CONSTANTINE HAS SURRENDERED HIS GUNS

SLIGHT DISTURBANCE IN THE GREEK CAPITAL -- CIVILIANS LEAVE BUCHAREST

CONSTANTINE SURRENDERS HIS ARTILLERY

Slight Disturbance in Athens is Followed by Armistice and Final Surrender of Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Dec. 2.—Without waiting for the expiration of the period of grace given by the Allies, the Greek government informed Vice-Admiral Du Fournet yesterday afternoon of its continued adherence to the decision not to hand over the war material and mountain batteries as requested.

Disorder. Greek troops have been ordered to protect all important points. A dangerous reservist element, which was quite uncontrolled, marched through the streets last night, creating disorder.

At midnight the government issued orders enjoining the people to remain calm, but crowds fired fifty shots into the Venizelist newspaper office and gangs of rowdies fired upon the French Legation, which was guarded by French marines.

Secretary Bridgman, of the British Legation, was arrested by a Greek patrol and was taken to the police station but was instantly released. Old men guarded the street corners with hunting guns.

Constantine Agrees.

Intervention was made by the Spanish and Dutch ministers, and the entire Greek cabinet, with the Entente diplomats, assembled in the French Legation and arranged an armistice. When the firing ceased, it was found that several had been killed.

King Constantine agreed to surrender the artillery demanded in the ultimatum presented by Du Fournet, and the French admiral ordered the withdrawal of the troops.

BREWSTER SHOWS REAL LEADERSHIP

The fact that Premier Brewster has not taken a portfolio in his cabinet has been the subject of considerable comment in the south. Interviewed on the subject, the premier said, "This is a new government and new policies will be followed. The reason I took no portfolio is because I shall follow a line of general supervision of the departments which are in the hands of the various ministers, and I could not do this were I to assume the detail work of any department."

RECOUNT CLAIMED IN PRINCE GEORGE

Prince George, Nov. 28.—John McInnes, former member of the Legislature and Socialist candidate in Fort George constituency in the general election, yesterday took the first steps towards contesting the election of W. R. Ross, late minister of lands.

An application for a recount was filed in the County Court register of this county on behalf of Mr. McInnes, and this will be proceeded with as soon as can be done. Nothing can be done, of course, until the ballots are sent on to the County Court judge, and this can not be for some days, it is understood.

Should the recount result in the retention of the seat by Mr. Ross it is said that a petition will be filed against his election on the ground of illegal acts committed.

SWANSON BAY PLANT STARTED YESTERDAY

The Empire Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, of Swanson Bay, about a hundred miles south of this city, yesterday started to turn out chemical pulp in commercial quantities, adding another important link in the chain of industry in the north. The capacity of the plant is already being increased, a third digester of large size being installed. The output of pulp will be from thirty-five to forty tons daily when the plant is in full swing. The product will be shipped to Vancouver and Prince Rupert for rail transportation, but for export vessels will load at Swanson Bay.

The saw mill has a capacity of 125,000 feet per day and the mill will ship high grades of spruce for which there is always a special market. The output of the mill and shingle mill will be shipped in covered barges to Prince Rupert, the company planning to handle its own transportation here. The company has one tug and others will be added. Over two hundred and fifty men will be employed in the pulp and saw-mills. Power is generated from a stream flowing from Yule Lake, the storage reservoir for the plant and at present 1500 h. p. is generated. This industry is of the utmost importance to Prince Rupert. The president of the company is George F. Whalen.

SUICIDE

The mystery attending the death of R. H. Vade, who was found dead in the Royal Hotel on Wednesday, has been cleared up by the evidence of Dr. Cade, coupled with the finding of two bottles of strychnine amongst deceased's effects, by Constable Bailey. Dr. Cade analysed the contents of a glass found in the room and found that the glass had contained strychnine. The finding of the coroner's jury was that "Deceased came to his death through an overdose of strychnine, administered by himself during a period of temporary mental derangement."

