## SAWMILL CONSTRUCTION TO START SOON

### KING ACCEPTS ASQUITH'S RESIGNATION -- BONAR LAW OFFERED PREMIERSHIP

#### ARRANGEMENTS FOR EMERSON SAWMILL NEARING COMPLETION

W. P. HINTON SAYS EVERYTHING GOING SMOOTHLY AND CONSTRUCTION MAY START EARLY IN THE NEW YEAR -- TRAFFIC MANAGER WILL DISCUSS THE STATION ALTERATIONS

W. P. Hinton, traffic manager for the Grand Trunk Pacific; H. H. Hansard, the company's solicitor, and George A. McNicholl, assistant general freight and passenger agent, arrived from the south on the Prince George this forenoon.

Mr. Hinton, who has been on the coast for some little time in connection with the company's business, informed The Daily News that the arrangements in connection with the building of a sawmill at Prince Rupert, by J. S. Emerson, of Vancouver, are progressing smoothly and satisfactorily. "The necessary papers are being prepared now," said Mr. Hinton, "and I expect to be back in Vancouver on Sunday, when I believe everything will have been satisfactorily consummated." Mr. Hinton added that there were, of course, certain arrangements to be made with the government but he did not look for any difficulties in the way of bringing the negotiations to a satisfactory conclusion.

"If all goes as well as I hope," said Mr. Hinton, "you may look for a start being made in the building of the sawmill along about the first of January." He remarked jocularly that there seemed to be some people in Prince Rupert who had the idea that the Grand Trunk Pacific did not want business, and that the first intimation he received of the proposed sawmill was a copy of a local paper which at the outset sought to show that the railway company would be almost certain to retard the project all it could. "We are looking for business for Prince Rupert, all the time," said Mr. Hinton, "but it must be business which gives promise of permanence and sound development." He said that he had heard of some criticism in regard to some boatbuilding concern having been unable to get a site. So far as he knew, this company applied to Mr. McNicholl and had been told to look over the sites at Seal Cove and report later. They had never since made a sign of wanting a site from the company.

Mr. Hinton will spend a day or two in the terminal city and this afternoon will have a lengthy conference with General Superintendent Mehan regarding the proposed alterations at the station and several other matters of local importance.

While in Victoria, Mr. Hinton

had a chat with Hon. T. D. Pattullo, whom he found up to the eyes in work but not too busy to go fully into the question of the development of the hinterland of Prince Rupert. "Mr. Pattullo has the right idea," said the railroad official, "and he has the energy and ability to tackle the big problems which confront him in the Department of Lands. On the development of the country back of the city depends the future of Prince Rupert and the Minister of Lands may rest assured that he will obtain every assistance possible from the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company."

