ZEEBRUGGE BOMBARDED BY ALLIED AIRMEN

RUMANIANS COME BACK--POSITIONS REGAINED--TWO HUN SQUADRONS ROUTED

ZEEBRUGGE IS BOMBARDED BY ALLIED AIRMEN

Damage Done to Naval Works—Raids Made on Other Important Points—Washington and the Marina.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 12.—Raids by aeroplane squadrons of the Entente Allies have done much damage to the German submarine base of Zeebrugge, on the coast of Belgium. Twelve aeroplanes reached this important point and dropped bombs on the enemy naval works.

British aeroplanes also made attacks upon German military works at Brussels, Oudenarde and Leuven.

Appeal to Washington.

An appeal to the United States has been made that the hellish scourge of Belgium should be brought to an end.

Marina Case.

Washington, Dec. 12.—The United States government views the Marina case as a clear-cut violation of Germany's pledges. The information regarding this case, which has been assembled by the State Department, is being forwarded to Berlin.

FRENCH WILL FORM NEW WAR COUNCIL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Dec. 12.—The Matin states that the French government will form a war council of five members, similar to that which has been appointed in Britain.

French Air Gain.

Four German aeroplanes were brought down by French aviators yesterday, two on the Verdun front and two on the champagne.

PEACE OFFER

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, Dec. 12.—The Kaiser has notified his commanding generals of a peace offer which he has made. He informs them that it is still uncertain whether it will be accepted. He is willing to give up all occupied portions of Belgium and France in return for Germany's captured colonies and will dispose of the Balkan situation.

NEW PRINCE RUPERT-ALASKA STEAMER LINE

According to the Railway and Marine News, a new and independent steamship company is being formed, with its head office at Prince Rupert, B. C., for operation in Southeastern Alaska. The new company will receive freight from and deliver to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company. It is understood that 4,000,000 cases of salmon have already been contracted for and one steamship has been arranged for to commence operations.

The article concludes thus:—"Railway and Marine News has previously shown how Seattle could protect its halibut industry—not by memorials to Congress but by legislation passed for the benefit of one or two operators at Ketchikan—but to start the fight right here at home by forcing the waterfront wholesaler to pay 15 cents for halibut. Eliminate the work of all boards of trade, chambers of commerce or commercial clubs, as changing the laws will not accomplish anything. On the other hand, start a campaign in Juneau, Ketchikan and Seattle, first to get the various business men properly lined up and shown the error of their ways, and then assist the railroad and steamships, jointly, in their effort to so adjust their rates that they can handle the business with dispatch. Unless this is done Seattle is surely going to lose some of its canned salmon, which is going to follow the trail of the halibut."

THE RUMANIANS ANNIHILATED TWO SQUADRONS

Russians and Rumanians Recapture Lost Positions—Germans Claim Further Gains on Wallachian Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 12.—A wireless despatch from Petrograd states that the Russians and Rumanians made a stand against Von Mackenzen's army east of Ploechti and drove the Teutonic forces back for several kilometres, regaining some of the positions which they lost in the drive following the taking of Bucharest. Two of the German squadrons were annihilated.

Berlin Report.

Berlin reports that strong Russian attacks have been repelled on the Transylvanian front and that the Teutonic forces are still advancing in Wallachia.

The same report states that new attacks by the Serbians and French at the bend in the Cerna river, on the Macedonian front, have also failed.

The Teutons claim that the Hungarian and German troops, on the centre of the line in Rumania, have emerged from the swamp lands along the Jablonitz River and have crossed the river near Receanu, between Bucharest and Buzeau and are now proceeding towards Buzeu.

COUNCIL TO DISCUSS HIGH COST OF LIVING

City Solicitor Peters, at the city council last night, brought in a report regarding the order-in-council in connection with enquiry into the high cost of living. He stated that the order repealed the criminal code in regard to combines and that if any council comes to the conclusion that there is a combination to raise the price of any commodity, an enquiry can be instituted as to the cost of the article, the overhead charges connected with its sale and handling, the selling price of same and the quantities on hand in any store or warehouse. If the council is satisfied that prices are being held up or raised by such combination, it may report to the Minister of Labor, who will refer the matter to the Attorney-General, who will take action, if he thinks the circumstances warrant it, the whole proceeding taking probably six months.