St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 2.—A germ believed to be the causative agent in the spreading of infantile paralysis, has been isolated by the Mayo Clinic, of Rochester. Doctors are experimenting in an endeavor to bring to perfection a vaccine or serum to prevent the spreading of the disease.

FISH RECEIPTS

E. H. Mortimer reported to the Board of Trade last evening that the total pack of the salmon canneries adjacent to Prince Rupert for this year, up to September 30, was 508,278 cases. Mr. Mortimer also reported that the halibut receipts for the same period amount to 11,667,300 pounds.

BUCHAREST IS PREPARED FOR LAST ASSAULT

Civilian Population Gone and Preparations are Made for Desperate Resistance to Huns.

Rome, Dec. 2.—It is announced that the civilian population has evacuated Bucharest and preparations are being made for a desperate resistance to the expected German assault.

Russians Active.

Numerous fresh Russian army corps are being concentrated in the Wallachian region with the object of arresting the advance of the Teutonic armies under Von Falkenhayn.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, Dec. 2.—The battle with the Russians in the Carpathians, in Eastern Transylvania, is being stubbornly continued along a front of 248 miles. The Russians are constantly renewing their forces.

Western Front.

London, Dec. 2.—There is very heavy shelling in the neighborhood of Gueudecourt on the Somme front. There is considerable trench mortar activity in the other areas on this front.

Board Objected.

New York, Dec. 2.—J. Pierpont Morgan has abandoned the proposed sale of a limited amount of short term British and French treasury bills, which he was requested to undertake by the Allied governments. The abandonment of the transaction is being attributed to the attitude adopted against the sale by the Federal Reserve Board.

POWER FARMING

A writer on agricultural subjects in the Toronto Globe deals at considerable length with the question of agricultural labor in Ontario after the war. Before the war, there was a great shortage of farm help throughout Canada, particularly during the harvest season when for a few weeks there is an enormous increase in the demand for labor. The writer of the article advises the Ontario farmer to lay his plans with the probability of a continued shortage of labor in view.

One means of dealing with the present and prospective labor shortage advocated by the Globe article is the increased use of electricity on the farm. It tells of how Robert Gray, a farmer of Durham county, has succeeded to a large extent in doing away with manual labor by the application of electric power. On the Gray farm, one man, with the aid of an electric current, is able to do as much work in cleaning grain, cutting feed, pulp roots, and sharpening tools as two men can accomplish where hand labor is alone depended upon. With the addition of a milking machine, the time spent in milking and separating could be practically reduced to half, and in the house, and the farm house is just as important as the outside department of the farm, all the drudgery on the Gray farm is taken out of washing and ironing by the turning of a switch. There is also a comfort and saving of time and worry through the use of electric light both in the house and in the outbuildings.

How far power may be applied to farming in British Columbia is a question which the

farmer alone will be able to answer intelligently, but it would appear that the subject is well worthy of study and development. This province is rich in water power, which could easily be harnessed to do the work of the farm, but, in the north particularly, the farming community is so badly scattered that the producing of power at a reasonable cost would in the meantime present a big problem. However, the subject is of more than ordinary interest, and the day is coming when British Columbia will have farming communities which will be compact, and in which there will be scope for co-operation in the development of power and in the united handling of the many difficulties which confront the pioneer tiller of the soil.

