HOSPITAL SHIP BRITANNIC SUNK IN AEGEAN

AUSTRIAN EMPEROR DEAD -- GERMANS AGAIN ADVANCING IN TRANSYLVANIA

BRITANNIC I SUNK AND FIFTY LIVES ARE LOST

Huge Hospital Ship Sunk in the Aegean Sea—Allies Carry All Before Them in Macedonia.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 23.—The White Star Line steamship Britannic, the third largest vessel ever built, which was used by the British War Office as a hospital ship, has been sunk in the Aegean Sea, fifty lives being lost. The Britannic was on her way to Saloniki with nurses and hospital attendants for the Allied base on the Balkan front.

Macedonian Gains.
Saloniki, Nov. 23.—The Entente Allies continue to successfully drive home their attacks against the German and Bulgarian forces on the Macedonian front. Following the evacuation of Monastir, fresh German troops were rushed to this front but the reinforcements were driven back along with the rest. Along the whole Macedonian front, the Allied attacks are meeting with success. Paralova and Dobiermir have been captured.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT PROTECTS FOOD SUPPLY

Paris, Nov. 23.—The French cabinet has decided that the French people shall have two meatless days each week, Tuesday and Friday, while it has also passed a measure prohibiting the making of pastry and fancy cakes in order to conserve the food supplies of the nation.
The Chamber of Deputies has passed an order calling for a census of all 1918 conscripts to be taken at once.

AGED EMPEROR NOW OFFICIALLY REPORTED DEAD

Franz Josef Died Two Days Ago—Italy Interested in New Ruler—Belgian King Appeals to the Pope.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Vienna, Nov. 23.—It is officially announced that Franz Josef, the aged Emperor of Austria-Hungary, is dead. The heir apparent, Archduke Charles Franz Josef, assumed the guidance of state affairs automatically two days ago. It is not likely that there will be any festivities of any kind in connection with the beginning of the reign of the new Emperor until after the conclusion of the war.

Italy Interested.
Rome, Nov. 23.—In connection with the death of the Emperor Franz Josef, attention here is being called to the fact that the Archduke Charles Franz Josef is married to an Italian.

Wilson Condolences.
Washington, Nov. 23.—President Wilson has sent a message of condolence to the new ruler of Austria-Hungary.

Belgian Appeal.
Paris, Nov. 23.—The King of the Belgians has written to President Wilson, Alphonso of Spain and the Pope asking for intervention on behalf of the thousands of Belgians who are being deported to Germany to labor for the enemies of Belgium.

