## BRITISH DEFEAT TURKS IN MESOPOTAMIA

### TRENCHES TAKEN AND CONSOLIDATED — TURKS SUFFERED HEAVY CASUALTIES

#### BRITISH TAKE TURK TRENCHES IN MESOPOTAMIA

First and Second Line Trenches Taken and Consolidated—Turks Suffer Heavy Casualties.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 27.—The British Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia, under cover of an intense bombardment from their heavy artillery, seized and consolidated eleven hundred yards of front line trenches in the approach to Kut-el-Amara. After taking the first line positions the British captured a considerable length of second line Turkish trenches and inflicted extremely heavy casualties upon the enemy. Many prisoners were also captured. The Turks delivered four unsuccessful but furious counter-attacks.

#### Western Front.

London, Jan. 27.—Northwest of Verdun, the Teutons stormed the French trenches along a front of sixteen hundred metres. The French counter-attacked and recaptured most of the ground lost in the German assault.

#### French Report.

Paris, Jan. 27.—We repulsed with severe losses four German attacks west of the Meuse last night. The Germans penetrated our advance trenches near hill 304 yesterday.

#### German Report.

Berlin, Jan. 27.—We took trenches on a sixteen hundred metre front west of the Meuse yesterday. The French counter-attacked unsuccessfully.

#### SAYS SIR RICHARD MUST BE DISMISSED

Victoria, Jan. 23.—Prohibitionists are demanding that Sir Richard McBride, agent-general in London, be dismissed from office, alleging irregularities in the taking of the vote on the prohibition question among the soldiers overseas. The demand has not been made formally to the government. "McBride has got to go," said a prominent prohibitionist who is visiting here from Vancouver.

#### DISASTROUS FIRE AT NIAGARA FALLS

Niagara Falls, Jan. 27.—Fire broke out last night at the plant of the American Cyanide Company. Damage to the extent of several hundred thousand dollars was done.

#### BRAVE MEN DIED BECAUSE RIFLE WAS INEFFECTIVE

Turiff Scores Government for Continued Use of Weapon—Stirring Fight in Quebec Today.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—J. G. Turiff, member for Assinaboia, repeated yesterday in the House of Commons conversations which he had had with returned soldiers. These soldiers stated that because of the inefficiency of the Ross rifle they were unable to protect themselves during the German attacks. "Fathers and mothers who have sacrificed brave sons in this war have a right to know the reason why this defective weapon was continued in use after it had been proven unsuitable," declared Mr. Turiff. He asserted that the Borden government was responsible for the deaths of hundreds of Canadian soldiers by its action.

#### Stirring Election.

St. Henedine, Jan. 27.—The greatest political activity is prevailing here over the by-election which is being held today. Hon. Albert Sevigny and Lucien Cannon are both confident of victory at the polls. Mr. Cannon, who gained a victory in the provincial election by a large majority, is very confident of being able to defeat the Nationalist member of the Borden cabinet, who had a majority of only 200 in practically the same constituency in 1911.

Hon. P. E. Blondin has telegraphed to Premier Borden making an explanation of the statements made by him at St. Rose and denying that he uttered disloyal sentiments.

The Liberal press throughout Quebec is resurrecting Mr. Sevigny's speeches of 1911, in which he declared that "the Laurier cabinet is a cabinet of Imperialists, disposed to sacrifice the interests of Canada, and to launch us into wars which do not concern us. What has England ever done for us?"

#### Senate Adjourns.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—The Senate has adjourned until Monday, February fifth.

#### SCHOOL BOARD TO ADD DOMESTIC COURSE

At the meeting of the school board last evening in the city hall, for the purpose of passing the estimates for the year, it was decided to add domestic science to the curriculum in the public school course. It will take some time to organize this branch of the work, as arrangements will have to be made in the different schools for the providing of rooms. It is expected to have the work under way by mid-summer. The board will advertise for a teacher for this branch. It was also decided to secure the services of another teacher for extra work which is likely to arise during the year, owing to the increased number of pupils which are applying for admission to the different schools.

