GERMANS CLAIM SUCCESSES IN MOLDAVIA

SERIOUS RIOTING AT KITCHENER, ONTARIO—SOLDIERS RAID NEWSPAPER OFFICE

GERMANS CLAIM SUCCESSES IN ZABALA VALLEY

Teutons Have Captured Heights—Two Towns and Many Prisoners—Russians Repulsed Attacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Jan. 2.—On the Moldavian front the Austro-Germans have captured several heights and two towns in the Zabala Valley, repulsing violent Russian and Rumanian counter-attacks.

The German army on the Danube drove the Russian to the Braila bridge-head and the Teutons captured a thousand prisoners; four cannon and eight machine guns.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, Jan. 2.—South of the Pinsk the enemy has made several attempts to advance but the Russians have repelled every German effort. The Germans are using asphyxiating gas shells in an attempt to relieve the Russian pressure southwest of Brody on the Galician front.

WILLIAM MANSON HAS TEN YEARS' JOB

Victoria, Dec. 30.—Around the legislative buildings, there is a good deal of interesting gossip regarding appointments and dismissals. It is said that Mr. Wm. Manson, of Prince Rupert, has been asked for his resignation as chairman of the agricultural board which loans money to farmers. A new incumbent is ready to take the position. It is said that Mr. Manson has not yet agreed to put in his resignation. The legislation providing for the appointment of a chairman for ten years' service and it is a question, according to the views of friends of Mr. Manson, whether he can be dismissed without a vote of two-thirds of the legislature and then only "for cause."

FRENCH REPEL HEAVY ATTACKS ON WEST FRONT

German Surprise Attack Fails at Chambrettes—British Enter German Trenches East of Armentieres.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Jan. 2.—In the Champagne district, after a violent artillery bombardment of the French trenches, the Germans made successive infantry attacks on the French advanced posts at Auberville. They were completely repulsed.

The enemy directed a heavy surprise attack against the trenches captured by the French the other day at Chambrettes farm and at this point also they utterly failed in their object.

British Front.

London, Jan. 2.—British patrols entered the German trenches east of Armentieres yesterday.

The enemy artillery has been particularly active north of the Ancre, on the Somme-front, and there is considerable fighting on both sides of the Loos salient and at Faquissant on the Ypres front.

DISASTROUS FLOOD IN NORTH QUEENSLAND

London, Jan. 2.—Northern and Central Queensland have been flooded as the result of a cyclone. One hundred persons are believed to have been drowned and fifty bodies have been recovered.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT SWANSON BAY MILL

On Sunday afternoon a man named Willett was brought to the general hospital from Swanson Bay pulp mill in an unconscious condition. It seems that a band-saw flew to pieces and one of the fragments went through the ceiling to the loft in which the unfortunate man was working. It struck the roof and came back on to the head of Willett, inflicting a very serious wound. The piece of saw plowed through his skull for five or six inches, part of the brain being exposed. Immediately after admission to the hospital, he was operated upon and pieces of bone removed. He is unable to speak but has regained consciousness and is progressing as well as can be expected.

BATTLE FIELD CURIOS SENT BY JACK KELLY

Jack Kelly, who has been at the front for some time, is keeping his spare time by making the cutest things from German shell cases, etc. Mrs. Kelly recently received from him a toast rack made from the cases of two French 75s with the badge of the 48th Battalion worked out on one end. The handle and feet are made from the copper driving bands of German shells and the whole is one of the finest pieces of metal work one could wish for. Amongst the curios Jack has sent over from the battle field is a British hand bomb, with the charge withdrawn. It seems to be simply a miniature shrapnel shell. Mrs. Kelly also has a collection of German bullets which have copper casings.

PRINCE GEORGE SAILS MIDNIGHT ON THURSDAY

Beginning on Thursday first, the Prince George will leave here for Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle at 12 midnight, instead of 9 a. m. Fridays. This change will give passengers for Victoria and Seattle 9 hours in Vancouver, instead of 4 hours as under the old schedule. The northbound schedule remains as before.

