AUSTRIAN PEACE EMISSARY TO VATICAN

DESPERATE SITUATION IN AUSTRIA-HUNGARY -- THE TISZA MINISTRY MAY FALL

AUSTRIA MAKES URGENT APPEAL TO THE VATICAN

Desperate Conditions Prevail—Teutonic Allies Will Hold Conference—Another Note Expected.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Jan. 5.—The Emperor and Empress of Austria-Hungary have despatched a special emissary to the Vatican urgently requesting His Holiness the Pope to intervene for peace.

The desperate economic situation in Austria has caused a revival of the traditional antagonism of the Hapsburgs for the Prussians. The fall of the Tisza ministry is imminent, as it is believed to be largely responsible for the present situation.

The Kaiser, Emperor Charles Franz Josef of Austria, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria and the Sultan of Turkey are arranging for a conference at Vienna to discuss the policy to be pursued since the Entente Powers have refused to discuss peace except along the lines laid down in the reply to the German note.

The Foreign Ministers and Presidents of the Parliaments of the Central Powers are assembling at Berlin. It is believed that the discussion will be one that affects the policy to be pursued and has no military significance, since the representatives of the war staffs of the Central Powers have not been invited to attend.

Another Note Expected.
A general understanding exists among the Entente diplomats that another German peace proposal, this time written in the minor key, will quickly follow the conference of the Central Powers' leaders in Berlin and Vienna.

LABOR MEN DENOUNCE NATIONAL REGISTRATION

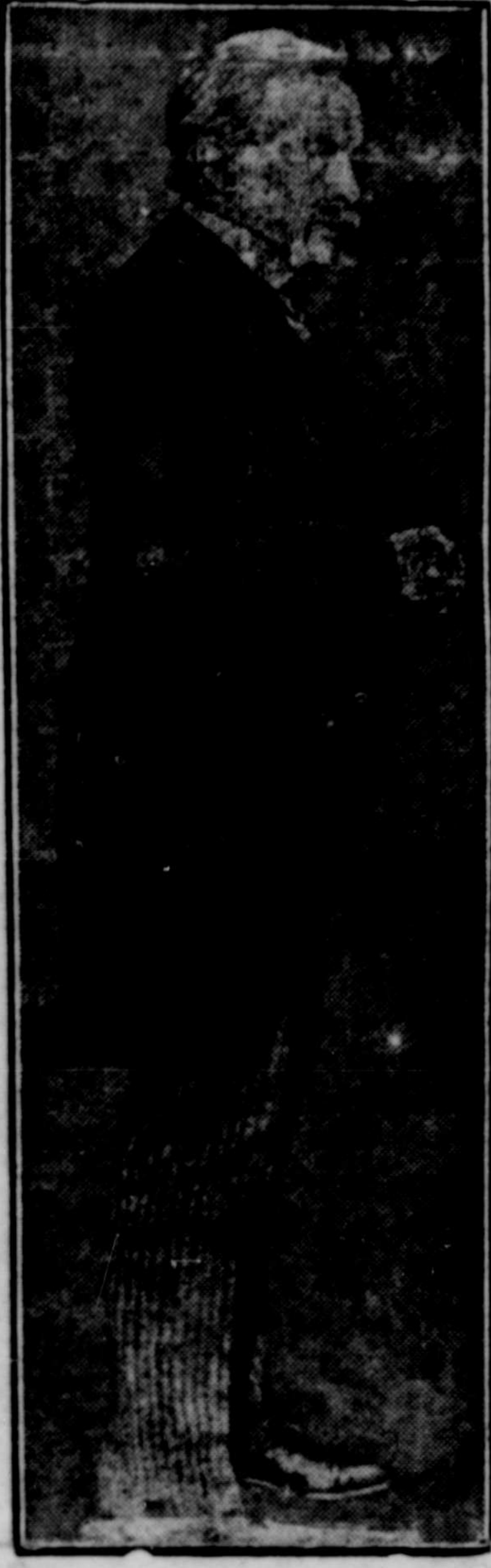

EMERSON WILL BUILD SHINGLE MILL AS WELL

Mayor McCaffery has just received a letter from J. S. Emerson stating that, after consulting with E. F. Doby in regard to the supply of cedar logs, he has decided to begin the construction of a shingle mill in conjunction with the sawmill. His plans included a shingle mill, but his idea was to delay the construction of it until a later date. RUSSIANS ARE SUCCESSFUL IN CARPATHIANS

