recently purchased by him in Prince Rupert.

Violent Scenes at the Trial of the Cammorristi

PRIEST ON TRIAL

Father Vittorzi Cursed the Informer Abbatemaggio after the Latter Had Taken an Oath on the Crucifix That He Had Not Lied.

(Canadian Press Dispatch)

Viterbo, Italy, May 8.—Sensational scenes marked the hearing of the Cammorristi trial on Saturday afternoon. Father Vittorzi, who is one of the prisoners, at the conclusion of the evidence of the informer Abbatemaggio, challenged Vittorzi to swear on the crucifix that he had not lied in his evidence denouncing the Cammorristi. Abbatemaggio put the crucifix to his lips and kissed it and swore he had told the truth. Vittorzi became livid with rage and cursed the informer in Latin. The court became uproarious, and by order of the Judges the carabinieri removed Father Vittorzi from the room until his passion was subdued.

FRANCE GETS A WARNING

Germany Intimates That Trouble May Follow

THREE CRUISERS SENT

Little Diplomatic Row is on Over the Despatch of French Troops to the Vicinity of Fez in Morocco.

to the south and the Queen Charlotte group. The Queen Charlottes have millions of acres of agricultural land; millions upon millions of feet of the best timber; coal and oil and minerals that will astonish the world. Three waterways cut through, with tides that afford transportation unequalled, and why are we making no progress simply because the 'provident' government of this country cares only for the 'dollars' that find their way into the treasury and only assists those who aid them in retaining office.

How Money is Wasted

"The year that has passed will show how the Lands and Works Department 'aided' the settler in the expenditure of public funds. Between the two principal towns there is an almost impassable trail—along the beach. Further up the Inlet—at a place known as Queenstown—there is a trail that is also in a bad state of repair. Instead of building a good road between the two places it was considered 'advisable' to spend \$4,000 on a short road running to the purchased land of three individuals, and non-residents. There is not one building, or clearing along this road, and it leads into a muskeg swamp. Over this road went the member for the district and the Chief Commissioner, and the wonder is that they did not 'stick' in it and remain there. True they stopped further operations; but why the expenditure at all, when other sections required trails and roads.

Settler Gets no Chance

It is possible that the argument will be used that there are thousands of acres still available on the Queen Charlotte group of islands. Where are they located? At the present time no man of sense will locate away from the waterways. The timber and brush that one must pass through is almost enough to break the heart of a 'cruiser.' There are no roads, with the exception of the \$4,000 'fiasco.' Trails there are none worthy of the name. Along the east coast of Graham Island, where the largest number of settlers are located, the food is 'packed' along the beach. It is only there the 'speculator' found no timber to stake, and coal claims are plastered on the posts along the shore line.

Speculators Paradise

Is it any wonder if the prospective settler leaves the group of islands a disgusted man? Not one sawmill running. No coal claims being developed. No land accessible through the blundering of a paternal government. Roads and trails there are none; yet this paradise that awaits but the advent of population, is given over to the speculator and to enrich the growing treasury at the capital.

Revenue Over \$500,000

'It is not too much to ask that some unprejudiced man be sent to the Queen Charlotte group to examine into and report on the condition of affairs. There is a country at your very doors which is capable of supplying your market with all the requisites of living. With a forest and stream wealth that is unsurpassed; the ground and climate to support hundreds of thousands of people; with waterways unequalled for the purpose of conveying produce to the open sea, and all comparatively unknown. Producing a revenue to the government that exceeds the half million mark, yet

without roads or trails for the few located thereon.

Is This Right?

"Such is the condition on the islands at your door. Such will be the condition until the government and speculator have secured for themselves and their friends 'everything in sight.' It is an era of speculation and intrigue—where the poor must grow poorer and the rich become richer, despite the fact that the masses 'govern.' It is time all of the people understood the motto of the late President Lincoln who said: 'You cannot fool all of the people all of the time.' 'Vote buying' and 'vote catching' is not governing and the sooner the people wake up to their responsibilities, the sooner the present system will be obliterated.

FOREST FIRE IS RAGING

Prince Albert District Is Threatened