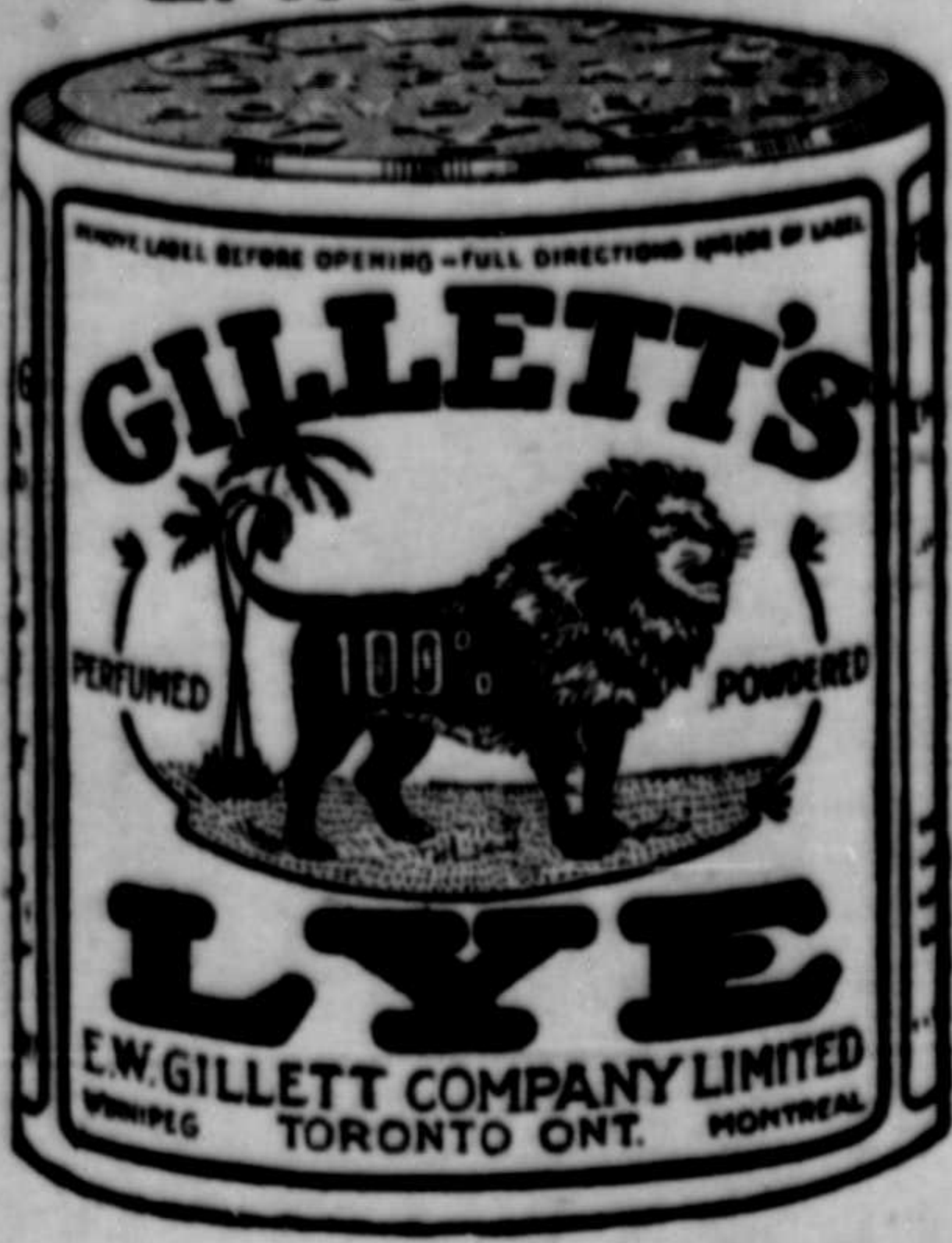
Power has revolutionized manufacturing, and there is no reason why its influence should not be brought to bear upon farming with equally good effect. In the long run, it should mean increased production, which is badly needed, and increased production will mean a lessening of the cost of living and ultimately a greater purchasing power by the people of the province. It is worth going into.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

FROM FAR AND NEAR

There is great activity in ship-building in Japan. A marine bank has recently been established for the sole purpose of financing new ship-building concerns.

Piles are being driven for a big new ship-building plant at Aberdeen, Washington. Orders are already on hand for six auxiliary wooden vessels.

Miss Alice Bradley, a Boston domestic science lecturer, shows how the cost of food can be reduced to 16 cents per day. The menu is largely made up of peanut butter, raisins and rolled oats.

Tampa cigar factories are producing 35,000,000 cigars a month. Who said times were hard?

James Irwin, a well known Yukoner who has been in the north since the rush of 1898, has decided to leave the north for good. He is at present living in Vancouver, having arrived there at the end of last week.