FIRST EMPIRE PULP BOAT ARRIVES HERE

The first of the fleet of the Empire Pulp and Paper Company, of Swanson Bay, arrived from Port Arthur, Ontario, on Saturday and was unloaded and towed down to the mill in charge of F. Beale, the manager for the company. The boat is 45 feet long; is built of Mullin steel and has two cycle Kalenburg engines. She was built by the Western Drydock and Construction Company, of Port Arthur, in which the Whalens are interested.

Every seat in the Westholme was occupied last evening when Charlie Chaplin was presented in his latest Mutual scream "Behind the Screen." It is one of the funniest Chaplin films ever shown and is a scream from start to finish. This is one of the latest Mutual Chaplins and is not in the least like "Behind the Scenes" which was produced some time ago.

GRAPHIC ACCOUNT OF A NIGHT ATTACK

Thomas H. McCubbin, of Pacific, has received a highly interesting letter from his brother Jack, who left here with the 102nd. The following is an extract from it:—

"The censor debar the giving of much information, but I will try to describe an attack we made. It was a surprise affair, got up on the spur of the moment. We had been in the front-line trenches for twenty-four hours and, about ten p. m. on the second night, the sergeant major came along and picked out twenty men who were instructed to take fighting kit and meet in a certain trench.

"We did not know what we were to do and surmised that it was a working party. Owing to the mud in our trench, which in places was thigh deep and of indescribable tenacity, we climbed out of the trench and proceeded overland to our meeting place. The night was a bit moonlit and Fritz caught sight of us. A shower of whizz-bangs—about 12 to 15 pounders—immediately followed. One landed close beside me and I could feel it heave the ground beneath my feet. but, luckily, it was a 'dud', i. e. it failed to explode, so I continued my way without loss of time and jumped into the trench meeting place, incidentally, into a couple of feet of water.

"When we were all assembled, it was explained to us that we were to take part in an attack which was coming off at midnight. Our objective was a trench 600 yards from our front line. Accordingly we got out in front of our line and lay down. It was impossible to see the trench which we were to attack, but a white tape was stretched along the ground to indicate the direction of our advance.

"Promptly at midnight, our barrage fire opened up and we jumped to our feet and headed for it. As I have already said, we could not see our objective, but we knew that we had to get

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED IN KITCHENER

Serious Rioting Follows Elections—Newspaper Office Raided—Two Aldermen are Injured.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Kitchener, Ont., Jan. 2.—Following a sweeping election victory confirming the changing of the name of Berlin, Ont., to that of Kitchener, members of the 118th Battalion, on furlough, paraded the streets of the town. One person, opposing the changing of the name of the town from Berlin, endeavored to mutilate a Union Jack, which led to rioting. The soldiers raided a newspaper office twice, doing considerable damage.

Two of the newly appointed councilmen were injured during the riots, one of them being rendered unconscious through concussion of the brain. On the arrival of troops from Galt, Ont., the mayor declared the town to be under martial law.

up to the barrage and, when it lifted, we would find the trench where it had been playing. The trip across the intervening space is a kind of a dream. I remember falling into shell holes and clambering out again; dodging barbed wire and a phantasmagoria of bursting shells.

"About half way across, a large chunk of shell hit my rifle and broke it in two, so that I was left with the barrel in my hand. I remember looking at it, stupidly no doubt, and then I threw it away and continued my way armed with my shovel. I got up close to the barrage and then lay down until it lifted. Many a man gets killed by going too far ahead and getting into our own barrage.

As soon as the barrage lifted, we rushed the trench and tumbled into it pell-mell. The Germans did not put up any kind of a fight, but threw up their hands and surrendered. I threatened to brain one with my shovel and the poor devil cringed and was evidently in mortal terror that I was going to kill him. He could not speak English but we had a little talk in broken French before he was taken to the rear. He was 21 years old and had been fighting for two years; had never been wounded and was thoroughly sick and tired of the war. His principal concern was to know how quickly he would be taken to the rear."

Mr. McCubbin says that they found white bread, chocolate and other eatables in the German trench and even a bottle of beer. He says that the Germans appear to be well-fed and get a greater variety than the British Tommy.

