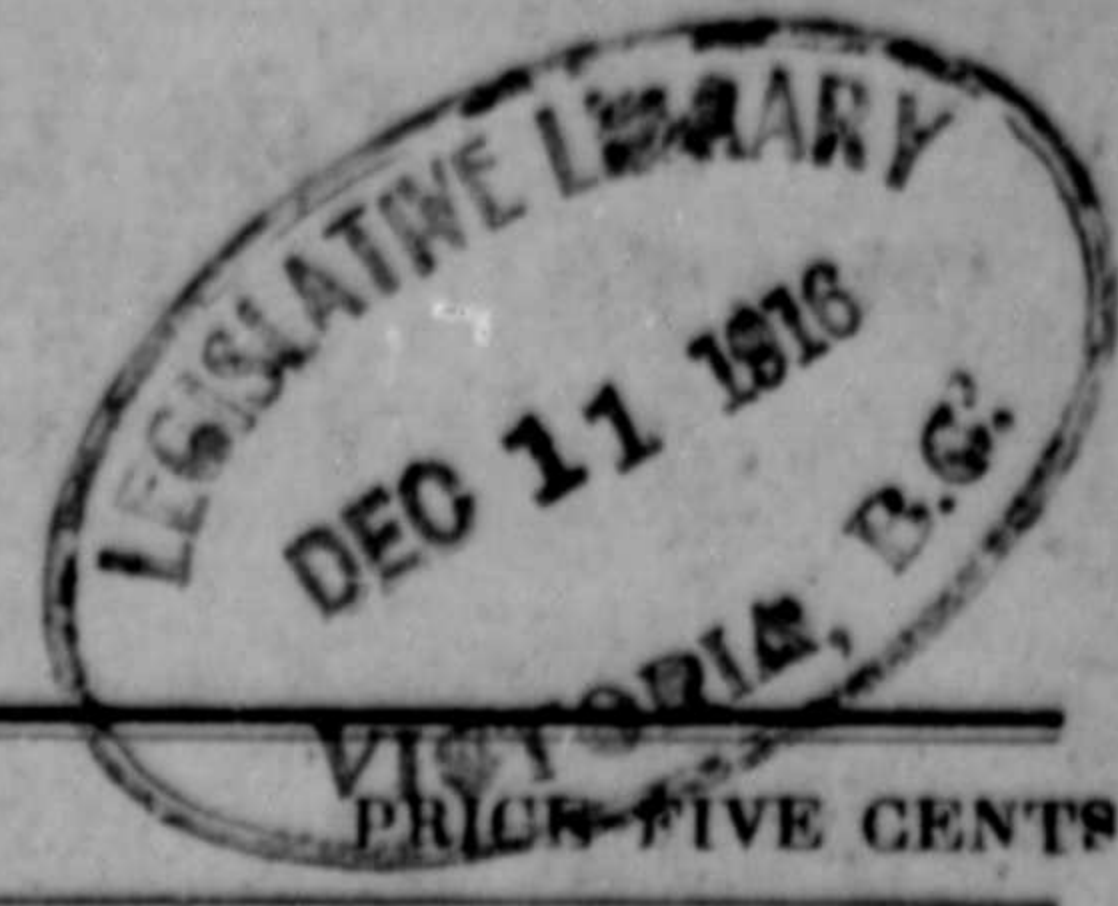

LLOYD GEORGE ACCEPTS THE PREMIERSHIP

HUN SUBMARINES BOMBARDED FUNCHAL -- ENEMY CLAIMS BUCHAREST FALLEN

LLOYD GEORGE HAS ACCEPTED PREMIERSHIP

Bonar Law Declined—New Premier Will Form a Coalition Ministry—Many Killed By Explosion.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 7.—Rt. Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, who was called upon by the King to accept the premiership, at a second interview with His Majesty, intimated that he was unable to form an administration. He suggested that Mr. Lloyd George be asked to undertake the onerous responsibility, and the King summoned the Secretary of State for War, who officially accepted the premiership.

