## CONSTANTINE QUIETLY MOBILIZING ARMY

### GREEKS MAY JOIN GERMANS AT MONASTIR--BUCHAREST HAS FIGHTING CHANCE

#### CONSTANTINE PLANNED TRAP FOR THE ALLIES

Greek King May Join Forces with Mackenzen—Greeks Now Advancing on Port of Piraeus.

London, Dec. 5.—Lord Robert Cecil stated in the House of Commons last night that the recent fighting in Athens against the Entente troops was the result of a deliberate trap treacherously prepared by King Constantine and the Greek government. The Entente Allies are expected to take action immediately to arrive at a solution of their difficulties in Greece.

According to reports from Piraeus, Constantine is quietly mobilizing his forces and preparing to make war against the Allies, intending to co-operate with a section of Von Mackenzen's forces on the Monastir front by attacking General Sarrail's flank. The Greeks are reported to be advancing upon Piraeus.

**Athens Calm.**  
Paris, Dec. 5.—Calm prevails in the city of Athens although armed reservists are moving about the streets.

#### MINERS REFUSE TO OBEY INSTRUCTIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Fermie, Dec. 5.—The men in the coal mining camps have resumed work, excepting those at Taber, Diamond City and Drumheller. The miners' organization has threatened to use coercive measures to enforce the men in the latter camps to obey the order issued by the union secretary.

#### HIGH COST OF LIVING

At the city council last evening, Ald. Casey raised the question of the position of municipalities in regard to the high cost of living. He understood that the order-in-council recently passed at Ottawa gave certain powers to the municipalities in the matter. He moved that the city solicitor report on the matter at the next council meeting, with a view to taking up the question in Prince Rupert. This was seconded by Ald. Montgomery.

#### DEPOT SHELTER

At the city council last evening, Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. McClymont, moved that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. be asked to provide a shelter at the depot for the protection of passengers or those who have occasion to meet trains. The resolution passed unanimously.

#### VON MACKENZEN COMMANDS THE UNITED ARMIES

Russian Troops Have Changed Situation—Bucharest has a Fighting Chance—Big Scrap in West.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, Dec. 5.—The timely arrival of fresh troops before Bucharest has changed the Rumanian situation. According to military experts, the arrival of Russian reinforcements gives the defenders a fighting chance of saving the Rumanian capital.

**Berlin Report.**  
London, Dec. 5.—A Berlin report on the Rumanian situation indicates that the Teutonic armies operating in that country have been incorporated under the command of General Von Mackenzen.

**Western Front.**  
Paris, Dec. 5.—There is artillery activity in the region of Dixmude, and severe fighting is in progress on the Somme front and also in the Vaux and Douaumont districts on the Verdun front.

Berlin reports that, following mine explosions, several British patrols succeeded in entering the German trenches on the Belgian front but were unable to maintain their advantage, being isolated from their main supports.

