PENSIONS

Some time ago several municipalities passed resolutions recommending the paying of equal pensions to all Canadian soldiers, and now the Liberals of Eastern Ontario, in concluding their recent convention, have passed a resolution recommending that equal pensions be paid to all Canadian soldiers, irrespective of rank.

Such a plan should appeal strongly to every Canadian. Whether the Canadian soldier is a major or a private, he has made an equal sacrifice. Each man who has offered all he had to offer in the service of his country in the present crisis is entitled to the same consideration at the hands of his fellow-countrymen. The fact that one man holds a higher rank than another entitles the man of rank to a higher remuneration in the service, but, when it comes to recompense for services rendered, a man should not be considered as a colonel, captain or private, but simply as a Canadian who has offered everything, to life itself, in defence of his country against a common foe. The difference in rank is very often simply the result of the one having friends and opportunity while the other was content to shoulder his rifle and do the hard grubbing. Rank is entitled to its reward, but that reward is received during active service and, when that is over, each is simply a Canadian who has offered his life to his country. No life should be considered of more value than another. When the ribbons and braid of the uniform have been discarded and the men return to civilian life, each man is the