The press association understands on good authority that the new Premier is endeavoring to form a ministry regardless of party differences, his idea being to get together the best brains in the country to carry on the affairs of the nation in the present crisis.

Munitions Explosion.

It is officially announced that twenty-six women have been killed and thirty injured in an explosion in a munitions factory.

GERMANS CLAIM BUCHAREST HAS BEEN CAPTURED

Huge Rumanian Territory Now in German Hands—Allied Army May Be Encircled—British Raid in the West.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 7.—The fall of Bucharest and Ploechti is announced in an official German communication. The report is unconfirmed from Entente sources.

The German report states that the enemy now controls fifty thousand square miles of Rumanian territory and it is believed that the defending Russian and Rumanian armies are endangered on account of the armies of the Central Powers having made a wide encircling advancement.

Western Front.

The British raided the German trenches last night at Neuville and St. Vaast wood.

The Germans attempted an attacking movement in the Champagne region but were dispersed by the French artillery.

Italian Front.

Reports from Rome state that the Austrians attacked the Italian positions at Scatolari, but the attempted advance was repelled.

MUNICIPAL MOVEMENT MEETING LAST NIGHT

There was a very meagre attendance at the meeting of the Prince Rupert Municipal Movement last evening in the Empress Theatre. W. J. McCutcheon opened the proceedings by stating that the movement was for the general welfare of the citizens. He said the present council was very slow. It had done nothing. It had not a leg to stand on. He said that there were members of the council present and it was up to them to defend their lack of action and explain to the meeting what they had done during the year. He said the meeting was called in a semi-public way. He then called upon Mayor McCaffery to address the meeting.

Mayor McCaffery said that he was especially interested in this movement as it was a new organization in a new city. He was very much disappointed that there was such a small audience, as he hoped that there was a larger interest in the movement. He was amazed at the remarks of the chairman, who had given him the impression that someone had tried to "slip one over" on him. He had been waited upon by the committee, who explained that they wanted him to join in this movement, with a view to uniting the citizens for their welfare. The committee explained to him that it was their object to avoid a mayoralty contest this year in order to devote their attention to the electing of a strong council.

The mayor said very emphatically, "I will not for a moment seek to defend the present council. Its acts are well known to all of you. If you are not satisfied, you will have an opportunity of saying so later. I am not here to take part in a contest. There is no contest. If this organization, or any other organization, cares to bring out a candidate, I will meet him on this or any other platform and will discuss every phase of the city's affairs, but there is plenty of time after nomination day to do that. This meeting was not called for any such purpose, or I was misled by the committee."

The mayor went over the points in the platform of the movement. He said that he favored the organization of labor. He had been a union man, and would be so again, if the occasion arose. He favored permanent rather than temporary work, always provided they had the funds to do the work. With regard to the G. T. P., he would, had he the power, compel them to open a steamship service to the Orient tomorrow; he would compel them to operate a transcontinental railroad, and he would compel them to make the waterfront a hive of industry.

"I came to Prince Rupert over seven years ago, after visiting each of the western provinces and most of the big cities in the United States," said the mayor, "and I decided that Prince Rupert, with its vast possibilities, was the place I wanted to locate in for the rest of my life. Today, after being here for over seven years, I have the same confidence in the city, and no man is more anxious to see it develop along the right lines than I am. Now, it is pretty cold tonight and the weather seems to have affected this movement. I am disappointed that the 'get together' movement does not show signs of more strength."

Mayor McCaffery left the platform amid cheers.

Ald. Casey said the mayor and the chairman did not seem to grasp the full meaning of the meeting. One of its objects was to avert strife. The idea was to bring all classes together to fight a common enemy, the G. T. P. It had been thought wise to get the co-operation of Mayor McCaffery in the movement. He did not think the chairman was justified in making a wholesale attack on the 1916 council. He hoped that Mayor McCaffery would not feel that the committee had broken faith with him.