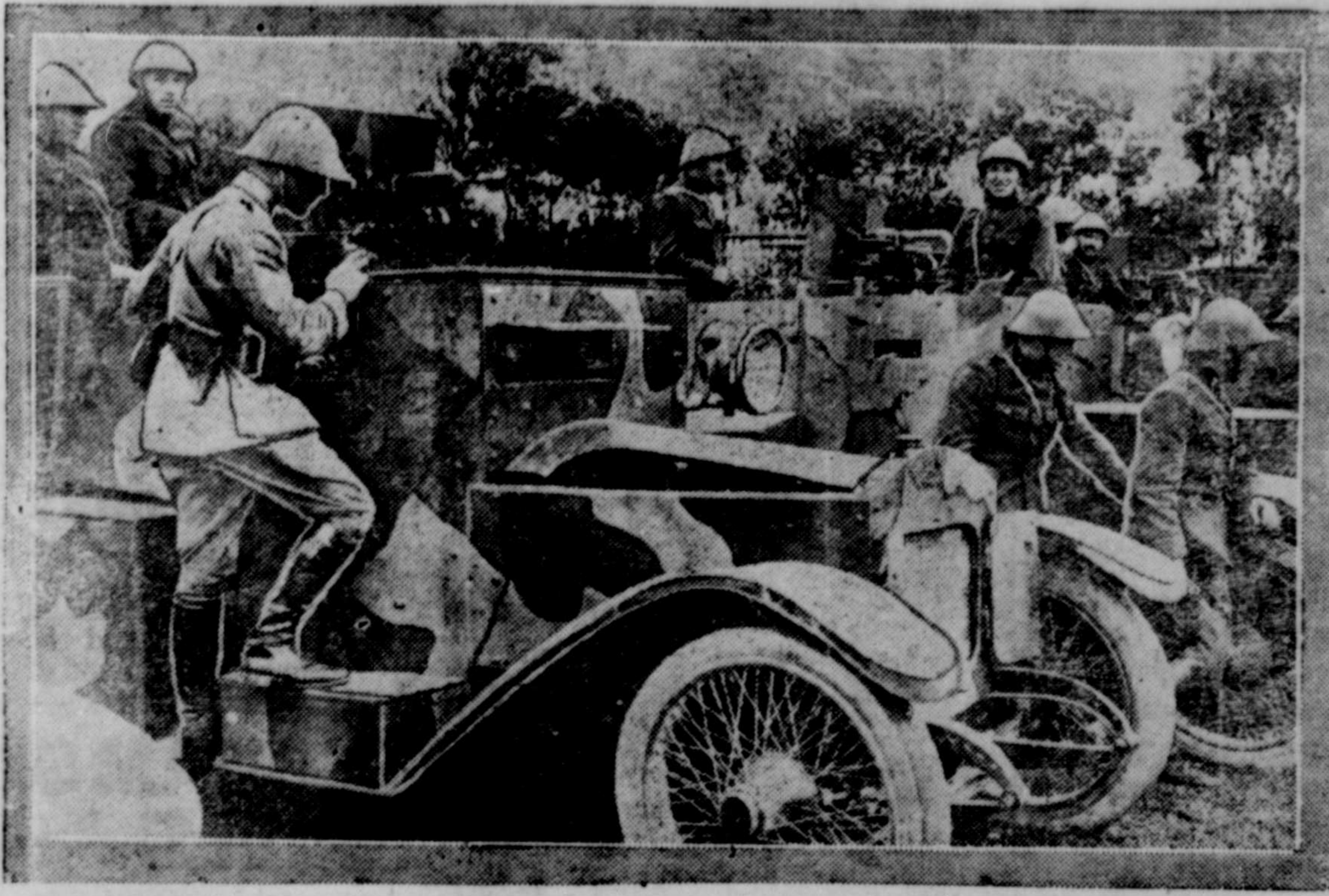
RORVIG FISH CO. VS. CANADIAN SURETY CO.

This afternoon in the Supreme Court, Mr. Justice Morrison heard the case of The Rorvig Fish Company, Ltd., v. Canadian Surety Company, Ltd. John Dybhavn, for the plaintiffs, stated that in the fall of 1914 they entered into an agreement with H. McGinnis, of Winnipeg, to take orders for fish for the Rorvig Company. In the spring of 1915, a new arrangement was made whereby Mr. McGinnis was to handle shipments of fish for the plaintiffs and to make collections for them, keeping a warehouse at his own expense. Under the new arrangement, he furnished a bond through the Canadian Surety Co. The relationship between the agent and the company terminated on November 30, 1915, and the Rorvig Company claim that the agent has failed to account for \$1,326 collected for the plaintiffs.

L. W. Patmore is appearing for the plaintiffs and A. M. Manson is acting for Alfred Carss, agent for the defendant company.

JACK LONDON DIES NEAR SANTA ROSA

Santa Rosa, Cal., Nov. 23.—Jack London, the world-famous novelist and Socialist reformer, died at his Glen Ellen ranch yesterday morning of uremic poisoning. He was ill only a few hours. The doctors state that the cause of death was poisoning, as the result of wrong dieting.
Mr. London was known as the tramp author and made several fortunes by his writings and just as often was reduced to bankruptcy. He was a contributor to most of the popular magazines and wrote several novels which have been read the world over. One of his latest was John Barleycorn, which was really his own autobiography.

DEATH HAS REMOVED DISTINGUISHED JUDGE

Toronto, Nov. 23.—Sir John Alexander Boyd, Chancellor and President of the High Court of Justice, died here today at the age of 79. Before being promoted to the bench many years ago, Sir John had a most distinguished career as a lawyer. He was the oldest member of the Supreme Court bench in Ontario.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN NEWSPAPER CASE

Mr. Justice Morrison yesterday afternoon reserved judgment in the case of Coyle v. McNeil. Mrs. Coyle and W. Croteau gave evidence in support of the claims of the plaintiff. Joe Bourgon testified to the fact that Mr. McNeil bought in the plant for Coyle.

