LIBERALS ARE PREPARING FOR GENERAL ELECTION

BUSH FIRES ARE REPORTED ALL OVER THE DOMINION

Settlers in Manitoba and Saskatchewan Escape Only With Their Lives---Gale is Raging and Fire Area is Growing---Bridges Burned and Towns Threatened---Women and Children Fight Fire All Night at Rainy River---Fires in Nova Scotia.

(Canadian Press Dispatch)
 Dauphin, Manitoba, May 9.—The brush fires are spreading. Everything here is as dry as tinder, and with a high gale, which has raged all night the situation looks very grave for the whole district. The flames have now got a grip on a large area, and many settlers have been forced to flee from their homes, for fear of being cut off by the flames.

Two Towns in Danger
 The towns of Mafeking and Hudson Bay Junction were threatened during the night, but every available man was centred to save them, and the danger is now passed. A cordon of cleared land is now round the towns. The inhabitants of the district are trusting to get reinforcements.

A Scene of Desolation
 Winnipeg, May 9.—Serious reports were received here from the fire areas in the east and the north. Settlers in the north part of Manitoba and in Saskatchewan are reported to have lost everything. Railway bridges have been

burned down, miles of telegraph poles and lines destroyed, and many small towns and large saw-mills along the route of the Canadian Northern are in great danger.

Place is Doomed
 The last message from the East this morning said that the Rainy River district at Canyon Lake near the international boundary is doomed. All night long, men, women and children, were out fighting the flames. No fires were reported to be springing up in other districts from sparks carried by the gales.

Aylesford is Fire-swept
 Aylesford, Nova Scotia, May 9.—Fanned by a strong westerly wind, fire swept through this village last evening, destroying fully one-third of the buildings. So fierce was its progress that very few of the inhabitants had time to save their household effects which were destroyed in the flames. The Dominion Atlantic Express which forced its way through the fire belt, caught fire in two places, the flames sweeping over the track.

ON THEIR WAY TO PLAN TOWN OF NEW HAZELTON

Party of Surveyors Under Mr. F. C. Green Left for Upper River Points this Morning—Townsite is the Property of Mr. Robert Kelly—Will Soon be on the Market

In charge of a party of ten assistants Mr. F. C. Green, civil engineer and B. C. land surveyor, left here this morning for New Hazelton, the new townsite bought a few weeks ago by Robert Kelly of the firm of Kelly, Douglas & Co., Vancouver, to survey and prepare plans of the proposed railroad division point. It is hoped to have the plans ready for registration within thirty days so that the townsite can be put on the market at the end of that time.

Some time ago Mr. Kelly purchased 640 acres at New Hazelton for a townsite for several thousands of dollars for investment purposes and some of his friends have a good deal of the land adjacent to the one square mile he owns.

According to the plans filed by the G. T. P., New Hazelton will be the railway hub in that district, Hazelton, the old original, is not on the main line and the new offspring looks as if it will some day be a fair sized town.

It is not yet known who will have the sale of the lots in New Hazelton for Mr. Kelly, but it is understood that several real estate men of this city and of Vancouver have approached him and made tempting offers to have the exclusive agency.

TENDERS FOR POLES

Contract Awarded to Charles R. Anderson

Tenders for a supply of poles of various lengths for use in city sewer maintenance as piles, were opened at last night's council, and the contract awarded to Charles R. Anderson whose prices were as follows: 16-ft. poles 4 cents per foot; 18-ft. 3 3-4 cents per foot; 12-ft. 4 cents and 14-ft. 4 cents.

Other bids were from G. R. Mulvey & Co., prices 5 1-2 cents, 6, 5 1-2, and 5 1-2 cents per foot respectively for lengths as above. J. H. Pillsbury and another bid 6 3-4 cents per foot straight.

Supreme Court in Rupert

J. P. McLeod, Deputy Attorney General has written to the Mayor in reference to the holding of a Supreme Court at Prince Rupert saying that owing to the absence of the Attorney General this matter can hardly be looked into until the fall. The letter was received and filed.