#### PREMIER BREWSTER OUTLINES HIS PLANS

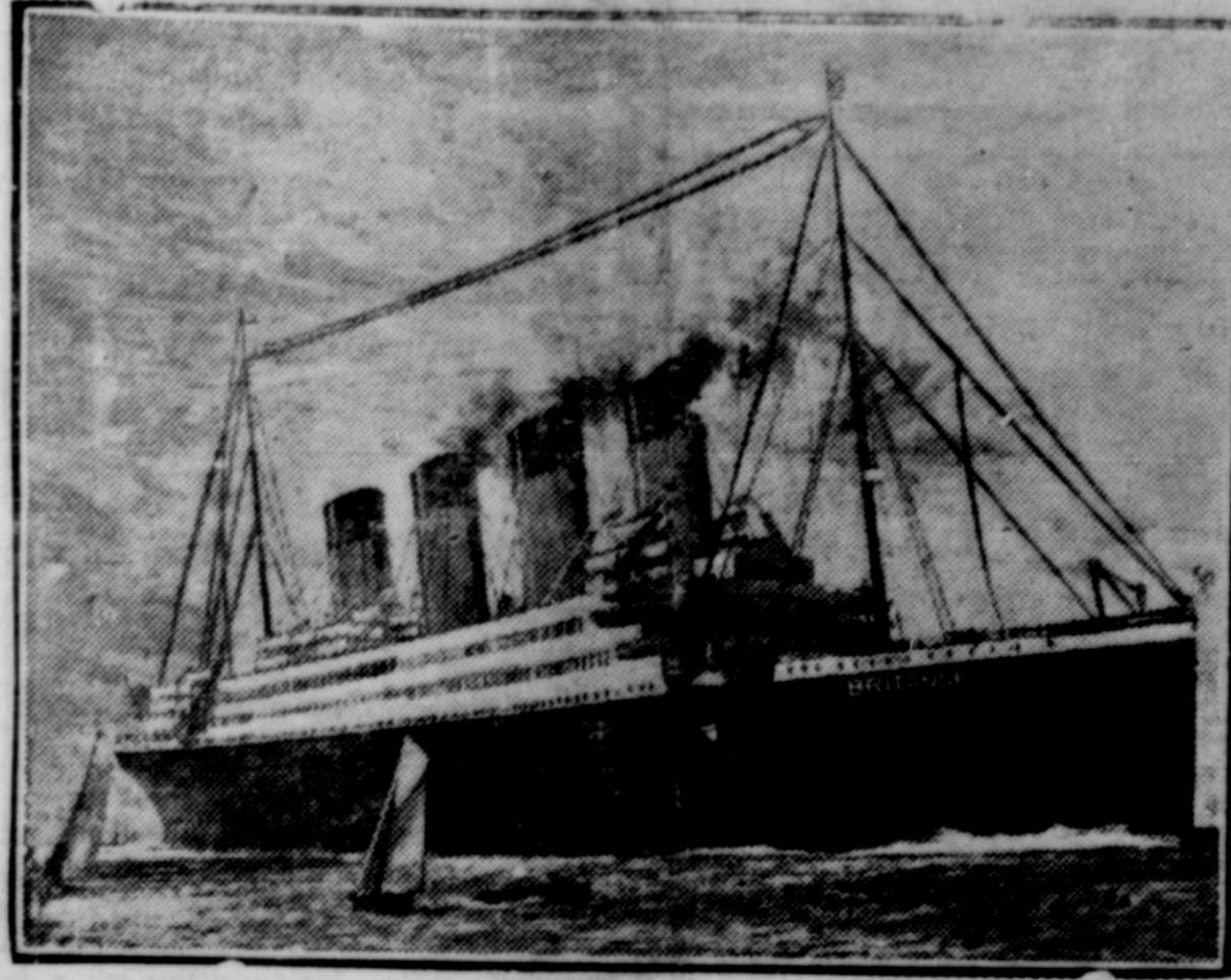
Interviewed in Victoria the other day as to the plans of the new government, Premier Brewster said that one of the first matters which called for attention was the financial position of the province. He said that it is most essential that we know just where we stand financially and that the people are entitled to know, too. He intimated that he intended to go carefully into the matter with the Minister of Finance and that a balance sheet would be prepared showing the demands which had to be met from month to month.

"The effecting of economies will have to receive close and earnest attention. The elimination of waste throughout the service of the province, in every branch and every respect, calls for action at the earliest possible moment. At the same time the cabinet will have to devote its efforts to what may be called the creation of economic production," said the Premier.

#### Thorough Reorganization.

"With the initiation of a thorough reorganization and the change of policies which the new government has been placed in office by the people to bring about I have felt that I must be left free from the routine duties of any department, so that I may properly maintain supervision of the whole. I will assist, so far as may be, in the work of the finance department and all the other branches of administration, but my time must be largely devoted to the numerous problems which will arise out of the changes involved and to the direction of the working out of policies. In this I know I will have the loyal support of every one of my colleagues.

"The cabinet will at once take into consideration the various aspects of the constitutional question, and take such steps as will be necessary to clear up all doubts which exist in regard to the status of legislation passed

#### TEUTONIC ARMY NOW CLOSING IN ON BUCHAREST

City Encompassed on South and Southwest—Russians Still Attack in the Carpathians.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Dec. 6.—The Teutonic forces under Von Mackenzen almost encompass Bucharest on the south and southwest and are now attacking determinedly from the west and northwest.

The Russians are keeping up their strenuous offensive from the Jablonitza Pass in the Carpathians to the Moldavian frontier.

**Sofia Report.** An Amsterdam despatch from Sofia states that, after Bucharest has been taken, the Central Powers intend to capture Avlona, the Albanian port on the Adriatic and to join hands with Greece.

**Serbian Success.** East of the Cerna River, on the Macedonian front, and north of Grunishite and Budmirtsa, the Serbians have captured additional fortified enemy positions and are compelling the Bulgarians to retreat.

#### Returned Soldiers.

"One of the matters of grave importance to which the government will give its earnest and immediate attention is that of preparation for the return of our soldiers. It will be our duty to establish and inaugurate such broad and wise policies in this regard as will at once secure to the men who have been making such a splendid fight against the common enemy a well-earned and justly deserved reward, and which will tend to the general advancement and well-being of the province. #### BRITISH AIRMEN HAVE FIELD DAY ON WEST FRONT

Ten German Machines Downed and Others Had to Quit—Two Enemy Planes Destroyed—Serbs Still Succeed.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Dec. 6.—In the Loos district, a squadron of British aeroplanes successfully bombarded a railway station and an enemy aerodrome. Ten German machines were driven down and others were forced to land, unable to cope with the ferocity and skill of the British attack. Two German aeroplanes were completely destroyed.

