## BREWSTER PLANNING GREAT DEVELOPMENT

### FINANCES ARRANGED--STEEL PLANT AND SMELTER MAY BE ESTABLISHED IN B. C.

#### BREWSTER HAS BIG PLANS FOR THIS PROVINCE

Finances Arranged for Mining Development—Steel Plant and Smelter May be Constructed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Toronto, Jan. 15.—Interviewed on his arrival here from Ottawa, Premier Brewster announced that he had been successful in securing financial assistance for the development of the vast mineral resources of the province of British Columbia.

Mr. Brewster said that the establishment of a steel plant and the construction of a smelter were matters requiring the immediate consideration of his government. The Premier said that the most important duty which devolved upon himself and his ministers was the changing of the system of patronage which has been practiced consistently for fifteen years into one of production.

#### Mines May be Taken.

Ottawa, Jan. 15.—An official statement issued respecting the labor difficulties in the western coal mining areas hints that the government might assume control if the mine operators and the men are unable to arrange satisfactory terms amongst themselves.

#### SANTA MARIA MINE NOW SHIPPING ORE

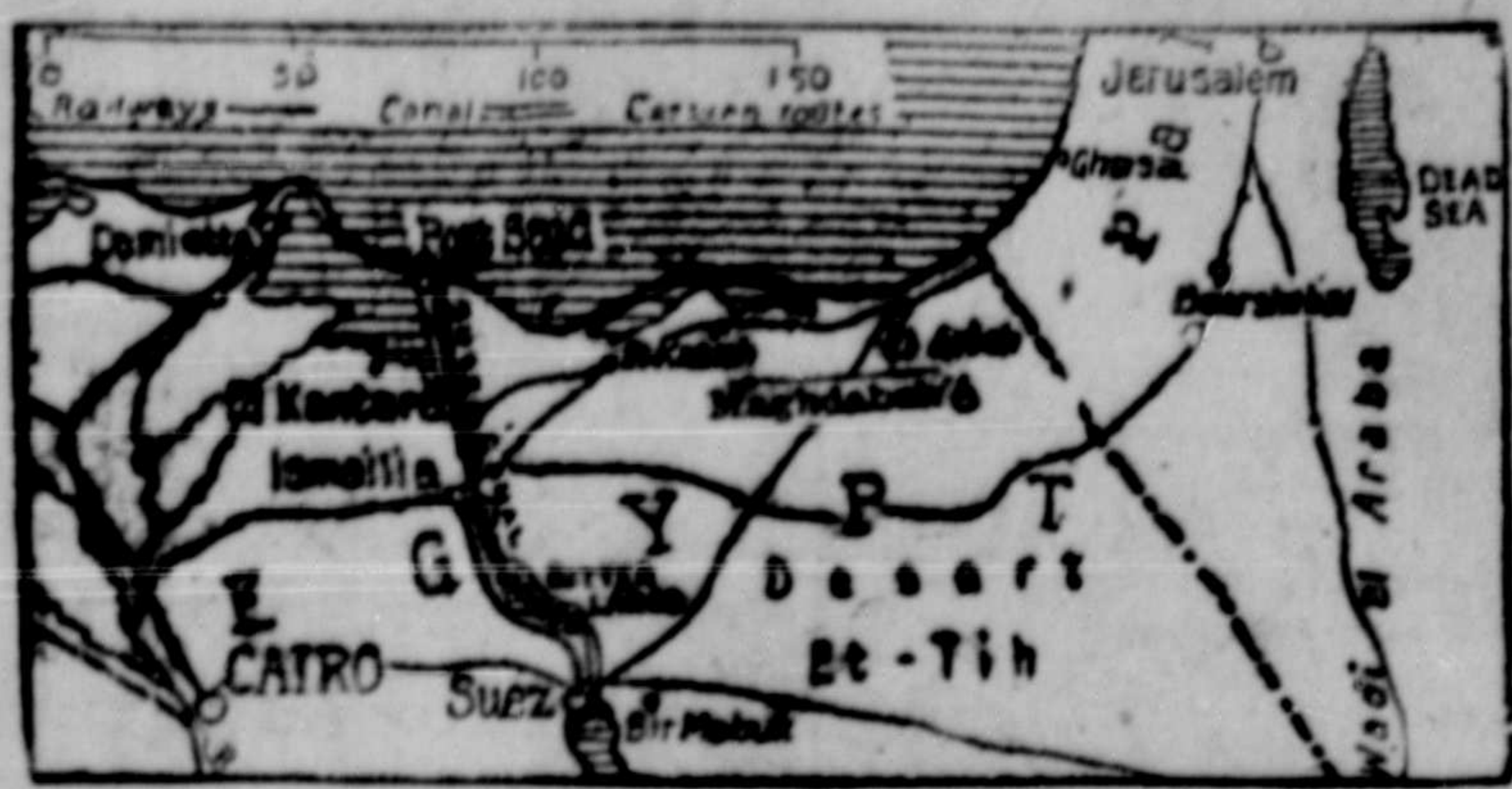
The first ore from the Santa Maria mine arrived in Telkwa on Tuesday or Wednesday of this week, and unless the weather continued soft so as to cut up the road, six four-horse teams will be on the job in a few days, possibly six six-horse teams. The road was opened last Saturday and was in good shape. The ore teams leaving Telkwa will make the 20 miles the first day and the six miles to the mine, load and return the second day and make Telkwa the third day.

