LLOYD GEORGE'S PROGRAMME IS OUTLINED

WAR COUNCIL APPOINTED--MERCHANTMEN TO BE ARMED--NATION MOBILIZED

LLOYD GEORGE ANNOUNCES PERSONNEL OF WAR COUNCIL

LORD DERBY NEW WAR SECRETARY—CURZON, FIRST CIVIL LORD OF THE ADMIRALTY—HODGE, MINISTER OF LABOR—BONAR LAW AND CURZON TO LEAD THE WAR COUNCIL

London, Dec. 11.—It is announced that the new war council will consist of Premier Lloyd George, Lord Milner, Earl Curzon, A. Bonar Law and Arthur Henderson.

Mr. Bonar Law will be the leader of the council in the House of Commons and Earl Curzon will act in a like capacity in the House of Lords. More power will be concentrated in the Prime Minister than ever before in the history of Britain.

The Earl of Derby, who managed the great recruiting campaign before compulsion was brought in, is the new Secretary of State for War; Sir Edward Carson is the First Civil Lord of the Admiralty, and John Hodge is Minister of Labor. The heads of the other departments remain unchanged.

It is believed that one of the first measures brought in by the new government may be the prohibition of the sale of spirits. It

is believed that the accumulated stocks of liquor on hand will be diverted to other purposes than use as a beverage. The distillation of whisky and gin will be prohibited.

Submarines.

The programme of Premier Lloyd George includes the arming of British merchantmen so that they may be able to fight the German submarines; a great preparation for the spring offensive; the mobilizing of the entire British civil population between the ages of sixteen and sixty; the making of the blockade effective; the rationing of the population by the issue of food tickets; the increasing of the home food production; the banning of all work not essential to the carrying on of the war, and the production of material not essential to that purpose, and the enforcing of the prohibition of the use of luxuries and the instituting of certain meatless days each week.

NEW ITALY SPRINGS FROM WAR EXPERIENCE

Editor Patrizi, of the San Francisco Italian newspaper, L'Italia, has just returned from a six months visit to the Italian front and gives an account of his experiences in a most interesting article in the San Francisco Bulletin. He spent ten weeks in the trenches of the Carso Plateau and up in the peaks, caves, ravines and gulches of the Alps. He states that the heroism, valor and skill of the Italian soldiers has made the downfall of Austria certain. "In the wonderful achievements of the Italian army, which have commanded the admiration of the world, I see, strange as it may appear, the death sentence of militarism." Italy has accomplished in one short year of war what it took Germany and Austria, with their militarist system, twenty-five years to do.

At the outbreak of the war, Italy had but 300,000 soldiers; a year later she had 4,000,000 men, thoroughly armed and equipped, and all men of from 20 to 40 years of age. They are taken from every trade and profession, and, after a few months of strenuous training, are sent straight to the front, where they are displaying the most surprising efficiency, besides bravery and heroism. Vienna itself is amazed at what Italy has accomplished in so short a time. The military experts who have visited the Italian front are unanimous in acknowledging that no other belligerent country had to contend with the obstacles encountered by the young Italian army on this mountainous front.

Kitchener's Praise.

The late Lord Kitchener, after a visit to the Italian front, advised the heads of the British army to follow the movements of the Italian army closely, as much was to be learned there.

To the End.

Mr. Patrizi asked these men, who have left their trades and

professions to fight for Italy and liberty, if they wished an early peace. Each replied that, though they would like to return to their businesses, it would be a crime to think of peace until victory was won. The general opinion was that this is a war against war and must be fought to the bitter end that militarism might be vanquished. Mr. Patrizi says he has heard more talk of peace in a few days since he returned to America than he heard in six months in Italy.

He found Italy in better shape financially and economically than in times of peace. Everything moves smoothly and regularly. Mills and factories are working at full capacity and wages are higher than ever before, which counter-balances any increase in the cost of living. There is a great shortage of coal and paper, but, otherwise, Italy was never in better shape. The spirit of the people runs high and \$400,000,000 of war bonds were sold in less than fifty days. CONSTANTINE THREATENS TO JOIN FORCES WITH GERMANY

GREECE PREPARED FOR BLOCKADE—ARMY SUPPLIED WITH AMMUNITION AND ARMS—FOOD TICKETS ISSUED IN ATHENS SUNDAY—RUMANIANS ARE FLEEING BEFORE MACKENZEN

London, Dec. 11.—King Constantine has informed the Allied ministers at the Foreign Legation in Athens that he will join with Germany if the Entente Allies break off diplomatic relations with him.

