VON MACKENZEN DRIVEN SOUTH OF DANUBE

RUSSIANS CONTINUE VIOLENT OFFENSIVE -- CHANGES IN THE BRITISH CABINET

RUSSIANS MAY YET SAVE CITY OF BUCHAREST

Von Mackenzen Driven South from Danube—Great Russian Offensive on Transylvanian Battle Line.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Dec. 4.—The Teutonic drive upon Bucharest has been held up and the Russians are winning the fight which is to save the Rumanian capital from the Germans.

South of Bucharest, Russian reinforcements are attacking Von Mackenzen's forces in the rear and have captured guns and prisoners. The Germans, who were within about twelve miles of Bucharest, have been driven south from the Danube and Tromana and Gostaniri have been wrested from the Bulgarians and Germans.

Von Falkenhayn alone gains successes for the enemy by reaching Gaesci, about thirty-six miles from the Rumanian capital. The Rumanians admit that their flanking movement has proven a failure and that Berlin will establish army law over the conquered territory.

Russian Offensive.

In the Carpathians, the Russians are increasing their pressure upon the army of Von Falkenhayn and advances have been made in Transylvania while a footing has also been gained in Moldavia at Kirlibala. The Slav-Rumanian armies have maintained a strong offensive for thirty-six hours without a stop, while the Russians are successfully applying pressure on the Dobrudja front.

Transport Gone.

Berlin, Dec. 4.—The German Admiralty announces that a German submarine has sunk the French transport Karnak, which was crowded with troops destined for Saloniki.

Other Vessels Sunk.

London, Dec. 4.—The French brigantine Indiana; the Swedish steamer Douglas and the French schooner St. Joseph have been sunk.

REPORT SAYS LLOYD GEORGE HAS RESIGNED

Asquith May Ask King to Consent to Cabinet Changes—British Take Prisoners on the Ypres Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 4.—Reynold's Newspaper states that Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Minister for War and Munitions, has intimated his intention of resigning from the coalition cabinet on account of the dilatoriness, indecision and delay which characterize the action of the war council and which endangers our prospects of winning in the war. His resignation has not yet been accepted.

It is also announced that Premier Asquith has decided to advise the King to consent to a reconstruction of the cabinet. It is believed that he means to place all measures for the control of the war in the hands of a directorate of five members consisting of Premier Asquith, Lloyd George, Bonar Law, A. J. Balfour and Sir Edward Carson. It is reported that Sir William Robertson and Sir John Jellicoe approve of this measure.

Western Front.

There is considerable trench mortar activity on both sides at Neuville, St. Vaast and in the Hohenzollern areas. East of Ypres the British have captured prisoners and have inflicted severe casualties upon the enemy.

French Report.

Paris, Dec. 4.—The enemy has violently bombarded the French positions around Fort Vaux and the Germans fired several shots in the direction of Nancy.

There is violent artillery fighting in the vicinity of Barleux and the enemy has made feeble attacks on the Somme front.

RUSSIANS WILL CONTROL THE DARDANELLES

Important Announcement by New Russian Premier—Trouble in the Duma—Greek Affair is Cleared Up.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Dec. 4.—Premier Troppoff, formerly Minister of Railways who recently succeeded Boris V. Sturmer as Premier, has read a proclamation in the Duma announcing that an agreement has been concluded between the Entente Allies which establishes definitely Russia's right to the Straits of the Dardanelles, the Bosphorus and also the city of Constantinople.

Disturbance

London, Dec. 4.—Twelve members of the Russian Duma have been ejected, after uttering strong protests against the war policy of the government. Premier Troppoff states that Russia is determined to reconquer Poland and that there can be no talk of peace until that has been accomplished.

Greek Situation.

Athens, Dec. 4.—A proposal was made by the ministers of the Entente Allies, at the instance of Admiral Du Fournet, that the Greek government be informed that the Entente Powers would accept six batteries of mountain guns, instead of the ten previously demanded, and that their surrender be demanded on Dec. 15th.

The Greek government accepted the proposal and will immediately proceed to deliver the guns.

150 Missing.

One hundred and fifty British troops are missing as the result of fighting which took place when Venizelos' troops charged the Royalists. In the encounter, the Greek troops fired on the Entente soldiers.

SIDELIGHTS FROM SIR SAM'S LETTERS

Ottawa, November 30.—The Duke of Devonshire will certainly be interested in Canada. His first official duty on reaching Ottawa was to read a bunch of letters between Premier Borden and his thorn in the flesh, Sir Sam, which are as full of surprises as a pumpkin is of seeds. "My word!" one imagines His Excellency saying, "Things do happen here."

Perhaps the Governor-General does not appreciate the surprises inherent in this correspondence to the same extent as we do who have been watching the cat jump for the last two years. For example, Premier Borden's ultimate indignation hinges on the smallest kind of grievance—the tone of Sir Sam's letter. He stands for paper shoes, Ross rifles, spavined chargers, the Bertram Shell Committee, Colonel John Wesley Allison, the fuse contracts, Camp Borden, and a hundred other crimes against the Dominion of Canada and then fires Sir Sam for what? For his offences against the state? No. For an affront to Premier Borden's personal dignity—he doesn't like the tone of Sir Sam's last letter.