#### PATRIOTIC FUND ANNUAL MEETING

At the annual meeting of the Patriotic Fund, held in the city hall last evening, the following executive was elected: Mayor McCaffery and Ald. McRae, representing the city council; S. D. Macdonald, representing St. Andrew's Society; E. Kemp, representing the Sons of England; G. G. R. Anderson, representing the Scandinavian Society; S. M. Newton, Mrs. R. L. McIntosh, Judge Young, Rev. Canon Rix, Hal Peck, J. H. Thompson and G. W. Morrow. The executive was empowered to elect a president and vice-president, as well as canvassers and committees.

On the motion of Mrs. McIntosh and Canon Rix, a very hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Rev. W. E. Collison, honorary secretary, and C. T. Heward, honorary treasurer, for their untiring services during the past year. S. M. Newton, who presided, made reference to the excellent work done by the secretary and treasurer. On the motion of Canon Rix, seconded by Judge Young, Mr. Collison and Mr. Heward were re-elected.

The treasurer's report showed that, in January, 22 families were received support from the fund and in December the number had been increased to 37. The number of children represented by these families was 67. The average monthly allowance was \$21.60 per family, this being slightly less than last year. The total administration expenses for the year for the branch were \$142.02. The secretary submitted a report covering the activities of the organization for the year.

With regard to outstanding collections, the treasurer said that he believed that \$500 of the amount could be collected.

J. M. Clancy referring to the recent address by F. Nation, said that the provincial secretary had shown that Hazelton had done almost as much work as Prince Rupert. This was misleading as the Hazelton report included the district from Smithers to Telkwa.

Mrs. McIntosh did not think that Prince Rupert had done so well as it might, in comparison with smaller places.

The treasurer pointed out that Mr. Nation said that the city had collected \$3,500 in 1915; \$8,500 in 1916, or a total in the two years of \$12,000, with an amount to the credit of the fund in the bank that had not been forwarded to Victoria. This was also misleading, for, at the request of the Governor-General, \$2,000 had been sent to Ottawa in 1914. A further sum of \$2,500 had been sent to Victoria yesterday, making a total of \$16,000 instead of \$12,000 as stated.

#### IMPORTANT DECISION UNDER MORATORIUM

Vancouver, Jan. 24.—An important decision on a new point raised by the Moratorium Act was given by Chief Justice Hunter this morning, his lordship holding that in a case where a debt on an agreement of sale existed before the war—and which as such would come under the Moratorium Act—has been transmuted into a mortgage since the war, that it thereby forfeits protection under the Moratorium Act.

This interesting point was brought up by Mr. J. W. deB. Farris, who asked for the Prince Rupert Building Co. relief under the Moratorium from a claim made by Mr. R. Syme for H. H. Raymond the holder of a mortgage for \$3,500, made in March, 1915. "Although the mortgage is dated March, 1915, it is really a debt which was in existence before the outbreak of the war," argued Mr. Farris, who explained that the amount was due originally on an agreement of sale. In March, 1915, however, the parties made adjustments whereby the defendant took a deed from Mr. Raymond and in turn gave back a mortgage for the \$3,500. Upon this mortgage the defendant has since been sued, and has raised the Moratorium Act as an answer. Mr. Syme took the stand that the mortgage being a new one and not a renewal, did not come under the protection of the moratorium.

"The trouble is that the agreement of sale, so far as the legal aspect is concerned, disappeared when the mortgage was given," said the chief justice in giving his decision. "The mortgage is a sealed instrument into which the agreement was merged, and I do not see how it can come under the Moratorium Act."

#### PASSENGERS WERE ROWED FOURTEEN MILES

The steamer Prince John, according to latest reports, is still fast on the rocks off the Alaskan coast. The vessel struck a large submerged rock off Finger Point, ten miles from Tunka and fourteen miles from Petersburg. All the passengers were taken off in the ship's boats and rowed the fourteen miles to Petersburg. A large hole was stove in the forward part of her hull, under the fore-hold and she was taking in water rapidly when the tug Pioneer arrived to assist her. The Pioneer, formerly a fire-boat in New York harbor, is fitted with very powerful pumps and is keeping the water down. The Prince Albert, of the G. T. P. company, has been spoken and is now on her way to stand by the stranded steamer.