Men and Guns Captured and Enemy Positions Taken—Germans Claim Big Gains in Dobrudja.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Jan. 5.—The Russian army in the Carpathians has captured a German advanced position, taking six hundred prisoners, three cannon and sixteen machine guns.

Another Success.
Petrograd, Jan. 5.—A Russian rifle regiment captured the village of Gulianka, taking 256 prisoners; six cannon and eight machine guns. The Russians also captured the villages of Kiovenu and Maksineni, driving the enemy occupants of both villages southward.

Germans Claim Gain.

Berlin, Jan. 5.—The Austro-Germans have captured Matchin, opposite Braila, the important Rumanian oil and grain centre on the Danube, and are forcing the Rumanians and Russians south of the Danube, where the river separates Dobrudja from Bessarabia.

Following up this success, the Teutonic armies have cleared Dobrudja of the Russian and Rumanian defenders, with the exception of a narrow strip of territory, occupied by the Russian rear-guard, forming a lane leading to Galatz. The defenders lost a thousand prisoners and ten machine guns when Matchin was taken.

THOMAS LAWSON GOES AFTER WALL STREET

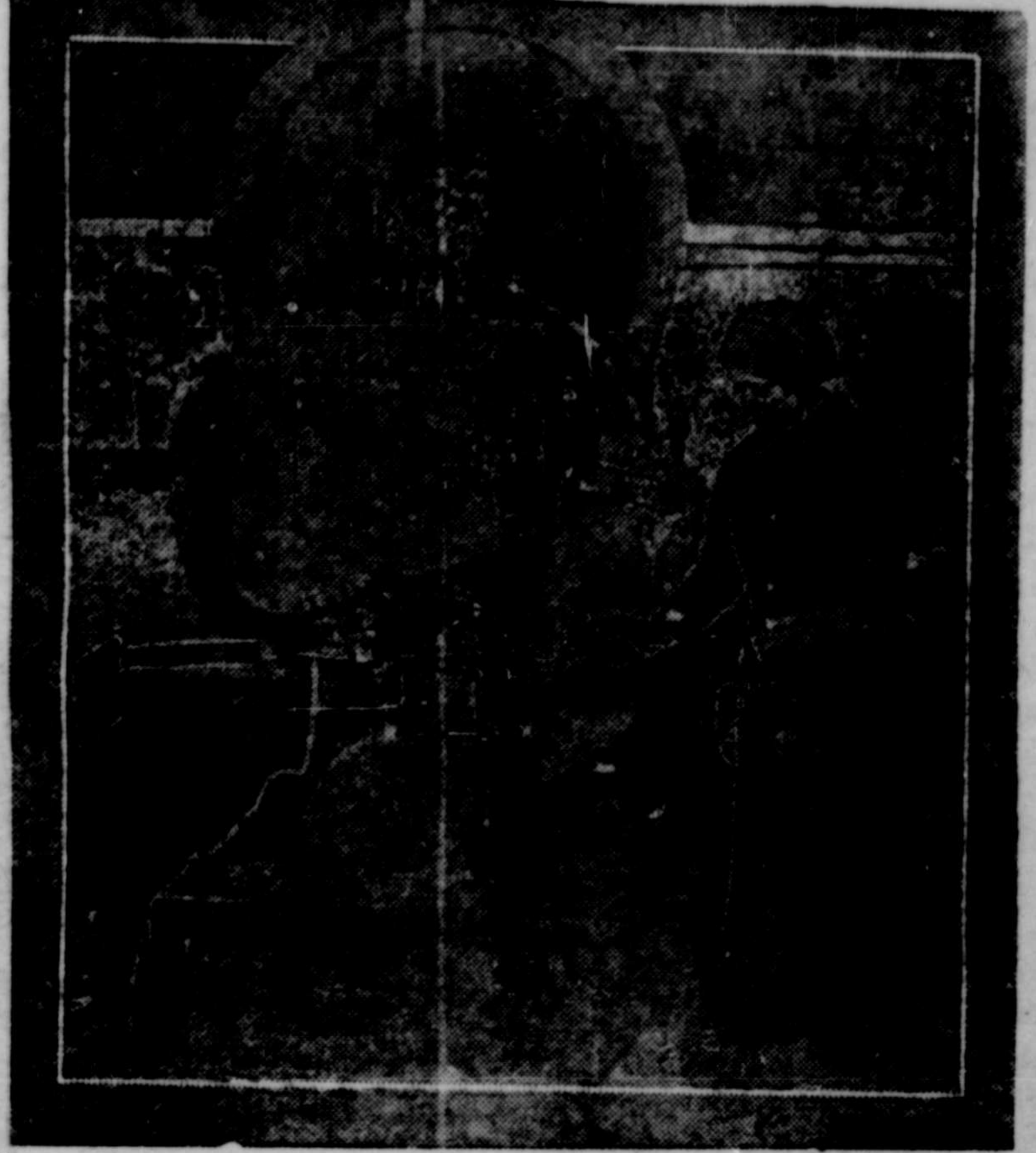

Washington, Jan. 5.—Thomas W. Lawson, of Boston, has cancelled a European trip in order to give evidence before the house committee on rules investigation into the giving of advance information regarding the submission of the President's peace note to the Entente Powers.

Mr. Lawson wrote to the chairman of the committee urging an investigation and expressing a willingness to give evidence. He says that the "leak" of last week was one of a series, through which he says "the American people were robbed of hundreds of millions of dollars of their savings." The letter predicts that other similar "leaks" are coming and that there is an arrangement to "split" the plunder with prominent men.

GRAND TRUNK BOATS TO BE OVERHAULED HERE

Mayor McCaffery, who has been in communication with W. P. Hinton in regard to the overhauling of the G. T. P. steamers at Prince Rupert, has received a letter from the traffic manager of the G. T. P. stating that, following the overhauling of the Prince Rupert, all the steamship overhauls will be carried out at Prince Rupert. Mr. Hinton also intimates that the necessary applications have been made to Ottawa in regard to the Emerson sawmill and that he expects that everything will be fixed up at an early date and construction work begun.