Ald. Casey said that every effort should be made to force the G. T. P. (Continued on Page 4)

GERMAN SUBS. SHELL FUNCHAL AND SINK SHIPS

British Cable Station BombarDED and French Gunboat Sunk—34 Men Lost—Civilians Are Killed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Dec. 7.—A Havas despatch from Lisbon states that a German submarine fired fifty shells on Funchal, capital of the Island of Madeira, in the Portuguese group to the north of the Canaries in the Atlantic, off the northwest coast of Africa. Several Portuguese residents were killed. The submarine bombarded the British cable station and other public buildings in this picturesque little city.

The British cable steamer Dacie was sunk, while the French steamer Kangaroo suffered a like fate, at the hands of a submarine. Another German undersea boat sank the French gunboat Surprise, which was lying in Funchal harbor. Thirty-four of her crew perished. This is the first occasion on which the Germans have attacked Portuguese territory since Portugal declared her alliance with Britain and France.

INTERESTING LECTURE BY AMERICAN CONSUL

At the Fortnightly Club last evening, G. M. Hanson, American Consul, delivered a most interesting and instructive address on North Borneo and the Orient. He described Borneo as the last outpost of civilization, the place where East meets West and the end of the world, approached from either side.

He gave a highly interesting description of the people of Borneo. He said that they were originally Malay but had intermarried with all the people of the Orient. They are very superstitious, and were originally very warlike and given to head-hunting. Their religion is mostly Mohammedan.

The lecturer referred to the Chinese as a very religious and industrious people. He described them as great philosophers. There are no schools in Borneo, but missions. He attributed the low morals of the people to opium and liquor. One of the most interesting parts of the address was that in which Mr. Hanson described the foods peculiar to that part of the world, which include bird's nest soup and shark fins. His description of the methods employed in the killing of crocodiles and elephants was also followed with close attention. Mr. Hanson also dwelt upon conditions in China, Japan and India, making a comparison of these countries from a commercial, religious and moral aspect. The lecture was listened to very attentively and Mr. Hanson was accorded a very hearty vote of thanks at the close.

Solos were rendered during the evening by Mrs. J. H. McMillan and S. Darton, and the ladies provided tea and cake.

BORDEN OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN FOR RECRUITS

Bennett Told to Go and Enlist—Others Did Not Speak—Serious Charges Made By Dewart.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—Premier Borden opened his recruiting campaign here last evening, when he addressed a large gathering at the Monument Nationale. The Premier was given an excellent hearing, but his colleague, R. B. Bennett, the chairman of the National Service Board, was subjected to many interruptions in the course of his speech. The audience asked him why he did not enlist and hooted him when he finished his address.

Minister of Inland Revenue Patenaude was continually interrupted and Hon. T. Chase Casgrain, Postmaster-General, and Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, who were scheduled to speak, remained silent on account of the interference with the two previous speakers.

Serious Charges. Belleville, Ont., Dec. 7.—At a Liberal conference here yesterday presided over by George P. Graham, Hartley H. Dewart maintained that the London agents of the International Nickel Company are an enemy firm, despite the naturalization and change of name of the two German members of it.

HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The American schooners Seattle, Omaney and Polaris are in port with good fares, despite the dirty weather outside. The Omaney has 60,000 pounds of halibut, the Seattle 50,000 and the Polaris 50,000.

ASQUITH RESIGNS

It is typical of the temperament of the British people that the country should be embroiled in political turmoil at the most critical stage in the history of the war. In Germany, such a state of matters could not be imagined, as, there, criticism is dealt with more than firmly.

The news of Premier Asquith's resignation comes as a surprise after the statement issued by him in the House of Commons two days ago to the effect that the King had consented to a reconstruction. The generally accepted opinion was that the King had agreed to the proposals of Lloyd George and his supporters for a small, compact war council, to take the place of the usual cabinet.

Now that the premier has resigned and Mr. Bonar Law has been called upon to take the premiership, it is not unlikely that there may be a general election, critical though the war situation still is. Mr. Bonar Law may be accepted confidently by the people as leader, but a patched up cabinet peace is never satisfactory and there is a big possibility that fresh ruptures may break out at the first opportunity. The Liberal policy of trusting the people generally works out to the best advantage, and there is little doubt that there is a strong section of the British public who would prefer to see Mr. Lloyd George at the helm. Able man though he undoubtedly is, Mr. Bonar Law lacks the fire which is the great strength of the "little Welsh attorney".