J. L. Christie, book-keeper for Mr. McNeil, produced the books of the defendant showing Mr. Coyle's account. There was no entry in the books in Coyle's account in connection with the purchase of the plant at Aldermere. He testified to having assisted at the drawing up of an agreement protecting Mr. McNeil from any suit for wages by an employee of plaintiff's against Mr. McNeil as owned of the plant. When Coyle told him that he intended to move the plant, witness said that he could not do that without first paying for the plant. Coyle said he was not going to state in Aldermere and that he would take the plant. On the following Saturday Coyle loaded up the plant and witness stopped him from taking it away. Witness told him that he could only have the plant on payment of \$250 in cash.

J. J. McNeil testified to having purchased the plant at Aldermere at a sheriff's sale. There were other bidders. He bought the plant with the exception of the gasoline engine. Joe Bourgon, who bid on the plant, wanted to buy from him the press. He ultimately sold to McDougall and Rymes the army press and enough equipment to run a paper at Endako.

Coyle came to him and asked him what he was going to do with the plant, and urged him to let him run the plant as he had a wife to support. This he agreed to do, reserving the right to dispose of the plant as he saw fit. Coyle assisted in the shipping of the part of the plant bought by McDougall. Later he drew up the agreement with Coyle releasing him from any possibility of a claim for wages. There was no (Continued on Page Two)

MAYOR M'CAFFERY WILL AGAIN ACCEPT OFFICE

Interviewed by The Daily News this morning as to the probability of his again running for mayor, M. P. McCaffery said that, so far as his own business interests are concerned, he would much rather that someone else should take up the reins of office. He felt, however, that in view of the fact that he has three projects in hand which will, if completed, materially affect the future welfare of the city, he is in duty bound to assume the responsibility of the mayoralty for another year.

"I appreciate the fact that the people have reposed in me their utmost confidence," said the mayor, "and that they provided a council which has backed me up splendidly. If the citizens feel that they want me to remain in office for another term, and if they will elect a strong council to assist me in the carrying on of the business of the city, I shall again place my services at their disposal."

TEUTONS GAIN MORE GROUND IN ALT VALLEY

Rumanians Retreating—Russians On the Offensive in Kimpolung Region—Russians Defeat Turks.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 23.—The Austro-Germans are continuing their offensive in the Wallachian region in the Carpathians and the Rumanians are still retreating. The Teutonic forces have gained more ground in the Alt Valley, having made advances on both banks of the River Alt. They have also advanced in Rothenthurm Pass sector.

The Russians have started a strong offensive in the Kimpolung district where the Germans and Austrians have been making desperate efforts to break through. The French have scored a success in heavy fighting along the west bank of Lake Presba.

The Russians have repulsed considerable forces of Turks in Persia, inflicting heavy losses upon the enemy.

The Anore.
British Headquarters, Nov. 23. (Official) The enemy's artillery is very active to the right of the new British front formed along the south bank of the Anore after the recent successful drive. Enemy patrols have made several attempts to cross the river but have failed.

NAVAL RECRUITING

The appointment of a citizens' naval recruiting committee in this city on Tuesday evening is destined to be a most important step. Such a movement is on foot throughout Canada, but nowhere will it be pursued more enthusiastically than on the Pacific coast, and particularly in the young port of Prince Rupert. Never before has the importance of naval supremacy been so clearly demonstrated as in the present war. One trembles to think what would have been the fate of the Empire today had not the navy been ready on August 4th, 1914. Silently and relentlessly the navy is still carrying on its great work of safeguarding our trade routes; conveying troops across the ocean, and protecting our armies and their supplies during transportation to the countries where fighting is going on. The navy is the Empire's watch dog and police force combined.

To an island kingdom like Britain, an invincible navy is absolutely essential, and it is beginning to be realized that naval protection is just as important to the long Pacific coastline of Canada as it is to the British Isles. The immediate field of the fleet is in European waters, but the time was, and may be again, when battleships were urgently needed on this coast.