On Wednesday of this week most of the machinery for the mine was shipped from Vancouver. The plant will include a three-drill compressor, a hoist and pumps. Denver drills will be used. A 50 h. p. gas engine will furnish the motive power. By the time the plant can be freighted out to the mine and put in running order it will be the first of March, but from then on good progress will be made on mining. In the meantime the ore is being taken out by hand.—The Omineca Herald.

#### FEATHERED FRIENDS ASSIST THE GUNNERS

A sailor recently stated that seagulls are very useful for betraying the whereabouts of a submarine. When the birds discern a periscope they rise in a flock from the water's surface, and circle round it uttering shrill cries. This performance attracts the attention of the crews of approaching vessels, and oftentimes results in the submarine being discovered.

Whilst seagulls are unconsciously aiding sailors, parrots are carrying out equally useful work for soldiers. It has been discovered that parrots have an extraordinary faculty for anticipating the approach of aircraft. Before an aeroplane has come within range of the human eye, the feathered alarm becomes violently agitated and shrieks incessantly.

In France wild birds often provide artillery observers with clues as to the whereabouts of hidden batteries. Birds rise in flocks from trees in the vicinity of which guns are being fired, and when there is a lull in the activities of the concealed artillery many of them return to their former perches. A trained observer can quickly tell, from the erratic movements of flocks of birds, the approximate locality of gun batteries hidden from his view.—Tit Bits.

#### ITALIANS GET TWO AUSTRIAN SUBMARINES

Russians Drive Back Germans on Rumanian Front—Enemy Attacks Repelled on the Riga Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Jan. 15.—Italian destroyers have captured the Austro-Hungarian submarines V. C. 12 and V. T. 12.

#### Rumanian Front.

Petrograd, Jan. 15.—The Russians have repulsed the Austro-Germans in various localities in Rumania and have also driven back a heavy German attack in the vicinity of Riga, where the enemy tried to regain some of the ground lost in the recent Russian advance.

#### Berlin Report.

Berlin, Jan. 15.—Under fierce attacks, the Teutonic forces made progress against the Russians, capturing the towns of Kotumikhali and Vadeni.

#### Suspects Arrested.

New York, Jan. 15.—Working on the theory that enemies of the Entente Powers were responsible for the recent explosions at the works of the Dupont Powder Co., and the Canada Car and Foundry Company, the New Jersey police have arrested several persons on suspicion.

#### TELKWA MAY HAVE COLD STORAGE PLANT

A number of the Bulkley Valley farmers are considering the advisability of erecting at Telkwa a small cold storage plant and an abattoir for the use of the farmers of the valley. The idea, if carried into effect, will give the local farmers many advantages, such as enabling them to kill when the animals are ready and to hold in storage until the market is ready. It will also permit of shipping in carload lots to the coast. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting of the directors of the Farmers' Institute.—Omineca Herald.

#### LORD MAX REMAINS CANADIAN EYE WITNESS

Ottawa, January 10.—Spite of peerages and such, Sir Max Aitken retains his official position as Canadian Eye Witness, supposedly at the front, but really tending his own fences in dear old Lunnon. It is about time SIR Max dropped the pretence and let a real newspaper man have the job. Sir Max as Eye Witness is a joke and the joke is on Canada.

Many people have written to ask why Sir Max was appointed. What qualifications had he? The answer is that Sir Max got the job because he wanted to be a safety-first colonel and have a sort of official status in the war that would help him in his social aspirations in England. Sir Max guessed right when he figured that being Canadian Eye Witness would help him a lot with the folks at Westminster. The immediate result is a peerage. Sir Max becomes Lord Brunswick, thereby conferring, as no doubt he will imagine, distinction both on his native province and on a very gallant gentleman who died at Waterloo. There is nothing small about Max when it comes to choosing a name to grace his new title.

