GERMANS LOSE DESTROYERS IN NORTH SEA

TWO SUNK AND ONE DISABLED -- UNFRIENDLY COMMENT ON WILSON'S SPEECH

GERMANS LOSE DESTROYERS IN THE NORTH SEA

Two Sunk and One is Towed into Dutch Port—Commander Killed—British Take Prisoners.

Amsterdam, Holland, Jan. 24.—Two German torpedo destroyers were sunk by the British in the North Sea on Monday night. Thirteen enemy destroyers were ordered to leave Zeebrugge harbor in order to avoid thick ice. In the North Sea, they encountered a flotilla of British destroyers and engagement ensued, which was continued into Tuesday morning. Besides having two destroyers sunk, the Germans suffered heavy casualties. It is believed, though details are lacking, that sixteen severely wounded German sailors were landed from a Dutch steamer, which afterward towed in the destroyer V-69 containing twenty dead seamen. The commander died before reaching port, being both legs shot off in the engagement. There are no details regarding the British casualties.

Western Front.

London, Jan. 24.—The British pushed the German positions near Neuville St. Vaast last night and captured a number of prisoners. The British also defeated German attempts to gain their trenches near Armentieres and caused a mobile party to leave a number of dead behind in their retreat. On the French section of this front, there has been heavy cannonading between the Oise and the Aisne.

Rumanian Front.

Berlin, Jan. 24.—The Teutonic forces have resumed their advance on the Dobrudja front, while the Bulgarians have crossed the southern estuary of the Danube and have maintained themselves against the Russian attacks. An artillery battle is raging in the region around Riga.

MRS. PHILPOTT WORKS FOR MUNITIONS GIRLS

Word has been received in town from Mrs. Philpott. Captain Philpott is still "somewhere in France" and is fit and well. Mrs. Philpott is also doing her share by helping the girls who are engaged in making munitions. She works from 6:30 p. m. until 9 a. m., looking after the welfare of the girls who work all night in the munitions plants. The women in the old country are doing an amazing amount of work in caring for returned soldiers, nursing the wounded and in making war supplies.

BRAZILIANS CAPTURE GERMAN SUPPLY SHIP

Rio de Janeiro, Jan. 24.—The Danish steamer Hammershire was fired on by shore batteries as she was heading out to sea secretly from Santa Cruz, Brazil. The vessel was loaded with provisions and explosives obtained from German ships in the harbor. She was brought back to port.

Danish Steamer Sunk. London, Jan. 24.—The Danish steamer Kama has been sunk by a submarine.

E. M. SANDILANDS IS TRANSFERRED SOUTH

E. M. Sandilands, who arrived from Queen Charlotte City yesterday morning, left for the south on the Chelohsin last night, en route for Wilmer, to which point he has been transferred by the provincial government. His place as mining recorder has been taken by J. L. Barge, of Queen Charlotte City, while the duties of Gold Commissioner will devolve upon J. H. McMullin, government agent at Prince Rupert.

SENATOR DAVIS DEAD

Prince Albert, Jan. 24.—Senator Davis, who had been seriously ill for some time, passed away last night.

ROCHER DE BOULE CUTS VEIN AT DEPTH

Last week the long tunnel at the Rocher De Boule cut a five-foot vein about 2,000 feet in the hill and at a depth of 1,050 feet on the vein. This is what is known as the middle or No. 3 vein which was uncovered on the surface near the ground tram. The vein is what is called good and strong and while there was only a little ore of a milling grade in the crosscut, there is every indication of it making ore in either or both directions. A drift on this vein will be started the first of February.—Omineca Herald.

FRANK OLIVER ADVOCATES AN EARLY APPEAL

Government Has Made War Along Party Lines—Pledges Are Unfulfilled—People's Mandate Needed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—Continuing the debate on the speech from the throne, E. M. Macdonald, representing Pictou, declared that the Dominion of Canada is the only government within the Empire which has preserved a partisan attitude in the control of its military affairs. He declared that Canada should limit patronage, graft and favoritism in connection with the administration of all affairs relating to the war. Mr. Macdonald said, "It is useless to ask men to fight for freedom when the citizens of Canada know that the Conservative patronage committees are running things entirely to suit themselves and their friends."