The sending of recruits to the navy from Canada will create a personal interest in the fleet which does not exist at present. Every eye is focussed on the doings of the Grand Fleet in the North Sea, to be sure, but that fleet is something in which Canadians in general have no active in-

terest. True, Prince Rupert, in Lieut. Peters, has provided one of the heroes of the Royal Navy in the present war, and the interest which has been taken in the doings of this gallant officer and his vessel goes to show just what would happen if this city were more fully represented in the navy. This personal interest is of the utmost importance, and had Canada possessed a fleet, named after the different provinces probably, and manned by Canadians, our citizens would have followed the fleet movements with a more acute and intimate interest than they have done.

When the war is over, one of the questions of first importance will be the protection of this coast, as well as the Atlantic seaboard. "Defence, Not Defiance" is our motto, and for the defence of our shores a navy must spring up. The men who will go out to join Canada's volunteer navy in the next few weeks will return to our shores imbued with the great traditions of the British Navy, and the blood of sea-going forefathers will have been stirred in their veins. There are many sturdy boys growing up in Prince Rupert. They come mostly of the old sea-faring stock, and every one of them is an embryo sailor. Just as soon as they have learned to toddle, they have made the acquaintance of the sea and love of the sea has been born in them, which they will never lose. Right in this city there is the foundation for a portion of our Pacific fleet of the future, and it may be that Prince Rupert, the namesake of an ancient warrior, will one day produce a Drake; a Nelson, or a Beresford.

trouble until the fall of 1915 when Coyle suggested the moving of the plant to Smithers. McNeil said he could only do that on paying what the plant was worth and also what he owed the store. He then left for the coast. On his return he found the printing press on a wagon near his store. He gave instructions that the goods be removed to his warehouse. Coyle had already taken a load of goods to Smithers. Coyle refused to go to check up the articles. Defendant denied that he ever had any arrangement to buy in the plant for Coyle.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Patmore, defendant denied absolutely ever having made any arrangement with Dr. Wallace as to buying in the plant for Coyle. Mr. Coyle was recalled in regard to the holding up of the plant and Mr. Christie's asking him to state a price.

A. M. Manson submitted that the evidence of the plaintiff showed that Mr. McNeil was the actual purchaser of the plant. He submitted that, taking the plaintiff's contention that McNeil bought the plant in for him, it was not shown that plaintiff ever made any effort to purchase back the plant.

L. W. Patmore contended that the evidence of two independent witnesses showed that Mr. McNeil was to buy in the plant. Coyle giving his ranch papers as security. He submitted that the fact that \$200 worth of paper was bought in for \$42 was additional proof that the goods were bought in for Coyle. He submitted that the part of the plant which was sold for \$275 to McDougall and Rymes was not part of the plant sold by the sheriff.