The Berlin newspaper Vossische Zeitung says that when the Entente blockade of Greece was announced, Greece had made preparations to meet it. The Greek army is well supplied with arms and ammunition. Food tickets were issued in Athens on Sunday.

Rumanian Situation.

The Rumanians assumed the offensive at Ploechti and drove the Germans back. It is reported that the Russians and Rumanians are in flight before Von Mackenzon's army of the Danube, and that the Rumanian army which was in front of Von Falkenhayn's right wing, has been annihilated.

Submarine Damage.

Ottawa, Dec. 11.—For the year

ending June 30th last, the German submarines had sunk 510 vessels. During that time 620 vessels had been built.

Deutschland Arrives.

Berlin, Dec. 11.—The merchant submarine Deutschland arrived home from her second voyage to the United States on Saturday.

LITTLE DAMAGE DONE

The high wind of yesterday did little damage around the city. There was a high sea running outside and several hunting parties had rather a rough time, but all got home safely. A launch broke away from her moorings at Cow Bay and was carried broadside across the bay and piled up on the other side. She was owned by two prospectors who had just come in from Alice Arm. They got her off and beached her at Cow Bay. A hole in the bottom is the extent of the damage.

"ALICE ARM A WONDER", SAYS FRANK MOBLEY, M.L.A.

Frank H. Mobley, M. L. A. for Alton district, returned on Saturday evening from Alice Arm where he has been looking into the transportation facilities of that mining district in anticipation of a large development in mining in the near future. Mr. Mobley, who has always been a firm believer in the future of this camp, says that the possibilities of Alice Arm are much greater than is supposed by those who have no close acquaintance with the camp. "It is going to be a wonder," said Mr. Mobley this morning, "and we must get busy on the transportation end of it very soon, so that the miners may get in their supplies more easily and cheaply than they are doing."

CANADIAN GOLD COMPANY HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

At the end of last week, The Canadian Gold Company, Limited, was incorporated to carry on development work at the Fiddler Creek property, near Dorreen. The company is capitalized at \$500,000, in \$100 shares and the public is not invited to subscribe to any of the stock. The president of the Canadian Gold Company is R. L. Shaw, M. L. A. for Stettler, Alberta, and the vice-president is D. Treadway. A strong board of directors has been appointed and all financial arrangements have been made to carry out extensive developments. The ore on this property is complex, showing gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc. The gold values are around \$25 a ton. The company purposes building a mill next spring and everything should be in full swing in the early summer and it is expected that the property will be shipping by October.

to ammunition and arms, Italy is self-supporting.

General Cadorna informed Mr. Patrizi that when Italy declared war on Austria, she had only about two dozen cannon of large calibre and not many more of the smaller calibres. When the Austrians began their great offensive on the Trentino the Italians were so short of cannon that they had to dismantle guns at some points and rush them on motor trucks to the Trentino. This lack of guns is a thing of the past and Italy's own factories are producing all sizes of guns and all kinds of munitions. Hundreds of establishments are turning out aeroplanes with great speed; motor trucks are being built rapidly and the navy yards are busy night and day. Everything has become methodic, regular, businesslike and warlike. The very temperament of the people seems to have been changed.

A new Italy has sprung up from the necessity of the war, and, when these four million men return to their homes, shops and fields, a new era of progress and civilization will follow the end of this first war of independence.

STATE CONTROL

As was to be expected, Premier Lloyd George has not wasted any time in making his plans known, in a general way, and they are along the lines which might have been expected. The situation demanded drastic action and it required a man of the fearlessness and vision of Lloyd George to formulate the new schemes.

Mr. Lloyd George has always had the faculty of expressing in word and action the thoughts which were trying to find expression from the public mind, and, in proclaiming a much wider sphere of the nationalization of industry, the new premier is simply doing what he believes to be the proper thing, and what the people of Britain for months have thought should be done.

One of the greatest difficulties of the war has been the reconciling of labor. The working man has objected very strenuously to putting out extraordinary effort to produce coal and other war necessities in increased quantity, only to see the capitalist pocket the bulk of the fruits of this extra labor. The people generally have objected seriously to paying enormously increased prices for food, when they knew that the bulk of the increase went to swell the dividends of the shipping magnates. The whole system was wrong, and the people have every confidence that Lloyd George is the man to right the wrong. He will have a struggle, but he has been struggling against odds all his life, and usually has come out on top.