Mr. Bonar Law became leader of the Opposition pretty much in the same way as Sir Robert Borden became Premier of Canada. It was a matter of

compromise, in order to save a rupture between the Walter Long and the Austin Chamberlain factions in the Conservative party when Mr. Balfour was ousted from the leadership. Mr. Law is a clear-headed far-seeing business man, and he has given evidence of considerable ability, but there is little to show that he will succeed in binding together the warring factions of the coalition government when a leader of the stamp of Mr. Asquith has failed to do so.

In spite of the Northernite criticisms, Mr. Asquith has proven himself a leader of genius since the war threw upon him the burden of presiding over a cabinet which was divided against itself from the beginning. He is advanced in years and not so prone to smile at criticism as he once was and there is little doubt that the constant clamor for the resignations of Mr. Balfour and Viscount Grey, tried men of the old school, caused the break which led to his retreat.

There is little doubt that an election would lead to the "ginger group" winning out, with Lloyd George as Premier and Sir Edward Carson not very far away, and the probability is that this will happen. At the time of writing, Mr. Bonar Law has not announced his acceptance of the premiership and it is not unlikely that he will decline it and that the present Secretary of State for War will be asked to form a government. Mr. Lloyd George has invariably shown a wonderful ability in rising to any occasion and any task, and it would appear at this distance that he is the man for the "big job".

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The German aviators will soon take to keeping pretty near the earth if there are many more British raids like that of Tuesday. The Allies undoubtedly rule the air as they do the sea.

Andrew Bonar Law, who has been offered the premiership of Britain, is a Canadian by birth, but spent most of his early years in the vicinity of the river Clyde in Scotland. Strange to say he is not a lawyer, but a business man, having been largely interested in the steel business for years. He can hold his own with any of the lawyers in debate.

The Bulgarian capital has ambitious plans for the Teutonic forces after they have taken Bucharest. In proposing to link up with the Greeks and form a line right across to Avlona on the Adriatic the Bulgarians are leaving out of account a very important factor—the Allied armies in Macedonia and Greece.

The ladies of Quebec do not yet have the vote but they seem to have a considerable amount of influence since they are to have the bars closed in that province. Canada will soon be without a bar from coast to coast.