NATIONAL SERVICE

National Service Week is here and the fact that the first week of the New Year bears that title is something in which everyone in Canada has an interest. The men are interested because it is obligatory upon each of them, between the ages of 16 and 65 years, to fill out one of the cards which the government is sending to them through the Post Office authorities. The women are interested because their co-operation is being invited, in seeing that their men-folk attend to this important duty. The children are interested because their school teachers have explained to them the meaning of National Service and the way in which father and the big brothers at home have to reply to the various questions.

To write in the answers and return the card promptly is a good New Year's resolution for every man throughout the Dominion and it has the advantage of being easy of fulfillment. It only means a few minutes' careful thought. The postman in the cities gets the hard work, for he has not only to deliver the cards; he is responsible also for their proper return. Prompt mailing of the answers will make the postman's work very much easier.

National Service means that we are to get into that frame of mind which will cause us to think of the needs of the country, to realize that the interests of the State have a greater claim on us than our self-interest. This applies to everyone, from the highest in the land to the lowest. The Prince of Wales' motto "I serve" may well be the motto of every citizen of the British Empire at this time.

There are many ways of serving the nation besides going to the front. The man on the farm and the mechanic in a workshop may be serving the nation as usefully as the man in the trenches. Every man should be doing the work which represents his most efficient service to his country.

The war is teaching us, or should be teaching us, great lessons. Terrible as are its effects, those who have faith in Canadian manhood hope and believe that the nation will emerge from this experience a stronger and a better people. If the meaning of National Service is thoroughly grasped and properly understood, if the government's call for information is responded to in the right spirit, this year will be the banner year in Canada's history.—National Service Board.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

In declaring that all peace offers must be ignored until the Allied demands are granted, the Governor-General was probably expressing only his personal opinion, but, in doing so, he was interpreting the thoughts of every loyal Canadian.

In the sinking of the transport Oihonna, Russia lost a thousand horses. Russia is better able to bear this loss than any other nation as in that country half of the world's supply of horses is owned. In parts of western Siberia there is a horse to every inhabitant and in many parts of Russia herds of horses are reared instead of cows and mare's milk takes the place of cow's milk.

The announcement of the death of Hon. T. Chase-Casgrain came as a great shock, there having



been no intimation that the Postmaster-General was seriously ill. The filling of the cabinet vacancy will likely bring a by-election, but it is not likely, judging by past procedure, that any attempt will be made to fill the vacancy of the Montreal seat.

There seems to be little method in the distribution of the National service cards, and the returning of them filled up is evidently purely a voluntary matter. As a matter of honor, every recipient should fill in his replies and return his card at once.

The British press seems to be worrying needlessly over the inexperience of the overseas Premiers in European affairs. There seems little cause for any such misgivings. The British war council has the experience and the overseas Premiers may be able to make some suggestions which, in the light of that experience, will be beneficial to the Empire.

Until the United States Supreme Court has brought down a decision regarding the constitutionality of the Eight-Hour Bill the railroads will ignore the measure in making up their payrolls.

The treaty for the sale of the Danish West Indies has been approved by King Christian. Washington is preparing for a big

naval demonstration to signalize the acquisition of the Indies by the United States.

Honolulu is to ask Congress to pass a bill permitting the importation of 25,000 Chinese. The Oriental is evidently appreciated in some parts of the United States domain.

Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary thinks the United States should not lose sight of the importance of Greenland as a possession and that a naval base should be established there. He says that Greenland is rich in mineral deposits, particularly coal.

No more Canadians are needed meantime for the Royal Flying Corps as there is a surplus of applicants and a long waiting list.

A widely signed petition, bearing the names of many prominent Canadians, has been sent to Ottawa asking clemency for contractor Thomas Kelly, who is now serving a term in Stony Mountain penitentiary for complicity in the Manitoba parliament buildings graft.

Cabinet meetings every day is the order in Victoria, in spite of its being still the holiday season. Prof. Adam Shortt is now in Vic-