Another of Sir Max's qualifications is that he had a Canadian career. He was among the first persons in Canada to teach the greedy money to get together and form, large snowballs with increased momentum, enhanced power of gravitation and many other advantages. He was merger's mormon, so to speak. He committed merger on the slightest provocation. At this game he made a couple of million dollars, which he took to England because it would go twice as far there as it does here. In Canada we could never see Max. He cut a very small figure in spite of his money. We had run against his sort before and didn't care very much for them.

But over in England they saw Max and his bundle quite distinctly—particularly his bundle. #### BRITISH GAINS ON THE SOMME AND THE ANCRE

German Attacks Repulsed—The British Make Successful Raids—French Capture an Aeroplane.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 15.—The British forces bombarded the German trenches in the vicinity of the Ancre yesterday and repelled several attempted raids on the part of the enemy.

The British troops executed effective operations against the German positions north of the Somme and made successful raids on the German defences south of Neuve Chapelle.

#### Verdun Front.

Paris, Jan. 15.—The French repulsed a number of German attacks on the Verdun front, the enemy sustaining heavy losses in the encounters. Our troops captured a German aeroplane and made the crew prisoners.

#### Japanese Cruiser Sunk.

Tokio, Jan. 15.—The Japanese cruiser Tsuchuba has been sunk in the harbor of Yokosuka. The vessel took fire following an explosion in her powder magazine. One hundred and fifty-three of her crew were killed and a hundred and fifty-seven injured by the explosion.

KAISER INSANE

It has long been supposed that the Kaiser is possessed of a disordered brain, to put the matter gently, and his latest proclamation to the German people is one more piece of evidence which goes to the confirming of the belief.

As usual, he makes free use of the name of The Almighty and enlists Him on the side of the Germans, in spite of the fact that, since the outbreak of the war, it has been clearly shown that, in this instance, Providence is not on the side of the big battalions, as Napoleon claimed it was.

Wilhelm is at liberty to make his own terms with Providence but when he asserts that the Allies are out to satisfy their lust for conquest and to enslave the whole of Europe, he simply becomes ridiculous, not only in the eyes of his enemy, but in the minds of all neutral nations.

The Entente Powers comprise the major portion of Europe, bound together to save little Belgium from the hand of the Prussian tyrant and there is no sign of their desire to enslave the people of Spain, Norway, Sweden, Holland, or Switzerland, the only neutrals in Europe, so that it is quite clear that Wilhelm's charge of slavery must be applied only

to the German people. Naturally, poor old Bill considers that Germany is the whole of Europe. So far as even the Germans are concerned, the Kaiser knows thoroughly how well the German prisoners are being treated in Britain and France, while our men in Germany are treated like dogs.

If there has been any doubt as to the insanity of the Kaiser, it must now have been completely dissipated and he must be looked upon by friend and foe alike as incapable of controlling the destinies of a great nation and unfit to be at liberty.

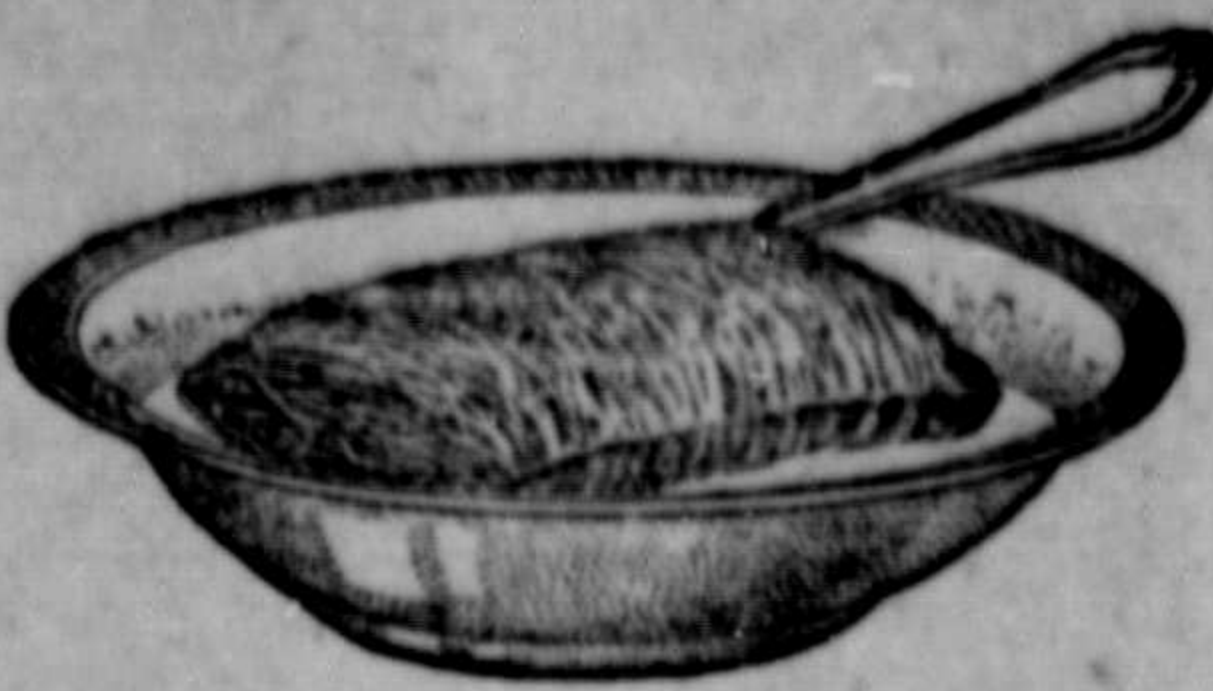
The German people are the unfortunate victims of the whims of a lunatic and they must be saved, if they refuse to save themselves. The only sensible thing for the people of Germany to do is to rise in their might and demand that the Kaiser be removed from the throne; that his weakling son be removed with him, and that a democracy be set up which will give the German nation an opportunity to develop along the lines which its real genius will choose.

