# ALLIED CONFERENCE IN ITALIAN CITY-THE GERMANS SAY DOBRUDJA IS THEIRS

# ALLIES TO HOLD CONFERENCE IN

Lloyd George and Lord Milner are Now in Rome-Senate Approves Wilson Note-Greek Vessels Sunk.

London, Jan. 6 .- Premier Lloyd George and Lord Milner, accompanied by their official advisers, have arrived at Rome where they are to hold a conference with the French, Russian and Italian government representatives.

### Washington Approves.

Washington, Jan 6 .- At the conclusion of a stirring debate, which lasted for three days, the Senate adopted Senator Hitchcock's resolution and voted approval of President Wilson's request that a statement of the terms upon which a peace conference may be started be secured from the belligerents.

# Greek Steamer Sunk.

Paris, Jan. 6 .- The Siripires, a Greek steamer, has been sunk. The captain and his crew of twelve men have been safely landed. The Greek steamer Tsiropinas has also been sunk. Her crew of twenty-five was saved. The crew of the Norwegian vessel Odda, which was sunk, was also saved. The Spanish ship San Leandro is also a victim but there is no report regarding the fate of her crew.

Heavy Fighting Near Loos-Heavy Artillery Fighting on Verdun Front-Minor Battles Elsewhere.

London, Jan 6 .- There was heavy fighting yesterday in the vicinity of Loos, following the entrance into the British trenches of parties of the enemy. A number of German dead were left in the trenches after the repulse. Some British soldiers are missing.

# GERMANS CLAIM DOBRUDJA HAS BEEN CAPTURED

Braila Taken and Rumanians and Russians Driven into Moldavia-Small Russian Successes.

Berlin, Jan. 6 .- (Official) The Germans and Bulgarians have captured Braila, the most important Rumanian commercial centre on the Danube. The armies of the Central Powers continue to advance through greater Wallachia into Moldavia.

Galatz is the only remaining Rumanian town which is still uncaptured. The success of our armies closes the Dobrudja pathway to Constantinople from Russia. Von Mackenzen has carried the towns of Slobozia and Rotesti. Russian Report.

Petrograd, Jan. 6.—The enemy last night silently approached a Russian position south of Brody, on the Galician front, but was repelled with losses.

North of Zolotvin, Russian scouts attacked an Austrian reconnoitering party. Several were bayonetted; others were captured, and the remainder dispersed.

## MORE PEACE TALK

That the refusal of the Entente Powers to enter into any discussion of peace, unless Germany and Austria come out openly and show that they are sincerely sorry that they ever made an attempt to gain world dominance and that they are ready and willing to make reparation for the great wrongs done Belgium and Serbia, has given the Kaiser and his friends to think furiously is evident from the reports of impending conferences at Vienna and Berlin. It is significant that these conferences are not of a military character and have no bearing upon the carrying out of any new scheme of campaign but are simply diplomatic gatherings called to discuss the political situation.

It is apparent that in submitting his proposals for a peace conference, the Kaiser once more showed himself to be utterly incapable of estimating the character of the British people. There is little doubt that he expected an entirely different\_ answer to his overtures, and that he looked for a sharp division amongst the British people on the question of the continuance of hostilities. It is not unlikely that he placed his confidence in the success of his appeal on the fact that, before the war, there was a large element in Britain, headed by Lord Haldane and other admirers of German methods, industrial and scientific, which scorned the idea of war with Germany and which, even after the rape of Belgium, still had strong sympathy for German lines of thought.

There is little doubt that the Kaiser figured that between the people who were sick and tired of the war and the followers of Haldane, there would at once be a strong clamor for peace,