There is considerable hostile artillery fire at Loos and on the Ypres section of the western front. The British batteries effectively replied to the enemy bombardment and repelled all attacks.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, Dec. 6.—The enemy made a surprise attack on the Italian positions north of Sant Caterina last night but the attempt to break through failed, the Italian machine gun fire proving an effective barrier to the Austrian infantry.

#### SERIOUS FIRE AVERTED EARLY THIS MORNING

The fire brigade was called out at one o'clock this morning to Chaloner's Studio on Sixth Street. The outbreak resulted from the blowing out of a chimney stopper and, for a short time, it looked dangerous. The flames threatened to spread to the Empress Theatre and to the store of McRae Bros., Ltd. Fortunately the blaze was caught in time and the brigade very quickly put it out.

#### PREMIER ASQUITH RESIGNS -- BONAR LAW OFFERED POSITION

GREAT POLITICAL EXCITEMENT IN LONDON -- POSSIBILITIES OF GENERAL ELECTION DISCUSSED -- CRITICISM OF BALFOUR AND GREY LED TO THE PREMIER'S RESIGNATION

London, Dec. 6.—At the conclusion of a day of extraordinary political excitement and activity, King George accepted Premier Asquith's resignation as leader of the coalition government and offered the premiership to the Rt. Hon. Andrew Bonar Law. There is no announcement as to Mr. Bonar Law's decision. Should the latter decline the premiership, Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Minister for War, is the most favored selection for the responsible post. There is considerable controversy regarding the possibilities of the holding of a general elec-

#### IMPORTANT SHOWINGS ON ROCHER DE BOULE

Important development work has been in progress at the Rocher De Boule mine for some time and there are now signs of most gratifying results. #### BARS TO BE CLOSED IN QUEBEC PROVINCE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Quebec, Dec. 6.—The provincial government of Quebec, following a caucus of the Liberal party, has decided to abolish open bars throughout Quebec, permitting the continued sale of liquors under a revised system, the details of which have not yet been decided upon. This action is the result of an interview with Premier Gouin by a hundred prominent women representing the temperance interests.

tion. It is understood, according to reports from usually well informed quarters, that Premier Asquith resented the outcry against Viscount Grey, whom government critics hold responsible for the late developments in Greece.

It is also believed that Mr. Asquith refused to request the Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour to resign his post as First Civil Lord of the Admiralty. The Morning Post and the Northcliffe press have been severely critical of Mr. Balfour's administration and have been clamoring for drastic changes in the British campaign against the German submarines.

#### Food Restrictions.

The Board of Trade has passed an order, becoming effective on December 19th, that no evening meal served in hotels, restaurants or any public place shall exceed three courses and that other meals shall not consist of more than two courses.

It is the intention of the board to take steps at an early date to forbid the consumption of meat, poultry and game on certain days of the week both in public places and in private houses.

#### PREPARING FOR BIG DEVELOPMENT WORK

The Edmonton syndicate which is carrying on extensive development work on the Knauss property at Dorreen are arranging for the incorporation of the company and it is expected that A. L. Shaw, of Stettler, B. R. Jones, of Skeena Crossing, and the others interested will be in the city within the next few days.

Forty men are at work erecting permanent camps and a smaller force is driving a tunnel. Everything is being got ready for big development work in the spring and machinery and supplies will be hauled in on the snow this winter. This property gives every promise of becoming one of the big producers of this district.

#### BY-ELECTIONS

The by-elections arising out of the appointment of the members of the new cabinet will take place on December 30th, nomination day being December 23rd. The necessary arrangements are being rushed through, though it is not anticipated that there will be any contests.

### GREECE

The truth about the Greek situation is coming out gradually, and it becomes apparent that Constantine is still, as he always has been, a Teutonic sympathizer. It may be that the Allies have been slow in bringing pressure to bear upon the Royalists in Greece, yet had they not practically taken possession of Saloniki at the outset of the Balkan trouble, the situation today would have been much more grave. There is no doubt that the Allied occupation of Saloniki was an important factor in the "benevolent neutrality" of the Greek monarch, but it is equally certain that fear of Venizelos and his democrats was a still more important factor. Had Constantine been certain of an united Royalist Greece, he would have joined the Bulgarians and Turks long ago.