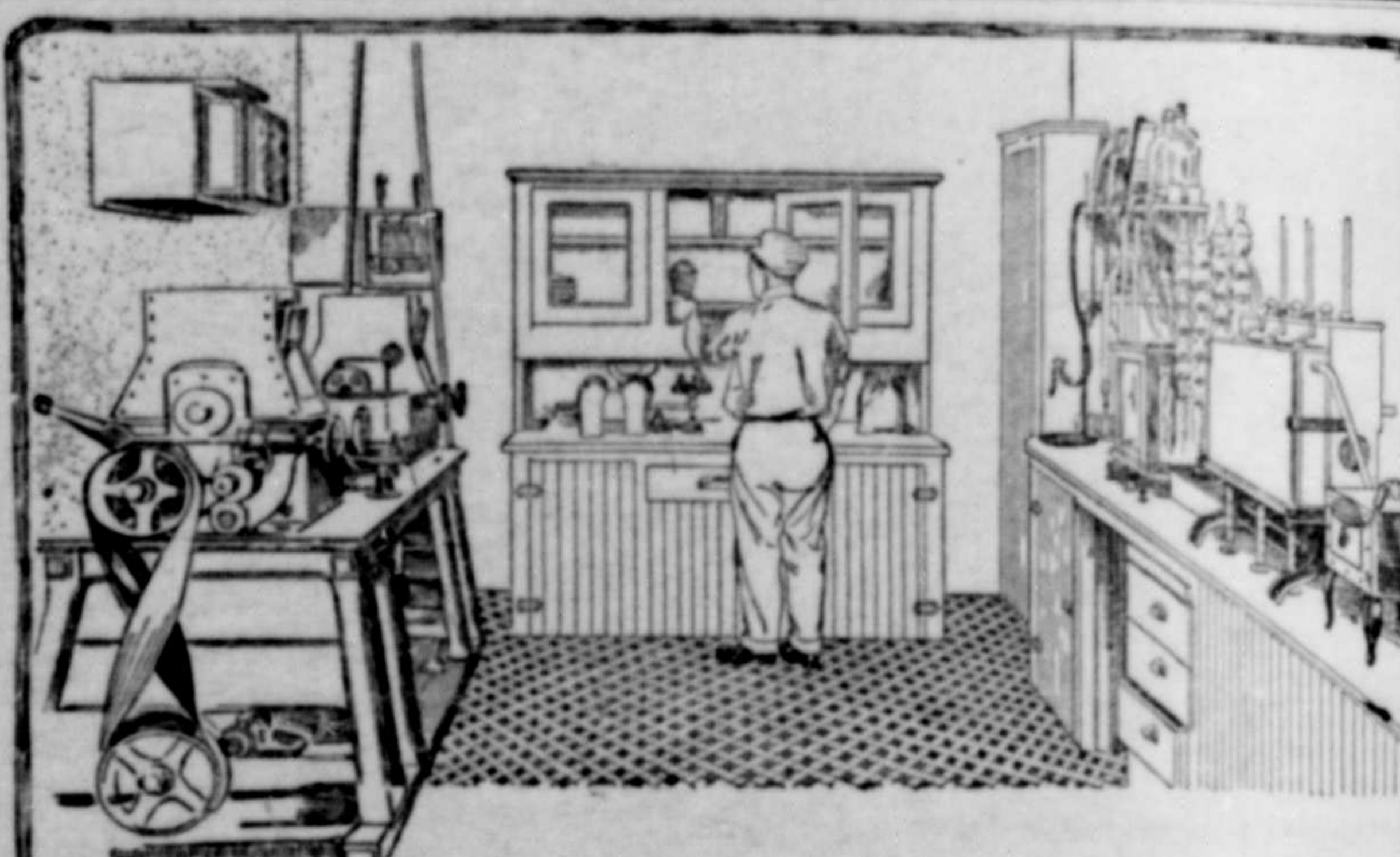