#### SENATOR KERR DEAD

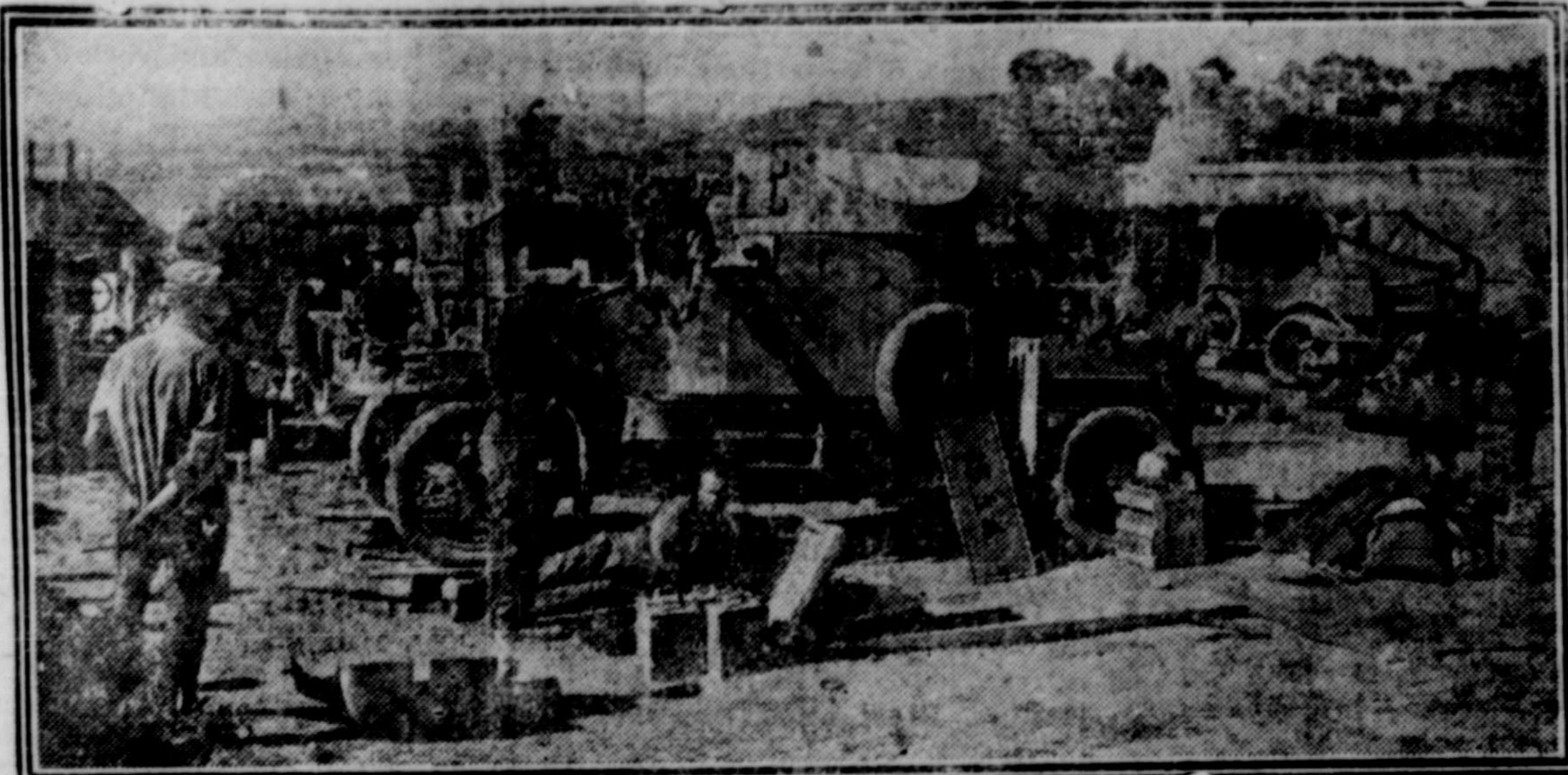

#### OPEN LEADS CAUSED THE WIRE TROUBLES

At the city council last night, Superintendent Kennedy made a further report on the interruption in the light and telephone service. He pointed out that the storm which caused the trouble was the worst ever experienced in the district, so far as its effect on the wires was concerned. He stated that the great damage done was to the open wire leads, the maintenance of which had been rather neglected during the past two years, the idea being to spend as little as possible on the maintenance of the system, with a view to putting in a new system, for which the cable was purchased two years ago or more. He considered that the city got off very lightly in the way of damage, considering the circumstances.

He referred the council to his report last May when he took over the system, when he stated that the outside telephone equipment was in very bad condition. At that time, he was advised of the situation and that the light committee of 1914 and 1915 had contemplated the remodeling of the system, and that very little maintenance work had been done and that there was no money available for the work.

Realizing the condition of the plant, he had caused a large amount of maintenance work to be done during the last six months. Some districts had held up against the storm but others had become completely demoralized. He referred particularly to the open wire leads in the downtown district. The superintendent produced specimens of this wire showing that it was so badly rusted that it was impossible to make joints with it.

It had been suggested that lack of help had been a cause in delaying the complete resumption of the service. He pointed out that the outside crew had not been reduced during the year and that there were as many men available as in 1915. The reductions made had been inside the telephone office and at the steam plant and these had no bearing whatever on the situation which had arisen.

Following the storm of Nov. 20th, he found that of our 400 odd lines, constituting some 800 telephones, 185, or from 350 to

400 telephones, were out of order. This number was reduced during that week to 50 and on Saturday last to 17. The high winds and rains which followed the snow had caused intermittent trouble through the wires swinging together.

The chief cause of the delay was the clearing away of the live wires connected with the light and power systems, in order to avert any danger to the public, and particularly the clearing up of the fire alarm system.

