GREAT FRENCH VICTORY ON VERDUN FRONT

RUSSIA SCORNS PEACE TALK—WASHINGTON WILL NOT URGE TOWARD PEACE YET

RUSSIA TURNS DOWN GERMAN PEACE TERMS

Northcliffe Says Proposals Result of Internal Trouble—Britain Will be Far Stronger Than Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 16.—The Russian government, following a spirited patriotic speech by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, unanimously passed a resolution against the acceptance of the German peace proposals.

Northcliffe's Views.

New York, Dec. 16.—Lord Northcliffe states that Germany's peace proposals are the result of grave internal dissension, on account of the shortage of food and the seriously strained relationship which exists between the various German and Austrian states and also between Austria and Germany and Turkey.

The proprietor of the Times also states that the Prussian government has learned that the British government intends in 1917 to surpass Germany's military activity of 1914, and that from the viewpoint of guns and shells, Britain's strength will be three times greater than Germany's has been at any period during the war.

FRENCH REPLY TO PEACE TALK AT DOUAUMONT

Advance Two Miles on Six-Mile Front—7,500 Prisoners are Taken—British Gain in Mesopotamia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Dec. 16.—The French forces have made an advance of two miles in depth along a front of six miles on the Verdun front, north of Douaumont, where extensive gains were made some time ago. The French captured seven thousand, five hundred Germans along with several heavy guns.

In Mesopotamia.

London, Dec. 16.—The British Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia has again assumed the offensive and has subjected the Turkish positions to an effective bombardment. Turkish trenches were captured and the British casualties were slight, the positions being reduced by artillery before the infantry attacks were carried out.

Greek Situation.

Athens, Dec. 16.—Should the Greek government disregard the Entente note which was delivered yesterday, its attitude will undoubtedly be considered hostile.

BUYER DID BETTER THAN THE GOVERNMENT

The Monetary Times this week publishes a letter from George R. Naden in reply to Sir George E. Foster's Empire Club speech, in which he held up this city as a terrible example. The letter is published under the headline:—"Man Who Bought It Did Better Than The Government." The following is the letter, to which the Monetary Times also devotes space editorially, commenting on the productive power and growth of production of Prince Rupert.

Prince Rupert, Nov. 24, 1916. To the Editor, The Monetary Times, Toronto, Ont.,

Dear Sir:—In your issue of the 17th inst. you give unusual prominence to a portion of a speech delivered by Sir Geo. E. Foster under the heading, "the town which lies under a curse", referring to Prince Rupert. One sentence I particularly wish to draw to your attention, viz: "Who live there now? The men who have speculated and who are hanging on by the skin of their teeth and their toe nails to see if the good Lord in some way or another will send a windfall to enable them to get out of their bad business."

It is only fair to this city that you should give space for a reply to such a base accusation, entirely unworthy of a cabinet minister whom his Sovereign has honored by Knighthood.

I wish to emphatically refute such a statement and, further, counter it by saying that the citizens of Prince Rupert are not relying on the good Lord to send them a windfall, but, on the contrary, believe that "The Lord helps those who help themselves" and are energetically developing their fisheries, minerals and other natural resources. I know of no city where there are fewer speculators pure and simple and who have no other occupation.

Nor do I know of a city where there is a greater production of the necessities of life and commerce per capita.

AMERICA DOES NOT LOOK FOR ACCEPTANCE

Notes Will be Sent Without Comment—Washington Believes Time not Ripe for Peace—Deportations Opposed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Dec. 16.—The prevailing opinion in official circles here is that the time is not ripe for a peace movement. America will not ask the Entente Allies to take up the German offer now. The notes, however, will be sent to the Allied governments, but without comment, for the present at least.

Though determined to take no action towards peace now, President Wilson reserves the right to urge mediation at a later date. Representatives at Washington of the various neutral nations are said to be in full accord with the views of President Wilson. The notes will be sent, as requested by Germany, and the reply expected from the Entente Allies to Germany is, "What are your terms?" In answer to this, Germany is expected to reply, "Come into the conference we have proposed and we will tell you our terms."

Vigorous Protest.

New York, Dec. 16.—A vigorous expression of indignation was voiced, at a mass meeting here last night arranged as a protest against the enslavement of the Belgians. The deportation of Belgians was condemned in trenchant fashion by Colonel Roosevelt, Joseph H. Choate, former Ambassador to Britain, and Archbishop Ireland. Resolutions were adopted urging the United States to emphasize the opinion that the deportations are outrageous.