vice, both bomb-proof jobs to which great glory was attached. Sir Max is, of course, a conscriptionist, just as Sir Sam is openly, and just as R. B. would be, if he wasn't afraid of civil war. Which reminds us that R. B. is as great a reader, ceteris paribus, of civil war for this country as Sir Edward Carson is for Ireland. It runs in our memory that R. B. made his first mad rush into federal politics away back in 1905 on a civil war platform. He was afraid, so he said, that the prairie provinces were about to rebel. He himself had much ado not to cry "To Arms." He restrained himself, however, because fighting makes a nasty mess. As R. B. will remember, we had then, instead of civil war, which he feared, a general election, which the Liberals won. That is our way in North America—R. B. talks civil

war and we have an election. In South America it is the other way round.

Still another qualification besides being R. B. Bennett's friend, Sir Max had in being the white-haired boy with Sir Sam. Max was always on the spot to witness Sam's arrival in London, his racy encounters with Kitchener and Roberts and the other heroes he mixed with as familiarly as milk does with water, his run-ins with the British War Office, his heart-to-heart talks with the King and all the other wonderful things Sam does when he visits London. So far as Max and Sam were concerned, Max was the You-and-I Witness and the long end of his job was keeping track of Sam and sharing his rainbows. Max afterwards wrote a book about it—at least he let somebody else write the book and he signed his name. It is a very thick book and right in the thick of it is Sir Sam with Sir Max beating the tom-tom. There was a movement to introduce this monumental work into the Canadian public schools as a text book, but the movement had not got very far when Sir Sam evaporated.

Some foolish person asks if Sir Max had any literary qualifications. The answer is that he had from time to time written a large number of prospectuses which always brought home the bacon. If that isn't answer enough it only remains to say that Sir Max didn't need any newspaper training for a newspaperman's job, because he intended to get another newspaperman to do it and he wasn't going to embarrass the fighting front with his presence anyhow.

Canadians had a curious idea that the Canadian Eye Witness would be a Canadian who took an intimate Canadian interest in Canadian soldiers and would tell Canadians back home what they wanted to know about their brave boys, the battles they were in, how they fought and died, the heroic deeds they performed—all the news, in fact. They had the

put in his place. There are a dozen Canadian newspaper men who would do the job well, and two or three who could do it splendidly. The newspapers can sink their little jealousies and decide on the best man, or the government might do it. It doesn't matter about his politics. Only let him have the nose for news, the industry to keep at it, and the ability to write it.

So far from letting any Canadian have a look-in at the job as assistant—that is to say, as the real correspondent who would do all the hard work and take all the risks, it is notorious that Sir Max turned down the applications of half a dozen first-class Canadian newspaper men who were kicking their heels in London. Instead, Sir Max turned the job, or such parts of it as he cared to undertake, to a London newspaper correspondent who duplicated his London copy and signed Sir Max's name to it for Canada. This may have been good stuff for the London newspapers, but for Canada it was next door to nothing, because it mentioned the Canadians only in general terms and when it did come to special performances it omitted the names, places, dates and other identifying circumstances. Even this hollow mockery of Canadian news has been intermitted lately so that Canada knows nothing about what her boys are doing save through letters home and other private channels.

The opinion prevails here that it is time to end this farce of an Eye Witness whose Ego takes so much witnessing that he can't get away from London where the peerages are being distributed. If the Borden government is anxious to stimulate recruiting it will speedily replace Lord Brunswick with a humbler but more industrious reporter who will not give the war the absent treatment it gets from the present Eye Witness.—H. F. Gadsby.
