When Forced to Speak Lawson Makes Startling Charges Says Chairman Gave Him the Initial Information.

(Special to The Daily News.) Washington, Jan. 16 .--- Threatened with imprisonment if he continued his refusal to divulge the names of the persons implicated in the stock gambling pool, which profited by advance information regarding the issuing of President Wilson's peace note, Thomas W. Lawson, befere the House Committee on Rules, asserted yesterday that Representative Henry, chairman of the investigation committee, furnished him with the initial information. Secretary McAdoo; H.