Convenient for Workers

On pay days—about the fifth of each month, in future, the City Hall will be open until 6 p.m. for the convenience of workers who are engaged on jobs distant from the City Hall. The motion to this effect was made by Alderman Kerr, seconded by Alderman Clayton and carried last night.

TOO SOON TO TALK TAXES

Says Mayor Manson to Ald. Morrissey

SINGLE TAX OR WHAT?

General Impression in the City That Improvements are to be Taxed. What About Election Promises? Mayor Manson's Advice.

Is the council going to tax improvements? Alderman Morrissey declares that there is a general impression in the city that it is. And this, he thinks, is contrary to the platform laid down at the election. Mayor Manson said at last night's council meeting that while it was up to every alderman to adhere to his own election promises, the time is not ripe yet for the discussion of the council's taxation policy. After the Court of Revision has been held on June 5th will be time enough to discuss the single or other tax policy.

The Mayor reminded the City Clerk of the Court of Revision. Four aldermen have to be selected to sit on this court. The selection will be made later.

DANGEROUS TO TEAMS

Always under Repair but Never Really Repaired. Can City Take Matter in Hand? Streets Committee Investigating It.

Wear and tear on the plankway from Sixth Street to the G. T. P. wharf known as Centre street, has gone to a ruinous extent. Alderman Newton is alarmed about it. The city keeps a man continuously on the job repairing this dilapidated plankway. All the G. T. P. does is to supply 6 x 4 lumber to replace old planks. Teams have to go gingerly along the plankway, and it bristles with "danger posts" stuck in holes that happen in it, like a skating pond in a thaw. There is hope for it, however. The streets committee has to consider the matter.

BIG SUMS ARE VOTED TO DEVELOP COAST DISTRICT

New Fisheries Cruiser to Cost \$75,000---Improvements at Naden Harbor and at Stewart are Passed---Dominion Government Starts to Administer that \$30,000,000 Surplus---To Benefit the Whole Dominion

CONTRACTOR GETS EXTRA

Ten Per Cent More Allowed Weston

ALD. CLAYTON KICKS

Says Weston Has Had Favors Enough Already. His Team Kept All Winter and \$300 a Month. No Discussion.

During the winter Messrs. J. G. Weston Bros. contracted to team lumber for the city at \$2.00 per 1000 ft. Now owing to the higher wages available since work is plentiful they are unable to fulfil their contract at the price. They ask 20 cents more. At last night's council Alderman Morrissey moved that the increase be granted. Alderman Clayton moved the opposite saying that the Messrs. Weston had already had favors enough from the city—a team of their horses had been kept at city expense at the fire hall for three months and Weston had been paid \$300 a month for the horses. This was not pressed far. Mayor Manson put Alderman Morrissey's motion without further discussion and it was carried.

Ratcatcher and Rat Counter

T. Reed has been appointed official Ratcatcher for Prince Rupert at a salary of \$60 per month and 25 cents per dozen rats caught. The rats will be counted by the sanitary inspector.

 Ottawa, May 9.—Lavish expenditures for public works all over the Dominion were provided for this morning in the supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year. Altogether they total to \$17,020,980, bringing the total estimates for the year to the record sum of \$156,239,180.

What B. C. Gets
 Among the expenditures provided for British Columbia are \$5,000 for harbor improvements at Naden Harbor in the Queen Charlotte Islands; \$2,400 for additions to the Government wharf at Stewart on the Portland Canal; and \$75,000 for a new fisheries protection cruiser for the Pacific Coast fisheries.

More Railways
 Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways, gave notice of a resolution to guarantee the bonds of the C. N. R. for a proposed new line between Montreal and Port Arthur, at a rate of \$35,000 a mile, being approximately \$2,535,500 with interest at 3 1-2 per cent.

