

SLOCKADE OF GREECE MAY START IMMEDIATELY -- RUMANIAN ARMY IS SAVED

JOFFRE MAY BE LLOYD GEORGE SUPERSEDED IN HIGH COMMAND

Bucharest Evacuated.

The Rumanians have evacuated Bucharest quietly, excepting for a rear-guard action, a small section of the defending army being forced to fight strenuously to cover the retreat of the Rumanians, who are falling back along the entire line from the Transylvanian Alps to the Danube.

ALLIES DEMAND EXPLANATION FROM GREECE

Blockade May Start Without Any Further Delay-Greece Could Stand Siege for Only Twenty Days.

Athens, Dec. 8 .- The Russian, Italian, Fernch and British ministers called in a body at the Greek Foreign Office yesterday and demanded an explanation of the Greek military activity.

It is believed that it is the intention of the Allies to immediately start a blockade of Greece. without notice.

THE NEW PREMIER

The appointment of Mr. David Lloyd George to the premiership will meet with practically universal approval. The situation demands a man of action and genius, and the late Secretary of State for War has shown himself to be both. There may be some who will consider him to be too radical to handle carefully a delicate situation and that he will have difficulty in holding his cabinet together. Mr. Asquith's greatest gift was that of leadership. He had the ability to combine opposing factions and get the best out of his cabinet. Mr. Lloyd George does not possess a gift of leadership of this type, but, considering the occasion, he has a more valuable gift in his power to lead and make others follow that lead.

For years, the gallant little Welshman has been the idol of the British people, who trust him implicitly. Even amongst INEFFICIENT MINISTERS the landed classes, who were so bitterly opposed to many of his schemes fro the improvement of living conditions and the transferring of the burden of taxation to the shoulders best able to bear it, he is today regarded as the great man of the war in Britain. He has shown a marvellous ability of rising to any and every occasion and that he will make a great premier seems beyond doubt.

He could not possibly keep together a cabinet of widely diverse opinions, he is not given to handling matters with kid gloves, but it is very certain that he will surround himself with men of the stamp who will support his plans because they are already their own. The man who is not ready to lay aside all old traditions and buckle to the work of winning

Is Saving Canada Millions

Low Prices of Rubbers and Overshoes Due to Britain's Control of Situation


Here in Canada many of us have fallen into the truly Anglo-Saxon habit of considering the "Mother of Parliaments" slow and a bit behind the times. The present price of rubber, when its cause is revealed, affords one of the many proofs that such an opinion is away off the mark.

Thanks to great rubber plantations established, in the face of criticism and ridicule, many years before in her tropical Dominions, Great Britain at the outbreak of the war held a firm and tightening grip on the world's supply of raw rubber-a grip reinforced by her dominating navy. From 60% in 1914, the production of these plantations has grown this year to 75% of the whole world's output, leaving only about half the requirements of the United States alone to come from all other sources.

The result has been that the needs of the Allies, enormous though they are, have been plentifully supplied, while Germany has been reduced to registered mails and the "Deutschland" in desperate attempts to mitigate her rubber famine. Neutrals have been allowed all the rubber they want, at prices actually lower than before the war, so long as they prevent any of it from reaching the enemy, while Canada and other parts of the Empire have an abundant supply at equally favorable Government-regulated prices.

In this foresight and generosity of the British Government lies the reason why rubber alone, of all the great staples, has not gone up in price-why rubbers and overshoes, in spite of increased cost of fabric, chemicals and labor, are as inexpensive as ever, while shoes are costing several dollars a pair more. Wearing rubbers or overshoes through this winter to protect these expensive shoes is more than practical thrift-it is grateful patriotism, for in thus saving leather we make it easier for the Government to secure the absolutely necessary supplies of this alarmingly scarce material for our soldiers.