In this connection, Ald. Casey brought down a resolution, which was seconded by Ald. Montgomery, suggesting that a commission be appointed by the mayor consisting of two members of council; two citizens outside of the council, one from the Board of Trade and one from the Trades and Labor Council. He moved that these gentlemen be paid \$5 per day during the time they sat on the enquiry into the high cost of living.

Speaking to the motion, he said that he understood that sugar could be bought at \$4.50 per 100 pounds in Windsor, Ont., and laid down here for about \$5.50, while the price paid here for Vancouver sugar is \$9.25 per 100 pounds. He said there were other lines which were going up in price at an abnormal rate. There was no greater consumption of these and there seemed to be an ample supply and he thought it time that an effort was made to get at the bottom of the trouble.

Mayor McCaffery said that there was a difference of opinion between the city solicitor and Ald. Casey as to the meaning of the order-in-council. He advised that Ald. Casey's motion be considered for a week pending a further re-

port from the solicitor, rather than that a resolution contrary to the order be passed by the council.

Ald. McClymont said that, if Ald. Casey's figures regarding sugar were nearly correct, it was time there was some investigation. If the city had the power, Ald. Casey's way would be the quickest way to get at the matter. He wanted to know if the city had not the power to buy say, a carload of sugar from Windsor, if the price was so low. He did not suggest that the city go into the retail business, but that it sell the sugar at cost to the merchants allowing them to make a legitimate profit. The same might be done with flour and other lines. If the merchants could combine against the city market getting butter from Alberta, there might be something the same happening in regard to other things.

Ald. Dybavn read from a clipping from a Vancouver paper, showing that the council had to pass a resolution stating that any given article was too high. An enquiry was then started and, if necessary, a report made to the Minister of Labor; he reporting to the Attorney-General.

Ald. McRae said he believed that the merchants in town would have no objection to an enquiry, but would rather welcome it. As a merchant, he was in favor of an investigation. He did not know where Ald. Casey got his figures, but he noticed that sugar was selling in New York at 9 cents. "If Ald. Casey's figures are sound, it is time we knew a little more about this," said Ald. Mc-

WAR COUNCIL

Lloyd George's new war council will meet with general approval, but the most satisfactory part of it is that Mr. Lloyd George is at the head of it. He will be the mainspring of all its actions and every member of the council will be at one with him in a combined effort to get every ounce of energy which the British people are capable of producing, focussed upon the one paramount issue, the finishing of the war and the routing of German militarism.

Earl Curzon is not just the type of man one has been accustomed to associate with the gallant little Welshman, but, as regards the war situation, his views will very closely coincide with those of the new Premier. Earl Curzon, of Kedleston, is one of the greatest men the Empire has ever produced and he has shown, while Vice-Roy in India, great ability as an administrator. He is essentially of the House of Lords but there is nothing of the proverbial complacency of that chamber noticeable in Curzon when he has set his mind to a big task.

Lord Milner is a happy selection. He was prominent as Governor-General of South Africa during the Boer War. He did not earn universal approval at that time, but neither did the government, when the people had time to review the situation calmly and clearly when the heat of battle had cleared away. He is another great administrator with a wonderful faculty of marshalling the details of any big scheme and he has the energy and power to carry them into effect. He will be an asset.

Mr. Bona Law, the first choice as Premier, who advised

the King that Lloyd George was the right man for the big job, is also a good selection. He knows the iron and steel business thoroughly; is young enough to be still looking ahead instead of acting largely upon precedent and what had been done before, and he is first, last and all the time, a good business man. He also adds strength to the council.

That Labor would be represented in the war council was certain, and no better representative can it have than Arthur Henderson. Mr. Henderson is of a much quieter type than his predecessor, Ramsay MacDonald. Instead of the fire and enthusiasm of the latter, he has a hard Scotch business head. He is trusted implicitly by his own followers and admired and respected by the whole House. Labor is playing a highly important part in the war and Labor has the right kind of representative on the war council.

It is a strong board of control, and, as we said at the outset, its greatest strength is that Lloyd George is at the head of it.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Captain Koenig has made one more successful trip across the Atlantic and return. He evidently knows the deep water route but he must be careful that he does not get too bold. A very little slip and down will go the Deutschland.

The Allies are building ships faster than they are being sunk, but it is cheaper to stop the sinking than to go on building. The arming of all merchant ships should be fairly effective. It is a fact that there is a much bigger mortality amongst unarmed ships

than amongst those which carry guns.