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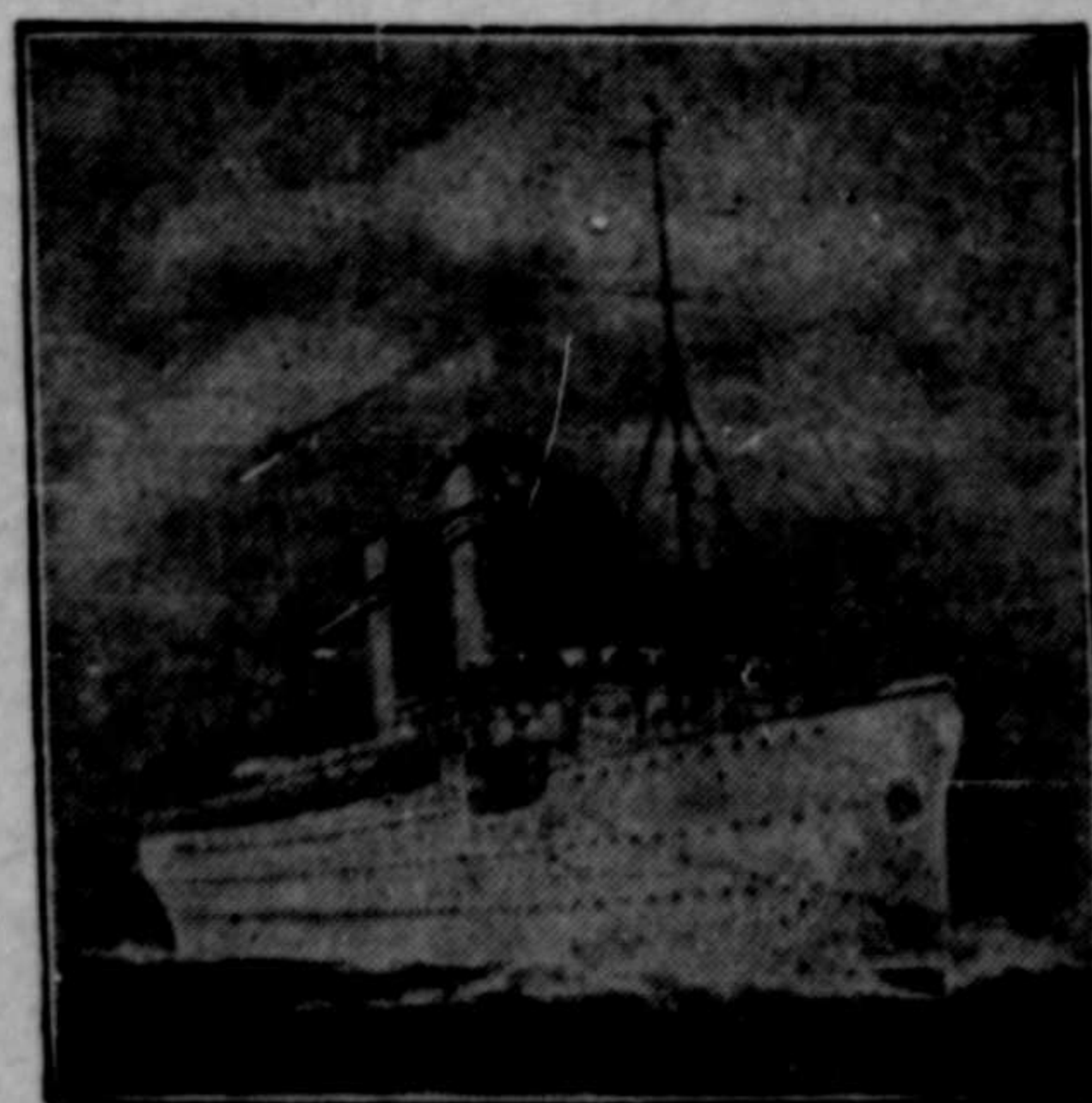