True, Premier Borden mentions the fact that Sir Sam has been acting off his own bat, not consulting his colleagues, disobeying orders, in fact, but all these misdemeanors pale beside the frank language Sir Sam uses in writing to the head of the government. Sir Sam may behave like a load of hay for two years—that is to say, take up the whole road—but he mustn't be saucy to the Premier. That is the unforgivable sin. Just for that you'll all get off.

Incidentally Premier Borden is the neatest little stable locker after the horse is stolen now extant on the northern half of the North American continent. Sir Sam's resignation after most of the harm has been done is Premier Borden's latest feat in this direction. But before that we had the excommunication of W. F. Garland, M. P., and A. DeWitt Foster, M. P.,—both gentlemen having previously got away with the goods. This is, perhaps, the priskest thing Premier Borden does—making others do penance for his lack of firmness.

IMPORTANT MOVE

The appointment of Sir John Jellicoe as First Sea Lord will be hailed with great satisfaction, not only in Britain, but throughout the Empire. The placing of Sir David Beatty at the head of the Grand Fleet will meet with the same universal approval. With a thorough knowledge of the problems of active service under present conditions, Sir John Jellicoe is admirably fitted for his important new position, while Sir David Beatty, the hero of Heligoland Bight and Jutland, is the right man in the right place as commander-in-chief.

Able though he undoubtedly was, Sir Henry Jackson lacked practical experience of naval warfare under present day conditions, and the transferring of Sir John Jellicoe to London is a master move. Just as Sir John and his brilliant young cruiser squadron commander have bottled up the German fleet, so will they continue to work together harmoniously in their more important capacities. The two have proved a deadly combination at sea, and, with the cool, clear head of the new First Sea Lord to lay the plans and the skill and daring of Sir David Beatty, a born leader, to carry them out, Britain should be better able than ever to maintain her control of the seas.

There has been an inclination recently to criticise the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, the First Civil Lord of the Admiralty, the chief complaint being that he is too old to cope with the problems of the present day, but, it is more than likely that, with Jellicoe at the helm, all cause for complaint and criticism will be removed. The "ginger brigade" have been

clamoring for action and have been accusing the Admiralty of negligence in allowing the German torpedo destroyers to make another raid on the Channel, but the probability is that even they will be satisfied with the changes which have been made. Jellicoe and Beatty should be able to infuse enough "ginger" into the Admiralty to keep things warmer than ever for the Kiel Canal fleet and any other German units which may care to show their noses in the open. The submarine question is also liable to receive closer attention than it has ever done before. Never in the history of the British navy has there been such a happy combination afloat and ashore.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is gratifying to find the Board of Trade turning its attention to pulp-wood. Here is something which is ready to our hand, and something the whole world is clamoring for. We have an ample supply of the right kind of timber and plenty of latent power. They should be brought together.

Japan provides a big market for pulp-wood which has been supplied by Norway in the past. It is just possible that there is a close connection between this market and the building of Norwegian ships on the coast. Norwegian representatives have also been busy lately sizing up our timber supply. Are the Norwegians more wide-awake than we are?

the cabinet fairly bristles with leaders. What the cabinet suffers from is not lack of leaders, but an embarrassment of riches in this respect. Premier Borden is only one leader among many—and a rather listless one at that—not even primus inter pares. Sir Sam mentions at least two more—the Honourable Bob, of course, and Sir Thomas White. Sir Thomas seems to be moving rapidly. Sir Sam also mentions Sir George Foster, the Trade wind, as being far too gay for a subordinate. The glimpse Sir Sam's letter gives into the seething vortex of personal rivalries which goes by the name of the Borden cabinet, is like a peep into Vesuvius. They seem to be united on only one thing—to give their friends, the profiteers, every chance to bleed the people to their last dollar.

Another surprise is the emergence of Sir George Perley. Sir George has in his time been Acting Minister for every one of his colleagues in the cabinet. They had no fear of leaving him in charge. He was understood to have no personal ambitions, so his colleagues knew him as a safe sort of chairwarmer who would never set the world on fire. The premier felt so sure of him that he made him High Commissioner in London—pro tem. Mark that "pro tem". Premier Borden may not be as aloof from that High Commissionership as he professes. At all events Sir George Perley is still High Commissioner "pro tem," besides being Overseas Minister of Militia, which is going to take up a lot of his time. The "pro tem" job will probably find a good man to handle it presently. Meanwhile, Sir George is Overseas Minister of Militia, a position which he is said to have filled for a year past, and which is now given its real name.

With pardonable cheerfulness Sir Sam points out that Sir George Perley has been responsible for most of the Canadian military management in England for the last twelve months, which is equivalent to saying that Sir

George is responsible for a pretty bad mess. Still, who would have thought it of Sir George Perley? That quiet oyster of a man Overseas Minister of Militia and against Sir Sam's say-so. It was like being kicked to death by a beetle.