The Allies long since sensed the true meaning of the situation and their repeated demands for more and still more concessions were simply a continued effort to bring Constantine to the scratch. He yielded one point, and a greater was demanded immediately, until the crisis was reached, when the Greek King had to surrender all to the Allies or fight. The whole round of Greek diplomacy has been typically Teutonic in its efforts to stall off the day when the Allied armies in Greece would be free to advance to the north to drive out the Germans, Bulgarians and Turks. The advance on Monastir was merely a preliminary movement to occupy a portion of the army until such time as the Greek situation was finally cleared up and done with. The crisis has arrived, and the Allies are ready. That they will act promptly and effectively is

certain. The time for delaying and compromise is long since gone and determined action on the part of General Sarraill and Admiral Du Fournet is the only solution of the difficulty. The Venizelists will probably to a man join the Allies and the Royalists should not present any great obstacle. The Allies have the whole winter before them to make a complete job, as there is little likelihood of any big advance north being made before spring. With Athens, Piraeus and Katerina in Allied hands, and Constantine and his supporters in safe keeping until the end of the war, the French, Serbian, Italian and British armies will be ready to sweep north to oust Von Mackenzen and his army from Rumania.

By spring, the demand for German reinforcements on the western and Galician fronts will have become so insistent that Mackenzen will receive little assistance from these quarters and he will find that his new and extended battle-line is a weakness which will prove his undoing. Germany and Austria are hard put to it now to keep the various divisions up to fighting strength and the Belgian garrisons have been largely depleted to fill the ranks on the various fronts. There is no longer a vast reserve to draw upon. An appearance of strength has been kept up by quoting the German army figures as so many divisions, but military experts who have gone fully into the situation state that a German army division is no longer what it was and that they have been reduced in size by as much as twenty per cent during the last few months. The Balkan situation was brought about by Germany in order to

spread the small armies of the Allies, but next spring the shoe will be on the other foot and Germany will have a big struggle to keep her armies intact for any length of time over such a wide area. The beginning of the final titanic struggle has come with the definite stand taken by the Greek King. It can have but one ending.

tion and to leave nothing undone to care for the men who come back.

"The adoption and operation of a workmen's compensation law which would do away with the costly litigation which men have been put to in order to obtain just compensation was for years a part of the Liberal platform. This will be one of the matters that early attention will have to be given to, so that our policy may be put into effective operation. The appointment of a board for the administration of the act will be one of the government's first activities.

"In the matter of the extension of the franchise to women, a simple act of justice which has been another of the party's policies, which a recent vote proved the people to be overwhelmingly in support of, our policy and our pledge, which will be implemented, and the women will have their first opportunity for enrollment as voters at the revision of the lists early next summer."

#### Investigate Elections.

"The government will take such steps as it finds necessary to have investigated every phase of election wrong-doing, with a view to ascertaining the facts in relation to all charges and imposing punishment where guilt is proved, and it will take the earliest occasion to have enacted by the legislature such laws as will effectively prevent all election irregularities or attempts at them.

"In choosing my colleagues I have kept in mind the one requirement of prudent and efficient administration of the people's business in the position of trustees, to which we have been appointed by their voice, and I believe that the cabinet will be approved by them. I have every confidence in the ability and loyalty of the men whom I have chosen to assist me, and the administration of the departments is quite safe in their hands. For them and for myself in the arduous duties which we have before us I ask the forbearance and co-operation of the people."

### FROM FAR AND NEAR

Dr. P. Rottenburg, of Glasgow, Scotland, has been successful in a suit against R. P. McLennan and the Bank of Vancouver for the return of \$6,000 paid for stock in the bank. Judgment was given against Mr. McLennan. The court held that fraudulent representations had been made when the stock was sold.

It may be found necessary to close one of the provincial jails in Saskatchewan owing to the falling-off in crime. The abolition of the bar and the reduction in unemployment are given as causes for the decrease.

It is reported that R. J. MacKenzie, son of Sir William MacKenzie, is at the head of a syndicate to mine coal on the eastern slope of the Rockies, north of the Yellowhead Pass. The syndicate claims to have splendid anthracite forty miles from the Canadian Northern Railway and that they will be able to reduce the price of coal in Western Canada when they start shipping.

As a result of the boycott of dear foods, Turkey was forced down to five cents a pound in Pittsburg the other day. The police reserves had to be called out to quell a riot when the hucksters and cold storage men met in conflict.

Health Commissioner J. D. Robertson, of Chicago, is dieting a squad of men to show that the cost of food can be reduced to 40 cents a day. The squad asked for Turkey for dinner the other day but it was ruled out as being too expensive. They got roast chicken instead.

Ambassador Gerard is returning to Berlin carrying final instructions from President Wilson as to the views of the United States regarding the deportation of Belgians.

Seattle is planning to link up its power system with that of Tacoma, the new pole line costing \$100,000, each paying half. There is a counter-proposal that Seattle buy 5,000 kilowatts from Tacoma for a period of three years.