FROM FAR AND NEAR

Mrs. R. E. Gosse has passed away in Vancouver. The sympathy of Captain Gosse's many friends in the north will be extended to him in his bereavement. Mrs. Gosse, like her husband, was one of the pioneers of the coast, coming to Vancouver from Newfoundland in 1887.

F. P. Gutelius, manager of government railways, is planning to co-ordinate the efforts of the railway and shipping companies with regard to trans-Atlantic transportation during the winter.

Ottawa will no longer endeavor to raise new battalions for overseas but will devote its energies to the gathering of reinforcements for battalions now overseas. The fame of the battalion is being substituted for the popularity of the colonel.

The Vancouver Province publishes a report that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will shortly visit the coast along with Hon. Wm. Pugsley and Hon. George P. Graham. There is no official confirmation of the report.

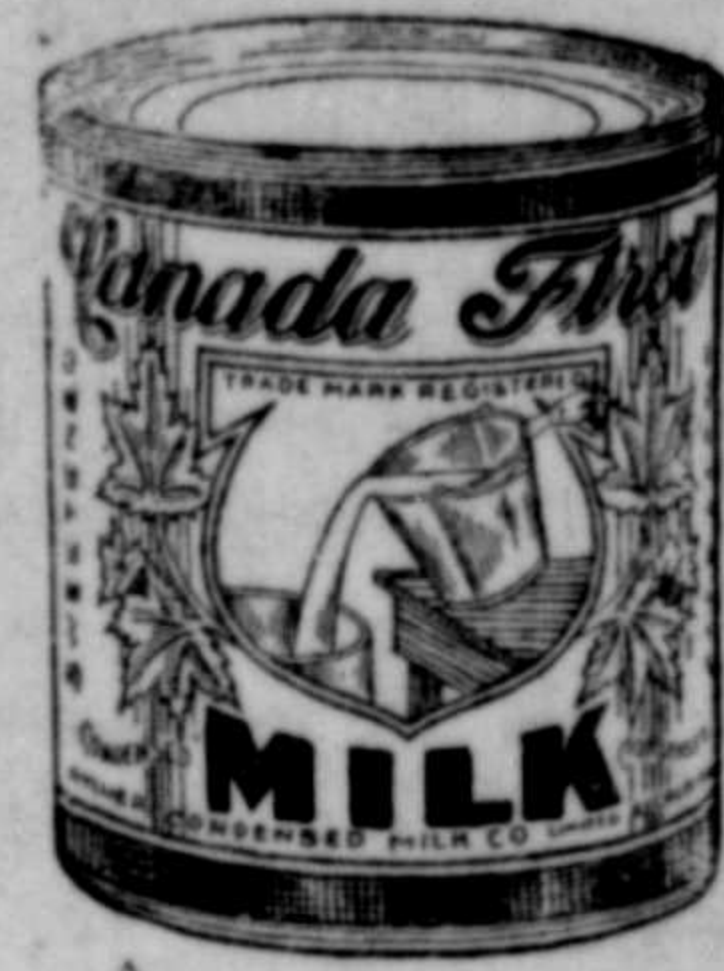

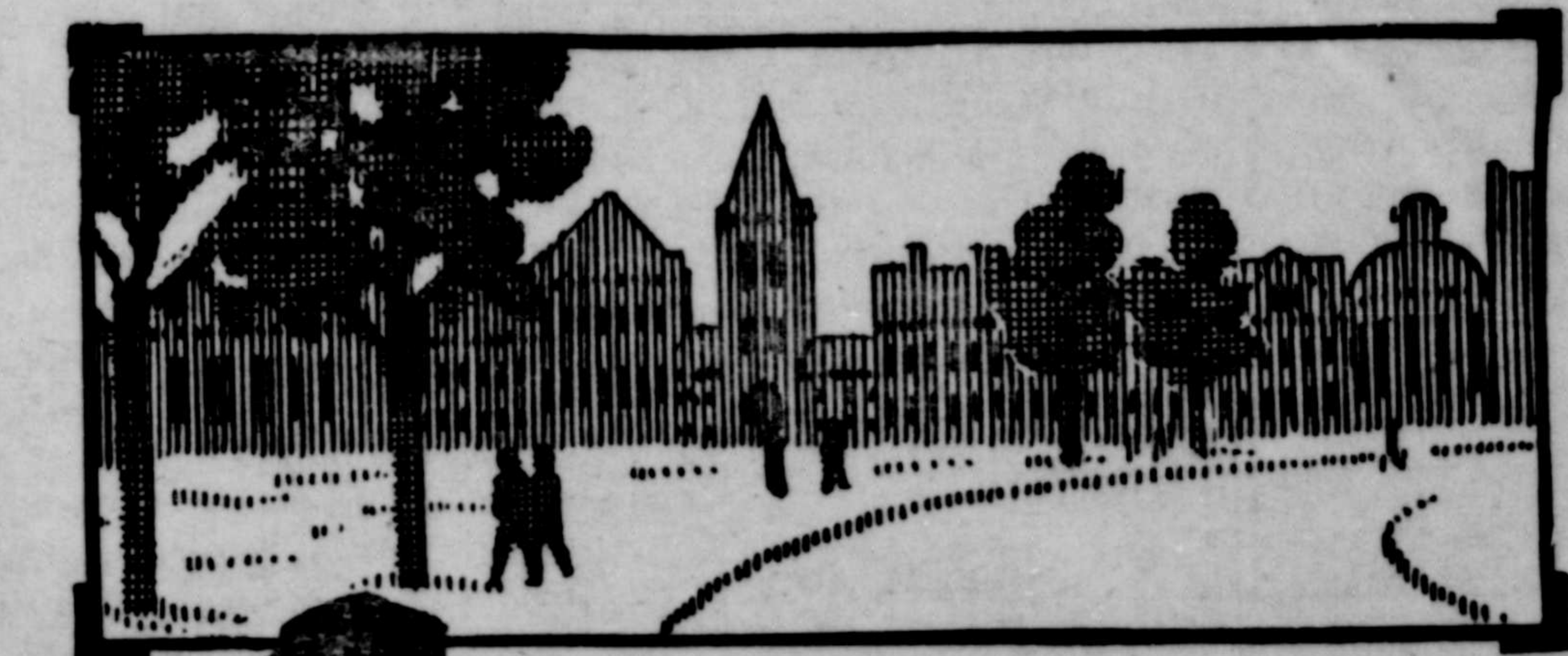