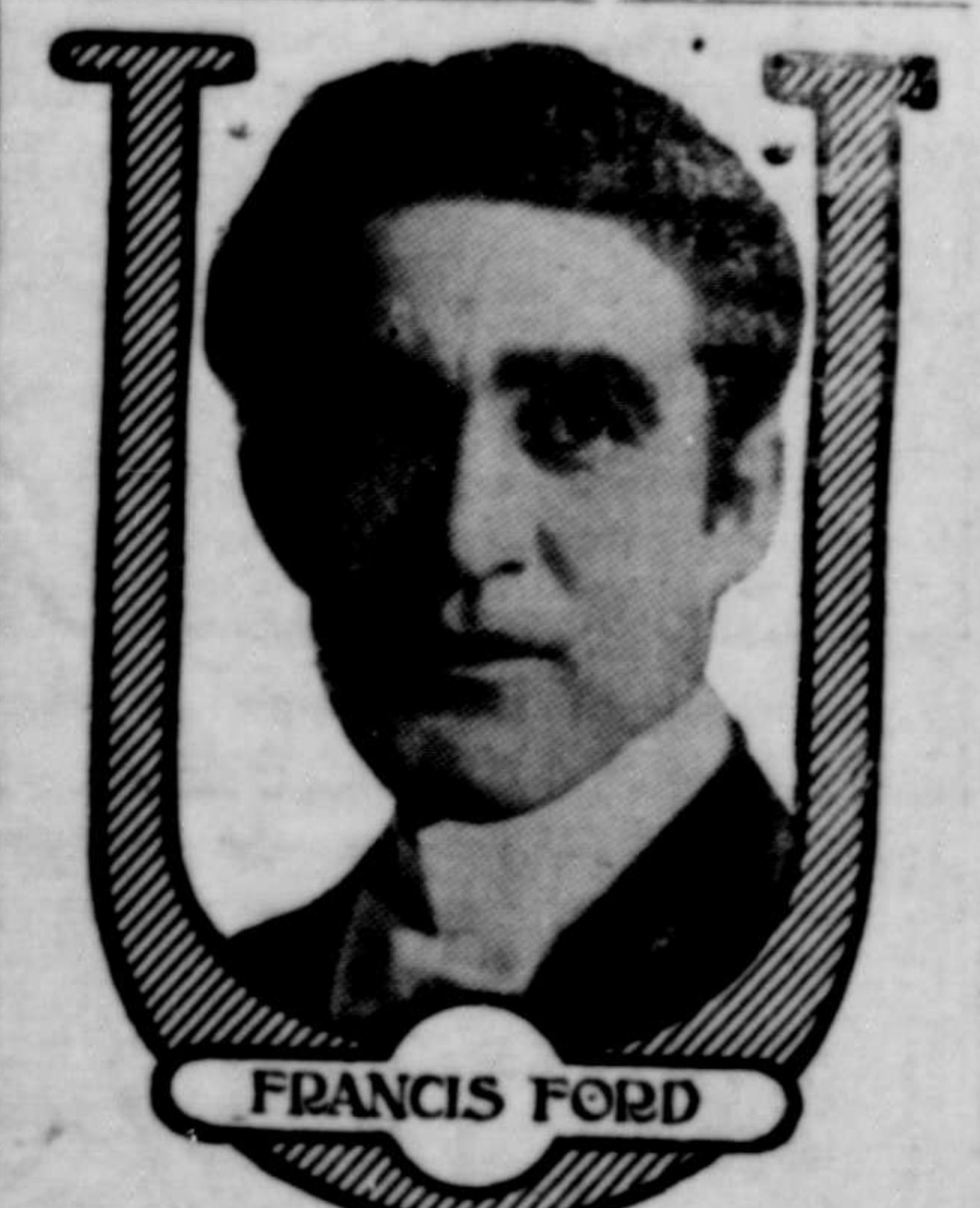
FROM FAR AND NEAR

British Plantation Rubber Is Saving Canada Millions

Low Prices of Rubbers and Overshoes Due to Britain's Control of Situation

Here in Canada many of us have fallen into the truly Anglo-Saxon habit of considering the "Mother of Parliaments" slow and a bit behind the times. The present price of rubber, when its cause is revealed, affords one of the many proofs that such an opinion is away off the mark.

Thanks to great rubber plantations established, in the face of criticism and ridicule, many years before in her tropical Dominions, Great Britain at the outbreak of the war held a firm and tightening grip on the world's supply of raw rubber—a grip reinforced by her dominating navy. Neutrals have been allowed all the rubber they want, at prices actually lower than before the war, so long as they prevent any of it from reaching the enemy, while Canada and other parts of the Empire have an abundant supply at equally favorable Government-regulated prices.

In this foresight and generosity of the British Government lies the reason why rubber alone, of all the great staples, has not gone up in price—why rubbers and overshoes, in spite of increased cost of fabric, chemicals and labor, are as inexpensive as ever, while shoes are costing several dollars a pair more. Wearing rubbers or overshoes through this winter to protect these expensive shoes is more than practical thrift—it is grateful patriotism, for in thus saving leather we make it easier for the Government to secure the absolutely necessary supplies of this alarmingly scarce material for our soldiers.

