## LLOYD GEORGE EXPRESSES NATIONAL VIEW

### WILSON APPEALS FOR CONFERENCE — SCANDINAVIANS WORKING FOR PEACE

#### LLOYD GEORGE EXPRESSED THE NATIONAL VIEW

Press Satisfied with Speech—Wilson Appeals for Conference—Scandinavians Working for Peace.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 21.—All sections of the British press agree that Premier Lloyd George expressed the views of the British nation in regard to the German peace proposals in his speech in the House of Commons on Tuesday.

##### Wilson's Appeal.

Washington, Dec. 21.—President Wilson has appealed to every belligerent nation urging that a peace conference be held. The notes were dispatched to the various nations and advance publications indicate that preparations were commenced some time ago. This information was cabled to London before Lloyd George's speech was made.

##### Bernstorff Confident.

Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador to the United States, contends that a peace conference is in sight. He said today: "It looks to me as if the matter is by no means finished by the British Premier's speech. I expect that, after one or two exchanges of notes, they will get together in conference."

##### Berlin Press Views.

London, Dec. 21.—The Berlin press hints at the possibility of an early peace. It is stated that counter-indemnities may be asked for by the Central Powers. German diplomats are reported as saying that their government wants peace on the basis of the Entente Powers forgetting the past.

##### Scandinavian Efforts.

The Scandinavian nations are reported to be joining in a movement for peace, and Holland has been asked to assist in bringing the war to an end. It is believed that Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Switzerland will undertake a plea to all the belligerents for peace. One Dutch deputy urges his country to participate in the peace conference.

#### BELGIANS ARE BEING SENT TO HUN TRENCHES

Civilians Shot Down by French Machine Guns on German Lines—Eleven More Executed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, Dec. 21.—Eleven Belgian citizens have been shot and nine more are awaiting execution, while others have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment for resisting the German military authorities in their carrying out of the deportation of Belgian civilians to Germany. The deportation continues and another court martial has commenced.

##### Belgians Shot Down.

Several citizens of Ghent, in Belgium, have been killed by French machine guns on the western front. A thousand Belgian civilians have been compelled to work on the German front line trenches on the Verdun front and four thousand have been ordered to the Somme.

##### Somme Front.

London, Dec. 21.—British troops entered the enemy lines at Gommecourt, on the Somme front, causing considerable damage to the German defences and capturing prisoners.

At Neuve Chapelle a German patrol was encountered, the leader killed and several of his men captured.

##### Verdun Front.

Paris, Dec. 21. (Official) Heavy artillery fighting continues on the Verdun front and during the night the fighting was particularly spirited in the regions of Rougemont and Chambrees. On the rest of the front, fighting is confined to encounters between patrols.

##### QUEBEC TAXES BANKS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Quebec, Dec. 21.—A bill has been introduced and given three readings quickly in the provincial legislature providing for a provincial tax on all banks to the extent of one-tenth of one per cent upon the amount of their paid-up capital.