Lloyd George plans the mobilization of the entire civil population between the ages of 16 and 60. Coupled with the mobilization of every cent in the country, this should work wonders. Every ounce of power must be concentrated on defeating the Germans. When is Canada going to start mobilizing men and money along the same lines?

Sir Edward Carson may not know a great deal about naval matters, still his knowledge should be as wide as that of any previous Civil First Lord, and he has lots of "ginger" in his make-up. The fighting Irishman and the fighting Admiral should make a good pair at the head of the navy.

King Constantine now threatens to join the Germans if the Allies refuse to dicker with him any longer. Tino's bluff has long since been called and he might just as well come out openly for Germany as try to play the game he has been playing.

J. S. Emerson's latest letter to Mayor McCaffery shows clearly that he was met fairly and squarely by the Grand Trunk Pacific officials in his effort to establish a sawmill here. When a man or a company shows that it really means business of the right kind, the railway company is there.

FROM FAR AND NEAR

"Big Jim" Macdonell has been appointed Lieut.-Colonel and has also been recommended for the D. S. O. "Big Jim" is now in command of the 1st Canadian Pioneers.

Ex-Premier Asquith has asked permission of the King to decline the offer of an earldom and the Order of the Garter. Mr. Asquith still intends to devote his energy and ability to the interests of the people in the House of Commons.

The Presbyterian Anti-Church Unionists in Toronto have decided to issue a weekly newspaper in the interests of the preservation of the Presbyterian Church.

Washington is taking cognizance of the fact that the Japanese navy is building a new type of battleship larger, swifter and more powerful than anything proposed by the United States navy.

The White Pass and Yukon Company are to have two steam-

ers built in Vancouver. One of the vessels will operate between Caribou and Taku while the other will be for a daylight service on Lake Atlin. The boats will be built in sections and assembled in the north.

Last week, five inches of snow fell in twenty-four hours in Vancouver. Several telephone and trolley wires came down and there were many near "short circuits" on the lighting system, causing the lights to blink and give unsatisfactory illumination.

Reports from London state that there are rumors of an important post for Sir Max Aitken. He is a frequent visitor at the war office, where he has been occupied with the war film business.

Arrangements have been completed for the construction of a floating drydock at Vancouver. It will be a two-section dock of a capacity of 18,000 tons. It will also include a shipbuilding and repair plant.

The Westholme Lumber Company has failed in its appeal against the judgment of Mr. Justice Murphy, arising out of a claim for damages against the city of Victoria for the cancellation of a contract for the construction of Sooke Lake waterworks. The company wants permission to appeal to the Privy Council.

The new mace for the Canadian House of Commons, to take the place of the mace destroyed in the fire, is now completed. It is beautifully executed and is similar in design to that of the British House of Commons. It is being presented to Canada by Sir Charles Wakefield, Lord Mayor of London, and Sheriffs Touche and Sheard, all of whom are well acquainted with the Dominion.

COUNCIL TO DISCUSS HIGH COST OF LIVING

(Continued From Page One)

Rae, "and, if they are absurd, it is also well that we know."

Ald. Montgomery said that he favored the fullest investigation. Sugar, shoes and most other commodities were very high, and going higher and it was time we knew why this was. It seemed to him that it was necessary to capture three lines of trenches before anything could be done and the sooner they started the better.

Ald. Nelson read from the order-in-council to show that Ald. Casey's motion was not in accordance with the order. He favored an enquiry but it would be useless to pass a resolution, in face of the wording of the order.

Ald. Casey said that he obtained his figures in regard to sugar from a merchant who would provide the documents to prove his statements. He did not wish to move a resolution contrary to the order-in-council, his idea being to have an enquiry along the lines laid down in that order. He was willing to withdraw his resolution if it was out of order.

Ald. Montgomery said that if there was doubt as to the resolution, he thought that the council as a whole should go into the matter and take action along the proper lines. The main thing was to get started in the matter.

Ald. Casey then withdrew his motion and moved that the council go into the high cost of living according to the wording of the order-in-council.

The city solicitor said that it was clear that the council had no power to pay money to anyone to sit on any enquiry. They must first make up their minds that certain specific articles were being held up to a high price and that then they would proceed to

make an examination of prices.

Mayor McCaffery suggested that they meet in committee of the whole on Friday at 3 p. m. to discuss the matter fully.

Ald. McRae suggested that they pass a resolution now regarding any article that was supposed to be too high, so that they would have something to go upon in committee. It was finally decided to hold a full discussion at Friday's meeting and pass any necessary resolution next Monday.