#### SCOTTISH SOLDIERS AS BAYONET FIGHTERS

Mr. Joseph W. Grigg, an American correspondent at British Headquarters in France, describing a visit to a training camp behind the front, says:—The bayonet drill of a Scottish sergeant, who was fresh from the trenches and giving a large body of men instruction, was as skillful as a swordsman. This sergeant had been through bayonet fighting, and four times had been mentioned for valor on the field of action. He was as alert as a tiger and as strong. Some of the fiercest bayonet work of the war has been done by the Scottish troops, and there is the feeling in all regiments of the British army that the Germans can be bested with the bayonet. One of the most interesting stories which I heard about Prussian pride was related to me by a British colonel, says Mr. Grigg. He said that a Prussian officer had been captured, and, preparatory to his being sent to a regular camp with others, was invited to share the mess quarters with several British officers. He refused to sit down with them at the table. Later, he complained that he should have fitting quarters in which to sleep. In the meantime one of the British officers had voluntarily given up his bed to the man and intended spending the night on some blankets on the floor. When this incident became known to the Prussian his complaining stopped, his features relaxed, and he burst into tears.

#### KING FROST IS PLAYING PART ON WEST FRONT

German Canals and Rivers are Icebound—Food Transportation Being Interfered With.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 27.—The intensity of the winter weather in central Europe is increasing and is causing additional suffering throughout Germany as it is interfering with the transportation of food, while it is also hindering the movement of munitions. The rivers and canals are icebound.

The use of autos by the British and French on the western front is almost impossible and several have been left stranded on lonely roads. The soldiers, principally those assigned to trench and sentry duty, are suffering severely from the intense cold.

#### Russian Front.

Heavy fighting continues between the Germans and Russians in the Tirul swamp and along the river Aa on the Riga front. The Germans claim that they have captured more Russian positions and have taken five hundred prisoners.

#### England Attacked.

German vessels shelled the coast of Suffolk last night. No casualties are reported.

**PATRONAGE**

Hon. T. D. Pattullo has recently been made the object of a bitter attack by the Vancouver Province because of his having had the temerity to appoint his own deputy. The Province went so far as to say that the change in the lands department had caused a split in the Liberal party in Victoria. That the Province deliberately tried to mislead the people, we do not believe, but that it has a correspondent in Victoria who is, to put it mildly, unreliable, is very evident. From reports of the recent meeting of the Liberal Association in Victoria, it is clear that the matter was not even mentioned.

Mr. Pattullo has made a characteristic reply to the Province attacks and states in very emphatic terms his reasons for making the change. The Minister of Lands has always had the courage of his convictions and is not afraid to make changes, where he considers them necessary in the interests of the people of this province.

Playing the game of politics as they know it, it is only natural that the Tory party should immediately grasp the opportunity to holler "patronage," simply because the Liberals stated during the election campaign that they would do away with the patronage system.

Patronage consists of the appointing of men to government positions, not because of their qualifications, but because they have rendered some service to the party in power. It is notorious that many of the employees of the McBride-Bowser government were not servants of the people, but political agents of the government. If any of these have to be removed by the new government, that government is doing a service to the people of this province, and that is their duty. They were put in power to clean up the political situation in this province, and if they fail to do so, they will be false to their pledges.