H. H. Stevens, the member for Vancouver, briefly mentioned that it was Canada's duty to prosecute the war with all vigor and expressed the opinion that conscription is not yet necessary in the Dominion.

Frank Oliver claimed that Canada's pledge of a half million men in the service of the Empire was still unfulfilled to the extent of a hundred and seventy thousand men, when the wastage from rejections and discharges was deducted from the total.

Mr. Oliver strongly advocated that the Government should secure the people's mandate before proceeding further with the conducting of the war along the present lines, on account of the severe casualties which had been suffered by the Canadian overseas forces. He stated that twenty thousand Canadians had been killed during the war. Mr. Oliver also said that it was quite possible that the ideas of the people had undergone a change since the last election and it was the duty of the Government to find out if it still had the people behind it.

TULADI CAPTURES HUGE BLACK FISH

WILSON SPEECH COMMENTED ON UNFAVORABLY

Britain Feels That President's Intentions are Good—House May Discuss Wilson's Views.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 24.—There is considerable unfriendly comment in the British press on President Wilson's recent speech to the Senate, in which he stated that a permanent peace could not be expected to follow victory.

Prominent citizens courteously refer to the President's good intentions in trying to bring about a peace which will be lasting but, at the same time, express the belief that the only way in which a lasting peace may be brought about is by supporting to the utmost Britain's new war measures for the prosecution of the struggle to a successful issue.

In official circles silence is maintained regarding the speech but it is believed that the matter will be brought up in parliament when the House of Commons re-assembles and that there will be a free parliamentary discussion on the President's expression of his views.

OPPOSITION

Since the outbreak of the war, the Opposition in the Canadian House of Commons has done its utmost to support the Government in every whole-hearted effort to prosecute the war to a successful conclusion. Nothing has been done to impede the Government or embarrass it in any way, so far as the actual work of carrying on the war was concerned. In many instances, both in the Dominions and in the old land, liberty has had to be sacrificed to the demands of the moment, yet, in no parliament, in the Dominions, in France, Russia, Italy or Great Britain, has it been found necessary or advisable to utterly still the voice of criticism. In Great Britain, where, rightly or wrongly, the government has been carried on by a coalition, culled from all parties, there has always been a most active Opposition. Not only have matters of general policy been attacked by the Opposition, but many of the war measures have been strenuously opposed by the coalitionists who occupy the benches opposite the government.

It is clear then that, in Canada, His Majesty's Loyal Opposition has shown splendid restraint in regard to many matters which have been brought before them in carrying on the work of the war. Criticism has been offered only when no honest and loyal Canadian could be justified in remaining silent.

In replying to the speech from the throne, at the opening of Parliament this week, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in clear, unmistakable terms, pointed out the weaknesses which have been so flagrantly displayed by the Borden government during

the past two years, weaknesses which were inherent in a government with a makeshift leader, such as the Conservatives in Ottawa had forced upon them by circumstances over which they had no control. It is most certain that, but for the Hughes correspondence, Sir Wilfrid would have refrained from mentioning the lack of unity which has characterized the actions of the Government at this time, but, in view of the facts brought to light by Sir Sam Hughes, no loyal leader of the Opposition could afford to remain silent and still lead the people of Canada. It was imperative that he should speak, and speak plainly.

The important business before Canada today is the carrying of the war to a successful issue, in fact that is the only business before the people of the Dominion, as all other matters must be set aside until victory is won and a permanent peace declared. That the war may be successfully prosecuted Canada must have a strong government, and no government can be strong while its leader is so weak as Sir Robert Borden has proven himself to be. The reckless extravagance of the government in its purchases of war supplies which were never fit to be sent to the front is one of the results of the weakness of the leader. The fact that he had not the strength to shake Sir Sam Hughes loose two years before he did, in fact the having of this gentleman in the cabinet at all, was ample evidence of his weakness. The fact that Hon. Robert Rogers has been allowed to remain in the cabinet, after the disclosures in connection with the Manitoba Agriculture College building, is another instance of lack of

leadership on the part of the Premier.