May Mean Election
 The large expenditure—an increase of nearly \$45,000,000 over the estimates for last year is looked on in some quarters as a certain indication that the Government intends to go to the country at an early date. This was intensified by the statement of a high government official who is reported as having said this morning: "There will be a general election in Canada before Christmas, if the Opposition clings to its intention to obstruct reciprocity after the parliamentary adjournment is ended."

SEARCHING FOR WRECK

 Victoria, May 9.—Though divers have been busy for a week, and a large number of men have been dragging the scene, no trace can be found of the steamer Iroquois which was lost off Sidney harbor on April 10th. A reward of \$200 has been offered for information as to the location of the wreck.

RICHES OF HIDDEN CREEK ARE TO BE EXPLOITED

Capt. Nicholson of the G. T. P. Made a Special Trip on the Prince Albert Last Night to Arrange for Transportation Facilities—Prince Rupert to Benefit

It is learned that the result of the visit of Mr. J. G. Graves, president of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company of Grand Forks and Phoenix, B. C., and his party of engineers to the mines at Hidden Creek, which the company have big interests in, is more gratifying than was expected. The party brought back such glowing reports of the richness of the gold, copper and silver ore when they returned on Sunday that Captain Nicholson, manager of the G. T. P. steamships, Mr. O. B. Smith, manager of the company and a party of miners left here last night on the S. S. Prince Albert for Observatory Inlet.

Makes a Special Trip

This is a special trip the Albert is making. Captain Nicholson will look over the proposition and make what arrangements he deems necessary for transportation facilities.

At present the snow is rather thick around the mines and the miners taken up there last night will be first put to work to clear the beautiful out of the way and then prepare things for working the mines on a big scale.

Prince Rupert to Benefit

Just where the smelting plant will be established, should the results warrant one, is as yet undecided. It will be either here or at the mines. In any case Prince Rupert will benefit greatly, because it is planned to ship all the ore through here to the east

to get it on the market as quickly as possible.

Will Return Again Soon

Mr. Graves will be back again shortly and will then be in a position to state officially what course the company will take. Several engineers are now up at the mines making big preparations for pushing development this summer.

LIGHT SIGN LIKED

But No Sign Must Project More Than Four Feet

Fire Chief McInnis, now also Building Inspector, generally admires the new electric sign proposed for the Phoenix Theatre. But he cannot approve of its being placed so as to extend more than 4 feet over the street. He recommends that the sign be placed on the roof of the theatre. Alderman Clayton likes the idea of electric signs. They mean a bright city and revenue for the light plant.

STABLE TO STAND

By a report of the health committee adopted by the city council last night the stable erected within 20 feet of residences on property of Mr. Gibson, and occupied by the Pony Express Co.'s horses, is to be allowed to remain where it is. It must be kept in sanitary condition, and the health committee recommended that all stables in town be subject to rigorous enforcement of the sanitary regulations.