If the Brewster government

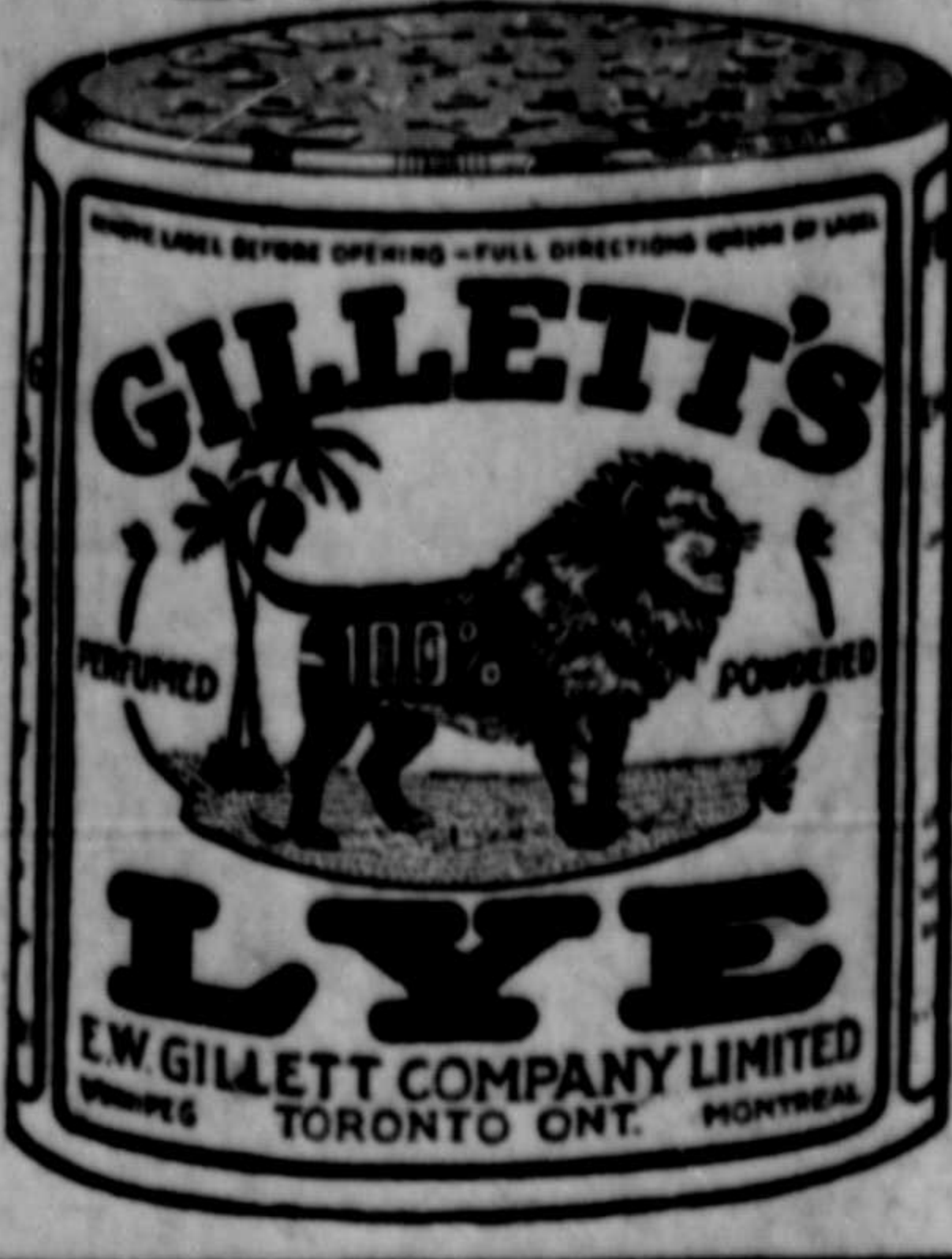
appoints any man to a position, whose sole qualification for the position is his political faith, the government shall have failed as Bowser failed. If any appointee of the Brewster government takes an active part in party politics, that man is false to his employers, the people, and ought to be dismissed immediately. That Premier Brewster and his ministers will fulfill their pledges to the people we believe thoroughly and that a civil service commission will very shortly be active in this province is certain. As the Tory papers pointed out during the election campaign, the new government has tackled a big job, in fact the Victoria Colonist said it was attempting the impossible in seeking to abolish the patronage system, but Premier Brewster is just the man for the big job and he has already shown that he is tackling it in no half-hearted fashion, even to borrowing the support of an Ottawa official.

**SOLDIERS, GET IN LINE!**

Is it necessary for a returned soldier in Toronto to join a Conservative ward association before he has any chance of securing a government position? Is the spoils system still in operation? Can no Liberal who has fought for his country hope to serve it in time of peace without renouncing his political creed? These questions are forced to the front by the uncontradicted statement that Sergeant Soloman, a returned soldier wounded in France, was told by Sergeant-Major Creighton at the city hall, when he applied for a position, to "go and join the Second Ward Conservative Association and get in line for a government job." The sergeant-major says he told the returned soldier to see the Conservative Patronage Committee, not to join the association, but that is a very lame excuse.