The absorption of war profits will meet with the approval of all but the profiteers, and many of these will be only too willing to do their share. A complete system of state Socialism is a big scheme, but there never was a better opportunity to put such a system to the test. If the people only forget that there is such a word as Socialism, which has been made to mean many things which it was never intended to mean, everything will go on splendidly. What the movement is called matters little. What it is, is the main thing, and it is simply an uniting of every force of industry and capital towards the attaining of liberty and justice for Europe and civilization.

Much depends on the outcome of the experiment, as, if it is successful, the people of Britain will never revert to the old system again. The war has thrown people out of the grooves in which they were wont to exist, and over the edges of which they could not see. They are looking on life today with the wide-open, startled eyes of little children looking around for someone to lead them through a strange world. All the old landmarks and guide-posts have been obliterated.

For centuries, the world has been becoming more democratic. The evolution has been scarcely perceptible in most countries, though France slid suddenly, too suddenly, on one occasion. If Lloyd George's scheme of nationalization of wealth and industry is successful, Britain may suddenly take a jump forward of at least a century without feeling the bump very seriously. The great stumbling-block to Socialism has been that, though its ideals were of the highest and most beautiful description, its exponents were usually suspected of wanting something instead of giving. Today, Socialism

FROM FAR AND NEAR
The Mexican government is planning to give back to the Indians the lands taken from them during the Diaz regime. The matter is in the hands of the National Agrarian Commission.

During July, August and September, the steel plant at Monterrey, Mexico, exported 20,000 tons of steel. Most of this went to France and England. Evidently Mexico's industries have not all been ruined.

Organized labor and the farmers of King County, Washington, are to establish a co-operative movement for the supply of food at first cost. The cost of living will be thus lowered and the farmer will get a better price for his products.

Ruth Law, the daring American aviatrix, recently made a flight around the Statue of Liberty by night. Her aeroplane was illuminated by electricity during the flight.

The month just concluded was the coldest November experienced for twenty years. There were seven days when the sun did not

shine. Woodrow Wilson probably did not notice the latter fact, while Charles E. Hughes probably thought there were more than seven sunless days.

The Carranza forces are again in possession of Chihuahua and Villa has fled to the mountains.

The steamer Zealandia has just towed the steamer Liberia from the west coast of Africa to New York, a distance of 6,000 miles. The Liberia is the vessel which took Capt. Alfred C. Sam's colony of negroes from the southern states to the Gold Coast. The expedition was a failure.

The Tacoma Ledger suggests that since husbands will be scarce after the war, they will naturally be more highly valued just as spuds and eggs are in a short season.

"TANKS" DESCRIBED AS "THE DEVIL'S CHARIOTS"

The first German admission of the terror created by the appearance of the "tanks" (says a Daily Mail correspondent) is contained in a vivid description sent to the Dusseldorf "General Anzeiger" by its war correspondent, Dr. Dammert, under the heading "The Devil's Chariots":—

"The morning of September 16 dawned in mist. Our outposts crawled from their holes and stretched their heads to the light after the night had passed under a tempest of fire. They looked across towards the English lines, and suddenly the blood froze in their veins. Across the crater field crawled two mysterious monsters. Stupified by the earthquake that had raged around them all night, our men rubbed their eyes, which seemed fixed upon the two huge reptiles as if they were bereft of their senses and were watching some legendary horror. Though they had forgotten all the fear of mere man, here came something which man's brain had furnished with an overpowering mechanism. It was a mystery which gripped and fettered their vital forces, because their senses could not fathom its meaning. It seemed a moving destiny against which they themselves were powerless.

"It Is The Devil."

"So they gazed and gazed, as if spellbound. Slowly the monster came on. They limped, they swayed, they swung, but still they came. They knew no obstacles, and seemed driven forward by some supernatural force. Then to someone's brain in our trenches sprang the thought 'It is the incarnate devil that comes, and like lightning the word passed along all our lines.

"And then from the armored backs of the iron reptiles flashed the first tongues of fire. A shell whistled over our heads, and the horrible rattle of the machine-gun orchestra filled the air. The mystery monsters had given up their secret and the spell was broken. Our men recovered their wits, and with them their courage and endurance when the English storm waves burst upon our lines."

Dr. Dammert, after giving some further details, describes the tanks' effect at Fiers. "Our machine-guns and bombs broke harmlessly against their steel skins. Our connections with the rear were cut off, so that our artillery could not be brought into action against the massed fire of these barbettes, so they had no difficulty in destroying the remainder of our men left in the front trenches."

After recounting their advance through Fiers and their progress along the road towards Ligny, Dr. Dammert says: "Their approach had now been notified to the artillery, which promptly put an end to their career."