MERCHANTS FAVOR WEDNESDAY CLOSING

There was a well-attended meeting of the Retail Merchants' Association in the city hall last evening when various matters of interest were discussed. There was a lengthy discussion regarding the half-holiday and on a vote being taken all but one favored Wednesday as the most suitable day on which to close.

The question of having the G. T. P. overhaul their steamers here was brought up and gone into fully. Ald. D. C. McRae and R. A. Grant were appointed as a committee to take the matter up with the officials of the company. They were asked to intimate to the company that the merchants were finding it monotonous to give their business to the G. T. P. while the company still gave most of its patronage to the south.

The question of the existence of closed towns, such as Granby, was also discussed widely and it was decided to make an appeal to the provincial government asking that the town be thrown open.

FISHERY COMMITTEES ARE AGAIN ACTIVE

Last evening the fisheries committee of the city council met with the committee of the Board of Trade and those who served on the citizens' committee last year, in the city hall, to discuss the fishing situation with a view to placing the demands of this district before F. H. Cunningham, the coast representative on the Fisheries Advisory Board. Ald. Montgomery presided.

The requests to be made will be along the lines submitted last year and a joint meeting will be held on Monday afternoon to draw up the representations and to discuss the line of action to be taken.

The committee will take up the matters of opening up the northern fishing areas to all comers who may desire to erect canneries and carry on business under the regulations laid down; the abolishing of the cannery boat-rating which is largely responsible for the employment of so many Orientals; the removing of all monopolies in streams; the allowing of Canadian halibut fishermen to take dog salmon for bait and a number of other changes which are considered desirable by the fishermen.