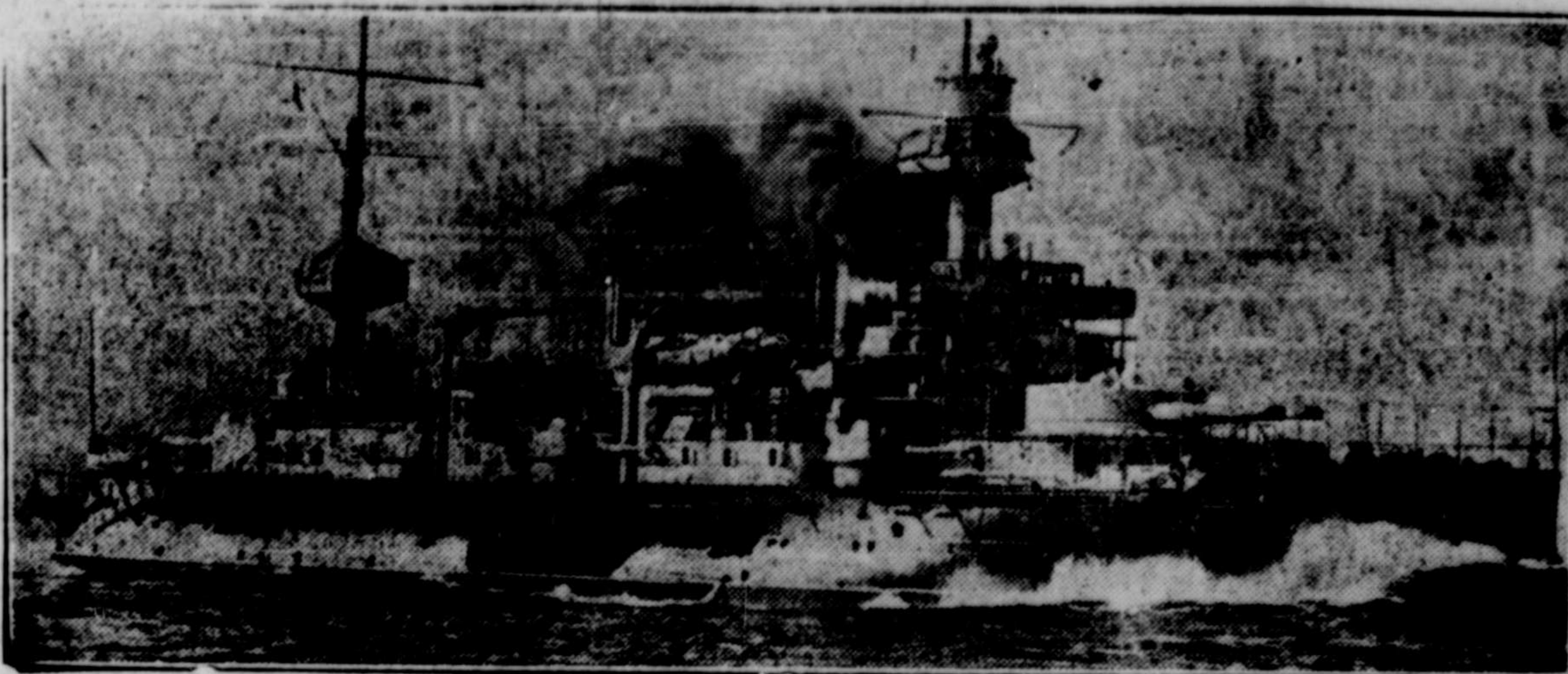

#### READY RESPONSE TO DEMAND FOR TRACK

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Dec. 21.—Officials of the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific, and Canadian Northern Railways have conferred regarding the demand of the Imperial government for immediate supplies of railroad track. Sir Harry Drayton, chairman of the railway commission, presided at the conference.

Sir Donald Mann, on behalf of the Canadian Northern, offered two hundred miles of track; the Canadian Copper Company tendered a quantity of rails and fastenings for immediate shipment to France, and smaller railways, dealers and contractors have telegraphed their willingness to surrender all available material.

#### CHINA WILL OBSERVE STRICTEST NEUTRALITY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Pekin, China, Dec. 21.—Chinese Vice-Minister for Foreign Affairs today, in answer to questions concerning rumors that China was proposing to join the Entente Powers in the war, declared that China is not considering entering the European struggle and that she would maintain the strictest neutrality.

#### WAR ECONOMY

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 21.—As a measure of war time economy, a decrease in the number of passenger trains throughout Britain will be made after January 1st, and all fares will be increased fifty per cent.

#### VANCOUVER AGAIN IN THROES OF ELECTION

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Dec. 21.—Premier Brewster and his cabinet ministers are in the city in support of the Hon. M. A. Macdonald and Ralph Smith in the by-election which is being fought today.

Meetings in support of Hon. M. A. Macdonald have been addressed by Premier Brewster, Hon. Wm. Sloan, Hon. John Oliver, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Hon. Ralph Smith, Hon. Dr. King, Hon. J. D. McLean, Mr. J. W. De B. Farris, and Dr. McIntosh. The government realizes that every effort is needed on Mr. Macdonald's behalf.

According to the opinion of Mr. McTaggart's followers, the Conservatives are uniting in support of McTaggart to defeat the attorney-general.

#### THREE MEN SWEEP FROM SCHOONER'S DECK

The American halibut schooner Sumner, well known at this port, lost three men overboard in a storm off Sitka recently. The vessel was anchored on the banks in a calm when suddenly, late at night, a gale sprung up, accompanied by very heavy snow. The anchor was taken up and the vessel put before the wind to run for shelter, when a squall struck her quarter, and a heavy sea, sweeping the after-deck, swept five of her crew overboard. Wild though it was and with heavy snow falling, two of the men were rescued, but Ole Hanson, R. Atwood and O. Haram were drowned. The Sumner ultimately made Ketchikan, from which port she left for the banks again the other day.

#### FIRST WEEK OF YEAR NATIONAL SERVICE WEEK

The first week of 1917 is to be National Service Week, when the postmasters of Canada will furnish each male between the ages of 16 and 65 with cards, a fac simile of which appeared in The Daily News a few days ago. The object in getting answers to the questions on the card is that the government may be furnished with exact data regarding the man power of Canada, with a view to making adjustments necessary for the maintenance of the agricultural and other basic industries of the Dominion, at that high point of production and efficiency so absolutely essential to the successful prosecution of the war, while maintaining unimpaired the indispensable public services of the country.