CHINA INSTALS DECIMAL COINAGE SYSTEM

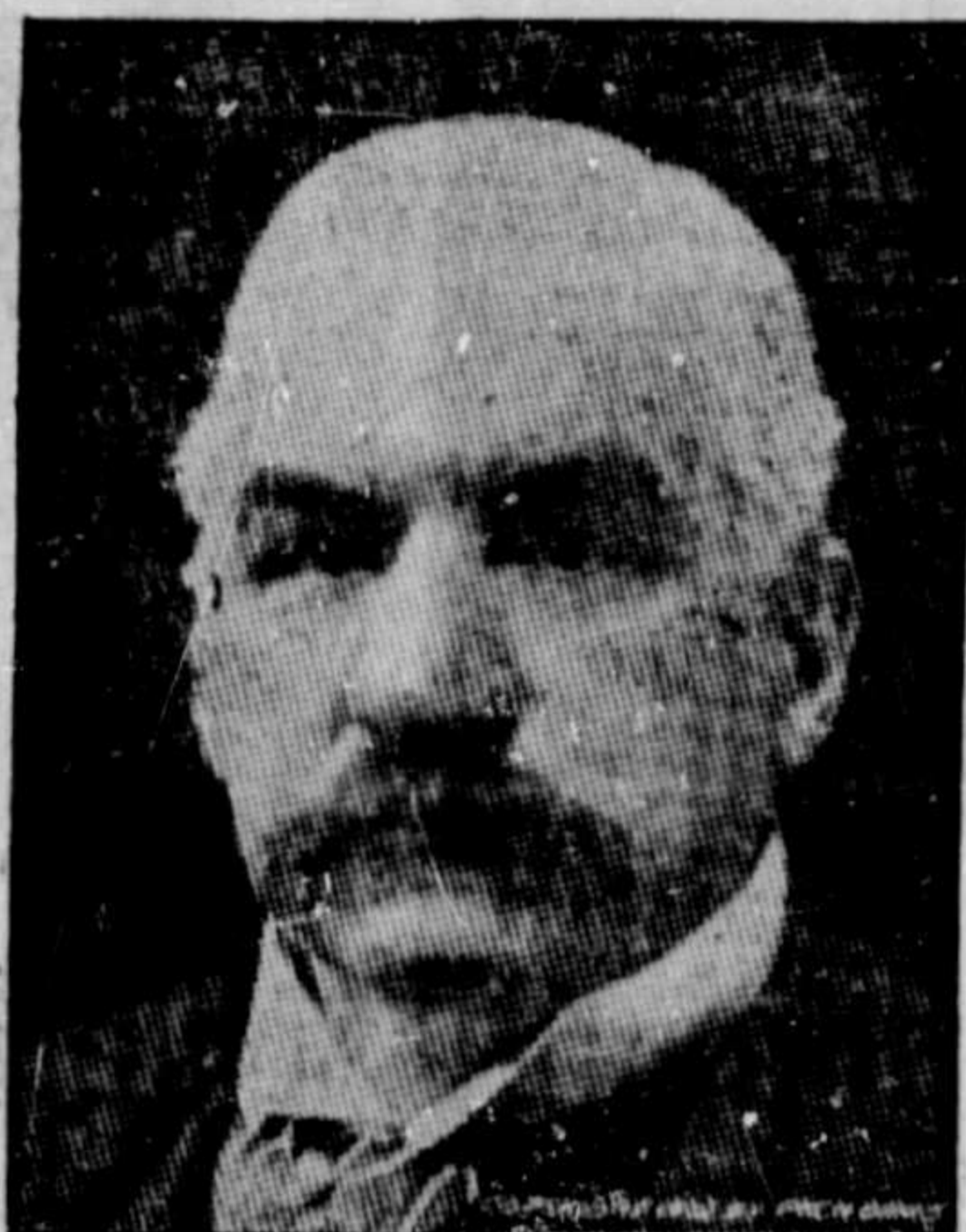
Secures Loan of \$50,000,000 from United States, British, German and French Bankers—An Agreement to Change Currency to Modern Standards Was Part of Agreement—Boon to Merchants and Bankers

(Special to the Daily News)

Washington, D. C., May 9.—With the recent signatures of the contract for the loan of \$50,000,000 to China by American, British, German, and French bankers, the death knell of the most hopelessly confused currency in the world was sounded. Foreigners residing in, or doing business with China breathed a great sigh of relief, as the loan is to end a most vexatious obstacle to the transaction of business.

China agrees, as part of the contract, to install a currency system worthy of the name. Until the eighties of the last century, China had no silver coinage. The copper, or more properly, the brass cash, was the only national coin. The copper, or more properly, the brass cash, was the only national coin. Silver was used in the lump by weight, the unit of weight being known to foreigners as the tael (an Indian term) and to the Chinese as the liang, the equal, roughly speaking, to 1 1-3 ounces avoirdupois.

The weight of the liang, how-

gan to mint dollar pieces, and there are some eight or ten varieties of these in circulation, all nominally of the value of a Mexican dollar, but in reality entirely lacking uniformity.

