ULTIMATUM TO GREECE WILL EXPIRE TODAY

ALLIES READY TO ENFORCE DEMANDS--GERMANS WITHIN RANGE OF BUCHAREST

CONSTANTINE FACES GRAVE CRISIS TODAY

Allied Demands Must be Acceded to Today—Du Fournet Ready to Land Troops to Enforce Demands.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 1.—The Greek government, according to a Reuter despatch from Athens, has replied to Vice Admiral Du Fournet definitely refusing to accede to the demands of the Allies. Admiral Du Fournet is reported as saying that he will insist absolutely on the execution of the demands and that he will see that the aims of the Allies are realized despite all obstacles.

French, British and Italian detachments will land at all points necessary and will fulfill their mission thoroughly. Every effort will be made to avoid bloodshed.

Allies Ready.

Athens, Dec. 1.—The Entente Allies are ready to begin the embarkation of troops at Piraeus. The Greek government has retained control of the post offices and telegraph lines from Athens, compelling the French officers who have had control of them since they were taken over by the Allies. According to an Entente diplomat, King Constantine has given assurances to Admiral Du Fournet that order will be maintained until today, when the time mentioned in Du Fournet's ultimatum demanding the surrender of the Greek artillery expires. The diplomat also says that Admiral Du Fournet has promised that the measures he will take to induce compliance with his demands will not include forcible seizure by arms.

GERMANS NOW WITHIN RANGE OF BUCHAREST

Von Falkenhayn Pressing From the West and Northwest—Russians May yet save the Situation.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 1.—Field Marshal Von Mackenzen's forces are now within shelling distance of the southern forts protecting Bucharest, the capital of Rumania.

General Von Falkenhayn's army is maintaining pressure from the west and the northwest. It is believed that an advance by the Russians might yet save the capital.

COLONIALS ENJOY LEAVE WITHOUT LEAVE

City Treasurer Johnston has received a highly amusing and interesting letter from a young Australian at the front. The young man is a property holder in Prince Rupert and he writes thanking the city officials for the courtesy they have extended to him in the course of their business relationship. After expressing a hope that he may return to Prince Rupert some day, he goes on to tell of some of his experiences with the Canadian boys in England. He says, "I had a most amusing rencontre with a Canadian on leave—without leave—last week, when we were seeking a 'doss-down' at the Union Jack Club. After using my pass, which, by the way, was overdue, we changed uniforms and he went in with my Australian slouch hat and tunic and pass, and worked the stunt successfully."

MINING ACTIVITY IN ALICE ARM DISTRICT

Everything points to big mining activity in Alice Arm district next spring and, even at the present time, the Alice Arm Mining and Development Company are pushing forward development work. Diamond drills have already been brought in to the McFarlane-Kennedy property which was bonded a few weeks ago and it is likely that a certain amount of work will go on all winter.

Extensive development work will also be carried out on the Silver Hoard property, adjoining the Wolf Mine, owned by the Dolly Varden Co. The Silver Hoard has been bonded for \$60,000 by the Alice Arm Company and a substantial cash payment has already been made. This property has big showings of native silver and sulphide of silver.

The Carpenter and Egan claim, across the river from the Wolf Mine, has also been bonded by the same company, while an offer has been made for the Tiger Group, between the Dolly Varden mine and the Wolf. This offer has, however, not been accepted. This property shows sulphide of silver.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—Sir Robert Borden and R. B. Bennett will commence a tour of the Dominion on December 6th in the interests of national service.

The campaign will open at Quebec and the ministers will then proceed to Quebec, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Vancouver, Victoria, Calgary and Regina. The tour will wind up with a huge recruiting rally in Toronto on December 22nd.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the aged Liberal leader, is arranging for a recruiting gathering in Quebec on the evening of December 8th. Premier Gouin will preside at the gathering.

THE NEW CABINET

That Premier Brewster has made a judicious selection in appointing his ministers will be the general consensus of opinion throughout the province.

William Sloan, the member for Nanaimo, a mining district, was generally conceded the portfolio of mines before the names of the new ministers were made public.

That Ralph Smith would be in the cabinet was also a foregone conclusion, and the only question was as to his portfolio.

That John Oliver would be one of the new ministers was never in doubt, and "Honest John" has been given the portfolio which all had already de-

cidated was his. The agricultural life of this province will be certain to benefit from the fact that he is at the head of this department.