BRITISH ARMY OF TWO MILLION MEN IN FRANCE

Haig's Splendid Force on Western Front—Three Aeroplanes Downed—No Coal for Norway.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Jan. 5.—Two million completely trained and thoroughly equipped men, ready instantly to receive instructions to deliver an attack on the German lines, represented the British army in France on January 1st, under the command of General Sir Douglas Haig.

Three Planes Downed.

London, Jan. 5.—Three German aeroplanes were shot down over the western front yesterday. Two of the crews were killed and the crew of the other enemy machine was captured.

Norway Threatened.

Christiania, Norway, Jan. 5.—The British government forbids the export of coal to Norway. The shutting off of coal supplies from Britain might result in a coal famine here.

Dissatisfaction with the Norwegian method of exporting ore, fish and other commodities and failure to fulfill other provisions of the agreement entered into with the British government is said to be responsible for this drastic action on the part of Britain.

Mrs. West Retires.

London, Jan. 5.—Mrs. Cornwallis-West, as a result of the severe official censure administered at the court of enquiry yesterday, has decided to retire from all public work, it is understood.

TORNADO WRECKED RURAL SCHOOL HOUSE

Muskogee, Oklahoma, Jan. 5.—A tornado wrecked a rural school house near here yesterday. Thirteen school children were killed and twelve were seriously injured, four of them probably fatally.

GO AFTER THEM

Just before the order-in-council regarding the cost of living was adopted at Ottawa members of the government declared that drastic steps were about to be taken to deal with the problem, with particular application to trusts and combines. When the order was passed it was found that the burden of investigation was unloaded upon the municipalities, which upon discovering any "undue" enhancement of prices were expected to submit their evidence to the justice department at Ottawa, which was empowered to prosecute the culprits. Fierce penalties were provided, but sceptics, remembering the carpet slipper commission of four years ago and the fact that the government itself was collective and individually placed in office by the big interests, regarded these as so much stage thunder. Penalties without prosecution are worthless.

Canadian municipalities have ever-growing opportunities of testing the bona fides of the national government in respect of this vital question as well as the practicability of the measure it took to deal with it. Our retail merchants in this city say they have a sound case in connection with several commodities, particularly sugar. That this province is in the grip of a sugar trust has been self-evident for years. Let the municipality collect the evidence, transmit it to Ottawa and demand action through the "drastic measures" provided by the order-in-council. If its researches disclose any other cases, which undoubtedly they would, let the evidence respecting them be sent to headquarters also. In that way we soon

shall know how much value to attach to the machinery set up for dealing with the high cost of living and whether parliamentary action in the direction of more effective measures will be necessary.

Trusts, combines, mergers and other large commercial interests must realize that the call to sacrifice includes the average citizen. They must suffer relatively from the exigencies of a war in which things a thousand times more precious than dividends are at stake as much as anybody else. They should not expect to operate on the same profitable basis upon which they may have operated in normal times, and the government should see that they are not allowed to do so. Moreover, the government would be wise in taking this matter in hand in the strongest possible way, and profiteers themselves would be wiser still if they made executive action unnecessary, for as surely as the sun rises there will be serious trouble in this country when the war ends if at that time no substantial relief is at hand. Academic lectures and appeals from the finance minister for thrift are merely a waste of energy unless the government itself resolutely bears its share of responsibility for the public welfare and deals seriously with those problems. Without their solution a call for thrift on the part of the people generally is little better than cruel irony.—Victoria Times.

IRISH REVOLUTION AGAIN PREDICTED

New York, Jan. 2.—Prediction that another revolution in Ireland is certain unless peace is restored "very soon" was made by John D. Moore, secretary of the Friends of Irish Freedom, in a statement issued tonight as a protest in behalf of Irish Nationalists against an international alliance such as is proposed by the league to enforce peace.

Mr. Moore declared no small nation ever had achieved its freedom "excepting in participating in a general war and making alliances with its oppressors' enemies."

He asserted any attempt to force Irishmen into the British army "will be resisted to the death. It is expected the Irish will receive assistance from their greatest ally, Germany," he said.