Superintendent Kennedy submitted a financial statement showing that \$2,624 had been spent on maintenance for the nine months ending September 30th, while for the whole of 1914, a total of \$2,499.72 had been expended, showing that this council had not been cutting down on maintenance of the system but had actually increased it. He said that an analysis of the figures would show that the bulk of the sum spent this year had been spent on outside work and that a considerable reduction had been made in inside expenditure.

The report showed that there had been no complete cut-off in power or lighting and that the trouble in these departments was purely local, resulting from contacts with foreign wires. Had the telephone system held out, they would have come through the storm without any interruption.

The superintendent submitted a financial statement showing that the light and telephone departments are in a very healthy condition financially and that the year will be completed with a good surplus, in spite of the fact that a reduction of 42½ per cent had been made in the amount charged up for street lighting.

Ald. Montgomery said that the report should be given all the publicity possible. There had been criticism and an attempt made in certain quarters to show that an attack had been levelled at municipal ownership. He thought the public should know the true state of matters, as municipal employees were debarred from defending themselves in public and had to depend entirely upon the council.

Ald. McClymont said that he had not heard of any direct attacks, though there may have been statements made on the street. If any attacks had been

#### POWER STAKED FOR PRIVATE ENTERPRISE

The city solicitor, at the city council meeting last evening, brought in a report regarding the enquiry of Ald. Casey regarding the staking of a certain water power in the name of G. R. Naden & Company. Mr. Peters stated that, at this stage, it was impossible for the city to do anything in the matter. The company had a legal right to stake the power and, if it showed a disposition to encroach upon the rights of the city, then steps could be taken to prevent its doing so. The company would be obliged to file plans showing its intentions and to advertise notice of same in a local paper and also in the B. C. Gazette, and, until this was done, the city could do nothing. If there were any sign of its interfering with the city's rights and power, it would then be up to the city to take action.

Ald. Montgomery said that his object in seconding the motion of Ald. Casey was to find out the intentions of the company. He thought it was unfair that the company should be allowed to go ahead and spend money on development work if the city were to step in and raise objections at the finish. He understood that Wark Channel provided ample auxiliary power for the city.

Ald. Casey wanted to know just how much power the Wark Channel rights represented to the city. Ald. Montgomery said that he did not think that this had ever been properly surveyed, though he believed that at certain seasons it would be about 30,000 h. p. while in winter it would only be about 2,000 h. p. It all depended on the putting in of the proper dams.

Ald. Nelson said that he did not think the city should worry about the power staked as it lay anywhere from sixty to a hundred miles south of here. He believed that it had been staked with a view to the putting in of an industry which would be of benefit to the city and with no intention of ever bringing power here. The report of the city solicitor was received and filed.

#### HIDDEN BOMBS PLAYED HAVOC AT ARCHANGEL

Russian Agent Says Bombs Were Placed in Cargoes at New York—General Turner in London.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
New York, Dec. 5.—The commercial agent of the Imperial Russian Embassy charges unknown persons with placing bombs in the cargoes of ships loading at the Bush Terminal Company's piers as the cause of the recent explosions at Archangel, resulting in the loss of several million dollars worth of munitions and supplies.

With the object of hiding the evidence, extensive thefts were made at the point of loading and a Brooklyn junk dealer has been arrested for having in his possession stolen articles which have been identified as part of a shipment of binoculars.

**CABINET CHANGES**

For months past there has been growing dissatisfaction in certain sections of the London press with the coalition cabinet. Since the early days of the war, there have been repeated attempts to get Premier Asquith to resign and there have been several rumors that he was about to do so. The "ginger brigade" thought that the government's methods were too leisurely and cumbersome and there was a general disposition to have Lloyd George, the active Minister of War, take over the leadership.

Recently, however, Lloyd George has come in for his share of criticism, and the Morning Post and Evening News, the latter a Northcliffe paper, have made strong attacks against the Minister for War, alleging that he is interfering with military matters with which he should have nothing to do. Lloyd George's reply was that he had been summoned to the seat of war by the French and British leaders and that their conference had resulted in a thorough understanding all round, and that at no time had he sought to interfere with active military matters.