If the war, so far as Canada is concerned, is to be carried to a successful conclusion there must be changes, in fact there must be one great sweeping change. The getting rid of Sir Sam Hughes did not clean up the situation, but simply threw more light upon it. Both in Canada and in England, millions of Canadian money have been wasted. Sir Thomas White calls for economy. The first economy should be the placing in power of a government which will root out all the profiteers; throw the tariff off food stuffs and bring the manufacturers to a real sense of their patriotic duty at the present critical time. Sir Wilfrid has given expression to the thoughts of the people of Canada and it is now up to the people to act.

HIGH COST OF LIVING RESOLUTION PASSED

The finance and general committee of the city council brought in a report on the high cost of living on Monday night. The report stated that the report from the various merchants had been carefully considered and that there was nothing to show that the prevailing high prices are due to any action on the part of the merchants of this city but that the high prices are caused by the manufacturers amongst whom there are signs of combination for the arranging of prices. The committee recommended that the resolution of the Nanaimo city council be endorsed.

Mr. Peters, not being satisfied with the wording of the Nanaimo resolution, drew up the following, which was adopted on motion of Ald. McMeekin, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn:

WHEREAS the government of Canada has taken some steps regarding the high cost of living throughout the Dominion, but, nevertheless, in order to obtain satisfactory results some further steps must be taken:

AND WHEREAS the purely local investigations made by the individual cities will not, in our opinion, lead to any very satisfactory results:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Government of Canada be pressed to take prompt and strong measures for the purpose of reducing the high cost of living by regulating, if necessary, the export of food stuffs; the removal of tariff barriers on food stuffs required in Canada; and the fixing of the price of wheat:

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Government of Canada hold a general investigation into the cost of producing canned goods, sugar, flour, and meats; all of which articles, and others besides, are now being charged for at prices which seem exorbitant, which prices it is suggested are caused by the influence of monopolies—and after such investigation to fix reasonable and proper prices for the same.

That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Minister of Trade and Commerce for Canada, and a copy to H. S. Clements, the member for this district, asking him to use his influence in this matter.

Ald. Mrlae was of the opinion that the resolution was an improvement on that submitted by Nanaimo. Ald. Montgomery could not see that there was much difference.

Ald. Casey said that there was one omission, in that the matter of the price of meat was not mentioned. He held that there was something wrong regarding the price of this commodity, as it was quoted at such widely varying prices by different firms. The resolution was altered so as to include meats with the other articles mentioned, and adopted unanimously.

JOHN P. ENSCH LEFT PROPERTY TO THE CITY
 City Solicitor Peters, at the city council on Monday night, reported that, by the will of John P. Ensch, who was killed at the front, four lots in the city had been left to the city for the purpose of creating a playground for children. Mr. Peters said that a man named Henry Engalts appeared to have an undivided half interest in one of the lots. The city could not use for the purpose mentioned, property in which another man holds an interest and it is proposed that the city buy the interest of the other holder or sell the Ensch interest.

A bylaw was submitted accepting the gift from the late Mr. Ensch after which the following resolution was passed on the motion of Ald. McMeekin, seconded by Ald. Casey:
 That this council greatly appreciates the action of the said John P. Ensch in leaving to this city all that he owned, for the purpose of benefitting the children of Prince Rupert.
 Mr. Ensch showed himself to be a brave soldier, and has paid the supreme sacrifice. It is most pleasing to note that not only did he possess the pluck necessary to go to the war, but that he also, during the last days of his life, should make over his property for a purpose which showed that he was not only a good soldier but a most excellent citizen, one who had at heart the best interests of the city in which he had made his home.
 And be it further resolved that this resolution be extended on the minutes of the council.