CHURCHMEN DECLARE PEACE MAY BE CURSE

Washington, Dec. 31.—In a signed document addressed to the nation, more than fifty prelates and laymen of various denominations representing many sections of the country have united in a warning against what they declare may be a premature peace in Europe which "may bring a curse instead of a blessing." The address declares the Christians of America should consider the right or wrong of the occupation of Belgium, Poland and Ser-

bia, the Armenian massacres, the destruction of merchant ships, the hardships of Jews and Syrians the "attempt to array Moslem against Christian in 'holy war,'" and to be reminded that "peace is the triumph of righteousness and not the mere sheathing of the sword." It further declares the signers "view with some concern the organized and deliberate efforts now being made so to stampede Christian sentiment as to create a public opinion blindly favorable to stopping hostilities without adequate consideration of the issues which the war involves."

PHOTOGRAPHING SOUND IS LATEST INVENTION

The ancient and modern were brought together at the sessions of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, held in New York recently. A machine that "shows how sound looks" and a restored "pithecanthropus erectus," who roamed the earth 500,000 years ago as the "missing link" were amongst the exhibits. A discussion as to whether man has been on this continent for 125,000 years or 300,000 years was a feature of the gathering, while there were many addresses on modern economic and humanitarian subjects.

The sound machine, which is called the "phonodeik," was exhibited by Prof. Dayton C. Miller, of the Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland, Ohio. He explained that the instrument photographs the variations of the human diaphragm governing the volume and cadences of the voice and projects them, magnified 40,000 times, on a screen. A record of Caruso's voice caused a broad, violently fluctuating line of light, while Tetrazini's voice showed as a finely pencilled dancing path of light. Prof. Miller spoke the word "war" into the machine and a confused irregular blot of light flashed upon the screen. Pronunciation of "peace" produced a marked contrast.