Added to these various dollars is that of the British crown colony, Hongkong, which is in use in a number of the ports. Several foreign banks doing business in China have issued paper notes, which have a limited circulation. Some of these are subject to discount if used outside the port of issue. All this has produced great confusion, and burdened trade with endless charges for exchange, and the difficulties have been increased by the fluctuation in the gold value of the silver.

The standard coin is to be of silver of the same weight and fineness as the Mexican dollar. The fractional pieces in silver will be the dime, the quarter, and the half dollar, and subsidiary coins in addition to these will be a nickel five-cent piece, and in copper the mill, five mill, one cent, and two cent piece.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE NEW ASSESSMENT

A closer study of the assessment for 1911, makes it appear an even more interesting document than at first appeared. Even without any statement of the figures for 1910 to compare it with, it was obviously an interesting document; placed side by side with the assessment for 1910, it becomes illuminative.

The assessment while totalling to practically the same amount as last year is made up in quite a different way. Some people will get surprised when they open their tax papers, and find how their properties have increased in value since March of last year.

The biggest surprise of all will be in the matter of the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company's property. Last year they escaped with an assessment totalling \$242,320. This year it has jumped to \$2,280,630. This is a matter upon which general approval will be expressed. That they should have got off with a nominal assessment on large and valuable pieces of property last year was a grievance. Even with a jump from \$242,320 to \$2,280,630 they are getting off very well. \$663,500 of the increase is accounted for by the removal of Section E from the railway company to the Development Company. The remainder is accounted for by assessing their holdings at cash value. Of their properties Section 3 escaped last year with an assessment of only \$10,339. This year it is placed at \$157,510. Section 9 is raised from \$29,650 to \$267,520. These sections while not as yet thrown open to the public for purchase, are being increased in value by the ratepayers in the other sections, and it is right they should pay rates on a figure nearer their cash value. A good test of whether a property is worth the cash assessment or not in the owner's eyes, is to know whether he is willing to sell at the price. The Development Company would have no difficulty in finding a buyer for Section 9 at \$267,520 or for Section 4 at \$263,250.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company on the other hand gets handsome reductions. Their property in Section 1 which last year was assessed at \$4,003,000 has been cut down to \$1,364,000. Allowance must be made, however, for the taking away of the piece of land known as Section E, which was assessed last year at \$433,500. This year it is charged up to the Development Company. But even with that allowance the company gets a large reduction.

In Section 2 the company has been equally fortunate. Its waterfrontage there, assessed last year at \$1,775,000 is now put at \$175,000, a reduction of \$1,600,000. Similarly the assessment for the waterfrontage on Section 7 has been reduced from \$1,500,000 to \$686,500. The only increase to the company is for the Section 6 waterfrontage which is increased from \$27,500 to \$327,000.

The net result of the new assessment is that the railway company gets a deduction on its assessment from \$7,291,500 to \$2,819,500, a matter of \$4,471,500. This deficit of \$4,471,500 has been made up by increasing the Development Company's assessments from a nominal to a cash value assessment and by increasing the assessment of the privately owned lots in the other sections. \$2,038,310 is thus to be made up by the Development Company and \$2,433,190 will be made up by the private citizens.

SKETCH OF EDITOR DAN

He is Bringing Charges Against Hon. Frank Oliver

IS WELL KNOWN

Dan McGillicuddy Has Been More or Less in the Limelight for the Past Ten Years.

Mr. Dan McGillicuddy, who figures in the charges against Hon. Frank Oliver has had a somewhat interesting career. Until about ten years ago he was editor and publisher of a lively weekly Liberal journal in Goderich. The famous West Huron by-election, the first in which "switched ballots" were distinctly traced, brought Mr. McGillicuddy first to general public attention. The official ballots were printed at his office, and he was called to explain. It was shown that he had no part in the fraud, but a tradition arose that he was the author of a campaign ballad beginning with the lines:

"Hurrah for Tarte,
So bright and smart."