Hatzic fruit growers claim that the labor situation is so serious that the Chinese head tax should be removed. They are going to appeal to the Dominion government.

Toronto labor forces have decided to form a party for political action. The name of the party has not yet been decided upon but a platform embracing the eight-hour day, tax reform, public ownership, free education, abolition of the senate, and abolition of the property qualification for aspirants for seats on municipal councils has been framed.

It is reported that W. J. Manson has been selected by the Conservatives of Dewdney to oppose Hon. John Oliver when he comes back to his constituents for reelection.

Buffalo newspapers have doubled their selling price on account of the enormous increase in the cost of newsprint and ink.

By 1914, when the war broke out, they were producing 60% of the total—and controlled the situation.

Then, with a practical monopoly of raw rubber and absolute control of the seas, Great Britain was in a position to supply the enormous war requirements of the Allies and to cut the Teutons off completely. This, of course, she has done, but, instead of charging the rest of the world high prices, the British Government actually lowered the price to less than 70 cents a pound—a figure below that asked before the war.

This means a substantial saving to every man, woman and family in Canada—a saving doubly important on account of the 80% advance in the cost of shoe leather. It means that a pair of rubbers, costing from 75 cents to \$1.25, will practically double the life of a pair of shoes costing five to ten times as much. Under these conditions it certainly pays to have a pair of rubbers to fit every pair of shoes, heavy as well as light, worn by every member of the family—for nothing rots and destroys even the most expensive shoes like wearing them in bad weather without rubbers.

Besides the saving of money and the invaluable protection to health, wearing rubbers helps to win the war. The soldiers MUST have leather in vast quantities for shoes and equipment—and it is getting scarcer all the time. 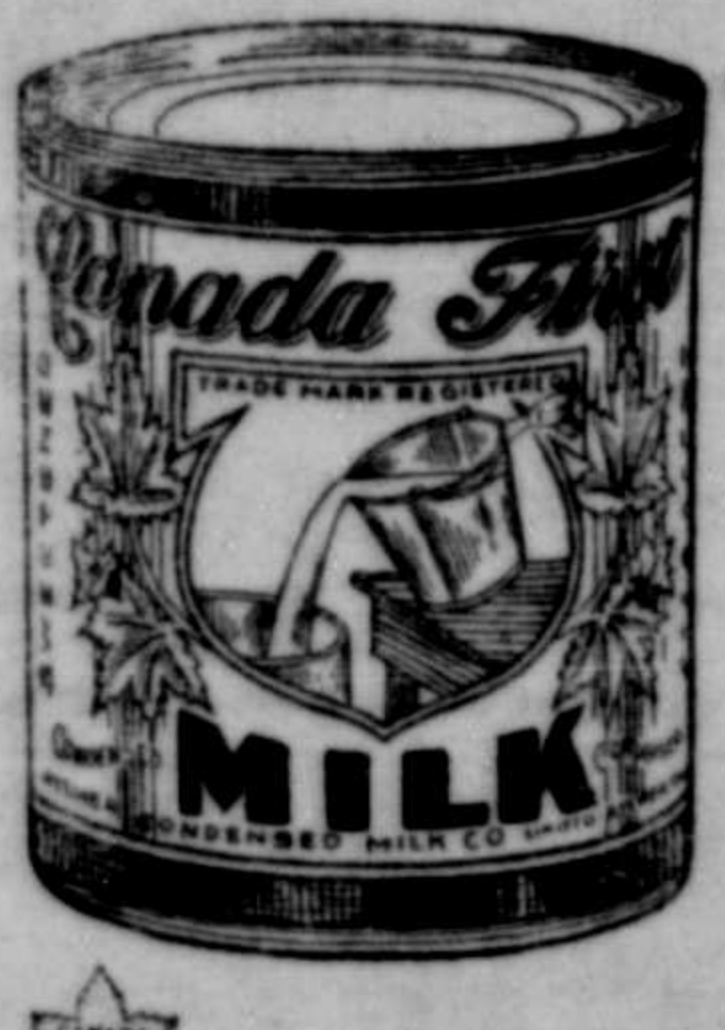