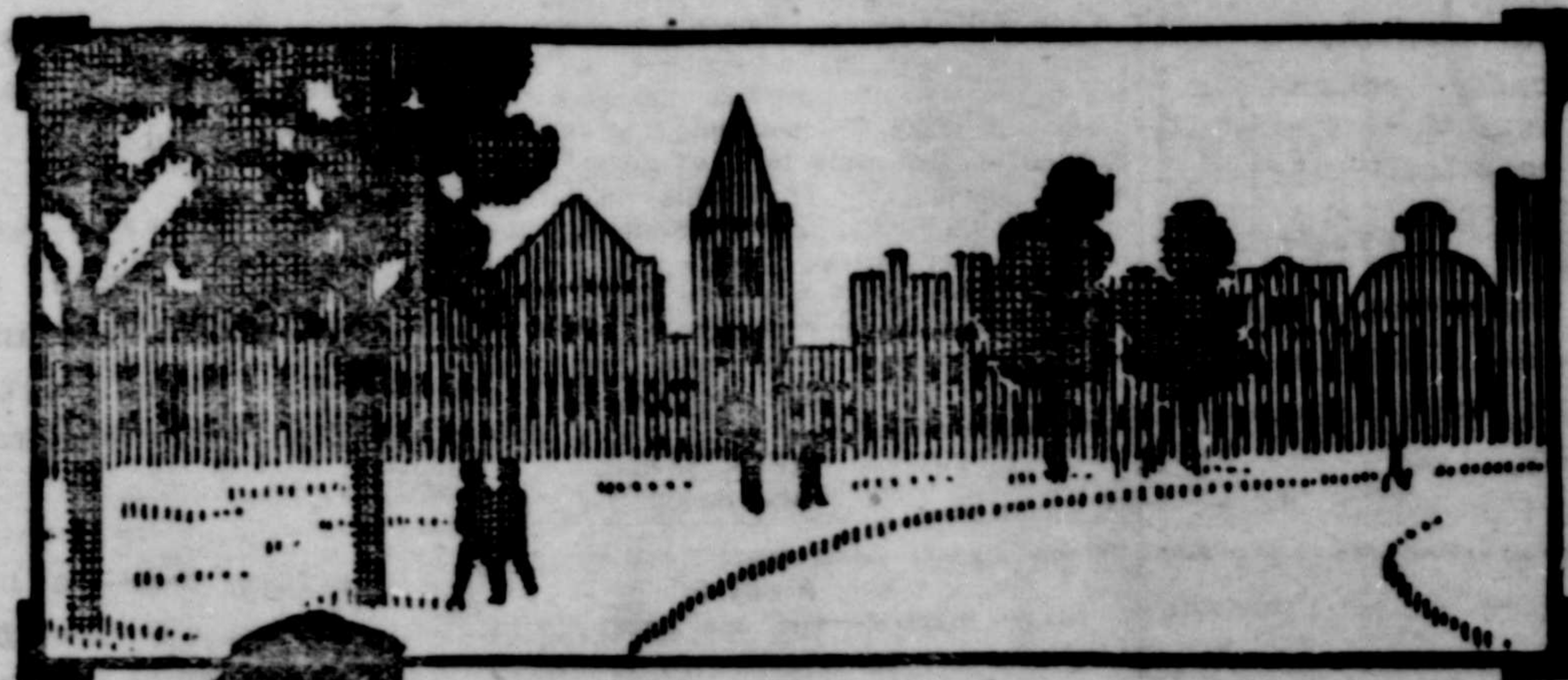

WONDERFUL CLOCK IN STRASBURG CATHEDRAL
The clock in Strasburg Cathedral is one of the most wonderful of its kind. It was first made in 1574, and went through various phases till it was remade in 1842, and since that date has been in perfect working order. This clock not only tells the time of day, but the month, the day of the month, and all the movable feast days of the Catholic Church. A statue of Apollo points out the day of the month and the name of the saint corresponding to that day. The clock shows the rising and setting of the sun, the diurnal motion of the moon round the earth, its passages over the meridian, the phases of the moon, and the eclipses of both sun and moon. Allegorical figures in chariots representing the days of the week drive into view, appearing each day in proper order: On Sunday, Apollo; Monday, Diana; Tuesday, Mars; Wednesday, Jupiter, armed with a thunderbolt; Thursday, Thor; Friday, Venus, and Saturday, Saturn.
At a quarter past the hour a child comes forward and strikes a bell once; at half past a youth strikes the bell twice; at a quarter to the hour a middle-aged man strikes it three times; and just before the hour a tottering old man strikes the bell four times. Then a figure of death steps forward and solemnly strikes the hour.
On the stroke of twelve, the twelve Apostles appear, each one bowing as he passes the figure of Christ, who stands with hands uplifted in blessing, and as the procession passes, a cock crows three times in a very life-like manner and flaps its wings.—Ex.

FROM FAR AND NEAR
The only approach to witness at midnight on New Year's Eve in Seattle was what came from above in the shape of snow. As a result of the city having gone dry 1917 was greeted in the most decorous fashion. The celebration was in marked contrast to previous fetes.
Fourteen hundred men engaged in shipbuilding in Portland, Ore., are on strike. Both sides are emphatic in declaring that no compromise will be made.
Alaska's mineral production for 1916 is valued at \$50,900,000, an increase of 54 per cent over 1915. Heavy exports of copper are responsible for the big increase. Gold shows a small increase.

Denmark is beginning to feel the pinch of war times and the government is taking steps to conserve the food and fuel supplies. Rye bread, the staple bread of the country, has for some time been mixed with ten per cent of barley and this is likely to be increased to twenty per cent.
Prof. Franklin Bobbitt, of the University of Chicago, says that public schools are only 50 per cent efficient. He says, "We have passed the quill pen stage in education. We are now at the typewriter stage. If our schools were properly equipped they could do in half a day what they now do in a whole day."

Perched on top of a disabled hydroplane and half frozen by the waves that dashed over him for two hours, T. K. Okuri, a Japanese aviation student was rescued from a perilous position four miles off Staten Island the other day. The captain of a tug-boat noticed him frantically waving for help and effected a rescue. The hydroplane was lost.