Another surprise is Sir Sam's fatal fondness for Sir Max Aitken. Canada had no idea that this affair of the heart had gone so far. Canada knew of Sir Max as the Canadian Eye Witness at the front who did his Eye-witnessing of battle dangers by proxy of the "Morning Post", thus leaving the Left Eye free to follow Sir Sam on his numerous visits to London and the Right Eye bent on the main chance which Sir Max never loses sight of at any stage of the game. Canada also knew Sir Max as a vicarious writer of books of common praise for Lieutenant-General Sir Sam Hughes, his friend and patron and companion on roller skates.

Canada also knew Sir Max as an expatriated Canadian, somewhat cloudy in his beginnings, who won fame and riches as the midwife of the cement merger and other progeny of the same kind, who became the partner of R. B. Bennett, M. P., in an elevator combine whose object was to give the Northwest farmer another squeeze, and who subsequently took his money over to England, where he bought a Unionist nomination for Parliament and in due time a baronetcy. The career of Sir Max in England is such as to cause the average Canadian to say "If he can get along, then anybody can." Sir Max is not what you would call the highest type of Canadian. He is a promoter—will promote anything, including himself. Some day he will be caught trying to sell the dear public a milk mine in the moon. Meanwhile he has three valets—one for his necktie, another for his shoes and a third for the rest of his clothes. Working together they dress Sir Max in three minutes, their distinguished employer talking the while to half a dozen reporters and telling them what a great man he is. Not to put too fine a point on it, Sir Max is a bit of a bounder, and in England is widely known as such. It is difficult to see what dignity Canada would have conferred on her by making this swanker Overseas Minister of Militia.

However, Sir Sam believed in him as he believed in Allison, under somewhat similar circum-

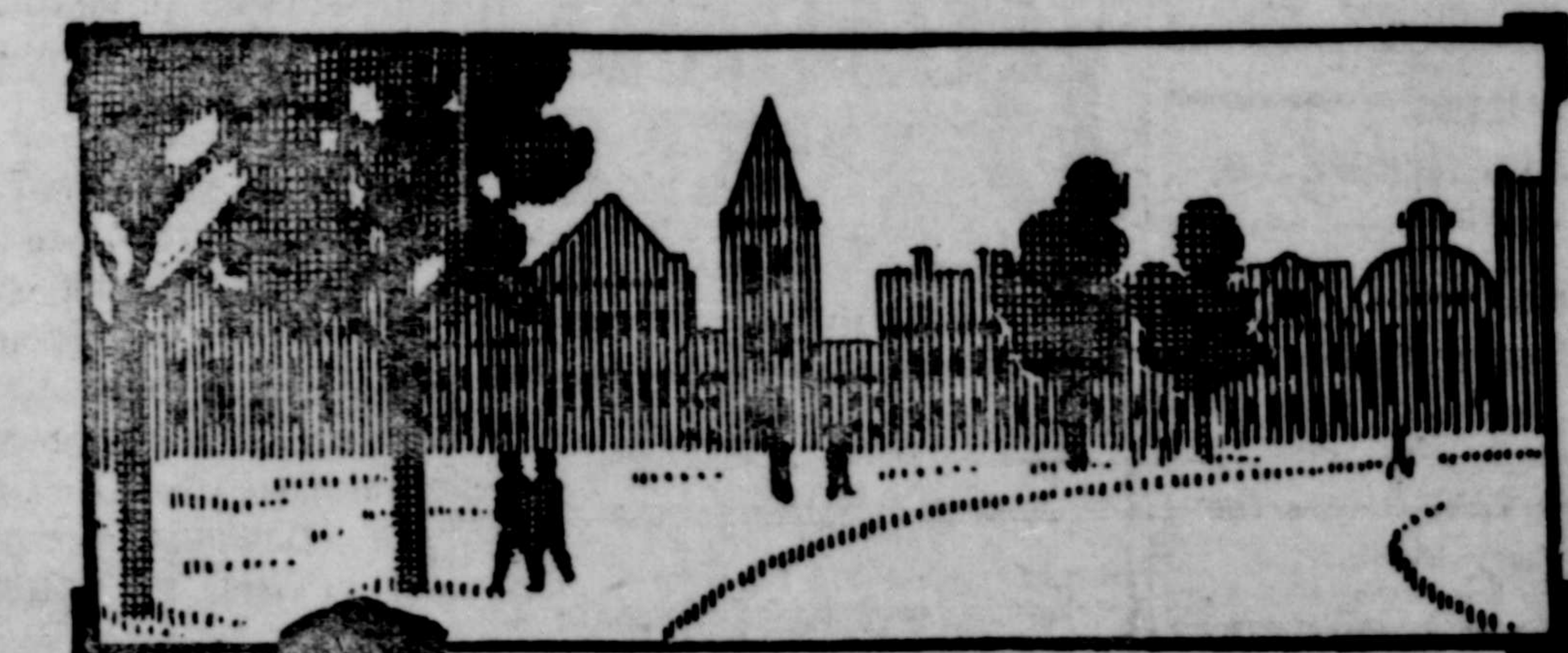