That affairs are coming to a head is evidenced by the report to hand yesterday from London. Though it is only a press report, there is every reason to believe that there are to be changes and that the changes will take the form of a war directorate, instead of the present unwieldy cabinet. That Premier Asquith will remain at the head seems certain. He does not possess the fire of a Carson or Lloyd George but his judgment is sound, and he is above all things a leader.

That the Minister of War will be allowed to resign is out of the question, and it is not unlikely that his threatened resignation has been the means of bringing about the discussion of a directorate of five men to carry on the war. The introduction of Sir Edward Carson to the directorate would be a move in the right direction, as he is the active leader of the "ginger" group and was the first insurgent to leave the coalition cabinet. The fire and ability of Lloyd George and Carson, coupled with the business acumen and foresight of Bonar Law and the experience of Balfour, under the leadership of Premier Asquith would make for a strong, progressive government, and a government which would meet with the approval of all sections of the people.

Northcliffe has been severely criticised for the stand taken at different times during the war by his press but it is clear that his criticisms were not made for party political effect, but in the interests of the nation and in order to strengthen Britain's position in the war. His methods may not always have been wise, but it must be admitted that he has been instrumental in directing the attention of the people to weaknesses in the government. The greatest weakness is undoubtedly slowness of action, due to the miles of red tape which have to be unwound before anything can be done, and the formation of a small, compact war board, composed of the best brains of the country would work wonders in speeding up action. Evidently the "ginger" group have not shouted in vain.



**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

For the first time in history a Liberal premier is at the head of affairs in Russia. From the recent disturbances in the Duma it would appear that there was some truth in the rumors of pro-German influence in Russia and that there was a section of the Duma which favored a separate peace. Russia is more determined now than ever to see the war through.

There is evidently a pretty strong kick left in the "beaten" Rumanian army and Von Mackenzen and Company are not to have things all their own way in getting to Bucharest.

The little disturbance in Athens over the handing over of the Greek guns seems to have been more serious than at first reported. The Allies seem to have got all they wanted, however, and Constantine must now be a good little boy.

Premier Brewster has intimated that he will proceed immediately to have the matter of the writ cleared up. He is proving to his opponents that the writ was no irresponsible act of a politician struggling for power, but the serious action of a man who had the best interests of the province at heart.

The local Tory organ does not seem to be able to grasp the idea of a provincial Premier being public-spirited enough to place the general over-seeing of the province before a salary. It will soon realize that a great change has come over affairs in Victoria and that the old days are past forever.

made, he favored the publishing of the report in full.

Ald. Montgomery said that he did not know what Ald. McClymont meant by direct attacks, but a certain newspaper in town had tried to throw grave suspicions upon the city council in this matter.

Ald. Meltae said that he thought they should not take seriously the wild charges made by people who did not know what they were talking about. Everybody was aware that the storm of November 20th was something away out of the ordinary in regard to its effect upon wiring, and that the government telegraph system between here and Port Simpson had been torn to shreds and had to be rewired entirely. The G. T. P. had also had the same difficulty to contend with that the city and government had. He thought that the superintendent's report answered fully the wild statements made by irresponsible parties.

Ald. Casey said he had no objection to the report being published. He said that Mr. Kennedy had warned the council in May of the condition of the telephone system and that the council had done nothing to take care of the danger. They concentrated their energies on retrenchment and reform, laying off men instead of improving the system. He said that a man named Summers had been laid off. He did not want to make a noise over a misfortune but he thought the council had been negligent in its duty in regard to the telephone system.

Ald. Montgomery said that Mr. Summers had been an inside man and did not belong to the line gang, which had been kept up to its former strength.

Mayor McCaffery said that Ald. Casey was very fair in taking his share of the responsibility, he being a member of the council.

Ald. Nelson said that Ald. Casey spoke as if he were entirely outside of the council. He did not recollect that Ald. Casey had ever raised his voice in council as to the condition of the telephone system. The council had had a serious financial duty thrust upon

it in getting the city out of the hole and there was no money to expend on renewing the telephone system. He accepted full responsibility for his share in the matter and thought the council was justified in pursuing the line it did, just as the councils of 1914 and 1915 had done. He did not shirk responsibility just because the elections were near. The report was adopted.

### SAVINGS ENQUIRY

At the city council last night Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Smith, brought in a resolution asking that the heads of the various departments bring in, not later than December 18th, reports covering the reductions made during the year in the operating forces of their departments, showing what savings had been made and how the savings had been effected. The resolution was adopted unanimously.