The statement made by Solomon is all the more significant when it is remembered that the Second Ward is a part of the constituency of the Hon. A. E.

## HOW MAJOR GREEN INTRODUCED FISH

"Hughie," who is Scotch, was a fish dealer in Prince Albert before the outbreak of the war, and his business having fallen away since so many went to the front, he went to Ottawa, taking with him a pair of frozen whitefish, to take up the matter of fish supply for the troops with the government. "Hughie" and his fish made many fruitless trips to the Parliament Buildings and finally he enlisted. Finding no fish on the soldiers' bill of fare he got permission to cook some for the boys. The experiment was a success and "Hughie" took the matter up with the war office, with the result that huge quantities of Canadian fish are now being sent

to the old country to help feed the troops. Now Major Green, "Hughie" is back in Canada looking after the fish requirements of the men at the front. The following is an extract from the Province interview with him, and it is of particular interest to the people of Prince Rupert:

"Altogether we have recently shipped five million pounds of fish for overseas forces," he said. In the maritime provinces fish which were previously thrown away are now as valuable in the market as salmon used to be.

"How big is the market?" Well, at the very least they want a million dollars worth of fish a week. That seems to me worth while. On the Northern British Columbia coast you have only a small market for your black cod. A few weeks ago we took a trial shipment of half a million pounds of it from Prince Rupert. It went well. Instead of your canneries operating only a few weeks in the summer on salmon alone, why can they not pack other fish every day of the year? The market is available and prices are good. Now is the time for your fishing people to establish their markets if they want continuous business after the war."

Recently Major Green addressed the Board of Trade of St. John's, Nfld., on the fish marketing question. The governor of the colony and the premier were present. Major Green hopes during the next few weeks to visit Vancouver in order to get into closer touch with the packers there.

Seattle Bohemians have asked Washington to use its influence to secure the liberation of the Czechs and Slovaks from Austrian rule. A resolution passed by the Bohemian League says that an independent Bohemia will hold back German expansion toward the East.

## FROM FAR AND NEAR

Circuit Judge Robert G. Morrow, of Portland, recommends the return to whipping posts to deal with automobile thieves who are very busy in Oregon at present.

Premier Hughes, of Australia, is having trouble in making arrangements for representation at the Imperial Conference because of internal trouble in his government. He is arranging with the leader of the Opposition for the formation of a new government.

"The Only Way Out," a pamphlet published in Bavaria, says that the only practical course to avert final ruin in Germany is the dethronement of the House of Hohenzollern.

As a result of the war, Canada is producing two new minerals. One is magnesium and the other is ferro-molybdenum. The magnesium is used in making starshells.

The Vancouver Province, through false reports from Victoria, has been publishing statements regarding an alleged disturbance amongst the Liberals in the capital over the appointment of G. R. Naden as deputy minister of lands. At the meeting mentioned by the Province, the matter was not even discussed.

On his arrival in Vancouver, Premier Brewster was interviewed regarding the release of Mr. Renwick, deputy minister of lands in the Bowser government. The Premier said that the change had his hearty support as he approved of all ministers appointing their own deputies, this being the only way in which there could be harmony in the department.

"La Libre Belgique," the paper published secretly in Brussels and which has caused so much trouble to the German Governor; is still being published regularly. The German officers in Brussels are exasperated and puzzled.

A Chinese student, named Ing-lis Hosang, won the gold medal at the recent oratorical contest in the University of British Columbia. His subject was "Li Yuen Hung, President of China."

Robert Millar, an active prohibitionist, has been appointed license commissioner in Vancouver.

Major Dugmore, a British officer at present in the United States, has got into trouble with the British authorities for making nasty remarks about President Wilson. The major wrote a poem lampooning the President.

William Taft describes the Washington peace "leak" enquiry as a bad smell which will soon evaporate into thin air.