The director of National Service has in view the insuring of the maximum production of war material and equipment by utilizing the services of all available men and women in such a manner as will permit of the release from their present employment of men who, physically fit and of suitable age, may desire to serve overseas with the military or naval forces. In the interests of the Dominion and of the Empire it is essential that every male fill in replies to the questions on the card within the period stated.

#### RUMANIANS AND RUSSIANS ARE FACING ENEMY

Retreat Has Ceased—Germans are Engaged on Dobrudja—The Russians Break Line in Galicia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 21.—The Russians and Rumanians on the Dobrudja front, who have ceased to retreat before Von Mackenzen's army, are now engaging the Teutonic army.

##### Galician Front.

Petrograd, Dec. 21.—(Official) Russian troops operating in the region of the Brystitzu River, in Galicia, have broken through the barbed-wire entanglements in front of the Austro-German positions. The Germans tried an attacking movement, after a violent artillery bombardment, but were driven back into their trenches.

Our troops have also penetrated the enemy lines in front of Bohoiodozsy, and southwest of Stanislau the Germans are reported to have fled in disorder.

On the Macedonian front a very dense fog continues to retard military operations.

##### British Steamer Sunk.

London, Dec. 21.—The British steamer Flimston has been sunk by a German submarine. The chief engineer and captain have been taken prisoners but the remainder of the crew were rescued.

#### LLOYD GEORGE SPEAKS

Distrust of Germany is the keynote of Lloyd George's speech in reply to the Kaiser's proposed peace conference. It is not a distrust arising out of the fact that Germany is, for the present, an enemy, but a distrust born of the fact that Berlin tore to shreds her written word on August 4th, 1914, and turned Belgium into a road to Paris. It is a distrust of the nation which permitted and encouraged unspeakable outrages to be committed against helpless women and children in Belgium; it is a distrust of the nation which could be guilty of such a dastardly crime as the sinking of the Lusitania, with its helpless babes and women, and smile at the results: it is a distrust of the nation which first used asphyxiating gas, when its troops were no longer able to hold their own in fair combat; it is a distrust of a nation which has from the first carried on warfare against non-combatants in unprotected towns and has stooped to the lowest possible methods in trying to injure Allied interests in neutral countries. In other words, the British premier intimates that he must be shown that Germany is not only sincere in her desire for a lasting and honorable peace, but that she is ready to make ample reparation for the horrible deeds she has committed.

Von Bernstorff says that Britain is evidently ready to talk peace. Britain has always been ready to talk of a real peace. Up to the present she has talked peace in the actions of her millions of men and women; her mighty guns have belched forth talk of peace; her sons have died in thousands that peace may come upon the

earth, and the only thing which Britain and her Allies are absolutely determined on is peace. All that the Allies have been fighting for is peace, but it is not a peace which allows Prussian militarism to remain in existence. It is not an armed peace, which is the only peace understandable to the Prussian mind. Peace cannot come so long as the Prussian reigns in Germany, and there is good reason to believe that the present proposal is simply an effort to save the Hohenzollern.

Private reports from Germany clearly show that matters there are much worse than was supposed. The movement for proper representation of the people in the Reichstag is growing stronger every day, and is developing alarming signs, from a Prussian standpoint. There are not wanting signs that the Hohenzollern regime is drawing to its close, and it is not impossible that the Kaiser's peace proposal is a last great effort to save his throne for his children. If this is so, it will be a great blessing for Germany, and for the world in general, if the Allies turn down the proposal. With the Hohenzollerns driven from power, and a democracy reigning in Germany, peace would come quickly, and it would be a lasting peace. No other kind of peace can be discussed or thought of.

#### NOTES AND COMMENTS

Scott may say matters little either way, any more than does any statement made by Gosden.

By innuendo and insinuation the Tory press tried to make political capital out of what was supposed to be contained in the Scott confession. That it had to stoop to using garbled reports of this confession is a true index to the character of the Tory party in British Columbia.

Things are not running smoothly in the Ontario cabinet. W. J. Hanna, the latest deserter, was looked upon as a strong "corporation" member and an opponent of the Adam Beck party.

It is evident from Lloyd George's speech, in the House of Commons on Tuesday, that the chill he contracted did not extend to his feet. The little Welshman did not budge an inch from his former stand in regard to letting up on the war until Prussian militarism is crushed.

With General Nivelle and Sir Douglas Haig in command on the western front and Sir David Beatty in charge on the North Sea, there is liable to be some more very emphatic peace talk at an early date.