Later on the Goderich editor added a dredging contract to his journalistic activities. Still later he introduced at Ottawa a simple and convenient analytical index to Hansard and for several sessions was employed in its compilation. Then the lure of the west took him to Calgary where he published a lively evening paper. The most notable achievement of this journal was its contest with the "Eye-Opener," a publication which had large command of language of denunciation and attack. It says something for editor Dan that he pushed this war to the point at which the editor of the "Eye-Opener" sued him for libel, which seemed to be a confession that Goderich man was ahead in the matter of language.

My good friends, the old-timers, always delight in pointing out to me new beauties and attractions in Prince Rupert. A couple of months ago while the snow was still deep on the ground they told me just to wait and see the humming birds here in the merry month of May. I was too busy trying to learn how to keep right end up on snow shoes at the back of a mountainous lot after dark, to believe them, but I made a mental note of it as "another yarn," and went on to discovering ways of doing the double shuffle backwards in a snowdrift.

Now the merry month of May has actually arrived, and sure as clockwork so have the humming birds. I have seen one. It was the first to reach Rupert. I saw it taking a hop round to look over some choice corner lots on McBride street. I watched the little rascal, hoping to hear it hum, but it didn't. They don't hum I am informed by the old-timers, except on special occasions, at weddings, and bridge parties, and when some one has just closed a big deal. How the humming is done the old timers do not explain, except vaguely.

Humming birds when hungry are very voracious. A well-known old-timer in Prince Rupert once owned a dog. It was the sort of dog which has the affectionate instincts of a lap dog combined with the substantial physical development of a bloodhound. It had engaging ways, was very playful, and always came home to its meals. One morning its master misad his pet. He called and whistled for it in vain. He advertised for it, got T-bone steaks put touching messages like "Return and all will be forgiven" on them with pins, and left them in likely places in the bush. The steaks vanished but the dog did not return. Its master grew anxious, and more anxious.

At last he could bear it no longer. He sallied forth into the vast and impenetrable bush with his trusty rifle upon his shoulder, and his never-failing six-shooter at his thigh. Deep into the dark glades of the gloomy forest he penetrated, far past the places where he had left the steaks with their pathetic unavailing messages. Towards evening just when he had all but given up the search he became aware of something faintly humming in the distance. "Aha, methinks I have a clue," he cried, and hid him on wards. He reached the fatal spot. There lay all that remained of his faithful Fido, a few big bones bare and white in the gloom of the bush. And with an ominous and awe-inspiring hum, up from that stripped skeleton there rose a fierce uncaged humming bird with a dangerous glitter in its wicked little eye. Homeward in haste went that old-timer mourning his dead dog. On his own humble lot in the Seal Cove District there stands a simple stone with the sad inscription: "In Memoriam. Fido. WOMAN'S CHIEFTEST CHARM

Twenty Thousand Men Vote for Goodness First

The idea that Frenchmen, especially residents of the city of Paris, have loose ideas about the marriage tie and womankind in general is dissipated through a unique newspaper test.

"What is the most excellent quality in woman?" a paper asked of its readers. The papers asked each person to name the ten virtues he prefers in woman. Sixty virtues have been named. The seven first have always been at the top of the poll since the beginning of the ballot, in the following order: goodness, orderliness, devotion, thrift, gentleness, intelligence and amiability.

This is a tribute to the essential solidity of the French people. First of all they ask for goodness and second for orderliness, in its women! The former virtue has scored 19,308 votes and the latter 18,470. The fact that devotion comes third, with 17,904 would tend to show that many of the voters are men.

It will startle some hasty judges of French character to find that only 2306 voters mentioned elegance as one of the ten most excellent things in women, which takes only the thirty-first place on the list. It will surprise everybody to learn that pride is asked for in women by only 528 voters, and that its place is fifty-second on the list. But perhaps the most instructive point of all is the sixtieth and last virtue, meekness for which only 96 men voted.