Dr. King, of Cranbrook, is another of the old time members of the legislature whose experience and ability had assured him a seat in the cabinet, and, as Minister of Public Works, he will have ample scope for his abilities, while the sterling character of the man gives assurance that the public works department, one of the hardest to control, will be administered as it ought.

Dr. McLean, of Greenwood, one of the new members in the house, is just the right stamp of man to hold the Provincial Secretaryship and the portfolio of Education, and his appointment will meet with the approval of the people throughout the province.

To the people of the north, the most interesting appointment is that of T. D. Pattullo, the member for Prince Rupert, as Minister of Lands. Mr. Pattullo is another of the new members in the legislature, but his abilities are so widely recognized that he has been given a seat in every "newspaper" cabinet selected by the press in the south during the time which elapsed between the election and the resigning of the Bowser government.

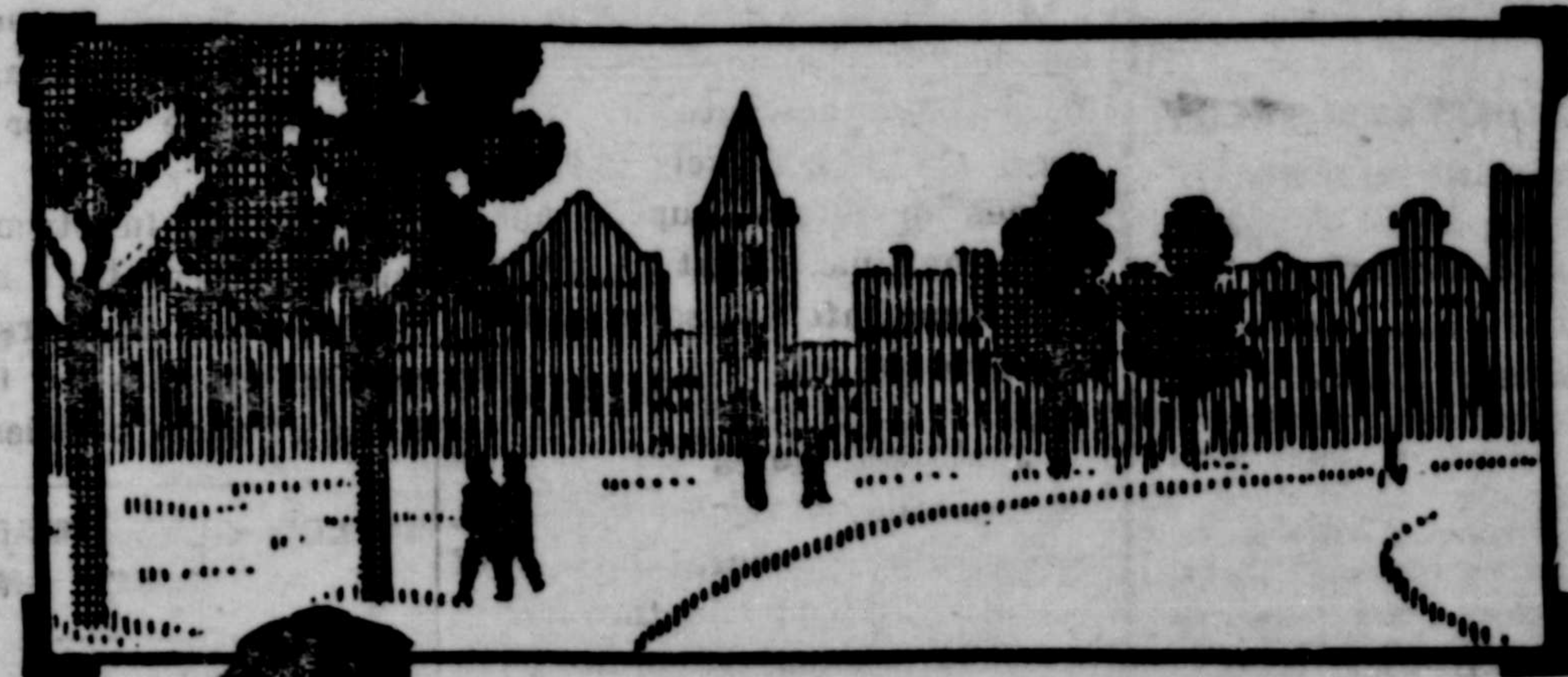