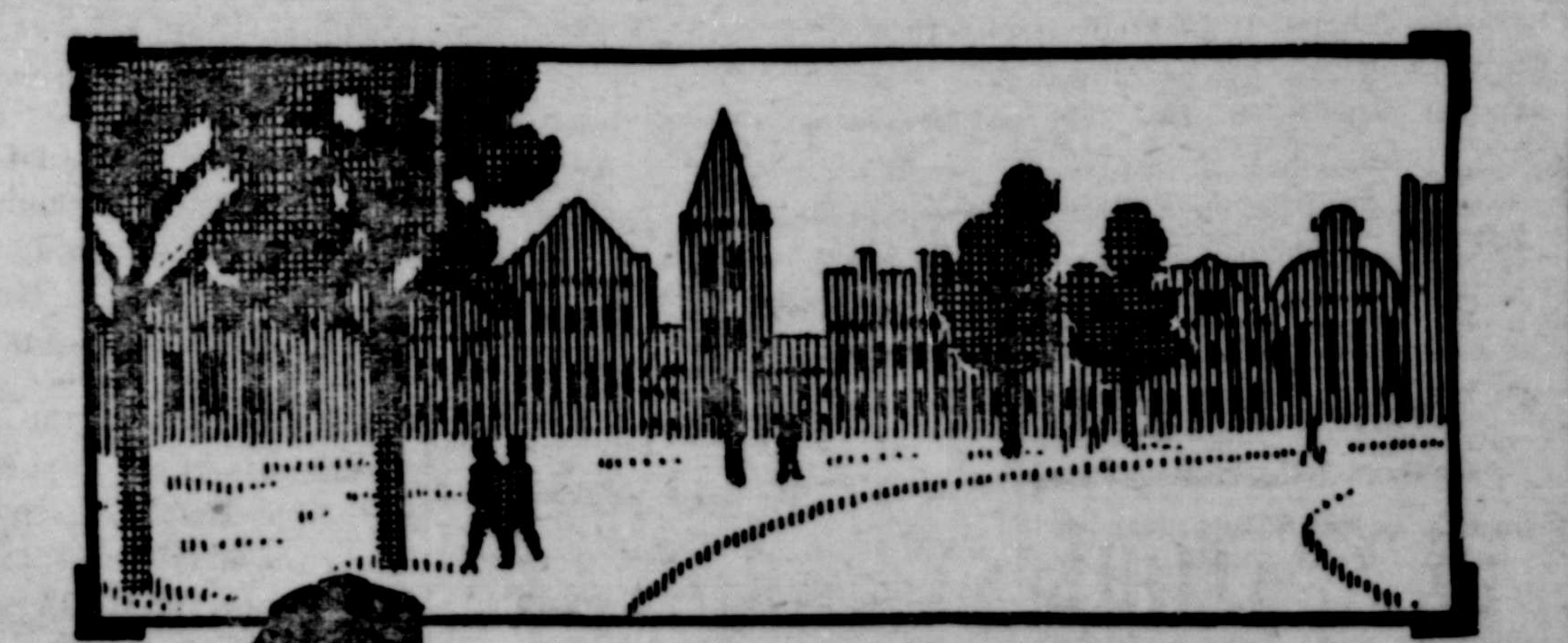

T. P. to give sites to industries. He said that J. S. Emerson, who wanted a sawmill site had been negotiating for months and could not get a satisfactory lease. He thought the city should arrange some basis upon which the company would give leases.

He also referred to actions by the local merchants, which had been brought to his notice. He was willing to help business men extend their scope but he would always oppose them when they worked harm to the people. He instanced the boycotting of a peddler and the shutting off of the butter supply to the city market. He said he would bring this matter before the council and would see if it could be taken up at Ottawa.

Ald. McClymont said he had come to listen and not to speak. He did not think that the present council was the best that ever was, but he thought it was entitled to credit for what it had done. He favored the election of police and license commissioners

by the people, especially since prohibition was coming into force.

A. W. Edge said that he thought the main issue was whether the city should be run by the citizens or by factions.

Walter Shaw thought the meeting had gone astray somewhat. The idea was to stir things up.

Ald. Montgomery thought that the fault-finders should come forward and state just what they thought should be done. He believed that the G. T. P. had made breaches in their contract, but they had excuses. He did not think that politics should be carried into municipal affairs.

He would like to see the police and license business handled by the council.

Ald. Casey said at the close that one of the objects of the meeting was to find a mayoralty candidate. He wanted an expression of opinion as to whether Mayor McCaffery should be elected by acclamation. The matter was left over until next Monday.

Another meeting will be held in the Carpenters' Hall on Monday evening.