3,000,000 MILES OF SEA

Engineer Retires After 912 Voyages Across the Atlantic

Mr. J. W. Alexander, chief engineer of the Oceanic, and senior chief engineer on the White Star Company's service, who has just retired, has what must be a nearly unique record.

The whole of his seafaring career of thirty-eight and a half years has been spent in the White Star service. During that time he has crossed the Atlantic 912 times, travelling about 3,000,000 miles, and has never missed a voyage.

By a curious coincidence Mr. Alexander began and finished his career in vessels named Oceanic. He was chief engineer of the Britannic when that vessel took out the Imperial contingent of troops to Australia when the present King opened the Commonwealth Parliament.

Mr. Alexander, who is a native of Dundee, has just completed his fifty-ninth year.

The coronation of King George V. will, in all probability, be marked by a feature which no coronation of an English monarch has known before. It is proposed that a fleet of aeroplanes shall circle the towers of Westminster Abbey and greet the King and Queen on their arrival. Most of the British aviators will probably make the attempt, and it is certain that a similar demonstration will take place at Spithead, when the King attends the naval review. TWO BYLAWS ARE PASSED

Procedure and Regulation of Civic Officials' Duties

TWO ALDERMEN PUZZLED

Abolition of Old "Inquiry" System Grieves Ald. Newton; and Ald. Morrissey Labors under Misapprehensions of Procedure Laws.

Two by-laws passed their third reading last night after going through the stage of consideration in committee of the whole by the city council. These by-laws were the by-law regulating the duties of city officials, and Mayor Manson's Procedure By-law.

In the consideration of the first there was little or no discussion, but Aldermen Newton and Morrissey required a good deal of instruction from the Mayor while the clauses of the second were being gone over.

They were loth to relinquish the enquiry system which was a feature of proceedings under the old system. Mayor Manson's idea is to have enquiries made in writing and at least a day's notice of motions given by the use of a notice board at the City Hall. The Mayor said distinctly that he desired to restrict aldermen from rising in their seats and firing off little speeches that led to nothing definite but, reported in the press, gave the public the impression that the aldermen prone to the habit were taking a vital interest in many matters. He hinted rather pointedly that Alderman Newton's eloquence had inclined that way, and that there were others.

Alderman Morrissey was evidently laboring under the burdensome impression that it would be impossible under the new by-law to bring up an urgent matter without a day's delay. It certainly looked as if he were afraid that if the City Hall took fire the council would have to follow the rules of procedure to the bitter end before rising, even if they frizzled in their seats for it.

Eventually, however, by means of much patient explanation the Mayor got the mysteries of his new by-law into his henchmen's heads, and the by-law passed its third reading.

FIRE RISK INCREASED

By Want of Proper Access on Second Avenue

ASK FOR PLANKWAY

Residents Ready to Supply Labor if City Will Give Lumber. Council Appreciates Need, Streets Committee Lok into the Matter.

Residents of Second Avenue have petitioned for permission to construct a sidewalk between Seventh and Eighth streets. They wished to use the lumber taken off the streets during grading. It was pointed out by Alderman Morrissey that there is hardly any access possible to buildings in that vicinity now in case of fire owing to the state of the streets, and M. Soskin, one of the residents, made the similar statement. The Mayor remarked that the difficulty was the fact that these sidewalks have mostly been put in by residents at their own expense including lumber. The lumber asked for was in terms of grading contracts to be replaced by the contractor. The matter goes back to the streets committee which had already reported favoring the sidewalk but refusing the lumber.

PLANKWAY WILL GO ON

Petition of Seventh Avenue Residents Against Day's Labor

The petition against the construction of a plankway on Seventh Avenue proposed to be constructed by day's labor under the new Public Works Department came up at last night's council. It was signed by fifteen residents.

Benjamin Walsh asked leave to address the council on the subject and said that only one-third of the Seventh Avenue people were against the plankway. The matter was referred to the streets committee, but the work will go ahead as agreed at last Monday's meeting of council.