PIONEER MISSIONARY RETURNS FROM ENGLAND

Rev. A. E. Price, who had charge of Church of England work at Kitwanga for twenty-two years and who later was in charge at Alert Bay, arrived on the Maquinna yesterday afternoon, having come direct from England. After spending a furlough of over a year in England, Mr. Price is on his way to Massett, where he will take over church duties. He was warmly welcomed by Bishop Du Vernet on his arrival here.

KEMP UNOPPOSED

Hon. A. E. Kemp, who succeeded Sir Sam Hughes as Minister of Militia, has been returned unopposed. Under the circumstances, the Liberals of East Toronto acted in the proper spirit. So long as the Borden government remains in power, it is essential that its Minister of Militia be given every opportunity to prove his value, and, at the present time, it would have been unpatriotic to have forced an election fight upon him, when he has so many other much more important matters to attend to.

Conservatives, no doubt, would like to apply the same argument to the Borden government as a whole, but the situation is entirely different. The new Minister of Militia has taken over onerous duties at critical time in the history of the Dominion and the Empire, and there is no reason to suppose that he is less fitted for the important position than any other member of the government.

Since the outbreak of the war, the government has been given whole-hearted support by the Opposition in every genuine endeavor to carry on its share in the war, and criticism has been offered only when the circumstances were such that no honest Canadian could stand aside and say nothing. When middlemen grabbed ten per cent off the top in every contract for war supplies, and "paper" shoes were furnished to the troops, the members of the Opposition in loyalty to the people of Canada, protested in no uncertain fashion. When John Wesley Allison got away with commissions which allowed him to present his stenographer with a gift of \$105,000,

there was naturally a demand for an enquiry, yet, when Premier Borden and his colleagues were carrying on war work in the House, they received the fullest support of a loyal Opposition.

In spite of the errors made by the government, and in spite of the profiteering of its friends, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in his desire to give the government every opportunity to conduct the war untrammelled by the worries of an election, agreed to an extension of a year in the life of the present government. As the Liberals of East Toronto have just done, Sir Wilfrid did what he believed to be his duty as a loyal Canadian, in view of the circumstances in which the Dominion found itself.

The people of Canada will shortly be faced with a demand by the government that it be granted another extension of life, and it is for them to decide whether such an extension should be granted. Remembering what has just happened in Russia, in Britain and France, the people of Canada must put aside all party prejudice and must face the question of the war and its conduct more seriously than they have yet done. If they are satisfied in their hearts that the most has been made of every dollar which they have poured into the war chest; if they are satisfied that it was right that the Premier of Canada should have stood for two years of the rule of Sir Sam Hughes, and should then dismiss him simply because he had offered rather severe criticism of the Premier; if they are satisfied that a Canadian Premier is justified in harboring in his cabinet a man who has been guilty of the acts committed by Hon. Robert Rogers;

month now, I think you will find that some other people than speculators must be living in Prince Rupert.

Sir Geo. E. Foster must be "A man without a vision," if the only thing he could see worth commenting on during his trip through Northern British Columbia was a rocky lot for which a man paid \$18,000. If he failed to see the enormous resources in minerals, timber, fish and agricultural lands, the magnificent harbor with its possibilities as a naval base, the outlook for the port as a great commercial centre, as the nearest Pacific port to the Orient, having the best dry-dock and shipbuilding plant on the Pacific, then I say, if he failed to see all this, he is not the man who should be Minister of Trade and Commerce. No wonder the people of this part of Canada are looking forward anxiously to the time when the "Man with a vision," who conceived and carried into execution the building of the G. T. P., shall once again control the destinies of our Dominion.

If Sir Geo. E. Foster wished to illustrate his remarks by citing the price paid for a lot in Prince Rupert, why did he not draw his hearers' attention to the purchase made by the Dominion government, of which he is such an important member?

The lot which Sir George cites was a corner in the centre of the city, 35 by 100 feet, and the price paid was \$18,000, while the cost of excavating was estimated at \$11,000.

The Dominion government purchased four lots for a post office site and paid \$95,000 for 100 by 100 feet.

These four lots were inside lots and had no alley to the rear. The cost of excavating, according to official returns was over \$27,000. Corner lots are usually considered to be worth at least one-third more than inside lots.

If the unlucky purchaser of the \$29,000 lot, including estimated cost of excavation, had paid at the same rate as the Dominion government, his lot would have cost him over \$50,000.

Instead of Sir George E. Foster uttering senile platitudes on the folly of speculation, obvious to the meanest intellect in Canada, after the event, why did he not raise his voice during the mania and prevent the government, of which he is a member, from being absolutely the worst offender in the very city which he uses for illustrating his text?
