WHAT KIND OF PRINCE RUPERT SHALL WE MAKE?

"What kind of Prince Rupert shall we make?" It is a question that every man and women who intends to live their life here might well take time to ponder over. Even if half the population stayed away from church over the week end to contemplate on the questio, it would be justified. No more solemn question will be propounded in the churches. To build a good clean livable city here and now, is a much more revelant thing than to worry about admission to a New Jerusalem in the skies, after we are dead.

And even the man who wrote most and with most assurance about the New Jerusalem, pictured it saying, "And I beheld a city-." It was to him the ideal city.

No one need waste any gray matter in wondering whether Prince Rupert is going to be a rich or a big city. With a continent like a big wheatfield behind us, with the trade of the East and the West to pass along the little line of steel that comes to a stop on the banks of Tucks Inlet, there is no doubt as to the great commercial future that is awaiting Pruince Rpert. There is no doubt but that every inch of real estate held long enough, will make a turn-over yielding profits to present owners.

But the fact has got to be faced that a city may grow to be a big city and a rich city, and not even in a worldly sense be a good city. It is an awful responsibility for a handful of people to have thrust on them, this responsibility for making or marring that side of a city's life which in a man responds to what we call character. And cities have characters, just as men do. New York, Chicago, Boston, London, Manchester, Paris, Glasgow,—often they vary as BESNER & BESNER, Proprietors much in their characters as do the men of one family, who in featur The New Knox Hotel is run on the European resemble each other.

It is true that Prince Rupert started off with a handicap in its FIRST AVENUE, PRINCE RUPERT charter of incorporation. After we had all decided, as it were, what kind of a character we were going to try to live up to, that character was denied us. Another one, very different from the one we wanted was forced on us. Conditions and contracts of which we knew nothing and wanted nothing were hung about our necks. A good many valiant souls were disheartened at the handicap. And it is a handicap on the hopes we had, that we would show the world and the seer of Patmos himself, something of what that ideal city might look like on earth.

But just as the man who throws away his character finds it staring him in the face which ever way he turns, so the city cannot get away from its ideals. At every crisis it confronts us. "What kind of city are you going to make of me?" it aske.

Since the city was incorporated, it has had a bad attack of party fever. Party fever to young cities corresponds to measles in children. Few escape it. It is an infantile complaint. Some folk think it is a good thing to get it over and done with. Let us hope so.

Now that the fever is pretty well out of our blood, the time has come for good citizens of all parties, Liberals, Conservatives, Socialists and Labor, to face the question of questions—the question on which so many things depend—"What kind of city shall we make?"

Take the question of the waterworks scheme, for which the council will soon ask the citizens to vote half a million dollars; take the question of the Tsimpsean Power Company's proposals to establish gas works, an electric power plant and a street railway. On any one of the propositions it is the character element that is the deciding factor. We need waterworks, we need gas works, we need a power plant, soon we will need a street railway. Of their desirability there is no question.

The question arises over what is the waterworks project to bea vast piece of patronage to be bestowed piecemeal in the guise of day's labor, or a bona fide piece of civic enterprise where every man in return for good wages will do an honest day's work, and where his liability for "services rendered" ends with the blowing of the whistle each night.

So too, with the Tsimpsean Power Company's projects, there is material enough to prove both that civic ownership is a success and that it is a failure. The determining question is, "Are we good enough and honest enough to run these enterprises for the public benefit alone, or must we get a private company to come in and act as trustee for the public, in return for the profit it can make?" The question of "Can we raise the funds?" takes second place to that.

The question of "What kind of city are we going to make?" depends upon the kind of citizen each man and woman proposes to be. To the discussion of the question "How best to make Prince Rupert a good city" we invite the assistance of all who are interested. Were it not that any prize we could offer would be wholly incommensurate to the benefits someone might confer on the community, we would feel like offering a prize for the best contribution.

How do you propose to answer the problem?
