



Another guarantee of good faith on the part of the Borden government would be to make an example of one of their cold storage supporters, one of those fellows who, under the pretext of heavy exports to feed the soldiers abroad—at the top price by the way—take advantage of this overworked excuse to squeeze the people at home for the last dollar. This fellow is a disgrace whatever way you look at him. If he takes the customary profits of peace pears and full harvests, instead of taking his medicine with the rest of us, then he is a poor patriot. If he takes double and triple profits, as he generally does, then he is a robber. It would help recruiting a great deal if the government would hold one of these land pirates up to public execration, unmask his methods, and punish him accordingly. Not sudden death-we are not spiteful-something slow and lingering. For example, he might be forced to eat all the eggs he has kept in jail for more than a year. This would make a fine busy hell for him for the remainder of his natural life. Prospective recruits would feel much better for it. They could leave their wives and mothers behind in the assurance that they would not be gouged for every dollar of patriotic fund or separation allowance to keep from starving.

Another act of grace on the part of the Borden government would be to say to all the noncombatant officers in handsome uniforms in the Pay and Records Office, at London, "It's your turn at the front. Fight or go home." The same thing could be said to



HOW STEEL HELMETS ARE MANUFACTURED

The rolled steel plate has to be supple enough to be worked cold, as heating would lessen its resisting qualities. A special steel obtain-****** pure castings, free from phosphorus or sulphur, has therefore to be used. The outer lining is made of sheepskin, whilst for the inner old cloth is utilized.

The helmets are coated with a dull grey similar to that of the '75 gun, which is difficult to dis-Linguish at a very short distance. The spraying process used has the advantage of being very rapid and of giving no inequality of surface, besides drying almost immediately. The interior of the helmet is pointed by the same process. To add to the permanence of the paint the helmets are then suspended on bars in a gas-oven, where they are thoroughly dried.

The lining consists of a cloth cap, to which is fixed a segment of black glazed (glace) leather cut in a particular form. Each skin provides at lease five linings, so that for 3,000,000 helmets 600,000 sheepskins have been used. The - Low lining projects a trifle below the
