Trenchant Speech by Lloyd George on Peace Proposals-Germany Must Furnish Guarantees.

(Special to The Dally News.)

London, Dec. 20 .- Premier George, addressing the House of Commons last evening on the German peace proposals, said: "To enter into peace proposals of which we have no knowledge would be to put our heads into a noose with the rope end in the hands of Germany.

"Peace without reparation for the grave wrong done to Belgium and to humanity is impossible. Have all the outrages on land and sea been liquidated by a few pious phrases about humanity?



GOOD WORK

When Mayor McCaffery and his council took office in January, 1916, they did not make any pre-election promises, but, at the first meeting of the council, the mayor intimated that his understanding of their election was that the taxpayers wanted greater economy in the administration of the affairs of the city.

That Mayor McCaffery and his council have been true to their sense of the duty which devolved upon them is amply shown by City Treasurer Johnston. The report is even better than a cursory glance discloses, as higher prices had to be paid for many things, while there was an extra expenditure for material in several departments. For instance, the light department shows a saving of \$4,402.31 in salaries and wages over last year, but an increased expenditure for material brings the net saving in this department down to \$2,537.91. The total wages paid includes the amount spent in labor through the faulty working of the governor, which amount the city hopes to recover from the company installing the governor. The same, in a lesser degree, applies to the telephone department, in which the saving in wages amounts to \$780, the recent storm.




